# CHAPTER 1—INTRODUCTION

Since 1960–61, a paper on Commonwealth payments to the States has been published annually among the Budget documents. From 1974–75 details of Commonwealth Government payments to local government authorities have also been included. This issue is the first to cover payments to the Northern Territory of Australia, which became a self governing Territory on 1 July 1978, with expenditure responsibilities and revenue raising powers broadly approximating those of a State.

This paper concentrates on providing information on forms of assistance on which Commonwealth expenditure has been incurred in 1977–78 and/or is proposed in 1978–79. The tables cover payments over five years where applicable, that is, the period 1974–75 to 1978–79. Information on earlier years may be found in earlier issues of this paper. The 1975–76 issue of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities' includes a consistent series of aggregate figures back to 1956–57.

#### Relationship with Statements Attached to the Budget Speech and Terminology

In the statements attached to the Budget Speech Commonwealth Government outlays are classified, inter alia, in terms of economic type—that is, as to whether they take the form of expenditure on goods and services, cash benefits to persons, payments to other levels of government or transfers to other sectors in the economy. The following table classifies estimated total budget outlays for 1978–79 by economic type and shows the proportion to total of each category.

This paper provides details of those budget outlays classified as transfer payments and net advances to or for the States, the Northern Territory and local government authorities—that is, Commonwealth assistance to other spheres of government. Payments in this category comprise payments to the States and the Northern Territory, payments made direct to local government authorities and the State Governments' Loan Council borrowing programs. These payments are estimated at \$10 799 million in 1978–79, comprising 37.4 per cent of total Commonwealth budget outlays.

In the statements attached to the Budget Speech, outlays are also classified according to function—that is, outlays having like purposes or objectives are brought together under the one functional heading. Table 2 below classifies on a functional basis the transfer payments and net advances to or for other levels of government which are covered in this document.

One of the main distinctions used in this paper is between funds provided to the States, the Northern Territory and local government for *general* purposes (that is, 'untied' funds) and those provided for *specific* purposes (that is 'tied' funds). All general purpose funds are classified under the 'Not Allocated to Function' heading. Certain forms of specific purpose payments are also classified under that heading, but most of these payments are classified under functional headings. Specific purpose payments are, with a few exceptions, grouped in the following Chapters on this functional basis.

Reference should be made here to the treatment in this and other budget papers of the State Governments' Loan Council borrowing programs, which are financed by the issue of Commonwealth Government securities and to which the Commonwealth Government itself subscribes from its own revenue sources, as necessary, to fill the programs approved by the Loan Council. The national accounting item 'grants and net advances to the States, the Northern Territory and local government authorities' used in the Statements attached to the Budget Speech and in certain other papers includes these programs. In this paper, the term 'payments to the States' does not include these programs; however, totals of payments to the States and their Loan Council borrowing programs are also given and, subject to the point referred to in the next paragraph, these totals are comparable with the totals of grants and net advances to the States included in other budget papers. The treatment of the States' Loan Council programs in this paper is explained in more detail in Chapter III.

As the term implies, the national accounting aggregate 'grants and net advances to the States, the Northern Territory and local government authorities' includes Commonwealth Government advances (loans) to the States, the Northern Territory and local government authorities on a net basis-that is, after subtracting repayments by the States, the Northern Territory and local government authorities of advances they have received from the Commonwealth Government in earlier years. The national accounting aggregate also includes the States' Loan Council programs net of sinking fund contributions. The figures for individual items and many of the aggregates referred to in the text or shown in the tables in this paper are on a gross basis—that is, before deducting repayments of Commonwealth Government loans or sinking fund contributions on State Loan Council borrowings. Where amounts are on a net basis this is specifically indicated. The grand totals in the summary tables in this Chapter and, for example, Tables 87 and 88 in Appendix I are on a net basis and are therefore consistent with the national accounting aggregate 'grants and net advances to the States, the Northern Territory and local government authorities' appearing in other budget papers.

# Outline of Commonwealth Payments to the States, the Northern Territory and Local Authorities and Format of this Paper

Payments of various descriptions have been made to the States continuously since Federation. Prior to World War II, these payments were mainly of a marginal character and were confined, for the most part, to special grants to assist the financially weaker States and to certain specific purpose grants such as assistance for roads and for debt charges. Since World War II and the immediate post-war period there has been a marked increase in the amount and scope of assistance to the States. This has reflected, among other things, increases in the range and variety of governmental activities that have accompanied economic and social developments in this period of rapid growth of the Australian economy; greater participation by the national Government in matters that were previously considered to be the sole responsibility of the States; and the effects of the introduction and continuation of uniform income tax.

An account of the historical development of payments to the States is contained in the 1975–76 issue of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities'—particularly the Appendices to that paper.

The arrangements under which the Commonwealth makes payments to the States for general recurrent purposes (referred to hereinafter as 'general revenue funds') are described in Chapter II. These funds comprise the largest element in Commonwealth payments to the States and are provided as general subventions to the States' budgets. They have no conditions attached as to how they may be used.

Up to the end of 1975-76 the bulk of the general revenue funds was made up of the financial assistance grants. These grants were determined annually on the basis of a formula that was normally subject to review at five-year intervals. In most years, however, special assistance was provided in various ways to supplement the amounts produced by the formula.

Commencing in 1976–77, the financial assistance grants have been replaced by tax sharing arrangements under which State Governments are entitled to a specified share of Commonwealth net personal income tax collections. General revenue funds also encompass the special grants paid to certain States on the recommendation of the Commonwealth Grants Commission.

Chapter III provides information on the general purpose capital funds available to the States and their authorities under the Loan Council arrangements. These comprise borrowings made on behalf of the State Governments (to which the Commonwealth Government has contributed from its own resources in most years), interest-free grants made to the States and borrowings by State authorities. Further statistical material on these funds is presented in Appendix II.

Specific purpose payments to the States, for both recurrent and capital purposes, are described in Chapter IV. Some further statistical details related to these payments are given in Appendix III. These payments finance a wide variety of expenditures.

Chapter V provides details of Commonwealth assistance to the Northern Territory and borrowings by Northern Territory authorities.

Chapter VI describes Commonwealth assistance to local government authorities, both direct and by way of payments through the States. In particular, attention is drawn to the significant amounts now being provided by the Commonwealth for local government authorities in the States under the tax sharing arrangements. These funds, currently comprising 1.52 per cent of Commonwealth net personal income tax collections in the previous year, are allocated among the States to be made available to their local authorities. In most places in this paper, these funds are regarded as *specific*  *purpose payments to the States* as they are specifically earmarked for 'on-passing' by the States to local government authorities. In the hands of the recipient local government authorities, however, such funds are properly regarded as 'untied general purpose assistance' funds and are so treated in the discussion and tables in Chapter VI.

Appendix I provides figures, in detail and in aggregate, of payments to the States and the State Governments' Loan Council programs in 1977–78 and 1978–79 (estimated). It also sets out aggregate figures of these funds and of payments made direct to local government authorities for the period 1974–75 to 1978–79 (estimated). Appendix IV provides information on Commonwealth advances to the States and debt charges paid by the States thereon and Appendix V gives figures, in detail and in aggregate, of payments to the *six States combined and to each individual State* for the years 1974–75 to 1978–79 (estimated).

### Recent Trends in the Level of Commonwealth Assistance to the States and Local Authorities

In examining year to year movements—either in total assistance, percentage increases or in components thereof—account needs to be taken of certain changes in the way funds have become available to other levels of government. The following factors are relevant in this connection:

- (i) over the five years to 1974–75 the Commonwealth made grants to the States to meet an increasing proportion of the debt charges on a \$1000 million parcel of State debt; this debt was formally transferred to the Commonwealth from 30 June 1975 and it has since met the debt charges directly:
- (ii) in 1975-76 the Tasmanian railway system and the non-metropolitan railway system in South Australia were transferred to the Commonwealth, with the consequent financial gains to the States partly offset by reductions in the levels of general purpose funds provided to them;
- (iii) the Medibank payments to the States for hospital running costs which began in 1975-76 subsumed various forms of payments for public hospitals which had not been classified as payments to the States in previous years;
- (iv) payments totalling \$215.6 million were made to the States in June 1976 (under arrangements for the financing of public hospital operating costs) in respect of expenditures arising in the following year; and
- (v) payments to the States in 1976-77 under the personal income tax sharing arrangements were based on estimated taxation collections; final taxation figures were determined by the Commissioner of Taxation on 31 July 1977. The 1977-78 States' entitlements were reduced by the amount overpaid in respect of 1976-77.

The percentage increases in the final column of Table 3 show the annual percentage increases after adjusting for the factors listed above. The figures in this table are not adjusted for other 'abnormal' or fluctuating factors, such as payments for natural disaster and unemployment relief. (For details see 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities 1976–77', pages 6 and 7.)

The figures in the foregoing table include the State Governments' Loan Council programs but do not include the borrowing programs of State semi-government and local authorities. This reflects the fact that the States' Loan Council programs are 'underwritten' by the Commonwealth and thus represent an effective charge on the Commonwealth's budget while the authorities' programs do not affect the Commonwealth's budget. It is of interest, however, to show how the magnitudes given in the previous tables are affected if the authorities' programs are included. The following table is designed for that purpose.

# CHAPTER II—GENERAL REVENUE FUNDS TO THE STATES

General revenue grants have, in one form or another, been paid by the Commonwealth to the States since Federation. Their purpose has been to assist the States, by way of subventions to their annual budgets, in the financing of their recurrent expenditures. They are not subject to any conditions as to the purposes for which they may be spent; that is, they are completely 'untied'.

A detailed history of successive arrangements governing this form of assistance is to be found in Chapter II and Appendix II of the 1975–76 issue of this paper. This Chapter provides a very brief summary of the arrangements, which applied up to and including 1975–76, followed by a more detailed description of the new tax sharing arrangements between the Commonwealth and State Governments which commenced in 1976–77.

#### SUMMARY OF PREVIOUS ARRANGEMENTS

Payments of general revenue assistance to the States in the early years of Federation were governed by provisions in the Constitution relating to the allocation to the States of a portion of customs and excise revenue and of 'surplus revenue'. These were replaced after about 10 years by per capita payments which were in turn replaced, under the Financial Agreement of 1927, by contributions by the Commonwealth to interest and sinking fund on State debt. Although the assistance in respect of State debt charges has the effect of providing general relief to the States' budgets, the assistance is classified in this document as a form of specific purpose payment.

Since 1910–11 the payments referred to above were supplemented by special grants to Western Australia and then later to Tasmania and South Australia; from 1934–35 these grants were paid on the recommendation of the Commonwealth Grants Commission.

In 1942, when uniform income tax arrangements were adopted, the Commonwealth became the sole Government imposing taxes on income. To compensate the States for revenue forgone as a result of their ceasing to impose such taxes, the Commonwealth began paying what were known as 'tax reimbursement grants' to the States. These grants continued until 1958–59, after which they were replaced by 'financial assistance grants'. The grants were replaced, as from and including 1976–77, by new personal income tax sharing arrangements.

In very abbreviated terms, the arrangements which applied over the period 1942-43 to 1975-76 may be summarised as follows:

- When the tax reimbursement grants commenced, both the total grants, and their distribution between States, were mainly related to the amounts of income tax previously being collected by the States.
- From 1948-49, however, a formula applied under which a total grant for each year was determined by increasing the amount payable in the preceding year by reference to increases in the population of the six States and to the increase in average wages.

- Over the period 1948-49 to 1956-57 a proportion of the grants was distributed between the States by reference to the previous income tax collections of the States and a proportion by reference to the respective populations of the States as adjusted for density and numbers of children aged between 5 and 15 years of age (they being factors considered to affect the relative needs of the States); the proportion allocated in the latter manner was gradually increased over the period, and in 1957-58 and 1958-59 the distribution between States was wholly on that basis.
- In every year from 1949-50 to 1958-59 supplementary grants, in addition to those yielded by the formulae, were paid.
- The legislation authorising payment of the tax reimbursement grants made those grants conditional on the States refraining from levying income tax, and permitted reductions to be made in the grants payable to any State which did levy such a tax; this element of the legislation was unsuccessfully challenged before the High Court in 1955–56.
- Over the whole of the period of the tax reimbursement grants the three least populous States continued to receive special grants annually on the recommendation of the Commonwealth Grants Commission.
- The financial assistance grants arrangements were instituted in 1959, and reviewed and amended (in each case so as to increase the grants payable to the States) in 1965, 1970 and 1975.
- The main change compared with the previous arrangements was that the grants each year increased not only in proportion to increases in State populations and in average wages, but by a further, so-called 'betterment', factor; until 1964-65 this factor was calculated as 10 per cent of the average wages increase in the year concerned; it was then fixed at 1.2 per cent, independent of the average wages increase, for the years 1965-66 to 1970-71, at 1.8 per cent for the years 1971-72 to 1975-76 and was to have been increased to 3.0 per cent in 1976-77.
- The grants arrangements have been adjusted from time to time apart from the periodic reviews referred to above; for example, adjustments were made to compensate the States for loss of receipts duty following a High Court decision in 1970-71 and to reduce the grants when pay-roll tax was transferred from the Commonwealth to the States in 1971, when the Commonwealth assumed full responsibility for financing tertiary education from January 1974 and on account of transfers of railways from South Australia and Tasmania to the Commonwealth in 1975.
- Additions were made to the financial assistance grants following withdrawals from the Commonwealth Grants Commission system of South Australia, Western Australia and Tasmania.
- Special revenue assistance, either for particular States or all States, was paid in each of the years 1966–67 to 1974–75 to supplement the financial assistance grants; on some occasions, this was 'built in' to the formula grants.

- In terms of the distribution of the grants between States, the effect of the formula—under which each State's grant was increased in proportion to its population increase each year and by the average wages and betterment factors which have been common to all States—was, abstracting from other factors, to maintain the relationships between the grants of the States in per capita terms. However, these relationships have also been affected by various adjustments made in the arrangements from time to time, including those referred to above.
- The grants arrangements, as revised following the June 1975 Premiers' Conference and incorporating an increase in the betterment factor in 1976–77 to 3.0 per cent, were to have applied over the five years 1975–76 to 1979–80, with a review before the end of that period.
- The legislation authorising the financial assistance grants—namely, successive States Grants Acts—has not specifically stated that the grants were conditional on the States not levying taxes on income; however, it was made clear by the Commonwealth at the time of each review that the grants were so conditional.
- The State Governments consistently expressed the view, over the whole of the period covered by the foregoing summary, that the arrangements were unsatisfactory from their point of view. In 1970 the six States unanimously proposed that they be given direct access to income tax broadly along the lines of the scheme then operating in Canada. In 1975 they proposed—again unanimously—that the general revenue grants arrangements should be based, in effect, on the principle that they should compensate the States for their lack of access to income tax and that, to put that principle into effect, the average wages element in the formula should be replaced by a new 'progression' factor equal to 1.5 times the increase in average wages each year.

#### PERSONAL INCOME TAX SHARING WITH THE STATES

Commencing in 1976–77, the financial assistance grants were replaced by personal income tax sharing arrangements between the Commonwealth and the States.

The tax sharing arrangements with the States represent a central element in the Government's Federalism policy, that policy being based largely on a statement on the matter issued by the Coalition Parties in September 1975.

The way in which a share of Commonwealth personal income tax revenue is provided as assistance for local government is explained in Chapter VI.

The income tax sharing arrangements with the States have been introduced in two stages.

Under Stage 1, which commenced in 1976-77, the States receive a specified proportion of the net personal income tax collections made under Commonwealth legislation. Relevant legislation—the *States (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act* 1976—received the Royal Assent in November 1976.

Under Stage 2, the Stage 1 arrangements continue but, in addition, each State has the right at its discretion to increase or reduce the personal income tax levied on residents of the State. Any additional income taxes so levied would be collected by the Commonwealth on behalf of the State or States concerned. Relevant legislation the *Income Tax (Arrangements with the States) Act* 1978—received the Royal Assent in June 1978.

Set out below is a list of points representing the understandings which were reached in 1976 between the Commonwealth and State Governments in connection with the scheme as it relates to State Governments (local government aspects are dealt with in Chapter VI).

## Personal Income Tax Sharing Between the Commonwealth and State Governments: Points of Understanding

- (1) The scheme will be related to personal income tax—not company tax and not including withholding taxes on interest and dividends.
- (2) The scheme will be introduced in two Stages; referred to below as Stage 1 and Stage 2.

#### Stage 1

(3) Stage 1 will apply as from the beginning of 1976–77.

- (4) The States' entitlements under Stage 1 will represent a specified percentage of Commonwealth imposed personal income tax. (State legislation will thus not be required in regard to Stage 1.)
- (5) The 'base' to which the percentage will be applied each year will be net personal income tax collected in the year.
- (6) The percentage figure for 1976-77, and for subsequent years, subject to any decisions made given relevant points recorded below, will be 33.6.
- (7) Personal income tax collections in the Territories will be included in the base figure but with this subject to review in the light of the developments in public finances in the Territories.
- (8) The yield or costs of special surcharges or rebates applied, in appropriate circumstances, by the Commonwealth will not be included in the base figure from which the States' entitlements will be calculated.
- (9) In regard to the possible effects on the States' Stage 1 entitlements of changes by the Commonwealth in its personal income tax legislation, the Commonwealth Government has given a firm assurance to the States that:
  - (a) it will ensure that the States are fully informed of relevant tax changes made by the Commonwealth and of their estimated effects on the States' entitlements;

- (b) it will participate in a review of the arrangements when there are changes in Commonwealth tax legislation which have effects on the States' entitlements of such significance as to warrant such a review;
- (c) when post-budget changes in Commonwealth personal income tax legislation with substantial effects on the States' entitlements are made, the Commonwealth will consider, in consultation with the States, appropriate adjustments in the arrangements to offset the effects on the States' entitlements in that particular financial year having regard to other relevant factors impinging on the States' budgetary positions; any necessary consultations with the States on this matter will be arranged at the earliest practicable stage; and
- (d) longer-term trends in regard to such matters as changes in the relative importance of personal income tax viz-a-viz other taxes will be kept under notice between the Commonwealth and State Governments.
- (10) However, it is agreed that it would not be practicable to devise in advance an automatic formula for defining how changes in Commonwealth tax laws should be reflected in the Stage 1 arrangements.
- (11) There will be a 'guarantee' arrangement to ensure that the States' Stage 1 entitlements in any year are not less, in absolute terms, than in the previous year. This arrangement will be supplemented in the first four years of the new scheme (that is, in the years 1976-77 to 1979-80) by a further undertaking that the entitlements will not be less in a year than the amount which would have been yielded in that year by the financial assistance grants formula as laid down in the States Grants Act 1973.
- (12) A total entitlement for all States will first be determined, to be then divided between the States.
- (13) The initial per capita relativities between the States in their Stage 1 entitlements will be the relativities in the financial assistance grants in 1975–76.
- (14) Subject to (16) and (17) below, and to any absorption of specific purpose payments, these relativities will be carried forward into subsequent years in such a way as to maintain the proportionate relationships between the per capita entitlements of the States.
- (15) The four less populous States will continue to be free to apply for grants on the recommendation of the Commonwealth Grants Commission in addition to their basic entitlements as yielded under the arrangements summarised above.
- (16) The matter of the relationship between the special grant which Queensland is at present receiving on the recommendation of the Commonwealth Grants Commission and the tax sharing arrangements is regarded as essentially one between the Commonwealth and Queensland Governments and will be considered by those Governments as necessary.

- (17) There will be a periodic review of relativities between all States, advice in relation to this review being sought from an independent review body; the first review will be made before the end of 1980-81 (the same timing as applies to the review of the tax sharing arrangements as a whole—see (35) below).
- (18) Arrangements will be made for the States to be regularly informed, as early as practicable and in confidence as necessary, of relevant estimates in relation to their entitlements.
- (19) In relation to the processes referred to in (9) and (18) as they may be affected by matters which are confidential as a result of their association with the Commonwealth's budget consideration and formulation, the Commonwealth will provide to the States the maximum possible relevant information as is consistent with the security and integrity of its own budget.
- (20) The States will be paid their Stage 1 entitlements on a monthly pro-rata basis, with adjustments during the financial year as necessary as estimates of personal income tax collections in the year are varied (this being similar to the arrangements under which the financial assistance grants are paid).
- (21) There will be full and precise documentation to record the understandings between Governments in relation to Stage 1 but this will not take the form of a formal Agreement.

#### Stage 2

- (22) Under Stage 2 each State will be able to legislate to impose a surcharge on personal income tax in the State (but not company taxation or withholding tax on dividends and interest) additional to that imposed by the Commonwealth, or to give (at cost to the State) a rebate on personal income tax payable under Commonwealth law and to authorise the Commonwealth to collect the surcharge or grant the rebate as its agent.
- (23) Any State surcharges or rebates will be expressed in percentage terms.
- (24) Assessment provisions, and the basic income tax rate structure, will continue to be uniform throughout Australia, these being matters for the Commonwealth to determine.
- (25) The Commonwealth will at all times remain the sole collecting and administrative agency in the income tax field.
- (26) The level of any State surcharges or rebates will be a matter for consideration by each State; relevant decisions will be taken within an appropriate framework of consultation with the Commonwealth and, as considered appropriate by the surcharging or rebating State, with other States, but ultimately the level of surcharge or rebate will be a decision for each individual State. In exercising these powers the States will accept responsibility to work in parallel with and not internegation of the overall economic management policies of the Commonwealth.

- (27) Equalisation arrangements will be made so that less populous States will be enabled to obtain the same relative advantage from a surcharge as the States with a broader tax base.
- (28) The Grants Commission will be responsible for assessing amounts payable under the arrangements referred to under (27).
- (29) The basis for assessment of equalisation assistance to the less populous States in regard to the yield of State surcharges levied under Stage 2 (see points (27) and (28) above) will be that supplementary assistance will be provided to a less populous State levying a surcharge to bring the per capita yield from the surcharge up to the average per capita amount which would be yielded if New South Wales and Victoria levied a surcharge on the same basis. The assessment will be independent of any examination of the overall financial position of the State concerned viz-a-viz other States.
- (30) Detailed proposals to implement Stage 2 will be formulated by an officers' working party. The firm target is to have an appropriate framework established, relevant matters agreed and any necessary legislation or other material prepared in time for Stage 2 to commence from the beginning of 1977-78.
- (31) At an appropriate time the Commonwealth will consider what implications Stage 2 might have in relation to the Territories.
- (32) Interest on future issues of Commonwealth securities will be subject to State income tax surcharges under Stage 2 of the tax sharing scheme; this change will not apply retrospectively to interest on securities already issued.

#### Implications for Tax Forms and Assessment Notices

- (33) In relation to tax forms, changes will be minimal apart from necessary changes to take account of surcharges or rebates.
- (34) Assessment notices will be changed only to accommodate State surcharges or rebates (any Commonwealth surcharge or rebate would, of course, also be shown), with information on the disposition of Commonwealth tax to States (and local government) provided to taxpayers separately but in conjunction with assessment notices.

# Review of Total Tax Sharing Arrangements

(35) There will be a review of the tax sharing arrangements as a whole periodically, with the first review being made at some time before the end of 1980-81 with any revisions applying as from the beginning of the next financial year after the review; arrangements will be made for the Commonwealth and State Governments to agree, well in advance of the review, on the procedures which are to be followed in connection with it.

Many of these points of understanding have since been incorporated into the States (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act 1976 or the Income Tax (Arrangements with the States) Act 1978. Others have been developed further in discussions at the Premiers' Conferences in 1977 and 1978 (see below).

#### Further Developments in 1976-77 and 1977-78

Although the majority of matters relating to the Stage 1 arrangements had been settled at the 1976 Premiers' Conferences, some outstanding issues, together with matters relating to Stage 2, were considered at Premiers' Conferences held in April, July and October 1977 and in June 1978, mostly on the basis of reports by Commonwealth and State officers. The position reached on these matters is set out below.

- (1) The States and the Commonwealth agreed in April 1977 on the scheme unanimously recommended by the Commonwealth and State officers under which, to meet possible cash flow problems faced by a State to the extent that a deficit in its budget was due to the State's Stage 1 entitlement in respect of a year falling short of the Commonwealth Budget estimate of its entitlement, and within Loan Council arrangements, a State would have access to Treasury Bills against which it would, except in extreme cases, be expected to lodge counterpart deposits with the Reserve Bank.
- (2) Consideration was given at the April and July 1977 Premiers' Conferences to the arrangements for the provision of information by the Commonwealth to the States, and for consultation, as necessary, between the Commonwealth and the States, in relation to Commonwealth budget decisions as they might affect the States' entitlements. At the July 1977 Conference the Prime Minister stated that the Commonwealth would provide information to the States as follows:—
  - a preliminary estimate of each State's Stage 1 entitlement for the year ahead on the basis of then current Commonwealth tax legislation;
  - an estimate of the yield of 1% surcharge/cost of a 1% rebate in that State on the basis of then current Commonwealth tax legislation;
  - an estimate of entitlement under the former financial assistance grants arrangements (the guaranteed entitlement);
  - relevant wage assumptions underlying the above estimates; and
  - certain other information to the extent this is practicable and consistent with budget security.
- (3) Following the 1976 Census, the Australian Statistician revised the State population estimates. This resulted in changes in the estimated entitlements of the individual States for 1976-77, although the total entitlement of the States as a whole was not affected by the revision. In particular, the Premier of Tasmania drew attention at the April 1977 Premiers' Conference to the impact on his State's estimated entitlement of the revised population figures. Officers were directed by the Conference to examine and report on the implications of the revision of population figures.

While no change has been made to the tax sharing arrangements in this regard, the general question of whether estimates of State populations could be made more accurate was considered at the October 1977 and June 1978 Premiers' Conferences on the basis of officers' reports. The Australian Statistician's efforts to overcome certain estimation problems have been noted and it has been agreed that no further action could usefully be taken at this stage.

(4) Point of understanding (17) records that there would be a periodic review of relativities and that advice in relation to this review would be sought from an independent review body. There were three aspects to be considered, the guidelines for the review body, the nature of the review body constituted to make recommendations, and the timing of the review.

At the April 1977 Premiers' Conference, the States and the Commonwealth agreed that the review body's guidelines should be expressed in relatively broad terms to give it flexibility in carrying out its work and agreed that the guidelines should be along the following lines:--

- (i) The basic purpose is to review the percentage relationship between the States' respective per capita entitlements under Stage 1 of the personal income tax sharing arrangements between the Commonwealth and State Governments and to make any recommendations for changes in those relationships considered appropriate.
- (ii) The review should be on the basis of the principle that each State should be able to provide State Government services of a recurrent kind of the same standard as other States without imposing higher rates of taxes or charges; differences in revenue raising capacities and in the relative costs of providing comparable government services should be taken into account.
- (iii) The review is to include an examination of the existing relativities, of the factors which have influenced them and of any relevant changes which have occurred in the period since those relativities were established.

It was also agreed at the April 1977 Premiers' Conference that the States and the Commonwealth would each have a right to argue before the review body any matters which a State or the Commonwealth regarded as relevant to the review, that the first review should be commenced as soon as possible and that the review body's report would be considered at a Premiers' Conference before any decision was taken on it.

Agreement was not reached at the April 1977 Premiers' Conference on the constitution of the review body but the Commonwealth undertook to give the matter further consideration. After this further consideration, the Commonwealth reiterated its view that the Commonwealth Grants Commission was the appropriate body to conduct the review. The *States (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Amendment Bill* 1977, nominating the Grants Commission as the review body and prescribing the guidelines which it was to follow, was introduced into the Parliament on 26 May 1977 and was passed by the House of Representatives. However, in the light of views expressed by several Premiers, the Bill was not proceeded with in the Autumn session of the Parliament and the matter was discussed at the Premiers' Conference on 1 July 1977.

At that Conference, the Prime Minister agreed that Commonwealth and State officers would consult further on the guidelines and would also give consideration to suggested amendments proposed by some of the Premiers. On the question of the review body the Prime Minister put forward a compromise proposal—in effect, a special Division of the Commonwealth Grants Commission supplemented by three associate members nominated by the States. It was then agreed that the body to review the relativities should be composed of the Chairman of the Grants Commission, two members of the Commission, plus three associate members, one of whom would be nominated by New South Wales and Victoria and two by the four other States.

The Premiers' Conference on 21 October 1977 agreed on the wording of revised guidelines which were in line with the broad agreement reached at the April 1977 Premiers' Conference. The Conference also agreed that:

- (i) the intention was for reviews to be held no more often than every three to five years;
- (ii) Commonwealth legislation for the purpose should give flexibility to enable a review to be held whenever there were special circumstances which warranted this—for example, if a review were sought by (say) three States; and
- (iii) the guidelines were not intended to place any limitation on the review body in considering the matters that led to the existing relativities.

Amendments were made in June 1978 to the States (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act 1976 and to the Commonwealth Grants Commission Act 1976 to provide, inter alia, for periodic reviews by a special Division of the Commonwealth Grants Commission of the per capita relativities between the States in their tax sharing entitlements.

(5) The July 1977 Premiers' Conference noted that there had been fluctuations in the estimates of the total tax sharing entitlements during 1976–77. These fluctuations had occurred largely because of changes in estimates of tax collections but the uncertainty arising from these sources would have been avoided had the States not chosen to have their tax sharing entitlements calculated as a percentage of the current year's personal income tax collections, which were not finally known until 31 July in the following financial year.

Against the background of the uncertainty inevitably associated with the use of current year tax collections as the base, the Prime Minister suggested that the States might reconsider the earlier Commonwealth proposal that the preceding year's collections be used as the base (local government tax sharing entitlements were already based on collections in the preceding year—see Chapter VI for details). He offered to fix the States' tax sharing entitlements in respect of 1977-78 at \$4336.1 million if the States were to decide to adopt that proposal. (This would be subject to adjustments on account of over-payments in 1976-77 of State entitlements for that year—see text on States' entitlements in 1976-77.) The Prime Minister pointed out that this would reduce uncertainty and administrative difficulties.

The Premiers agreed that Commonwealth and State officers should examine and report on arrangements for changing the total tax sharing entitlements from 33.6 per cent of the current year's collections to an appropriate percentage of the preceding year's collections.

On the basis of the officers' report, the October 1977 Premiers' Conference agreed to adopt the preceding year's net personal income tax collections as the base, using 39.87 per cent for the purpose. The amending legislation—the *States* (*Personal Income Tax Sharing*) Amendment Act 1978—provides, inter alia, for States' entitlements for 1977-78 to be \$4336.1 million (subject to the guarantee arrangements) and future entitlements to be 39.87 per cent of the preceding year's collections (again, subject to the guarantee arrangements).

- (6) In addition, the June 1978 Premiers' Conference referred the following matters to officers for examination and report:
  - (i) the States' request that there be an extension beyond 30 June 1980 of the present guarantee that until then each State will be entitled to receive each financial year under Stage 1 of the tax sharing arrangements at least what it would have received under the old financial assistance grants formula.
  - (ii) procedures regarding consultation between the Commonwealth and States in relation to post-budget changes in the income tax structure (point of understanding 9 (c) refers);
  - (iii) the factual position in relation to the effect of changes to population estimates on the level of Queensland's guaranteed minimum entitlement under the old financial assistance grants formula. (Queensland raised this matter at the October 1977 Premiers' Conference claiming that consistent under-estimation of its population has meant that its financial assistance grants were lower than they should have been and that, therefore, its guaranteed minimum entitlement is too low);
  - (iv) an examination of a New South Wales draft document relating to the points of understanding in relation to the extent to which it is an accurate, full and up-to-date record of the understandings reached between the Commonwealth and States; and
  - (v) a review in accordance with point 9 (b) of the points of understanding.

#### Stage 2 of the Tax Sharing Arrangements

The April 1977 Conference had before it the Report of the working party of officers of the Commonwealth and State Treasuries and taxation and legal officers, established following the April 1976 Conference, to advise on the introduction of Stage 2 of the tax sharing arrangements. The report canvassed some fundamental aspects of possible arrangements, including several which raised important and complex legal and policy questions.

The Conference was in broad agreement as to the objectives to be pursued in developing detailed arrangements for Stage 2:—

- (i) there should be complete uniformity as between the States in all respects other than rates of any surcharges or rebates;
- (ii) the arrangements should be free of any significant Constitutional or other legal doubt;
- (iii) the scheme should be as simple and inexpensive to administer as practicable consistent with legal requirements and the other broad objectives being followed;
- (iv) the arrangements should impose the least inconvenience practicable on taxpayers and employers; and
- (v) the arrangements should be such as to avoid creating avenues for tax avoidance or evasion.

For the benefit of States choosing to enter into Stage 2 arrangements, and in order to avoid technical problems, the Commonwealth suggested that it and all States co-operate to prepare complementary or 'interlocking' legislation. This proposal was not accepted by all States.

At the April 1977 Conference, the Commonwealth emphasised that it wanted to introduce enabling legislation as soon as possible, thus providing each State with the option of proceeding to raise or lower income tax within its own borders if it so chose. The States could, within a framework of enabling legislation, make their own decisions, in their own time and in accordance with their own priorities, whether or not to utilise the provisions of Stage 2. It was agreed that Commonwealth officers and officers of the Victorian and Western Australian Governments should have discussions regarding the Commonwealth legislation which was to be drafted.

The Income Tax (Arrangements with the States) Bill 1977 was introduced into the Commonwealth Parliament late in the Autumn 1977 sittings. This was a complex Bill to enable the States at their own discretion to increase their shares of personal income tax by increasing the tax paid by their residents or to provide tax rebates to their residents at the States' own cost. In order to allow time for proper consideration and informed debate, the Bill was not proceeded with immediately. At the July 1977 Premiers' Conference, the Prime Minister invited comments from the States on the Bill.

The 1977 Bill lapsed with the dissolution of the Commonwealth Parliament on 10 November 1977.

Subsequently, after careful consideration, the Commonwealth Government agreed to some changes being made to the provisions of the 1977 Bill to meet points raised by the Premiers before re-introducing the Bill into the Parliament. The revised Bill, basically the same as the 1977 Bill but incorporating these changes, and a number of minor technical and machinery improvements, was passed by the Parliament late in the 1978 Autumn sittings and became the *Income Tax (Arrangements with the States) Act* 1978.

The drafting of possible legislation which might be adopted by States is a State matter, but one on which the Commonwealth has indicated a willingness to consult and co-operate.

#### States' Tax Sharing Entitlements in 1977–78 and 1978–79 (estimated)

Under the States (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act 1976, the States are entitled to receive in respect of 1976-77 33.6 per cent of net personal income tax collections in the year, in respect of 1977-78 a fixed amount of \$4336.1 million and in respect of each subsequent year 39.87 per cent of collections in the preceding year. This is subject to the guarantee that the States' Stage 1 entitlements in any year are not less, in absolute terms, than in the previous year and that, in the years 1976-77 to 1979-80, their entitlements will not be less in a year than the amount which would have been yielded in that year by the financial assistance grants formula as laid down in the States Grants Act 1973.

The entitlements are calculated on net personal income tax collections, excluding the effects of any special tax levies or rebates. The health insurance levy, introduced from 1 October 1976, is in the nature of a special tax levy applied by the Commonwealth and is thus excluded from the figures from which the States' entitlements are calculated.

The relative shares of the States are determined on a weighted population basis, the weights (which are based on the per capita relativities in the States' financial assistance grants in 1975-76) being given in the Act, the populations being determined by the Australian Statistician.

Particulars of the calculations underlying the States' tax sharing entitlements for 1976-77 are given on pages 21 and 22 of the 1977-78 issue of this paper.

The States were entitled to a fixed amount of \$4336.1 million in respect of 1977-78. subject to the guarantee arrangements. (As required by the legislation, the Australian Statistician made determinations of amounts that would have been payable under the financial assistance grants formula (that is, the States' minimum entitlements) and of State populations at 31 December 1977.) After allowing for the operation of the guarantee in the case of Tasmania, the States' total entitlement for 1977-78 was \$4336.3 million, or \$0.2 million more than the fixed amount provided for in the Act. The States actually received \$4316.6 million in 1977–78 because of reductions amounting to \$19.6 million arising from over-payments in 1976-77.

The following table shows the calculations underlying the States' tax sharing entitlements in 1977-78 together with amounts actually paid in that year.

The amount of net personal income tax collections (excluding the effects of the health insurance levy) in 1977–78 determined by the Commissioner of Taxation in accordance with the Act is \$11 804.4 million, giving, on application of the percentage of 39.87 per cent (and after allowing for the operation of the guarantee for all States except Queensland), an estimate of the States' entitlements in 1978–79 of \$4777.0 million.

On assumptions concerning increases in State populations consistent with those used in estimating the States' tax sharing entitlements and assuming an increase in average wages consistent with that used elsewhere in the budget figuring, the financial assistance grants formula would yield an estimated \$4769.6 million in 1978–79.

The following table shows the calculations underlying the State by State estimates of their tax sharing entitlements in 1978–79. It is to be emphasised that these figures are estimates dependent on projections relating to wages and population and hence must necessarily be subject to a substantial margin of uncertainty.

#### THE SPECIAL GRANTS

Special grants have been paid to the States on the recommendation of the Commonwealth Grants Commission since 1934–35. The Grants Commission was established under the *Commonwealth Grants Commission Act* 1933 and functioned under that Act, to which only minor amendments were made, until September 1973. New legislation, the *Grants Commission Act* 1973, was passed by the Parliament in the Autumn 1973 sittings and amendments to that Act were passed in the Autumn sittings of 1975 and 1976. These various changes were mainly related to the Commonwealth's role in the matter of assistance for local government and are dealt with in Chapter VI of this paper.

Under the legislation as it now stands, the Commission is required to inquire into and report upon:---

- any application made by a State for financial assistance 'for the purpose of making it possible for the State, by reasonable effort, to function at a standard not appreciably below the standards of other States'.
- any other matters related to Commonwealth financial assistance to the States which may be referred to it by the Government.

The Commission's inquiries and reports in relation to special grants are made under the first of these provisions; the wording quoted is based on the principle of financial need as set out by the Commission in its Third Report (1936).

As noted above, the tax sharing arrangements are on the basis that each of the four less populous States may apply for special grants. Queensland has been the only applicant State in recent years. However, Tasmania, which had withdrawn from claimancy in 1974–75, applied on 30 June 1978 for a special grant in respect of 1977–78 and the matter has been referred to the Commission. Arrangements under which States ceased receiving special grants are set out in the 1975–76 issue of this paper.

In arriving at its recommendations, the Commission each year makes a detailed comparison between the financial positions of the claimant States and those of the 'standard' States. Prior to 1959–60 the Commission used a standard derived from the experience of New South Wales, Victoria and Queensland. From 1959–60 the standard States have been New South Wales and Victoria.

Since 1949 each recommendation by the Commission for payment of a special grant has consisted of two parts. One part is based on an estimate of the claimant State's financial need in the current financial year, and is treated as an advance payment subject to adjustment two years later when the Commission has compared in detail the financial positions in that year of the claimant and standard States. The other part represents the final adjustment to the advance payment made two years earlier and is known as the completion payment.

In 1977-78 Queensland received special grants totalling \$24.8 million, consisting of an advance grant for 1977-78 of \$14.0 million and a completion grant in respect of 1975-76 of \$10.8 million. The grants were recommended by the Commission in its Forty-fourth Report presented to Parliament in the Budget Session in 1977, and were authorised by the *Queensland Grant (Special Assistance) Act* 1977.

The Commission has recommended for payment to Queensland in 1978–79 an advance grant for 1978–79 of \$16.0 million and a completion grant in respect of 1976–77 of \$5.7 million. The Commonwealth Government has accepted these recommendations and it is expected that legislation to authorise payment of the grants will be introduced in the Budget sittings of Parliament following tabling of the Commission's Forty-fifth Report.

The table below shows the *final* amount of special grants paid *in respect of* each of the years 1974–75 to 1976–77 inclusive—that is, the advance grant paid in the year concerned plus the completion grant normally paid two years later. The table also shows the advance payments for 1977–78 and 1978–79. Table 8 shows the grants in terms of amounts actually paid each year.

#### OTHER GENERAL REVENUE ASSISTANCE

As noted above, the Commonwealth Government from time to time provided general revenue assistance to the States additional to that payable under the tax reimbursement and financial assistance grants arrangements or by way of special grants recommended by the Grants Commission. Between 1949–50 and 1958–59, for instance, the Commonwealth Government made ad hoc grants to each State to supplement the amount yielded by the formula then operating; and additional assistance grants, partly used for general revenue purposes, were paid in the years 1957–58 and 1961–62 to 1963–64. Special revenue assistance of one kind or another was also paid in every year from 1966–67 to 1974–75. The amount provided in the last of these years is shown in the table below; for earlier years, *see* Table 116 of the 1975–76 issue of this paper.

As part of arrangements for the transfer of the non-metropolitan railway system of South Australia and the railway system of Tasmania to the Commonwealth. Government (*see* 1975–76 issue of this paper for further details) the Commonwealth agreed to make special payments of \$10 million and \$5 million respectively to the two States in 1974–75. These payments have been classified as special revenue assistance to the States for purposes of this paper and in publications of the Australian Bureau of Statistics. They have, however, not been classified as payments to the States in the Statements attached to the Budget Speech, being regarded, for purposes of those Statements, as expenditures on the purchase of existing assets and, for this reason, relevant aggregates in this paper differ, for 1974–75, from those shown in the Statements attached to the Budget Speech.

#### PAYMENTS OF GENERAL REVENUE FUNDS TO THE STATES

The following table shows payments of general revenue funds to the States from 1974-75 and estimates for 1978-79.

#### ADVISORY COUNCIL FOR INTER-GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

One other element of the Government's Federalism policy which has potential implications for Commonwealth/State finances is the establishment of the Advisory Council for Inter-Government Relations.

After discussions at the three Premiers' Conferences in 1976–77, it was agreed that such a Council be established and appropriate legislation—the *Advisory Council for Inter-Government Relations Act* 1976—was subsequently passed. The Council comprises members of the Commonwealth and State Parliaments (with the exception of Queensland whose Government declined to nominate a representative), representatives of local government and of private citizens. It was intended that the Commonwealth and the States each meet 45 per cent of the Council's costs, the remaining 10 per cent being contributed by local government. However, following Queensland's decision not to participate in the Council, the Commonwealth agreed to contribute an extra 7 per cent. Subjects for investigation and advice by the Council will be referred to it by Premiers' Conferences; subjects so referred may include matters raised initially at the initiative either of local government or the Council itself.

The April 1977 Premiers' Conference approved the following items for reference to the Council for examination and report:—

- An examination of the appropriate long-term relationships between Commonwealth, State and local government.
- A study of the costs and benefits of an interchange of personnel between the three spheres of government, and recommendations for selected implementation of a staff exchange program.

The Council, whose Secretariat is based in Hobart, has met a number of times. Two reports—the first annual report for the year ending 31 August 1977 and a report on interchange of personnel—have been produced. A statement dealing with progress the Council has made in respect of the two matters referred to it was presented to, and noted by, the June 1978 Premiers' Conference.

#### CHAPTER III-GENERAL PURPOSE CAPITAL FUNDS

This Chapter provides information on the general purpose capital funds available to the States and their authorities under the Loan Council arrangements. These comprise borrowings made on behalf of the State Governments (to which the Commonwealth has contributed from its own resources in most recent years), interestfree grants made by the Commonwealth to the States and borrowings by State authorities. Relevant statistical material for the period from 1974–75 is presented in Appendix II; statistical information for earlier years is available in Appendix III of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities 1975–76'.

The Loan Council, which is constituted under the Financial Agreement, is composed of representatives of the Commonwealth and each State Government. Under the terms of the Financial Agreement borrowings by the Commonwealth and State Governments (except defence borrowings by the Commonwealth and borrowings for temporary purposes) are limited within annual borrowing programs for the Commonwealth and the States determined by the Loan Council. The terms and conditions of loans to finance these programs also require the approval of the Loan Council. Subject to the decisions of the Loan Council, borrowings for and on behalf of the State Governments and conversions, renewals, redemptions and consolidations of the public debt of the States are, with limited exceptions, arranged by the Commonwealth.

# STATE GOVERNMENT LOAN COUNCIL PROGRAMS

The Loan Council program for State Governments represents a major source of funds available to the States for capital works. Each State determines the application of its share of the program. A proportion of the total program for State Governments agreed to in the Loan Council is provided as a capital grant by the Commonwealth, which also undertakes to complete the financing of the States' borrowing program by subscribing any shortfall from its own resources.

The capital grants now constitute one-third of each State's total program. Background material on these grants, together with a summary of changes in the proportion of the total program provided as grants, is to be found on page 27 of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities 1975–76'; on pages 24 and 25 of that document there is an account of the way in which Commonwealth assistance to the States for housing has in the past been related to the Loan Council arrangements.

For 1977–78 the Loan Council approved a total State Government program of \$1433.8 million made up of a basic program of \$1423.8 million and a special permanent addition of \$10 million for New South Wales in recognition of that State's relatively low per head share of Loan Council programs.

The Loan Council at its June 1978 meeting approved for 1978–79 a total State Government program of \$1433.8 million. Two-thirds of the total State Government program, or \$955.9 million, will comprise borrowings and one-third, or \$477.9 million, will be provided as interest free capital grants to the States. (These proportions are the same as in 1977–78.)

#### Financing of States' Borrowing Programs and the Capital Grants

As previously mentioned, all borrowings on behalf of the State Governments are, with limited exceptions, arranged by the Commonwealth.

When the proceeds of public borrowings available for this purpose are insufficient to finance the States' programs the Commonwealth makes up the shortfall by subscribing the appropriate amount to a special loan, proceeds of which are allocated to the States. The amounts made available in this way represent State debt. These special loans are raised on terms and conditions similar to those offered in the previous public loan raised in Australia. The effect of this arrangement is that, as necessary, the Commonwealth contributes amounts from its own resources to help finance the Loan Council program of the State Governments.

The borrowing program for the Commonwealth approved by the Loan Council includes an amount equal to the capital grants. The legislation authorising the payment of the capital grants authorises the Treasurer to borrow the amount concerned, or to meet it wholly or in part from Consolidated Revenue Fund.

A summary of the financing of the States' Loan Council programs since 1973-74 is given in Table 99 in Appendix II; Table 100 shows further details of the financing of the programs since 1973-74.

Following previous practice, the Commonwealth has undertaken to support the total States' Loan Council programs of \$1433.8 million agreed for 1978–79, conditional on the States agreeing to certain arrangements designed to promote the raising of loans to finance the programs. On this basis, the Commonwealth will support the programs in the following ways:—

- (a) by leaving to the States, to the extent necessary to complete their governmental borrowing programs, the whole of the proceeds derived from public loan raisings by the Commonwealth in Australia (other than the net proceeds of Interest Equalisation Deposits, Treasury Notes and other borrowings for temporary purposes; and amounts applied to redemption of public securities (including Special Bonds and Australian Savings Bonds) that cannot be financed out of the National Debt Sinking Fund);
- (b) by arranging, to the maximum possible extent, for the redemption of maturing but unconverted State debt that cannot be met from State sinking funds; and
- (c) by making monthly advances to the States for the first eight months of the financial year against the borrowing component of the program at an annual rate not exceeding \$955 867 000, the position then to be reviewed and a tentative determination made, not later than February 1979, of the amount of any special loan assistance the Commonwealth may provide from its own resources. (The amount of the capital grants component of the program is paid to the States by equal monthly instalments.)

## BORROWING PROGRAMS FOR STATE AUTHORITIES

Under the 'Gentlemen's Agreement', originating in 1936, the Loan Council approves an aggregate annual borrowing program for larger semi-government and local authorities. As was the case in 1977–78, larger authorities are defined as those borrowing more than \$1 million in the financial year, the Loan Council having decided at its July 1977 meeting to increase the limit from the figure of \$800 000 which applied in 1976– 77. For information on the limits applying in previous years, *see* page 29 of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities 1975–76'. From 1962–63 no overall limit has been set by the Loan Council on borrowings by smaller authorities, that is, authorities borrowing within the financial year up to the amounts mentioned above.

The total program approved for borrowings by the larger authorities of the States is distributed between the States by the Loan Council. Each State determines the distribution between individual larger authorities of its share of the overall borrowing program approved for such authorities. The terms and conditions of loans raised by such authorities are subject to Loan Council approval.

Borrowings by State smaller authorities are also subject to the terms and conditions applying under the 'Gentlemen's Agreement' and it is the responsibility of each government to ensure that the authorities conform with these terms and conditions. For 1977–78, the Loan Council approved a total borrowing program for larger State authorities of \$1195 million. (The Loan Council also approved a further \$U\$47 million as a special temporary addition for the State Electricity Commission of Victoria towards the Loy Yang open cut project to be drawn down over a period of years. This is expected to commence with a small, but as yet unspecifiable, requirement late in 1978–79.) The total program was made up of a basic program of \$1128 million and special temporary additions of:—

- \$20 million for New South Wales, the same amount to be available by way of special temporary additions in each of the four subsequent years;
- \$31 million for Queensland, consisting of \$16 million for the Gladstone power station and \$15 million for the Queensland Sugar Board against three-year programs of \$25 million and \$50 million respectively approved by the Loan Council; and
- \$16 million for Western Australia in respect of a three-year program of \$24 million approved by the Loan Council for the conversion of the Kwinana power station to dual coal and oil firing.

At its June 1978 meeting, the Loan Council approved a total borrowing program for larger State authorities of \$1296.5 million. This comprises a basic program of \$1207 million, a special permanent addition for Western Australia of \$18 million to improve that State's per capita share of the program relative to the other States, and special temporary additions of:---

- \$20 million for New South Wales under arrangements made at the July 1977 Loan Council meeting;

 S21 million for Queensland, consisting of \$5 million for the Gladstone power station and \$16 million for the Queensland Sugar Board under arrangements made in 1977-78; and

- \$30.5 million for Western Australia, consisting of \$7 million for the Kwinana power station under arrangements made at the July 1977 Loan Council meeting, \$9 million for further electric power development at Muja (representing the 1978-79 approval against a program of \$48 million over three years) and \$14.5 million for rehabilitation and upgrading of the railway between Kwinana and Koolyanobbing (representing the 1978-79 approval against a program of \$65 million over six years).

The basic program for 1978–79 represents an increase of 7 per cent over the basic program for 1977–78. When account is taken of the special additions the increase in the total 1978–79 program over the total 1977–78 program becomes 8.5 per cent.

Details of the larger State authorities' programs for 1977-78 and 1978-79 are set out in the following table:—

The States' smaller authorities' borrowings have increased substantially in recent years. In 1977–78 these borrowings amounted to \$385.5 million and are estimated by the States to total \$441.5 million in 1978–79, an increase of 14.5 per cent.

The borrowings of both larger and smaller authorities in each State in 1977–78 and previous years, the shares of the program for larger authorities in each State in 1978–79, and estimated borrowings by smaller authorities in 1978–79, are shown in Table 94 in Appendix II. Table 98 in that Appendix shows the amounts that have been borrowed by local government authorities from within the total borrowings of both larger and smaller authorities. Further reference to the borrowing arrangements for local government authorities is made in Chapter VI.

#### Guidelines for Infrastructure Financing

At its June 1978 meeting, the Loan Council approved new guidelines for consideration by it of proposals for special additions to annual larger authorities' borrowing programs—the so-called 'semi-government programs'—for financing infrastructure. The guidelines cover both Commonwealth and State authorities. The guidelines also provide for consideration by the Loan Council of overseas borrowings in special circumstances by Commonwealth and State semi-government and local authorities. The new arrangements represent, in effect, an extension of the Gentlemen's Agreement which governs borrowings by these authorities. They do not relate to borrowings by Governments themselves, which are subject to the Financial Agreement. The Loan Council accepted the principle of a separate category of borrowings comprising special additions to 'semi-government' programs, including forward approvals thereof, subject to such additions being confined to exceptional cases which:

- could not be reasonably accommodated within resources normally available to the Government and the authority, under 'normal' Loan Council programs;
- are for the provision of services of kinds normally provided by Government or public utility enterprises;
- have special significance for development; and
- require outlay within a relatively short time span.

Each proposal for a special addition will be carefully examined by the Loan Council, including as to the viability of the proposed project, its special significance to the economic development of Australia, and importance and urgency, the extent to which the project will be funded from resources otherwise available to the authority concerned, and the need for the special addition. In view of the Commonwealth's overall economic management responsibilities, it is recognised that the Chairman may take into account the implications of a proposal for the Commonwealth's fiscal and monetary policy objectives. Approval by the Loan Council of a special addition requires the agreement of a simple majority including the Commonwealth.

The new guidelines provide that, where the Loan Council has approved a special addition to a government's semi-governmental program, the government and authority concerned shall use their best endeavours to obtain the funds within Australia. However, in exceptional cases if, because of inability of the domestic market to provide the funds on satisfactory terms or because of advantages to be derived from project financing involving a mix of local and overseas funds, the government concerned considers it desirable to arrange an overseas borrowing by the authority, it may seek the approval of the Loan Council for such a borrowing.

Loan Council approval may also be sought for an overseas borrowing under a normal semi-governmental borrowing program where the government concerned can demonstrate that that program cannot be raised in Australia on satisfactory terms because of domestic market conditions.

In considering any proposal for an overseas borrowing, either under a special addition or a normal semi-governmental borrowing program, the Chairman, in view of the Commonwealth's overall economic management responsibilities, may take into account the implications of the proposed borrowing for the Commonwealth's domestic monetary policy and external policy.

A number of projects were submitted by the States to the June 1978 Loan Council meeting for consideration under the guidelines. As soon as practicable, the Loan Council is to decide:—

- which projects should be selected for support within a program of special additions; and
- a responsible time scale and phasing for the program.

# TREATMENT OF LOAN COUNCIL PROGRAMS IN THIS AND OTHER BUDGET PAPERS

The capital grants (beginning in 1970-71) which have been agreed to in the context of Loan Council discussions represent Commonwealth payments to the States and are so categorised for purposes of this and other budget papers.

The State Governments' Loan Council borrowing programs are not included in the totals of payments to the States shown in this paper. However, as mentioned in Chapter I, the national accounting item 'grants and net advances to the States, the Northern Territory and Local Government Authorities' used in the statements attached to the Budget Speech and other papers does include these programs. The equivalent aggregate is described in this paper as the total of Commonwealth payments to the States and the Northern Territory, the State Governments' Loan Council borrowing programs and payments to local authorities.

# CHAPTER IV—SPECIFIC PURPOSE PAYMENTS TO THE STATES

The Commonwealth has provided financial assistance for certain specific types of expenditure by the States for many years. The present Government, in line with its Federalism policy, has been lessening the emphasis on specific purpose programs following the considerable expansion in this type of assistance in recent years. This Chapter outlines specific purpose payments recently made, presently being made or proposed to be made, to the States. Table 87 in Appendix I of this paper shows aggregate specific purpose payments to each State since 1974–75 classified as to whether they were for recurrent or capital purposes and Table 2 in Chapter 1 classifies these and other payments by function.

The various payments in this Chapter are grouped under the functional headings used in the Statements attached to the Budget Speech—the only exceptions being that payments included in the 'Not Allocated to Function' category (namely, assistance related to State debts, assistance for local government and natural disaster relief) are shown under specific headings in appropriate places in the Chapter and that payments for Aboriginal Advancement are outlined together (in the functional statements these are distributed over a number of functions).

Details further to those provided in this Chapter on specific purpose payments made to the States for 'on-passing' to local government authorities are given in Chapter VI.

# Assistance Related to State Debts

## Payments Under the Financial Agreement

# Contributions to Interest on State Debts

Under the Financial Agreement entered into by the Commonwealth and the States in 1927, the Commonwealth makes payments to the States expressed as a contribution towards interest payable on State debts. They are therefore treated here as specific purpose grants, although they have some of the characteristics of grants for general purposes. In fact, the payments superseded the general revenue grants of \$2.50 per head of the population of each State made in the period 1910–11 to 1926–27 under the *Surplus Revenue Act* 1910. (*See* Appendix II of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities 1975–76.')

Each year the total contribution is \$15.17 million, the amount that was payable in 1926–27 under that Act. The contribution is apportioned between the States in the same way as the 1926–27 *per capita* grant and is to continue for 58 years from 1 July 1927 (that is, until 1985). It is distributed among the States as shown in the following table:—

## Sinking Fund Contributions

The Financial Agreement of 1927 established arrangements for the payment of sinking fund contributions, by both the Commonwealth and State Governments, in respect of State debt or debt incurred on behalf of the States. These arrangements, with relatively minor amendments, applied from 1927–28 to 1974–75 and are summarised on page 36 of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities 1974–75'.

Amendments to the Financial Agreement which were ratified by the Parliaments of the Commonwealth and the States over the course of 1975–76 (the relevant Commonwealth legislation being the *Financial Agreement Act* 1976), and which had retrospective effect to 30 June 1975, provide for new sinking fund arrangements in respect of State debt which may be briefly summarised as follows:—

- (i) Specified contributions were made by the States (\$121.5 million) and by the Commonwealth (\$30.2 million) in 1975-76.
- (ii) For the next nine years (ten in the case of New South Wales) the contributions will equal the amounts referred to in (i) adjusted by a percentage of the difference between each State's net debt at 30 June 1975 and the net debt at 30 June immediately preceding the year of contribution; the percentage is 1.20 for State contributions and 0.28 per cent for Commonwealth contributions.
- (iii) As from and including 1985–86 (1986–87 in the case of New South Wales) the contributions by each State will equal 0.85 per cent of its net debt at the preceding 30 June and the Commonwealth's contributions will be 0.28 per cent.

The Financial Agreement amendments also gave effect to the transfer of \$1000 million of State debt to the Commonwealth from 30 June 1975 (*see* page 34 of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities 1975–76').

Further details of sinking fund arrangements may be found in the annual reports of the National Debt Commission.

The following table shows the Commonwealth's contributions to the sinking fund on States' debts from 1974–75, including estimated contributions to be made in 1978–79:---

#### DEFENCE

# Housing for Servicemen

Under successive Commonwealth-State Housing Agreements provision was made from 1956–57 to 1970–71 for certain of the funds advanced annually to the States for housing to be devoted to the erection of dwellings for serving members of the Defence Force. (For further details *see* page 35 of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities 1975–76.')

Present arrangements are governed by an agreement reached between the Commonwealth and States in 1972 and embodied in the Commonwealth-State Housing Agreement (Servicemen) 1972. Funds for erection of housing for servicemen in the States are provided under these arrangements by way of advances repayable over 53 years and attracting an interest rate equal to the long-term bond rate when the advances are made.

# Assistance to State Emergency Services

The Natural Disasters Organisation, which was formally established in 1974, is responsible for co-ordinating physical assistance provided by the Commonwealth (including that provided by the armed services) with the efforts made by State emergency services and local and voluntary organisations to cope with major natural disasters.

The Organisation also has the function of supervising the provision of assistance to State Emergency Services, for the purpose of strengthening those services. Following is a summary of assistance which is being provided by the Commonwealth:—

- (i) grants are made to the States to meet the cost of salaries of an agreed number of State Emergency Services' personnel at Division or District headquarters (this assistance was first provided in 1974-75);
- (ii) grants are made to subsidise disaster protection—specifically, levee banks, drains and firebreaks—and to provide depots for emergency service units at the local level;

- (iii) under a practice of some years' standing, capital equipment is provided to the State organisations. Equipment valued at \$1.33 million was provided in 1977-78 and the estimated value of equipment to be provided in 1978-79 is \$1.11 million;
- (iv) the Commonwealth meets the costs of State Government personnel travelling to attend courses at the Australian Counter Disaster College at Mt Macedon; and
- (v) other forms of assistance are provided from time to time.

Of these forms of assistance, those summarised as (i) and (ii) above are classified as payments to or for the States for purposes of this and other budget papers; they are both regarded as being recurrent payments for purposes of this paper. The following table shows payments made for these purposes and estimated payments in 1978-79:--

## Special Assistance to Exmouth Shire

In 1975 the Western Australian Government sought assistance towards the operational costs of the Exmouth Shire, which provides support to the United States Communications Station at North West Cape.

Payments totalling \$0.43 million to 30 June 1978, including \$0.11 million in 1977-78, have been made to Western Australia for the Exmouth Shire from Department of Defence Appropriations. An amount of \$0.35 million is being provided against the requirement for further assistance in 1978-79. Further details are provided in Chapter VI.

## EDUCATION

Grants to the States for education began with assistance for the recurrent expenditures of universities in 1951–52. The area of assistance was progressively extended, and the magnitude of Commonwealth assistance in particular areas has also been increased, the most notable examples being the assumption by the Commonwealth of full financial responsibility for tertiary education in 1973–74 (previously expenditure in this area had been shared between the Commonwealth and State Governments), and the substantially increased assistance for schools as from 1973–74 and for technical and further education as from 1974–75. As a result of these various developments, payments to the States for education have grown rapidly—for example, from \$259.4 million in 1972–73 to \$1815.0 million in 1977–78, and an estimated \$1921.8 million in 1978–79.

In recent years a number of changes have been made to the arrangements for payments to the States in the four broad areas of education—universities, colleges of advanced education, technical and further education, and schools. In 1977 a three-year rolling program was adopted involving the determination of a firm allocation in the Budget context for the first year of the period and planning guidelines for the second and third years with no financial commitment until each, in turn, becomes 'Year One' of the rolling program.

As from 1979, however, fixed triennial funding arrangements are to be adopted in respect of recurrent grants (other than equipment grants) for universities and colleges of advanced education to facilitate forward planning in these areas. Equipment and capital grants will be determined annually. In addition, funding arrangements for technical and further education are to be considered further following examination of a report by the Williams Committee of Inquiry into Education and Training. Rolling program arrangements are to be maintained for payments to the States for schools.

Cost supplementation arrangements for 1979 will continue to be confined to the wages and salaries component of recurrent programs, including the fees reimbursement component in the technical and further education assistance.

However, because the respective Commissions will not report until after the Budget it is not possible to give precise estimates, for the four areas of assistance, of total grants in 1978–79 including amounts to allow for cost increases beyond 30 June 1978.

The figures in respect of the four areas for 1978–79 given in Tables 15 through 18 below are therefore generally on the basis of estimated June 1978 cost levels and there will be additions to the amounts shown in those tables on account of cost supplementation. An amount of \$45 million has been allowed for in the budget figures in respect of cost supplementation for the four areas of assistance concerned. This is a broadly determined figure and it is not possible to give a break-down of it as between the areas of assistance concerned; for purposes of this document, however, an arbitrary allocation of \$41 million to recurrent grants and \$4 million to capital grants has been made and this has been allocated between States in proportion to recurrent and capital grants for education respectively.

#### Tertiary Education

The Tertiary Education Commission Act 1977 established the Tertiary Education Commission as a replacement for the three former Commissions—the Universities Commission, the Commission on Advanced Education and the Technical and Further Education Commission. The areas with which these former Commissions were concerned are now dealt with by separate Councils within the new Commission, which has the object of promoting balanced and co-ordinated development of tertiary education throughout Australia. In particular, the programs of assistance to the States towards these areas are administered by the Commission.

As indicated above, the Government's decisions on the 1978 programs were taken in accordance with the three-year rolling program arrangements which were introduced in 1977. The programs of assistance to the States for that year for universities, colleges of advanced education and technical and further education institutions were authorised under the *States Grants (Tertiary Education Assistance) Act* 1977.

In June 1978, the Government announced base levels of expenditure for 1979 (i.e., before allowances for cost increases during the year) and relevant amounts for 1980 and 1981. For universities and colleges of advanced education, there is to be a 0.7 per cent real increase in recurrent funds in 1979 to sustain intakes of students at present levels and to accommodate the Commission's projected increases in total enrolments. Capital funds are to be reduced by 39.3 per cent in real terms on 1978, due in part to stabilised enrolments following a period of rapid growth. For the technical and further education sector, there is to be an overall increase of 19.4 per cent in assistance in 1979 including the first instalment of an additional capital works program announced in December 1977.

For each of the years 1980 and 1981, recurrent grants (other than equipment grants) for universities and colleges of advanced education have been set at the same overall level in real terms as those approved for 1979. As indicated above, for technical and further education, the base programs for 1980 and 1981 will be determined by the Government after consideration of the report of the Williams Committee of Inquiry into Education and Training.

The percentages referred to in this section relate to the total programs which are the subject of recommendations by the Commission. In the case of universities and colleges of advanced education, these programs relate to institutions in the Territories as well as the States but, in the case of technical and further education, they relate to the States only.

#### Universities

Assistance to the States for the recurrent expenditures of universities dates from 1951-52; in 1957-58 assistance was first given for expenditure on capital programs. In 1973-74 the Commonwealth assumed full financial responsibility in this area.

On the basis of the arrangements noted above, the program of financial assistance to the States for universities in 1979 amounts to \$626.7 million at estimated June 1978 prices. The allocation for 1978–79 is \$628.3 million, again at estimated June 1978 prices.

The following table shows grants to the States for universities since 1974–75 and the estimated grants for 1978–79 at estimated June 1978 prices:—

## Colleges of Advanced Education (including Teachers Colleges)

Grants to the States for colleges of advanced education began in March 1965 when the Commonwealth agreed, as an interim measure, to pay capital grants to the States for colleges of advanced education during the remainder of the 1964-66 period. From the start of the 1967-69 triennium, assistance was extended to recurrent grants for such colleges. Grants to the States have been made since 1967-68 for teachers colleges and since 1968-69 for pre-school teachers colleges. Prior to July 1973 these grants were provided under separate programs, but since then they have been absorbed into the program of grants for colleges of advanced education.

On the basis of the arrangements noted above, the program of financial assistance to the States for colleges of advanced education in 1979 amounts to \$455.2 million at estimated June 1978 prices. The allocation for 1978–79 is \$462.1 million, again at estimated June 1978 prices.

The following table shows grants to the States for colleges since 1974-75 and the estimated grants for 1978-79 at estimated June 1978 prices:--

## Technical and Further Education

Assistance to the States for technical and further education, first provided in 1964–65, has been directed towards enhancing the quality and extending the availability of technical and further education, and compensating the States for not levying fees.

Grants to the States under the technical and further education program are made on the understanding that the States do not reduce the levels of activity financed from their own resources.

On the basis of the arrangements noted above, the program of financial assistance to the States in 1979 amounts to \$119.5 million at estimated June 1978 prices. The program includes a first instalment of \$6.6 million of a Government undertaking to provide an additional \$53.4 million at estimated June 1978 prices for capital works over the period 1979–81. The allocation for 1978–79 is \$125 million, again at estimated June 1978 prices.

The following table shows grants to the States for technical and further education since 1974–75 and the estimated grants for 1978–79 at estimated June 1978 prices:—

#### Schools

The Commonwealth has been providing assistance for schools in the States since 1964–65 when it provided grants for science laboratories and equipment. The range of assistance was progressively extended and by 1975–76 the Commonwealth was providing grants for both government and non-government schools in a number of categories: general recurrent grants, general building grants and grants for science laboratories and equipment, primary and secondary school libraries, schools for handicapped children, disadvantaged schools, migrant children, teacher development, innovatory projects and information programs.

The Schools Commission, established by the Schools Commission Act 1973, administers these programs of assistance.

Three-year rolling program arrangements have applied to assistance for schools in the States since 1977. Under these arrangements an amount of \$646.4 million (at estimated June 1978 prices) will be provided as the base program of assistance in 1979. This program, comprising \$166.5 million and \$479.9 million for capital and recurrent expenditures respectively, represents an increase of 1 per cent in real terms on the approved program for 1978.

Planning guidelines provided for 1980 and 1981 under the rolling program arrangements allow for growth of 1 per cent per annum in real terms in the base programs. The following table shows grants to the States for schools since 1974–75 and the estimated grants for 1978–79 at estimated June 1978 prices:—

#### Child Migrant and Refugee Education

Grants are provided by the Commonwealth to the States for child migrant education in schools. Until 1976, they were made available under the *Immigration (Education) Act* 1971. Since then almost all of the program of assistance has been subsumed within the general recurrent grants programs administered by the Schools Commission (*see* above). Grants under the *Immigration (Education) Act* are now only provided for the purpose of initial special instruction of refugee children who arrive during the course of a school year, and for the purchase of materials. The increased expenditure shown below for 1978–79 is to cater for the large increase in refugee intake agreed to for the year. In addition, for the period 1973–74 to 1976–77, assistance was also provided to the States under the Act for the construction of portable supplementary classrooms to accommodate the increased number of students needing special language instruction in government and non-government schools.

The Commonwealth also reimburses the States for the costs of certain adult migrant education services. These reimbursements are regarded as payments for services rendered and are not, therefore, classified as payments to the States. In addition Commonwealth funds to be provided in 1978–79 for portable classrooms will not be by way of payments to the States.

## Educational Research

Grants to the States for the purpose of educational research are made under the *Education Research Act* 1970. For this purpose, the Education Research and Development Committee advises the Minister for Education on priorities in educational research, makes recommendations on allocations of financial support of educational research projects proposed to it and commissions research. The Committee is also required to advise the Minister on any other means for the improvement of educational research, its development and the application of results in Australia.

\$1.04 million has been approved for 1978–79 and, of this, it is estimated that \$0.8 million will be made available to the States on the recommendations of the Committee.

Under the Act payments are also being made to the States for research commissioned by the Minister for Education. In addition, grants are provided for fellowships tenable overseas, and payments are made in the Australian Capital Territory. These payments are in addition to the activities of the Education Research and Development Committee. The following table shows grants to the States for educational research since 1974-75 and estimated grants in 1978-79:---

#### Health

The Commonwealth has been providing assistance to the States for health services and facilities since 1949–50, when it began providing grants for the control of tuberculosis. Grants of relatively minor amounts have also been made for blood transfusion services since 1953–54, for the disposal of ships' garbage since 1966–67 and for nursing homes and certain health education services since 1970–71.

In recent years, however, the level and extent of Commonwealth assistance to the States for health have increased dramatically, with a number of new continuing programs being initiated. The most significant of these is the scheme for sharing net operating costs of recognised hospitals in the States.

Payments to the States for health purposes have consequently risen rapidly from \$21 million in 1972–73 to \$1 107.2 million in 1977–78. The estimated payments in 1978–79 are \$1 164.4 million.

## Health Insurance Program

Section 30 of the *Health Insurance Act* 1973 authorised the Commonwealth to enter into agreements with State Governments 'for the provision of hospital services' by the States.

South Australia and Tasmania entered into such agreements with effect from 1 July 1975, Victoria and Western Australia from 1 August 1975, Queensland from 1 September 1975 and New South Wales from 1 October 1975.

Under these arrangements, the States provided free standard ward public hospital treatment without means test and free public hospital outpatient services. There were agreed arrangements in respect of charges in wards other than standard wards.

In very much abbreviated terms, the agreements provided that the Commonwealth meet 50 per cent of the net recurrent costs of hospitals referred to as 'recognised' hospitals in the agreements.

Payments under the agreements were suspended in May 1976, following legal advice that the agreements were invalid. Up to that date, the Commonwealth had already made payments totalling \$575.2 million.

As an interim measure, until new cost-sharing arrangements were negotiated with the States as part of the new health insurance arrangements that were to apply from 1 October 1976, the *States Grants (Hospital Operating Costs) Act* 1976 authorised the payment of up to \$315 million to the States to meet 50 per cent of net operating costs of hospitals incurred before 1 October 1976. Of this amount, \$294.5 million was paid to the States in 1975–76 to meet the estimated payments that would have been made to the States from 25 May to 30 September 1976 had the former agreements not been declared invalid. It was estimated that \$215.6 million of that amount would have been paid in ordinary circumstances in 1976–77.

New cost-sharing arrangements under the *Health Insurance Act* 1973 were negotiated with the States and became effective on 1 October 1976. Apart from revisions to relevant charges and to conditions in respect of free hospital treatment, the main change from the previous arrangements was that the Commonwealth is now to meet 50 per cent of budgets as approved by the Commonwealth and State Health Ministers. Agreements with four of the States (New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland and Western Australia) end on 30 June 1980 and with the two remaining States (South Australia and Tasmania) on 30 June 1985.

#### Hospitals Development Program

From 1973–74 to 1977–78 the Commonwealth provided assistance towards an approved program of construction of public hospitals, mental hospital facilities, public nursing homes and health hostels. This overall program has now ceased and annual payments from 1974–75 to 1977–78 are given in Appendix V.

## Launceston General Hospital

Under an agreement with the Tasmanian Government, the Commonwealth is continuing to meet 50 per cent of the approved costs of Stage 1 of the redevelopment of the Launceston General Hospital. Previously, assistance for the project was provided under the Hospitals Development Program. The estimated amount to be provided in 1978–79 is \$5.9 million.

## Community Health Facilities and Services

The Government is continuing to provide grants in 1977–78 to the States and other eligible organisations under the Community Health Program which commenced in 1973.

From 1 July 1978, the Commonwealth will meet 50 per cent of recurrent costs of approved projects instead of the 75 per cent provided in 1977–78. Funds allocated through the States for recurrent costs of women's refuges will, however, continue at the rate of up to 75 per cent. Capital costs of all approved projects will continue to be subsidised by the Commonwealth at 50 per cent. In addition to the above-mentioned arrangements, the Commonwealth meets the full cost of those community health projects that have an Australia-wide application.

Grants were also paid to the States under the *Mental Health and Related Services* Assistance Act 1973, for the period 1973-74 to 1975-76. Assistance for projects encompassed by that Act has since been subsumed within the Community Health Program.

The following table shows payments that have been made to the States under both programs taken together since 1974–75 and estimated payments in 1978–79:—

## Tuberculosis Control

Under the *Tuberculosis Act* 1948, the States were reimbursed from 1949-50 for approved expenditures they incurred in the diagnosis, treatment and control of tuberculosis. The incidence of tuberculosis has been brought under control in Australia and Commonwealth assistance under this program ceased as from 31 December 1976. (Costs incurred by recognised hospitals in treating tuberculosis patients were subsumed within the hospital cost-sharing arrangements.)

Annual payments from 1974–75 to 1977–78, when final payments were made to certain States to meet commitments entered into prior to 31 December 1976, are given in Appendix V.

## School Dental Scheme

The Commonwealth has been co-operating with the States since 1973 in an Australiawide School Dental Service for all primary school children.

The State Governments are responsible for administering the scheme. Until 1975–76, the Commonwealth met the full capital and operating costs of training facilities for dental therapists, as well as the full capital costs and 75 per cent of operating costs of school dental clinics. These arrangements have been revised since then and in 1977–78 the Commonwealth met 75 per cent of the capital costs of new facilities, 75 per cent of the operating costs of training facilities and 50 per cent of the operating costs of clinics. A further revision has been made to these arrangements and as from 1 July 1978 the Commonwealth is to meet 50 per cent of the operating costs of training facilities and clinics and 50 per cent of the capital costs of rew facilities. Capital facilities not completed by 30 June 1978 will continue to be funded 75 per cent by the Commonwealth.

## Health Education Campaigns

The Commonwealth is continuing to sponsor, in conjunction with the States, the National Drug Education Program. Funds have been provided to support State and national projects of drug education since 1970–71. It is estimated that \$904 500, an increase of 22 per cent, will be made available to the States for this purpose in 1978–79. Grants to the States for health education campaigns between 1972–73 and 1975–76 also include expenditure relating to a five-year program of national antismoking education which ceased in the latter year. The grants made to the States under both programs since 1974–75 and the estimated grants for drug education in 1978–79 are shown in the following table:—

## Blood Transfusion Service

Grants have been made to the States since 1953–54 for the purpose of assisting Blood Transfusion Services conducted by the Australian Red Cross Society.

Since 1973-74 the annual operating costs of the Services in the States have been met 35 per cent by the Commonwealth, 60 per cent by the States, and 5 per cent by the Society. It was agreed in 1975-76 that approved capital expenditure for the Services be shared between the Commonwealth and the States on a \$1 for \$1 basis.

The basis of the Commonwealth's contribution changed from the beginning of 1976–77 so that the Society's contribution, within each State Division, is the lower of 5 per cent of operating costs or 10 per cent of the previous year's income from donations. Any reduction in the Society's previous share is taken up by the Commonwealth. Approved capital costs in the States continue to be shared equally by the Commonwealth and the States.

#### Health Planning Agencies

The Government will continue to provide grants in 1978–79 for the support of State health planning agencies. Payment of grants for this purpose commenced in 1973–74. In previous years, these grants were provided to the States on a \$2 for \$1 basis. From 1 July 1978, the Commonwealth will meet 50 per cent of the approved costs of the agencies.

## Home Dialysis Scheme

From 1974–75 to 1976–77 the Commonwealth made available, through State public hospitals, home dialysis equipment and supplies to all who needed them. The scheme was absorbed within the hospital cost-sharing arrangements from 1 October 1976 and costs are now shared equally with the States.

Annual grants made under the scheme since its inception in 1974–75 and final payments in 1977–78 are given in Appendix V.

# Control of Encephalitis

Following the outbreak of Australian Encephalitis (formerly known as Murray Valley Encephalitis) early in 1974, the Commonwealth has provided funds to New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia to assist in a mosquito eradication campaign along the Murray Valley Basin.

Funds will be provided in 1978–79 to continue to control the disease, not only for mosquito abatement programs but also for co-ordination research and teaching purposes. The campaign is being extended to include Western Australia and the Northern Territory.

Grants paid to the States under these arrangements and estimated grants in 1978–79 are set out in the following table:—

# Disposal of Ships' Garbage

Financial assistance has been made available to each State for the provision of facilities for the disposal of overseas ships' garbage with a view to improving existing measures against the entry of exotic diseases into Australia. The Commonwealth met the full capital cost of incinerators and ancillary structures and half the cost of

access roads, excluding land costs, at selected ports. The cost of maintaining and operating the incinerators and transporting garbage was, however, met by the States. These arrangements are currently under review. Annual grants from 1974–75 to 1977–78 are given in Appendix V.

# High Security Quarantine Units

To meet the threat of new types of human quarantinable diseases, the Commonwealth is meeting the cost of establishing a national high security quarantine unit at the Fairfield Infectious Diseases Hospital, Victoria. The cost of constructing the unit, estimated to be \$1 600 000, is to be met in full by the Commonwealth. An amount of \$200 000 was provided in 1977–78 and it is intended that the estimated balance of \$1 400 000 will be provided in 1978–79.

## SOCIAL SECURITY AND WELFARE

# Welfare Services for the Aged

Under two Acts effective from June 1969—the States Grants (Home Care) Act 1969 and the States Grants (Paramedical Services) Act 1969—the Commonwealth is making grants to the States for certain services provided wholly or mainly to aged persons specifically for home care services, senior citizens centres and paramedical services.

#### Home Care Services

Under the States Grants (Home Care) Act 1969 the Commonwealth shares with participating States the cost of approved house-keeping or other domestic assistance provided wholly or mainly for aged persons in their homes. The Commonwealth's grants were on a \$1 for \$1 basis with the States until 1973-74 when they were made on a \$2 for \$1 basis. The Government has decided to amend the Act so that grants for home care services will again be paid on a \$1 for \$1 basis.

## Senior Citizens Centres

Under the States Grants (Home Care) Act 1969, the Commonwealth shared with participating States up to a maximum of two-thirds of the capital cost of approved senior citizens centres and of the cost of the salaries of welfare officers employed by such centres. The basis of sharing capital costs with the States was altered in August 1973, from a \$1 for \$1 basis up to one-third of the capital cost to a \$2 for \$1 basis

up to two-thirds of the capital cost. The basis of sharing the salary of a welfare officer was also altered from \$1 for \$1 to \$2 for \$1. The Government has decided to introduce amendments to the Act so that the cost of welfare officers' salaries will again be shared on the previous \$1 for \$1 basis.

## Paramedical Services

The Commonwealth shares on a \$1 for \$1 basis with participating States the cost of approved paramedical services, such as chiropody, occupational therapy, physiotherapy and speech therapy, provided wholly or mainly for aged persons in their homes. All States have indicated their willingness to participate, but to date only Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania have provided paramedical services in circumstances which qualify for assistance under the arrangement. Grants up to specified amounts are made in the first instance through the *States Grants (Para-medical Services) Act* 1969. However, where a State has an approved requirement for funds in excess of the limits prescribed by that Act, provision may be made for a supplementary grant through an Appropriation Act.

# Pensioner Housing

Since 1969–70, the Commonwealth has provided grants to the States to assist with the provision of self-contained accommodation at reasonable rentals for certain categories of single aged and service pensioners who have little or no means of support apart from their pensions. During the four years ended 30 June 1978, a total of \$40 million was provided under the *States Grants (Dwellings for Pensioners) Act* 1974 including \$10 million in 1977–78.

This scheme is being continued under the *Housing Assistance Act* 1978, but with wider eligibility criteria and under conditions giving the States greater freedom in the way the funds can be applied. Eligible persons will include those in receipt of an age or invalid pension, a supporting parent's benefit, a special benefit, a sheltered employment allowance, a training allowance in certain circumstances and some classes of service pension. Married as well as single pensioners will be assisted.

Grants totalling \$14 million will be provided in 1978–79. The grants are allocated among the States in proportion to the total number of persons in each State who are eligible under the Act and who are receiving supplementary assistance. Payments made to the States under the scheme since 1974–75 and estimated payments for 1978–79 are shown in the following table:—

# Assistance for Deserted Wives

Under the States Grants (Deserted Wives) Act 1968, the Commonwealth has been sharing on a \$1 for \$1 basis with the States up to prescribed limits the cost of helping certain mothers of families without a breadwinner where the mothers are ineligible for a Class A widow's pension or, as from 1973–74, a supporting mother's benefit.

Assistance is provided during the first six months after the date of the event which gives rise to eligibility (e.g. the birth of a child or separation). The main groups of mothers assisted under the Act are deserted wives, deserted defacto wives, deserting wives, wives of prisoners, and unmarried mothers. After the first six months these groups of mothers may qualify for either a Class A widow's pension or a supporting mother's benefit.

The grant to a State is equal to half the cost of the approved assistance paid by the State to each eligible person but is not to exceed half the amount that would have been payable to such a person under the *Social Services Act* 1947 had she been eligible for a Class A widow's pension or a supporting mother's benefit.

## Pre-Schools and Child Care

Services for children provided in the States began attracting Commonwealth financial support in 1972–73 under the *Child Care Act* 1972. Under that Act, payments were made direct to non-profit organisations and local government bodies—that is, not by way of payments to the States. Payments to the States commenced in 1973–74 under a broader scheme of assistance introduced in that year and have continued since then, as have the direct forms of payment.

The program of assistance is administered by the Office of Child Care which was established under the Minister for Social Security to advise on programs providing for capital and recurrent assistance for pre-school and child care projects including home care, vacation and after school care projects and various other community initiated projects. In 1977–78, assistance to the States for the recurrent costs of pre-school services was provided in the form of a block grant subject to certain broad requirements concerning priority of access. From 1978–79, the block grants will represent the total Commonwealth contribution to the States towards capital and recurrent costs of pre-schools.

Legislation is expected to be introduced into Parliament in the Budget sittings to repeal the *Child Care Act* and other relevant legislation and to provide for new legislation to cover the whole of the childhood services program.

The Government has decided that up to \$65.1 million will be provided in 1978–79 for services for children. It is tentatively estimated that, of that total, approximately \$42 million will take the form of payments to the States.

# Employment Grants for Maryborough Region

Following the decision to ccase granting export licences for minerals from sand mining on Fraser Island, the Commonwealth agreed to provide \$10 million to Queensland for allocation by that State to create employment opportunities in the Maryborough region. \$1 million was provided in 1976–77 and \$3 million in 1977-78. It is intended to provide a further \$3 million in each of the following two years.

## Rehabilitation Centre—Hobart

The Commonwealth and Tasmanian Governments agreed in 1974 to share the costs of establishing and operating a joint rehabilitation centre for handicapped persons in Hobart. The arrangement provides for the Commonwealth to meet up to half the capital cost of building and equipping the centre and to contribute 40 per cent of the annual running costs. Total payments to 30 June 1978 amounted to \$1 533 000 including a payment of \$922 000 in 1977–78. The Commonwealth contribution is expected to be \$1 050 000 in 1978–79.

## Relief Grants for Community Welfare Agencies in Victoria

Grants of \$50 000 were made to Victoria during the Latrobe Valley power strike in October 1977 towards emergency relief for community welfare agencies.

# Grants for Welfare Officers Employed by Ethnic Groups

Following a recent review of post-arrival programs and services for migrants, \$110 000 is to be provided to the States in 1978–79 to employ welfare officers to work with the ethnic aged. Of this amount, it is expected that New South Wales and Victoria will receive \$33 000 each, and the other States \$11 000 each.

## ABORIGINAL ADVANCEMENT

Since 1968–69 the Commonwealth has provided assistance to the States for Aboriginal advancement, particularly in the fields of housing, education and health. Details of payments are included in the statements attached to the Budget Speech and in Table 2 in this paper under the functional headings appropriate to the specific kinds of assistance involved. In other relevant tables in this paper, however, all payments for this purpose are grouped together.

The Commonwealth also provides assistance for Aboriginal advancement in the States by way of direct assistance to Aboriginal organisations and other bodies.

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## Housing

Under successive arrangements between the Commonwealth and the States, financial assistance has been made available to the States in one form or another since 1945-46 for the provision of housing, including assistance with home ownership, for families of low or moderate means. A detailed account of successive arrangements, together with statistics covering the period to 1975-76, is to be found on pages 66 through 68, 200, 201 and 224 of the 1975-76 issue of this paper. Following is a very brief outline:--

- Formal Commonwealth-State Housing Agreements operated throughout the period 1945-46 to 1970-71 under which the Commonwealth advanced to each State, on specified terms and conditions, the proportion of the State's Loan Council works and housing program that it nominated for housing, generally at concessional interest rates (of the order of 1 per cent below the long-term bond rate prevailing at the time). Advances were repayable over 53 years.
- The 1945 Agreement also included provision for the Commonwealth to contribute three-fifths of any loss incurred in a financial year by the State in connection with the administration of its housing projects. Queensland is the only State at present receiving such contributions.
- In 1971-72 and 1972-73 the States financed their housing programs directly from their ordinary Loan Council borrowing programs. The Commonwealth provided specific revenue grants under the *States Grants* (*Housing*) Act 1971 in lieu of the former interest subsidy that the States had received on housing advances. Basic grants of \$2.75 million per year are payable for 30 years in respect of each of those two years.
- In 1972-73 the States were advanced \$6.55 million under the Housing Assistance Act 1973, specifically for additional rental dwellings, to supplement the programs they had undertaken and financed from their normal Loan Council borrowings. These advances were provided at an interest rate of 4 per cent per annum and are repayable over 53 years.
- Under the *Housing Agreement Act* 1973 (amended in 1974) the Commonwealth provided specific purpose payments to the States for welfare housing from 1973-74 to 1977-78 by way of concessional interest rate advances repayable over 53 years outside, and in addition to, Loan Council arrangements. As a result, the State Government Loan Council programs since 1973-74 have been lower than they would otherwise have been (that is, 'offsets' were made).
- Up to 30 per cent of the advances (and a higher proportion in special circumstances) were channelled to the States' Home Builders' Accounts for the provision of low interest loans through terminating building societies or authorised State lending authorities to assist eligible persons to build their homes or to buy them on the private market. In addition, the State Housing Authorities were permitted to sell a specific proportion of their housing stock to eligible persons through vendor finance on concessional terms specified in the Agreement.
- Eligibility for assistance under the Agreement was on the basis of need in accordance with a specific income test of the main breadwinner's income; the breadwinner's eligibility was not subject to subsequent review once assistance had been provided.

The *Housing Assistance Act* 1978 authorises the execution of three-year Housing Agreements with the States to cover the period from 1978–79 to 1980–81 and the payment of advances to the States in accordance with these agreements. The total amount of the advances each year will be determined in the annual Budget context after consideration of State requirements. For 1978–79, a base amount of \$186 million will be provided, together with advances totalling up to \$130 million to be matched \$1 for \$1 with the States' own expenditure on housing programs, including certain non-welfare programs.

Advances will be repayable over 53 years as under earlier Agreements and concessional fixed rates of interest will apply—4.5 per cent per annum for funds directed to home purchase assistance and 5 per cent per annum for rental housing.

The objectives of the new Agreements lay particular importance on :--

- assisting those most in need;
- gearing assistance to the degree of need and limiting it to the time of need (unlike the previous arrangements); and
- making effective use of past investments in welfare housing.

The States will have greater flexibility in determining the uses to which housing funds can be put and the extent of assistance to individuals. At least 40 per cent of advances are to be applied to home purchase assistance by the third year of the Agreement. Restrictions under previous arrangements on the sale of State Housing Authority dwellings will be removed. The States will determine their own sales policy provided that all sales are for cash at market value or replacement cost; purchasers of State Housing Authority dwellings will be eligible for loans from the home purchase assistance program.

## URBAN AND REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT NEC AND THE ENVIRONMENT

Payments to the States included under this functional heading comprise those being made under a number of programs, including some for Aboriginal Advancement. Payments in 1977–78 were \$53.5 million and are expected to total approximately \$41.3 million in 1978–79. (These figures are *net* of repayments.)

Payments in 1977-78 for most of the urban and regional development programs and for certain programs falling within other functional headings were made mainly under the authority of the Urban and Regional Development (Financial Assistance) Act 1974.

## Growth Centres and Decentralisation

A total of \$8.15 million was paid to the States in 1977–78 for development of metropolitan and regional growth centres and for related projects. The funds were provided in the following manner:—

- \$5.08 million to New South Wales and Victoria for Albury-Wodonga (\$5 million in the form of loans and \$0.08 million in the form of grants), mainly for land acquisition, land development and headworks, housing and commercial development construction, studies and investigations and the running costs of the Albury-Wodonga Development Corporation;
- \$1.5 million to New South Wales for the Macarthur growth centre, wholly by way of loans, for land acquisition and development works;
- \$1.5 million to New South Wales for the Bathurst-Orange growth centre, wholly by way of loans, for land acquisition and development works; and
- \$0.07 million to Tasmania by way of grant as the final payment towards the acquisition by the State of land for parks and reserves in the Tamar area.

In 1978–79 assistance amounting to \$5 million will be provided towards expenditure on Albury-Wodonga. While the precise allocation of this amount between New South Wales and Victoria is not possible at this stage, preliminary consideration of the proposed program of expenditure for 1978–79 suggests that the bulk of the funds might go to New South Wales. For the purposes of this document the whole of the \$5 million has been allocated to that State.

The 1978–79 Budget also allows for \$20.1 million for capitalised interest on advances to the States for Albury-Wodonga in 1978–79 and earlier years and on advances for the Bathurst-Orange, Macarthur and Monarto (in South Australia) growth centres in earlier years. This amount represents estimated interest payments which are deferred and added to the amount of principal outstanding and on which interest thus accrues. (In 1977–78 capitalised interest amounted to \$17.5 million.)

In addition to the above, the Commonwealth initiated a new program of general decentralisation assistance in 1977–78 with the establishment of the Commonwealth Decentralised Development Program. Under this program, financial assistance of a capital nature will be provided to State, local government and community bodies and firms engaged in manufacturing and tertiary industry, in selected non-metropolitan centres. Projects are approved under the program following consideration of recommendations made by the Decentralisation Advisory Board. An amount of \$10.5 million has been included in the Budget for 1978–79 for assistance for projects approved under the program additional projects to be approved in

1978-79. It is not known at this stage what proportion of this, if any, will be provided in 1978-79 to the States and local government and, for purposes of the Budget, funds under the program are not classified as payments to the States.

Payments to the States for growth centres and related projects since 1974–75 and estimated payments in 1978–79 for Albury-Wodonga, including capitalised interest, are given in Appendix V.

## Urban Flood Mitigation

Since 1975–76 84.63 million, including \$1 million in 1977–78, has been provided to Queensland under the Urban and Regional Development (Financial Assistance) Act 1974 to assist with the construction of certain flood mitigation works on various creeks in the Brisbane metropolitan area. An amount of \$0.88 million is provided for this purpose in the Budget for 1978–79

## Assistance for Land Acquisition and Development in Urban Areas

In 1973–74 a program of assistance by way of grants and loans was undertaken with the object of making land available for residential and associated uses at fair prices and to facilitate the planning and development of new urban areas.

An amount of \$14.1 million was provided in 1977–78 to meet remaining commitments to the States. In addition, interest is being capitalised on advances in 1977–78 and earlier years in a similar manner to its treatment for growth centres and related projects (*see* above). The 1978–79 Budget allows for \$14.6 million for capitalised interest.

Payments for land acquisition, development and related works in urban areas since 1974–75 (including capitalised interest) and capitalised interest in 1978–79 are given in Appendix V.

#### Woolloomooloo Redevelopment

An agreement was concluded in 1974–75 with New South Wales under which up to \$17 million is being provided by way of grant for acquisition of 3.2 hectares of property and planning and site development in the Woolloomooloo basin in Sydney. Payments to the State have totalled \$9.4 million since 1975–76, including \$0.6 million in 1977–78. An amount of \$1.2 million has been included in the Budget for estimated payments to the State in 1978–79

In addition to the provision of financial assistance, the Commonwealth agreed to transfer, at no cost to the State, 2.6 hectares of Commonwealth property in the Woolloomooloo basin which was valued in excess of \$11 million.

The agreement also provides for the State to make certain payments to the Commonwealth including the payment of specific amounts in respect of each unit of public housing produced on the property acquired by, or transferred to, the State and payment of the receipts from any part of the property that is not retained for public housing. A total of \$540 000 has been received from the State under these provisions since 1976–77 including \$386 000 in 1977–78. Similar payments by the State in 1978–79 are estimated to be \$587 000.

The amounts shown in Appendix V are net amounts after deductions of these receipts.

#### Air Quality Monitoring

In 1975–76 \$191 000 was paid to the States under the *States Grants (Air Quality Monitoring) Act* 1976 on a \$1 for \$1 matching basis for the purchase of equipment for air quality monitoring. In 1977–78 a program of \$150 000 was approved for the expansion of national urban air quality monitoring to provide data for national planning decisions that need to take account of air quality. \$80 000 was paid against this program in 1977–78 under the *Environment (Financial Assistance) Act* 1977; the remaining \$70 000 is expected to be paid in 1978–79. Payments made to each State since 1975–76 and estimated payments in 1978–79 are given in Appendix V.

## Captains Flat—Pollution Abatement Works

Under the *Captains Flat (Abatement of Pollution) Agreement Act* 1975 the Commonwealth is providing financial assistance to New South Wales for approved programs of works to abate the pollution of the Molonglo River from the mine waste dumps at Captains Flat. Financial assistance of up to \$2.5 million is being provided for expenditure on capital works and up to \$100 000 will be provided on a \$1 for \$1 matching basis for expenditure on maintenance of the works. The financial assistance for capital works is 80 per cent by way of grant and 20 per cent by way of loan, and for maintenance wholly by way of grant.

Payments to the State since 1975–76 have amounted to \$1.92 million for capital works, although no payments were made in 1977–78. Amounts of \$70 000 and \$40 000 have been included in the Budget for estimated payments in respect of expenditure in 1977–78 and 1978–79 on capital works and maintenance, respectively.

#### National Sewerage Program

In 1973–74 the Commonwealth embarked upon a program of assistance to the States designed to eliminate the backlog of sewerage works in principal urban areas (defined as the six capital cities, together with Wollongong, Newcastle, the Gold Coast and Launceston).

Funds were provided until 1976–77 for this program, including amounts for extending the assistance to smaller cities and for research, training, monitoring and planning. The program has now been discontinued and \$241 000 was paid in 1977–78 for the completion of certain studies concerned with the rationalisation and efficiency of sewerage services in the States. Annual payments to each State are shown in Appendix V.

#### CULTURE AND RECREATION

The Commonwealth Government first provided grants to the States for cultural and recreational purposes in 1973–74. An estimated \$6.7 million will be made available for these purposes in 1978–79.

## National Fitness Program

In 1975-76 and 1976-77 payments of \$0.6 million per annum were made to the States for national fitness activities. Under arrangements agreed with the States in 1977-78, funds for these purposes are now allocated to the 'Life, Be In It' campaign

which the Commonwealth is co-ordinating in the three years to 1979–80. Of an amount of \$0.6 million which is to be made available over this three-year period, \$207 000 was paid to the States in 1977–78 and a further \$207 000 has been allocated for 1978–79.

## Capital Assistance for Leisure and Cultural Facilities

A program of capital assistance grants on a cost-sharing basis with State, local government and voluntary bodies for the development of community sporting and recreation complexes was commenced in 1973–74 and expanded in 1974–75 to cover a wider range of community leisure facilities including arts/cultural facilities. Final grants estimated to total \$0.9 million will be made to the States in 1978–79 to meet outstanding commitments; some will be for on-passing to local government authorities (*see* Chapter VI) and voluntary bodies.

#### Nature Conservation

Amounts of \$70 242 and \$282 000 were paid to the States in 1977–78 under the *States Grants (Nature Conservation) Act* 1974 and the *Environment (Financial Assistance) Act* 1977 respectively for land acquisition and programs related to the management of parks and reserves for the purposes of nature conservation. \$604 000 will be provided in 1978–79 to meet existing commitments.

## National Estate

Since 1974, grants have been provided for the restoration, preservation and improvement of landscapes and buildings of special significance. The Australian Heritage Commission, established in 1975 under the *Australian Heritage Commission Act* 1975, provides advice to the Commonwealth on the programs of assistance in respect of these matters.

All grants (other than in the Territories) take the form, in the first instance, of payments to the States in accordance with Agreements concluded under the Urban and Regional Development (Financial Assistance) Act 1974.

The following table shows grants paid since 1974–75 and the estimated grants for 1978–79. The distribution of the 1978–79 estimate is notional only, and no commitment to the provision of the amount for each State is implied.

## Facilities for 1982 Commonwealth Games

\$10 million by way of grant is to be provided to Queensland for the construction of sporting facilities and athletes' and officials' accommodation for the 1982 Common-wealth Games in Brisbane. The first of four annual payments of \$2.5 million each is to be made in 1978–79.

# ECONOMIC SERVICES—TRANSPORT

The Commonwealth has been making payments to the States for transport purposes continuously since 1923–24, when it began providing grants for roads. The estimated total payments, *net* of repayments, are \$555.3 million for this function in 1978–79 and, of this, \$508.1 million is for roads and bridges and \$42 million is provided for urban public transport

## Roads

Commonwealth assistance for expenditure on roads has taken two main formsgeneral assistance and assistance for specific road projects. Payments of the latter kind (such as those for beef roads and the sealing of the Eyre highway) were subsumed in the general program of roads assistance introduced in 1974–75. (See page 81 and the relevant section of Appendix IV of the 1975–76 issue of this paper for an historical description of the Commonwealth's assistance for roads).

Over the period 1977-78 to 1979-80 the arrangements for providing assistance to the States for roads are embodied primarily in the *States Grants* (*Roads*) *Act* 1977. The arrangements were determined by the Government after consideration of a 'Report on Roads in Australia 1975' by the former Commonwealth Bureau of Roads. It was decided that \$475 million would be made available to the States in 1977-78 and that the total grants in both 1978-79 and 1979-80 would be equivalent in real terms to the 1977-78 grant. The legislation also set down annual quotas for expenditure by each State from its own resources.

In addition to the \$475 million for 1977–78 an amount of \$2.91 million payable under the *National Roads Act* 1974 in respect of 1976–77 brought total payments for the year to \$477.91 million.

In keeping with the Government's earlier decision that road grants in 1978-79 and 1979-80 would be the equivalent in real terms to the 1977-78 grants, the Government has announced that the road grants for 1978-79 will total \$508 million, an increase of 7 per cent over the \$475 million provided for 1977-78. Of this amount, \$475 million has already been appropriated under the *States Grants (Roads) Act* 1977 and the balance of \$33 million will be appropriated under legislation which is expected to be introduced in the Budget sittings of Parliament. The State expenditure quotas for 1978-79 currently set down in the legislation are also to be increased in line with the increase in the Commonwealth grants.

# Second Hobart Bridge

Following agreement in 1975 between the Commonwealth and Tasmanian Governments, a Joint Committee on the Second Hobart Bridge was established. The first stage of the Committee's work is to carry out the technical investigations and design associated with the Bridge. In relation to these studies the Commonwealth provided a total amount to June 1978 of \$1 165 000, including a payment of \$518 000 in 1977-78. A further \$80 000 is being made available in 1978-79. It is expected that the investigation and design for the Bridge will be completed and a report made to the two Governments in the second half of 1978.

# Railway Projects

Under the program of assistance for urban public transport initiated in 1973-74 the Commonwealth is providing grants to the States for urban railway projects. (See text below under 'Urban Public Transport'.)

For a number of years, the Commonwealth has provided assistance towards rai<sup>1</sup> standardisation projects in certain States. \$34 000 was made available in 1977–78 to Western Australia under the *Railway Agreement (Western Australia) Act* 1961. Payments since 1974–75 are given in Appendix V.

The Government has announced its intention to provide \$70 million over 5 years commencing in 1978–79 for the purpose of financing projects designed to upgrade the national mainline railway network. South Australia and Tasmania will of course not be eligible for assistance under this program as their mainline railways have been transferred to the Commonwealth and are now controlled by the Australian National Railways (ANR) An allocation of \$3 million has been made in 1978–79 for the program but the method by which these funds will be made available, the terms and conditions which will apply and the actual projects to be assisted in 1978–79 have yet to be finally resolved. Preliminary consideration suggests that in 1978–79, the first year of this program, possible allocations might be of the order of \$2.7 million and \$0.3 million to New South Wales and Victoria respectively. While decisions have yet to be made about the State-by-State distribution, these figures have been adopted for the purposes of this document.

## Railway Intersystem Passenger Vehicles

A common 'pool' of passenger vehicles was formed for the operation of the direct standard gauge passenger service between Sydney and Perth (the 'Indian Pacific' service) and the 'Trans-Australian' service between Perth and Port Pirie. The purchase of these vehicles was initially financed by the Australian National Railways. The other railway authorities involved (New South Wales, South Australia and Western Australia) are repaying a share of the cost of the rolling stock, with interest on outstanding balances, over a period of 35 years. The total debt has been divided between the three State systems and the ANR in proportion to operating distances. Following the transfer of the non-metropolitan South Australian railways to the Commonwealth on 1 July 1975, the South Australian portion of the debt has been taken over by the Australian National Railways. No advances to the States for this purpose are expected in 1978–79.

## Urban Public Transport

## (a) 1973–74 to 1977–78

Under the Urban Public Transport Agreement (incorporated as a Schedule to the *States Grants* (*Urban Public Transport*) *Act* 1974), the Commonwealth met twothirds of the cost of approved urban public transport projects in the States. The purpose of the program was to assist in upgrading urban public transport, including railways, over the five years until 1977–78.

Although projects were first approved in 1973–74, funds were not made available until 1974–75 following passage of the legislation. In the period 1974–75 to 1977–78 several additional Acts were passed to appropriate moneys to meet the costs of additional projects approved in 1974–75 and 1977–78 and of certain cost increases which the Commonwealth was required to meet under the terms of the Agreement (namely, two-thirds of approved cost increases due to cost escalation and circumstances which were not foreseen at the time of approval, but not due to faulty planning or faulty cost estimation).

## (b) 1978-79 to 1982-83

A new program of assistance totalling \$300 million for the period 1978–79 to 1982–83 is being provided under the *States Grants (Urban Public Transport) Act* 1978. The Act provides for payments to the States at the rate of \$60 million a year, of which \$40 million is allocated to the States in fixed guaranteed amounts with the remaining \$20 million to be allocated annually on the basis of needs and priorities assessed in the light of proposals submitted by the States. In view of the difficult budgetary situation in 1978–79, the Government has decided, however, to limit payments this year to the guaranteed amounts. It is proposed to amend the Act to add the \$20 million which will not be paid in 1978–79 to the amounts available in later years of the program.

Under the 1978-83 program the Commonwealth will continue to meet two-thirds of the cost of approved urban public transport programs, but there will be no automatic provision for the Commonwealth to support cost escalation. The Commonwealth's liability to each project will be specifically determined at the time the project is approved. In addition to the \$40 million to be made available under the new program, \$2 million is to be provided in 1978–79 towards outstanding commitments under the previous Agreement.

## Transport Planning and Research

For a number of years, funds have been made available for planning and research projects related to roads.

Assistance was first provided for urban public transport planning and research in 1974-75 and 1975-76 under the Urban Public Transport (Research and Planning) Act 1974. Also in 1974-75, in conjunction with new roads legislation, the Transport (Planning and Research) Act 1974 was passed making available funds for planning and research in respect of both roads and urban public transport. Under this Act the Commonwealth met two-thirds of the cost of approved projects over the three years ending 1976-77.

The Transport Planning and Research (Financial Assistance) Act 1977 provided that the Commonwealth continue to meet two-thirds of expenditure in 1977–78 on approved programs of projects and meet one-half of such expenditure incurred by the States in following years. The scope of the program was expanded to include all land transport modes and their relationship with other modes. \$8 million was provided to the States under this Act in 1977–78, in respect of a total program expenditure of \$12 million. A further amount of \$924 000 was paid in respect of commitments in 1976–77 under the Transport (Planning and Research) Act 1974 but not paid in that year.

A total program of \$12.84 million (which incorporates an increase of 7 per cent over the total 1977–78 program) is expected to be approved in 1978–79, towards which the Commonwealth will contribute \$6.42 million.

## Tasman Bridge Disaster

Following this disaster, which occurred in Hobart on 5 January 1975 when the Australian National Line's vessel, 'Lake Illawarra', hit the Tasman Bridge, with consequent loss of life and serious damage to the Bridge, the Commonwealth undertook to reimburse the State for the full amounts of expenditures incurred by it and its authorities, subject to the various expenditures being accepted by the Commonwealth as attributable to the bridge collapse and reasonable, and subject to certain procedures for consultation between the Commonwealth and State Governments. As well as the reconstruction of the Tasman Bridge the agreed measures included:—

- emergency services provided immediately after the disaster;
- the provision of temporary bridging across the river;
- the maintenance and upgrading of roads to cope with additional traffic caused by the loss of the use of the Tasman Bridge;
- the obtaining of ferries, the building of ferry terminals and the construction of additional facilities in connection with bus services on the eastern shore;
- contributions towards the recurrent costs of ferry and bus operations; and
- the provision of additional State Government services on the eastern shore.

The Tasman Bridge Restoration Act 1975 and the Tasman Bridge Restoration Act (No. 2) 1975, in conjunction with complementary legislation passed by the Tasmanian Parliament, ratified the Joint Tasman Bridge Restoration Agreement between the Commonwealth and Tasmanian Governments which provided, inter alia, for a Joint Tasman Bridge Restoration Commission, the functions of which included the restoration of the Tasman Bridge. The administrative costs of the Commission were being met by the Commonwealth.

In addition to the above, a Joint Commonwealth/State expert advisory Committee investigated and reported on proposals for a further permanent bridge across the Derwent River. Following this, in June 1975 the then Commonwealth Government undertook to provide financial assistance for the restructuring of the Tasman Bridge so as to provide an additional traffic lane and, subject to discussions with the State Government on the timing for construction and appropriate financial arrangements, for the construction of a new permanent bridge at Dowsing Point. Assistance for these various purposes, other than the new permanent bridge, is classified in this paper under the heading 'Tasman Bridge Disaster'. With regard to the new bridge *see* elsewhere in this Chapter under the heading 'Second Hobart Bridge'.

The restoration works on the Tasman Bridge have now been completed, the bridge being re-opened for public use on 8 October 1977. Payments to the State between 1974-75 and 1977-78 are given in Appendix V.

#### ECONOMIC SERVICES-WATER SUPPLY AND ELECTRICITY

#### Urban Water Supply

Payments amounting to \$28.5 million have been provided to South Australia since 1974–75 under the Urban and Regional Development (Financial Assistance) Act 1974 to assist with the construction of water treatment plants in the Adelaide metropolitan area. Of this amount, \$6 million was paid in 1977–78. An amount of \$4.44 million is provided in the Budget for 1978–79 under the new National Water Resources Program (see page 79 for further information on this program).

#### Julius Dam

In 1977–78, a grant of \$325 000 was paid to Queensland for on-passing to the Mount Isa City Council as assistance towards the Council's share of the debt burden associated with the now-completed Julius Dam, towards which the Commonwealth had provided \$2 million by way of loans in 1974–75.

## **Gladstone Power Station**

Under the *Gladstone Power Station Agreement Act* 1970, financial assistance was provided to Queensland by way of loans to help finance the construction of a thermal power station at Gladstone in Central Queensland. Payments to 30 June 1978 amounted to \$138.7 million including a final payment of \$191 000 in 1977–78.

#### ECONOMIC SERVICES—INDUSTRY ASSISTANCE AND DEVELOPMENT

#### Softwood Forestry

Under the Softwood Forestry Agreements Acts of 1967 and 1972 financial assistance was provided to all the States for a program of increased planting of softwood forests over two consecutive five-year periods which ended on 30 June 1971 and 1976 respectively. The assistance to each State was by way of interest-bearing loans repayable over twenty-five years, with repayments and the payment of interest to commence approximately ten years after the date of each advance. Total payments to the States under these two Acts amounted to \$17.7 million and \$31.8 million respectively.

The Commonwealth agreed to a one-year extension of assistance to the softwood forestry program in 1976-77 up to a limit of \$6 million which was allocated to the States in accordance with the principles applying to previous agreements. Total payments of \$5.84 million have been advanced under this Agreement. A further payment of \$15 000 is expected to be made to Western Australia in 1978-79.

Under the *Softwood Forestry Agreements Act* 1978 the Commonwealth agreed to provide assistance for a further five-year period commencing 1 July 1977 to cover the cost of maintenance of existing forestry planting financed by earlier Common-wealth assistance. The assistance, which is by way of loans, is repayable over twenty years with repayments commencing fifteen years after the date of each advance.

Assistance for 1977-78 was limited to \$4.2 million, but for the subsequent four years of the Act, payments will depend on State requirements for the maintenance program. Because of delays in finalising agreements with the States, no payments were made under this Act in 1977-78. It is expected that the States will receive their 1977-78 entitlements in 1978<sub>7</sub>79, as well as a further \$5 million for the 1978-79 maintenance program.

## Assistance to the Forestry Industry in Tasmania

The Commonwealth has agreed to provide financial assistance to Tasmania over the next five years towards the cost of establishing some small plantations and certain silviculture projects involving native trees.

The assistance, by way of loans on a \$1 for \$1 matching basis, is intended to commence in 1978-79 with a payment of \$136 500. The loans are to be repayable over 40 years commencing 20 years after each advance is made. During the 20 years in which repayments are deferred, interest is to be capitalised.

## Trawl and Danish Seine Fishery Assistance

In 1974 the Commonwealth agreed to provide assistance of \$105 000 to New South Wales on a \$1 for \$1 sharing basis, for an assessment of the trawl and Danish seine fisheries in the State with a view to formulating practical and constructive management policies. Total payments to 30 June 1978 amounted to \$95 548, including a payment of \$21 054 in 1977 78, and it is estimated that a further \$9500 will be provided in 1978–79.

## Rural Adjustment

In accordance with an agreement reached between the Commonwealth and the States in 1976, assistance is being made available under the *States Grants (Rural Adjustment) Act* 1976, partly as grants and partly as loans, for the purposes of a Rural Adjustment Scheme embracing debt reconstruction, farm build-up, farm improvement, carry-on finance, rehabilitation and household support.

The scheme replaced the Rural Reconstruction Scheme, the Dairy Adjustment Program and the program of Carry-on Assistance to the Beef Industry, all of which were terminated on 31 December 1976. Annual payments under each of these superseded schemes, including estimated payments in 1978–79 to finalise outstanding commitments under the Dairy Adjustment Program, are shown in Appendix V.

During 1977–78 agreement was reached between the Commonwealth and the States on modification of some aspects of the current scheme. Conditions of carry-on finance for beef producers were extended, household support provisions have been liberalised, and in 1978–79, wine grape growers will be eligible for carry-on finance assistance--previously only beef and dairy producers have been eligible.

Assistance under the Rural Adjustment Scheme in 1977–78 amounted to \$40.24 million and it is estimated that a further \$48.7 million will be provided in 1978-79.

#### Fruitgrowing Industry Reconstruction

The States Grants (Fruitgrowing Reconstruction) Act 1972, approved an Agreement under which the States were offered \$4.6 million in financial assistance towards a scheme for the removal of fruit trees deemed to be surplus to long-term market requirements. Following a number of amendments to the Agreement the closing date for lodgement of applications for assistance was set at 31 December 1976 and the closing date for removal of trees at 31 August 1977. The Act was also amended to increase the amount of assistance available under the scheme to \$5.6 million.

Some of the States encountered difficulties in finalising assistance payments in 1977–78, resulting in commitments estimated at \$28 000 having to be carried over into 1978–79.

## Supplementary Assistance for Apple and Pear Growing Industries

In early 1974 the Commonwealth agreed to join with Queensland, Western Australia and Tasmania, on a \$1 for \$1 matching basis, to supplement for the 1974 season the assistance available to the apple growing industry under the Commonwealth funded Apple and Pear Stabilisation Scheme. The supplementary arrangements were subsequently extended to cover the 1975, 1976, 1977 and 1978 seasons. All States except New South Wales have participated in the arrangements at one time or another.

For the 1979 and 1980 seasons, the Commonwealth has offered to continue the supplementary assistance arrangements and to extend them to the pear growing industry. However, only the commitment in respect of the 1978 season arrangements will be paid in 1978–79.

## Eradication of Bovine Brucellosis and Tuberculosis

Since 1970 the Commonwealth has joined with the States in an intensified national campaign for the eradication of bovine brucellosis and tuberculosis. The Government has agreed to provide \$19.1 million during 1978–79 as payments to the States for this purpose.

In 1973 the Commonwealth also joined with the mainland States in a scheme to partially compensate owners of livestock slaughtered following positive reaction to bovine tuberculosis tests, and from July 1976 also joined with these States in a bovine brucellosis slaughter compensation scheme. It is anticipated that \$6.4 million will be paid to the States for this purpose in 1978–79.

#### Control and Eradication of Exotic Animal Diseases

Under long-standing agreements between the Commonwealth and the States in respect of outbreaks of a number of exotic animal diseases, \$1 600 will be paid to New South Wales and Queensland in respect of an outbreak of Newcastle disease during 1977–78.

The Commonwealth has offered to share the cost of bluetongue control up to 30 June 1978 on a \$1 for \$1 basis with the States. The estimated net cost to the Commonwealth is \$27 000, payable in 1978–79.

The Commonwealth has also offered to provide an amount estimated at \$1 342 000 in 1978–79 under the *States and Northern Territory Grants (Bluetongue Virus Control) Act* 1978 for special \$1 for \$1 assistance for cattle producers affected by bluetongue control measures, and for the acquisition by Western Australia and Queensland of virology laboratory equipment. An estimated distribution between States is given in Appendix V.

#### Control and Eradication of Plant Pests

The Commonwealth has agreed to provide \$450 000 to South Australia to assist that State in defraying some costs of its blue and spotted lucerne aphid control programs. The provision for 1978–79 is \$307 000.

In 1977–78 the Commonwealth paid \$156 250 to New South Wales under a three-year agreement to match contributions by all States for the eradication of an outbreak of warehouse beetle in that State. The estimated payment in 1978–79 is \$84 000.

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## Commonwealth Extension Services Grant

From 1948-49 annual grants have been made to the States to promote improved practices in the dairy industry and from 1952-53 further grants have been provided for development in the States of agricultural advisory services generally. In addition to the payments to the States, a small amount is expended directly by the Common-wealth on projects of national importance.

#### Commonwealth Special Research Grant—Agriculture

Annual grants have been made to the States since 1960–61 to finance special investigation projects of a new, limited nature, usually on a \$1 for \$1 matching basis with the States and/or industry. Some Australian Agricultural Council projects common to several States are also financed. (In previous issues of this document, these grants came under the heading of *Minor Agricultural Research*.)

# Assistance to the Mount Lyell Mining and Railway Company Limited

Since August 1977 the Commonwealth has provided funds to Tasmania towards meeting the cash deficit of the copper mining operation of the Mount Lyell Mining and Railway Company Limited at Queenstown. Initially the funds were on a \$1 for \$1 basis under the *Tasmania Grant (The Mount Lyell Mining and Railway Company Limited) Act* 1977. Following consideration in November 1977 of an interim report on copper by the Industries Assistance Commission, the Commonwealth has since then met all of the cash deficit, less the amount of payroll tax collected by Tasmania from the company. This arrangement was entered into, under an amendment to the Act, to reduce the likelihood of mine closure pending a further report by the Commission and following an indication by the Tasmanian Government that it was unable to continue to provide a share of the funds. \$3.38 million was paid to Tasmania for this purpose in 1977–78.

Following consideration in June 1978 of the Commission's further report, the Commonwealth undertook to make further funds available in this manner during the first three months of 1978–79 while negotiations take place between the Commonwealth, the Tasmanian Government and the company on the question of future assistance.

Estimated payments for this three-month period in 1978–79, after adjustments are made for interim payments in respect of assistance to 30 June 1978, are \$1.4 million.

#### Assistance to the States for Water Resources Management and Development

The Commonwealth has for many years provided financial assistance to the States for water related purposes. Depending on these purposes, this assistance has come under a number of functional headings. While the following tables group all of the relevant assistance together, several projects—*Urban Flood Mitigation* (Brisbane Creeks Scheme), *Urban Water Supply* (Adelaide Water Treatment Scheme) and *Julius Dam*—are dealt with elsewhere in this document and in the Statements attached to the Budget Speech under their appropriate functional headings.

Details of assistance provided in 1977–78, amounting in total to \$17.8 million including \$7.32 million dealt with under other functional headings, are given in the table below. For details of assistance in previous years, *see* Appendix V and earlier issues of this document.

In November 1977, the Commonwealth decided to establish a National Water Resources Program to provide assistance for water related purposes over a five-year period. The Commonwealth has undertaken to contribute \$200 million over the duration of the program.

The program will encompass the provision of funds to the States by way of grants and/or loans for programs, projects or activities of national significance or in special circumstances, for:—

- urban and rural water supplies and water re-use;
- flood mitigation and flood plain management;
- problems representing a threat to long-term use of existing water resources;
- water resources assessment and control; and
- regional planning and management investigations.

In 1978–79 it is estimated that a total amount of \$17.96 million, including \$5.32 million dealt with under other functional headings, will be provided to the States for water related purposes. This comprises \$12.13 million already allocated to specific

programs and projects, and \$5.83 million not yet allocated. The following table includes a State distribution of this unallocated amount based on preliminary considerations only and no commitment to these figures is implied.

## Soil Conservation

From 1974–75 to 1976–77 \$1.58 million was provided to the States for soil conservation programs under the *States Grants (Soil Conservation) Act* 1974. In 1977–78 the Commonwealth agreed to provide further interim assistance of \$0.2 million pending the completion of a comprehensive study on soil conservation problems. \$95 000 was paid under the *Environment (Financial Assistance) Act* 1977 in 1977–78 and the remaining \$105 000 will be made available in 1978–79. The comprehensive study has now been completed and the report is to be considered by the Government.

## ECONOMIC SERVICES—LABOUR AND EMPLOYMENT

#### Coal Mining Industry—Long Service Leave

In those States where coal-miners have been awarded long service leave by industrial tribunals, the State Governments reimburse employers the cost of this leave. The Commonwealth, in turn, reimburses the States for the amounts paid and the administrative costs incurred by them in giving effect to these arrangements.

The funds required for these purposes are obtained from an excise imposed on coal production under the *Coal Excise Act* 1949. The excise is currently 15 cents per tonne of which an amount equivalent to 10 cents per tonne is appropriated to a Trust Fund under the *States Grants (Coal Mining Industry Long Service Leave) Act* 1949. Payments are made to the States from the Trust Fund. The balance of the excise is applied to coal research.

## Apprenticeship Training

Since 1971–72 the Commonwealth and the States have collaborated in several schemes to improve and extend apprenticeship training. In 1977–78 the Commonwealth provided \$6.69 million, comprising \$5.22 million to meet costs incurred by the States in employing some 824 apprentices surplus to requirements, \$1.44 million to increase opportunities for trade training under pre-apprenticeship courses and accelerated apprenticeship training, and a final subsidy payment of \$30 000 for the employment of apprenticeship training supervisors.

In 1978–79 \$5.2 million has been made available for the employment of an estimated 685 apprentices, surplus to requirements, in State Government establishments. A notional distribution of payments to the States for 1978–79 is included in the following table, but no commitment to the provision of these amounts is implied.

## Education Program for Unemployed Youth

Under the Education Program for Unemployed Youth the Commonwealth provides funds to the States to conduct courses to improve the skills and motivation of the young unemployed, particularly those with low or inadequate educational qualifications. During 1977–78 eligibility was extended to the 21–24 years age group.

In 1977–78 \$1.47 million was paid to the States under the program and the Government has decided to provide \$3 million in 1978–79. In addition, almost \$2.3 million will be provided as living allowances to trainees under this scheme in 1978–79. This amount forms part of the allocation for allowances under the National Employment and Training Scheme and is not classified as a payment to the State.

# GENERAL PUBLIC SERVICES Law, Order and Public Safety Legal Aid

In the period 1973-74 to 1977-78 the Commonwealth provided grants to assist the functioning of existing legal aid schemes in the States. Payments totalling \$80 000 were paid to Victoria in 1977-78.

A comprehensive legal aid scheme has now been developed whereby State Commissions take over the functions of the Australian Legal Aid Office in the States and are reimbursed by the Commonwealth. As payments under this arrangement are for services rendered, they are not classified as payments to the States.

## Family Law

The Family Law Act 1975, which came into operation in January 1976, provides for a Family Court in each State, established either by the State where it wishes to do so, or under the auspices of the Commonwealth. Only Western Australia has chosen to establish its own Court and, under the provisions of the Act, Commonwealth assistance is being provided for its establishment and operation. An amount of \$1 065 000 was provided in 1977–78 and it is estimated that \$1 483 000 will be paid to Western Australia in 1977–78.

#### Promotion of Road Safety Practices

In each year from 1947–48, grants have been made to the States to assist in the financing of public education programs for the promotion of road safety practices. Since 1970–71 the annual grants to the States have totalled \$150 000 and the distribution between States has also remained constant. The amounts are given in Appendix V.

## **Research Grants**

Since 1965–66 the Commonwealth has made grants to the States for research projects on the recommendation of the Australian Research Grants Committee. An outline of developments over the period 1965 to 1975 was given in Appendix IV of the 1975–76 issue of this paper.

From 1976–77 onwards, the previous fixed triennial funding arrangements were replaced by a three-year rolling program. An amount of \$10 155 000 was provided in 1977–78 and \$11 893 000 is to be made available to the States in 1978–79. The following table shows grants made since 1974–75 and estimates for 1978–79:—

## Assistance for Local Government

Commencing in 1976–77 local government authorities have participated with the States in a scheme of tax sharing. Details of this scheme as well as other schemes of assistance, insofar as they affect local government authorities, are given in Chapter VI.

#### ASSISTANCE FOR NATURAL DISASTER RELIEF

When natural disasters causing damage and destruction occur in a State, the Commonwealth stands ready to join with the State Government concerned on a \$1 for \$1 basis in meeting expenditure on the immediate relief of personal hardship and distress, except where such expenditure is of a very minor nature. Such expenditures may cover provision of food, clothing, shelter and repair of homes to make them habitable and secure.

In respect of 'major' disasters, the Commonwealth also assists with expenditures on other agreed relief and restoration measures when the expenditures are considered to be beyond the capacity of the State concerned to meet from its own resources. In 1977 arrangements were made to enable the States to assume automatic Commonwealth agreement to inclusion of certain 'standard' measures under the arrangements following specified major disasters. The States are required to seek Commonwealth approval if they wish to change the terms of previously applied standard measures (e.g. the size of concessional loans). It remains open to a State to request Commonwealth support for non-standard measures which it might wish to implement for a given disaster. The standard measures are as follows:—

- (a) grants for relief of personal hardship and distress (cyclones, floods, storms, bushfires);
- (b) grants for restoration of public assets and emergency protection and repair works by State, local and semi-government authorities (disasters as in (a));
- (c) concessional loans to small businesses (cyclones and floods);
- (d) concessional loans to churches, sporting associations and other voluntary non-profit organisations (disasters as in (c));
- (e) concessional loans to primary producers for carry-on, restocking and restoration etc. purposes (cyclones, floods, storms, bushfires and droughts):
- (f) freight subsidies for primary producers (disasters as in (e));
- (g) subsidies for carriage of water to central dispersal points for primary producers (drought); and
- (h) assistance to State, local and semi-government authorities for the disposal of helpless and unsaleable stock (floods, bushfires and droughts).

The financial arrangements which have applied since 1971 will be modified for 1978–79. The Commonwealth previously met all expenditures by a State in a year on agreed measures necessitated by major disasters in excess of a base amount set for the State. Under the new arrangements above-base expenditures will be financed on a S3

Commonwealth: \$1 State basis. In addition the State base contributions, for 1978–79 will be double those that have applied since 1971. The new base amounts are:—

The definition of a major disaster remains unchanged, i.e., a disaster necessitating expenditures on agreed relief and restoration measures in excess of one-tenth of a State's (new) base annual expenditure.

Table 103 in Appendix III shows payments that have been made to each State since 1974–75 in respect of various types of disaster (drought, flood, storm, cyclone and bushfires). Reflecting the differing incidence of disasters, the amounts vary considerably from one State to another and from one year to another. A major proportion of the assistance to the States for natural disaster relief in 1977–78 was in respect of drought in the mainland States, particularly South Australia and Western Australia. In addition considerable expenditures were incurred as a result of storm and flood damage in New South Wales and Queensland.

# CHAPTER V—PAYMENTS TO THE NORTHERN TERRITORY

On 1 July 1978 the Northern Territory of Australia became a self-governing territory under the Northern Territory (Self-Government) Act 1978. Under this and associated legislation (and regulations thereunder) the Territory has expenditure responsibilities and revenue raising powers broadly approximating those of a State (though, of course, the Territory is not a State under the Constitution). As a prelude, executive responsibility for certain functions was transferred to the Northern Territory Executive on 1 January 1977 (part of the Department of the Northern Territory) and 1 January 1978 (the Crown Law function of the Attorney-General's Department).

# FUNCTIONS TRANSFERRED

The Assembly of the Northern Territory has power, with the assent of the Administrator or Governor-General, to make laws 'for the peace, order and good government of the Territory' and the Ministers of the Territory have executive authority in respect of the following main matters:

Taxation, including stamp duty

Provision of rural, industrial and home finance credit and assistance

The Public Service of the Territory

Maintenance of law and order and the administration of justice (including legal aid and correctional services)

Police

Private law

Administration of estates and trusts

**Civil liberties** 

Inquiries and administrative reviews (including matters relating to a Territory ombudsman)

Markets and marketing

Corporate affairs

Marketable securities

Consumer affairs

Sales and leases of goods, supply of services, and security interests in or over goods Prices and rent control

Industry (including forestry, fisheries, pastoral, agricultural, building and manufacturing)

Regulation of businesses and professions

Tourism

Printing and publishing

Labour relations (including training and apprenticeship and workers' compensation and compulsory insurance or indemnity therefor)

Industrial safety

Mining and minerals (including gases and hydrocarbon fuels)

Land, public and private (including internal waters)

Urban planning and development

Surface transport regulation (including traffic control, carriers, roads and bridges, vehicle registration and compulsory third party insurance, driver licensing and road safety)

Ports and harbours

Environment protection and conservation (including parks, reserves and gardens and preservation of historical objects and areas)

Flora and fauna

Fire prevention and control

Water resources

Energy planning and regulation

Public utilities

Public works

Registration of land titles, instruments, and births, deaths and marriages

Local government

Housing

Child, family and social welfare

Museums, libraries and art galleries

Scientific research

Recreation, entertainment and sport

Community, cultural and ethnic affairs

Lotteries, betting and gaming

Liquor

Firearms, explosives and hazardous and dangerous substances

Civil defence and emergency services

Censorship

Agreements between the Territory and the Commonwealth or a State or States

Matters incidental to the execution of any executive authority vested in the Ministers of the Territory.

Health is to be transferred on 1 January 1979 and Education on 1 July 1979.

The major State-type matters in relation to which responsibility is *not* to be transferred are:

- The mining of uranium
- Aboriginal affairs, other than the provision of services to Aboriginal communities
- The Supreme Court

## **OUTLINE OF FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS**

The financial arrangements to apply between the Commonwealth and the Northern Territory are set out in a Memorandum of Understanding which has been agreed between the Commonwealth and Northern Territory Governments.

## Types of Payments to be Made to the Northern Territory

From 1 July 1979 (or, by mutual agreement, a later date) the financial arrangements are to be modelled on those applying between the Commonwealth and the States. The Northern Territory will receive a tax sharing entitlement, a local government tax sharing entitlement, and appropriate specific purpose payments under arrangements similar to those which apply in the case of the States. In addition, the Territory will receive from the Commonwealth general purpose capital assistance analogous to a State Government Loan Council program (comprising one-third grant, and twothirds loan on the same terms and conditions as apply to the State Government Loan Council programs). Borrowings by Northern Territory semi-government and local authorities will continue to be covered by the appropriate Loan Council arrangements and programs applying to Commonwealth authorities and individual borrowings by these authorities may be guaranteed by the Commonwealth in appropriate circumstances.

#### Special Grant and Additional Assistance Grant

The Northern Territory has been given access to the Commonwealth Grants Commission on the same basis as a claimant State, and has applied for a special grant on the recommendation of the Grants Commission in respect of 1979–80.

It has been agreed that an additional assistance grant of \$20 million will be paid in each of the first three years of operation of the State-type financial arrangements and that this will be gradually phased out over the following three years. However, an additional assistance grant will not be payable in a year in which a special grant is recommended for payment if such special grant exceeds the additional grant otherwise payable. The intention is that in these initial years the Territory should receive *either* a special grant or an additional grant, whichever is greater.

## Assistance for Expenditure on Aboriginals

Overall responsibility for policy planning and co-ordination in respect of Aboriginal affairs remains with the Commonwealth. However, a considerable part of expenditure in the Territory on various functions which have been, or are to be, transferred is directed towards Aboriginals. In the main, allowance for continued relatively high per capita expenditure on the Aboriginal people of the Northern Territory will be made by means of the normal general and specific purpose Commonwealth assistance to the Northern Territory. The Northern Territory Government has agreed to give full consideration to the needs of the Aboriginal people in setting its expenditure priorities. However, since the Commonwealth wishes to continue the particular priorities it has set in the Territory in relation to some of these expenditures, certain funds will be provided as specific purpose grants for expenditure in various areas such as education and health.

#### Debt Charges

As noted above, the Territory will receive from the Commonwealth funds analogous to the State Government Loan Council programs and will have to meet debt charges on a portion of these funds under terms and conditions analogous to those that apply to the States.

It has been agreed that in the early years of self-government, the Commonwealth will make specific purpose payments to the Northern Territory equal to the debt charges on the capital funds analogous to the State Government Loan Council programs. After some years when the rate of growth of these debt charges has declined it may be agreed to replace the specific purpose payment by an appropriate addition to the general revenue funds provided by the Commonwealth.

#### Mineral Revenues

Special arrangements have been entered into in relation to mineral revenues, the principal features being as follows. Ownership of minerals other than uranium is vested in the Crown in the right of the Northern Territory which will have the right to collect royalties. The Commonwealth will continue to make payments into the Aboriginal Trust Account in accordance with the *Aboriginal Land Rights (Northern Territory) Act* 1976 and a once-for-all adjustment will be made to the Northern Territory tax sharing entitlements.

The Commonwealth will retain ownership of uranium but will make an additional grant to the Northern Territory of an amount in lieu of uranium royalties at  $1\frac{1}{4}$  per cent. Payment of this grant will be conditional on the Northern Territory ensuring that the terms of stamp duties and other charges etc. applying to mining agreements or to financial transactions in respect of such agreements are in line with those that apply in the States. In addition, the Commonwealth undertakes to reimburse the Northern Territory for additional capital or other expenditure, arising from the proposed uranium developments, to the extent that such expenditure is incurred by the Northern Territory in accordance with prior specific arrangements agreed between the two governments.

#### Northern Territory Electricity Commission

In recognition of the special circumstances relating to the electricity undertaking and subject to the Northern Territory Electricity Commission being given financial autonomy, the Commonwealth has agreed to subsidise the Commission through a specific purpose payment under arrangements designed to provide incentives to the Commission to improve the efficiency of its operation.

## Transfer of Assets

Assets being transferred to the Northern Territory under the provisions of Section 69 of the *Northern Territory* (*Self Government*) *Act* will not attract a capital liability payable to the Commonwealth except in the case of the assets associated with the following items, in respect of which there is a capital liability as indicated in each instance.

# (a) Staff Housing

Each dwelling transferred to the Northern Territory will attract a capital liability of \$19 000 repayable over 53 years from the date of transfer at an interest rate of 5 per cent per annum.

(b) Northern Territory Housing Commission

The capital liability of the Northern Territory Housing Commission as at 30 June 1978 and the terms and conditions applying to the advances comprising that liability will be assumed by the Northern Territory.

(c) *Electricity Supply* 

Assets to be transferred at a valuation of \$55.983 million, repayable over 20 years at the appropriate semi-government interest rate current at the time of transfer.

## (d) Water Supply and Sewerage

Assets to be transferred at a valuation of \$16 million repayable at an annual redemption of 0.85 per cent plus interest at 5 per cent per annum.

# TRANSITIONAL YEAR

1978-79 is to be a transitional year to allow time for the administrative framework and financial arrangements of the Commonwealth/State financial model to be developed in respect of the functions transferred on 1 July 1978, and for planning the subsequent transfer of the education and health functions. The general approach to be followed in settling the financial arrangements is described in the Memorandum of Understanding in the following words:

'General approach

16. The first step will be to settle an *overall amount for revenue assistance* (i.e. assistance for recurrent expenditures) for the Northern Territory in year 1 [the first year of operation of the State-type financial model], an *overall amount for capital assistance* for year 1 and an appropriate borrowing program under the umbrella of the Common-wealth's *semi-government borrowing program* for year 1 within the Loan Council arrangements.

17. The second step will be to dissect the overall amounts of revenue and capital assistance for year 1 into various categories of payments and to specify the terms and conditions which will apply to the payments.

18. The overall amounts referred to in paragraph 16 above will be settled having regard to the levels of the relevant provisions in the years preceding year 1, and the special needs of the Territory. It should be noted, however, that the overall amount for revenue assistance could, in effect, be determined by any special grant paid after inquiry and recommendation by the Commonwealth Grants Commission, and in the case of the semi-government borrowing program, the figure ultimately will be determined by the Loan Council.

19. The Commonwealth has given an assurance that Commonwealth assistance to the Northern Territory will be sufficient to maintain standards of service at an overall equivalent to that presently provided pending the examination by the Grants Commission, of the Territory's current revenue and expenditure, this on the understanding that the Territory will make a reasonable revenue raising effort.

20. The terms and conditions attaching to the various payments referred to in paragraph 17 above will in appropriate cases include a formula for determining the levels of assistance in the years beyond year 1. In other cases the level of assistance in those years will be determined by the Commonwealth in the context of its priorities and its own budgetary constraints and in the light of the needs of the Territory. These are similar to the arrangements which apply between the Commonwealth and the States.'

# PAYMENTS TO THE NORTHERN TERRITORY AND BORROWINGS BY NORTHERN TERRITORY AUTHORITIES IN 1977–78 and 1978–79

For 1978–79 the bulk of the Commonwealth funds for the Territory will be provided as general purpose funds. Similar arrangements were adopted for the first time in 1977–78, although self-government had not been formally instituted. The table below shows payments to the Northern Territory, borrowing programs of Northern Territory authorities, and interest paid by the Northern Territory to the Commonwealth for 1977–78 and corresponding estimates for 1978–79.

It should be noted that in both years (though to a lesser extent in 1978–79 than in 1977–78) a considerable part of overall Commonwealth expenditure in the Northern Territory is in respect of functions not yet transferred to the Northern Territory and is included in the appropriations administered by various Commonwealth Departments. Such expenditures are *not* included in the above table. That is to say, the payments set out in the above table do not represent total Commonwealth payments to or for the Northern Territory, but (with the exception of the establishment grant), only those payments made direct to the Northern Territory. The increase in payments in 1978–79 compared with the previous year reflects the additional functions transferred to the Northern Territory in the latter year and thus now funded by way of direct payments.

## Specific Purpose Grants in 1978–79

#### Payment for Recurrent Costs of Public Hospitals

It is proposed to introduce legislation to amend the *Health Insurance Act* 1973 to allow the Commonwealth to negotiate a hospital cost-sharing agreement with the Northern Territory. It is envisaged that the agreement would be on similar lines to those with the State Governments (*see* Chapter IV) and take effect from 1 January 1979 when the Northern Territory assumes responsibility for health functions.

In anticipation of this arrangement, provision has been made for the payment of \$8.425 million under the Health Insurance Act to meet 50 per cent of the estimated approved net operating costs of public hospitals in the Territory from 1 January to 30 June 1979.

## Control of Encephalitis

The Northern Territory will participate in this scheme in 1978–79 along similar lines to those applying to assistance to the States. (See Chapter IV for details.)

#### Housing for Aboriginals in the Northern Territory

Within the 1978–79 appropriations of the Department of Aboriginal Affairs, an amount of \$450 000 has been allocated to the Northern Territory for payment to the Northern Territory Housing Commission for the construction of houses in urban areas. Houses for Aboriginals will be provided in Alice Springs, Tennant Creek and Katherine under arrangements to be negotiated.

## Exotic Animal Diseases Eradication

The States and Northern Territory Grants (Bluetongue Virus Control) Act 1978 provides for the Northern Territory, for purposes of this Act, to be treated as a State after 1 July 1978. Under this Act, the Commonwealth matches agreed State expenditure on assistance to cattle producers towards meeting the cost of mustering and blood-testing and on virology laboratory equipment.

# CHAPTER VI—PAYMENTS TO OR FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES

Local government authorities in Australia (except in the Northern Territory) are established under Acts of the State Parliaments for the purpose of providing certain public services within defined geographical boundaries. The functions of these authorities differ significantly between States and, indeed, within States.

Prior to 1973 no Commonwealth assistance was provided specifically for local government in the States. Successive Commonwealth Governments had taken the view that as local authorities were constituted and functioned under State laws, it was the responsibility of the State Governments to assess and provide for the needs of local government in the light of local government's overall responsibilities and the revenue raising resources available to it. The Commonwealth, for its part, provided general purpose funds to the States to assist in the financing of all the States' expenditure responsibilities, including in the local government area.

(There were, however, over this period, a number of Commonwealth programs —mostly of a relatively minor kind—under which local authorities were among the bodies eligible for assistance either directly or through the States. Details of these programs are included later in this Chapter.)

The major developments concerning Commonwealth assistance for local government in recent years are summarised below.

While the borrowing arrangements of local government authorities do not involve Commonwealth payments to or for such authorities, this Chapter includes material on such funds because of their relevance in the general context of inter-government financial relations.

Then follows an outline of various Commonwealth programs involving payments to or for local government authorities. The Chapter ends with a summary of the various forms of such payments in the years 1974–75 to 1978–79.

Particulars of programs in respect of which expenditures were not made in 1977-78 nor are expected to be made in 1978-79 but which involved expenditures in earlier years may be found in previous issues of this paper.

GENERAL PURPOSE ASSISTANCE PROVIDED ON ADVICE OF THE GRANTS COMMISSION

In 1973 the Commonwealth Parliament passed the *Grants Commission Act* 1973 repealing the *Commonwealth Grants Commission Act* 1933. The 1973 Act, inter alia. laid down procedures for regional organisations of local government to apply for financial assistance from the Commonwealth and for such applications to be the subject of inquiry and report by the Grants Commission. It also provided that the grants to the States for local authorities should be provided in such a way as to promote financial equality between local authorities and regional groupings of such authorities.

After consideration of written and oral submissions and evidence from interested parties, the Commission recommended grants for local government totalling \$56 345 000 in 1974–75 and \$79 908 000 in 1975–76, and further recommended that the grants be paid without conditions attached to their use by local government authorities. The Commonwealth accepted the Commission's recommendations in both years. The payments were made in the first instance to State Governments for transmission to individual local government authorities in the amounts specified. The payments made to each State are set out in Table 63 below.

These arrangements were replaced in 1976 by the tax sharing arrangements described below, and the Grants Commission ceased to be responsible for recommending amounts to be paid to specific local authorities or regional groups. (*Common-wealth Grants Commission Act* 1976).

#### LOCAL GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE UNDER THE NEW TAX SHARING ARRANGEMENTS

As noted in Chapter II, the sharing of personal income tax between the Commonwealth, the States and local government represents a central element in the Government's Federalism policy.

The arrangements agreed in 1976 between the Commonwealth and the States for the sharing of personal income tax collections with local government, and subsequently incorporated in the *Local Government (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act* 1976, are broadly as follows:—

- ~ each year local government will be entitled to 1.52 per cent of net personal income tax collections in the previous year;
- the amount so derived will be divided among the States in specified proportions which are subject to recommendation by the Commonwealth Grants Commission;
- each State will allocate a minimum of 30 per cent of the assistance among local authorities on a basis which takes into account the respective populations of those local authorities, but which may also take into account the respective sizes and the respective population densities, and any other matters agreed upon between the Commonwealth and the State concerned;
- the remaining assistance will be allocated among the local authorities, having regard to their respective financial needs, on the recommendations of State Grants Commissions.

On 21 November 1977, the Prime Minister announced that the percentage of net personal income tax collections allocated to local government would be increased to 2 per cent over the next three years. At the Premiers' Conference on 22–23 June 1978, the Government reaffirmed its commitment to the increase, but announced that, given other commitments, it was unable to make any move in that direction in 1978–79.

The Act provides for the assistance to be distributed amongst the States as follows:—

# BORROWING ARRANGEMENTS FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES

As explained in Chapter III, the borrowings of Commonwealth and State Government authorities, including those of local government authorities, come within the purview of the Loan Council under the Gentlemen's Agreement originating in 1936. The Loan Council determines maximum interest rates and other terms and conditions of loans raised by authorities and also approves annual overall programs for 'larger' authorities (at present those borrowing more than \$1 million in a year) in each State. These borrowings are arranged by the individual authorities, with guarantees and other assistance being provided in some cases by the State Governments.

## Borrowings by Local Government Authorities in 1977–78 and 1978–79

The table below shows aggregate borrowings by all 'larger' and 'smaller' authorities in 1977–78 and the amounts borrowed within these aggregates by local government authorities, together with corresponding estimates for 1978–79. (Figures for earlier years are given in Appendix II.) It will be seen that a considerable proportion of, but not all, borrowings in the 'smaller' authorities category are made by local government authorities. It will be seen also that the amounts of borrowings by local government authorities vary markedly between the States (after taking account of differences in population). This reflects a number of factors including, importantly, variations between the States in the range of functions allocated to local government. As an example, the particularly high figures for Queensland reflect, in part, large borrowings by the Brisbane City Council, which carries out a number of functions (e.g., sewerage) which in other States are undertaken by semi-government authorities.

Under the financial arrangements applying between the Commonwealth and the Northern Territory from 1 July 1978, Northern Territory semi-government and local authorities will continue to be covered by the appropriate Loan Council arrangements and programs applying to Commonwealth authorities and individual borrowings may be guaranteed by the Commonwealth in appropriate circumstances—see Chapter V.

COMMONWEALTH PAYMENTS MADE DIRECT TO LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES

There are no Commonwealth programs of direct payments to local government authorities designed for the specific purpose of providing financial assistance to these authorities.

There are, however, a number of programs under which local government authorities are among bodies that are eligible for, and have received, Commonwealth assistance paid direct to them. The programs concerned are summarised below. Wide variations between the States in the amounts paid for particular programs reflect, amongst other things, differences in the extent to which the activities concerned are carried out by local government authorities rather than by private organisetions or by State Government departments or agencies. It might be noted that payments formerly classified for the purposes of Budget documents, including previous issues of this paper, as payments direct to local authorities for Aboriginal advancement have been reclassified as direct Commonwealth expenditure. In accordance with this re-classification the item has been omitted from this issue.

## Nursing Homes

In 1974–75 the Commonwealth Government introduced a scheme under which religious, charitable and other non-profit organisations conducting nursing homes may receive assistance from the Commonwealth Government in meeting deficits incurred in running the homes. Local government authorities operating nursing homes on a non-profit basis are also eligible to participate in this scheme.

Local government authorities in two States—South Australia and Western Australia— are participating in the scheme. It is estimated that an amount of \$551 200 will be provided to meet their nursing homes' operating deficits in 1978–79. Details of payments are set out in the following table:—

# Home Nursing

Under the *Home Nursing Subsidy Act* 1956 organisations (other than profit-making bodies and bodies conducted or controlled by a State Government) conducting home nursing services are eligible for annual subsidies depending on the numbers of nurses employed on home nursing duties. The amount of Commonwealth Government assistance cannot exceed the amount received by the organisation from a State Government and/or a local government authority.

Local government authorities in New South Wales and Tasmania have received assistance under this scheme. The only local government authorities to participate since 1976–77, however, have been in New South Wales. The amounts of grants that have been paid to such authorities since 1974–75 and estimates for 1978–79 are shown in the following table:—

## Aged or Disabled Persons Homes

Under the Aged or Disabled Persons Homes Act 1954, local government authorities along with religious, charitable and certain other organisations, are eligible to receive assistance for the capital and operating costs associated with the provision of certain kinds of accommodation for the aged.

The rate of subsidy is \$2 for \$1 up to a maximum subsidy of \$11 130 for a single unit and \$12 910 for a double unit. The subsidies are reviewed periodically.

In 1969 the Act was amended to provide for the payment of personal care subsidies in respect of persons aged eighty years and over resident in accommodation provided by an approved organisation. The subsidy is presently \$60 a month. In 1973 the subsidy was also extended to persons aged less than eighty years. Only one local authority—in South Australia—is currently receiving this subsidy.

The greater part of the capital grants under this Act is paid to organisations other than local government authorities. In 1977–78 local government authorities received \$1.4 million out of total capital grants of \$22.2 million. For 1978–79 it is estimated that local government authorities will receive \$3.4 million out of total estimated payments under the Act of \$26.1 million.

## Aged Persons Hostels

Under the Aged Persons Hostels Act 1972, local government authorities, along with religious, charitable and other organisations are eligible to receive assistance for the capital costs associated with the provision of hostel accommodation for the aged.

Subject to certain conditions, the Commonwealth Government meets the cost of providing hostel accommodation by eligible organisations up to a current maximum of \$16 700 a person. The subsidies are reviewed periodically. The Government also pays an additional grant of up to \$2 400 a person for the purchase of land; a further \$250 a person is available for furnishings.

Local government authorities first received assistance under the Act in 1975–76. The following table shows grants paid to local government authorities since 1975–76 together with estimates for 1978–79:—

#### Delivered Meals Subsidy

Under the *Delivered Meals Subsidy Act* 1970, eligible organisations can receive assistance for the provision of what are known as 'meals on wheels' services. Since 1974 assistance has been at the rate of 30 cents for meals with an approved vitamin C supplement and 25 cents for meals without such a supplement.

The table below shows grants that have been paid to local government authorities under this scheme since 1974-75 and estimated grants in 1978-79. In 1977-78 total payments under the Act were \$2.2 million, of which \$0.7 million was paid to local government authorities. For 1978-79 it is estimated that local government authorities will receive \$0.8 million out of total estimated payments under the Act of \$2.3 million.

# Handicapped Persons Assistance

Under the Handicapped Persons Assistance Act 1974, local government authorities and voluntary non-profit bodies are eligible to receive assistance for the accommodation, employment and training of disabled people. Capital grants are provided on a \$4 for \$1 basis; assistance with rent is also on a \$4 for \$1 basis and assistance for staffing is on a \$1 for \$1 basis. In addition, a training fee of \$500 is paid to eligible sheltered workshops for each former employee who, after completing more than six months sheltered employment, graduates to, and retains, normal employment for 12 months or more.

Details of payments for the years 1974–75 to 1977–78 and estimated payments for 1978–79 are shown in the table below:—

## Pre-Schools and Child Care

Under the Childhood Services Program, grants are made direct to local government authorities and community organisations towards the cost of the establishment and operation of a range of care and associated services for children, including educational services for young children.

In 1977–78 grants paid directly to local government authorities under the Childhood Services Program totalled \$6.9 million and payments in 1978–79 are estimated to be \$6.7 million.

## Community Youth Support Scheme

The Commonwealth introduced the Community Youth Support scheme to assist young unemployed persons in November 1976.

The scheme provides financial assistance to community groups, including local government authorities, for supportive programs and services to unemployed youth. The aim of the scheme is to improve the employability of unemployed youth and maintain their orientation towards work.

Overall expenditure on the scheme in 1977–78 was \$5 742 000 and is estimated to be \$9 million in 1978–79.

Grants amounting to \$472 000 were made direct to local government authorities in 1977–78. A notional distribution of estimated payments to local government authorities in 1978–79 is included in the following table:—

#### Homeless Persons Assistance

Under the *Homeless Persons Assistance Act* 1974, capital grants are made over a threeyear period to voluntary agencies, and local and statutory authorities, for approved projects to upgrade and replace existing inadequate accommodation and to build new facilities for homeless men and women. Assistance is also provided towards the cost of accommodation and meals and to meet half the salaries of welfare officers performing approved services for homeless persons.

Only one local authority, in Victoria, has received assistance. Total payments for both recurrent and capital purposes since 1975-76 and estimated payments for 1978-79 are as follows:—

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## Arts

Local government authorities are eligible to receive assistance for community arts activities under a program formerly administered by the Community Arts Committee of the Australia Council. The Committee was replaced by the Community Arts Board which was established in 1977–78 to assist local government, service and welfare organisations to include the arts in their programs, to raise the standards of their arts activities, and to expand them to cater for new sectors of the community. Grants made by the Australia Council for the period 1974–75 to 1977–78 to local government authorities are shown in the following table. As these grants depend on the consideration of applications made during the course of the year, the grants that might be paid to local authorities in 1978–79 cannot be estimated at this stage.

## Aerodrome Local Ownership Plan

Assistance is provided to local government authorities and to other bodies under the Aerodrome Local Ownership Plan to establish, develop and maintain local aerodromes on their own initiative and to take over aerodromes owned by the Commonwealth. Funds are provided on a \$1 for \$1 basis by the Commonwealth for both developmental and maintenance works proposals which meet the relevant criteria. Where an authority takes over a Government owned aerodrome, the Commonwealth meets 100 per cent of the cost of any approved 'pre-transfer' works necessary to bring the aerodrome up to an acceptable standard. The following table shows the payments made to local authorities in each State under the Aerodrome Local Ownership Plan since 1974–75 and estimated payments in 1978–79:—

# PAYMENTS TO STATES FOR ON-PASSING TO LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES

As explained above, the funds provided by the Commonwealth as general purpose assistance for local government take the form of payments to the State Governments for on-passing to individual local authorities. There are also other programs of payments to the States under which portions of the funds provided are passed on to local government authorities. However, it should be noted that the degree of influence exerted by the Commonwealth over the particular amounts paid to local authorities varies considerably among different programs as does the availability of information relating to those amounts. In some cases the amounts passed on to local government authorities are wholly at the discretion of the State Governments.

Each of the programs concerned is summarised, in general terms, in Chapter IV. The purpose of this section is to outline the way in which local government is involved and to provide available details of the amounts paid to the States for on-passing to local government authorities. As with the programs of direct payments, differences between the States in the amounts of payments in this category which have been made to local government authorities reflect, in part, differences in the extent to which the functions concerned are undertaken by local government authorities rather than by State Government departments or agencies or private bodies.

# It is emphasised that the payments referred to in this Section are included in the totals of payments to the States shown in this document.

Because of the lag, in some cases, between payment of the funds concerned to the States and their allocation by the States, the amounts of funds paid to the States for local government authorities under a particular program in any year are not necessarily precisely equal to the amounts paid to authorities in that year. The figures provided below generally relate to payments made to the States for local government authorities but, in some cases, they relate to amounts paid by the States to authorities.

Because of the difficulty of obtaining data on that part of funds paid to the States for Aboriginal advancement and channelled by the States through local authorities, the item has been deleted from this issue.

#### Special Assistance to Exmouth Shire

As mentioned in Chapter IV, the Western Australian Government sought financial assistance towards the operational cost of Exmouth Shire which was established with the main purpose of servicing the United States Naval Communications Station at North West Cape. Amounts totalling \$320 500 were paid to the Western Australian Government on a \$1 for \$1 basis for on-passing to the Shire in 1975–76 and 1976–77 from Department of Defence appropriations. This grant was additional to that provided to the Shire as a result of Commonwealth Grants Commission recommendations.

As an alternative to the continuing special financial assistance to the Shire, the Commonwealth has agreed to assume responsibility for specified loans amounting to \$715 125 and to repay the principal with interest over a three-year period on the basis that the Western Australian Government accepts that this action will represent a full discharge of Australian Defence interests in the operations of the Shire. The first payment of \$112 421 was made in 1977–78 and provision has been made for payment of a further amount of \$353 000 in 1978–79.

#### Home Care Services and Senior Citizens Centres

Grants for these purposes are provided under the *States Grants* (*Home Care*) Act 1969. Local government authorities are amongst the bodies eligible for assistance. Of the total grants of \$13.8 million paid to the States under this Act in 1977–78, \$7.1 million, or about 51 per cent, were for local government authorities. Assistance under the Act is not available to State Government departments or agencies. #### Pre-Schools and Child Care

Commonwealth Government assistance for services for children is outlined in Chapter IV and earlier in this Chapter in the section on 'Commonwealth Payments Made Direct to Local Government Authorities'. Briefly, the position is that, in addition to direct grants to local government and private bodies, grants are made to the States. Some of the grants to the States are for on-passing to local government authorities.

#### Urban Flood Mitigation

Amounts of \$2 060 208, \$1 574 271, and \$992 041 provided to Queensland in 1975–76, 1976–77 and 1977–78 respectively to assist with the construction of certain flood mitigation works on various creeks in the Brisbane metropolitan area were passed on to the Brisbane City Council. An amount of \$880 000 is provided in the 1978–79 Budget to complete the project.

An amount of \$100 000 was paid to Victoria in each of the years 1975–76 and 1976–77 for flood mitigation works at Seymour.

#### Urban Water Supply

In 1977–78, a grant of \$325 000 was made to Queensland for on-passing to the Mount Isa City Council as assistance towards the Council's share of the debt burden associated with the now-completed Julius Dam.

#### Capital Assistance for Leisure Facilities

Payments to the States under this program (see Chapter IV) have included payments passed on to local government authorities in respect of community leisure facilities sponsored by these authorities. Of the total grants of \$900 000 expected to be paid to the States in 1978–79 it is estimated that \$675 000 will be passed on to local government authorities. The following table provides details of payments since 1974–75, together with estimates for 1978–79:—

### National Estate

National Estate projects supported from funds provided to the States under the Urban and Regional Development (Financial Assistance) Act 1974 have included many projects undertaken by local government authorities. Assistance provided to the

States from the 1977–78 National Estate program for projects undertaken by local government authorities was \$410 000 out of a total expenditure under this program of \$2.241 million. It is estimated that \$2.49 million will be made available to the States in 1978–79 for this program, and provision will be made from within this amount for projects undertaken by local government authorities in 1978–79. No details of the amounts that local government authorities will receive from the States in 1978–79 are available at this stage. #### Roads

The Commonwealth provides grants to the States for expenditure on the construction and maintenance of roads, including roads which are the responsibility of local government authorities. Although the relevant Commonwealth legislation does not determine any particular amount which the States must provide to local government, in each State amounts determined by the State are passed on to the local government authorities for expenditure on roads which are the responsibility of those authorities.

The following table shows the amounts passed on by the States to local authorities from Commonwealth grants from 1974–75 to 1977–78; estimates for 1978–79 are not available at this stage:—

#### Urban Public Transport

The only amounts under this program which have been passed on to local government authorities were \$138 667 in 1974–75, \$614 912 in 1975–76, \$523 586 in 1976–77, and \$2 066 343 in 1977–78 out of payments to the Queensland Government. These amounts were passed on to the Brisbane City Council for the acquisition of buses. A further \$63 213 is to be made available in 1978–79 for unpaid commitments incurred on the bus acquisition project.

#### PAYMENTS TO LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES IN THE NORTHERN TERRITORY

Before the Northern Territory became self-governing on 1 July 1978, two local government authorities had been established under the Northern Territory Local Government Ordinance—the Corporation of the City of Darwin in 1957 and the Corporation of the Municipality of Alice Springs in 1971. The relationship between the Commonwealth Government and these authorities changed on 1 January 1977

when executive responsibility for the Corporations was transferred to the Northern Territory Legislative Assembly. While the assistance given to these two authorities was of quite a different character from other forms of assistance referred to earlier in this Chapter, it can be regarded as the equivalent of assistance received by other local government authorities from State Governments.

Initial establishment grants had been provided to both Corporations and continuing operational subsidies were provided to the Corporations to meet the difference between income from ratepayers and the cost of providing municipal services at what were regarded as reasonable standards. These subsidies were subject to quinquennial review.

Capital assistance was also provided to the two Corporations in the form of matched and unmatched grants for capital works generally.

Additional financial assistance was given to the Corporation of the City of Darwin in 1974–75 to meet the cost of emergency services provided by the Corporation following Cyclone Tracy. The two Corporations also received assistance under various specific programs from time to time. These forms of assistance are not included in the table which follows.

The Northern Territory itself has established two further local government authorities, the Corporation of the Municipality of Katherine and the Corporation of the Municipality of Tennant Creek.

The global allocation to the Northern Territory for 1978–79 (see Chapter V) includes an allowance for local authorities but there is no requirement that the Northern Territory Government pass on specified amounts to local authorities.

The memorandum of understanding between the Commonwealth and Northern Territory Governments provides that from 1979–80 (i.e. after the transitional year) the Northern Territory will receive a local government tax sharing entitlement (See Chapter V).

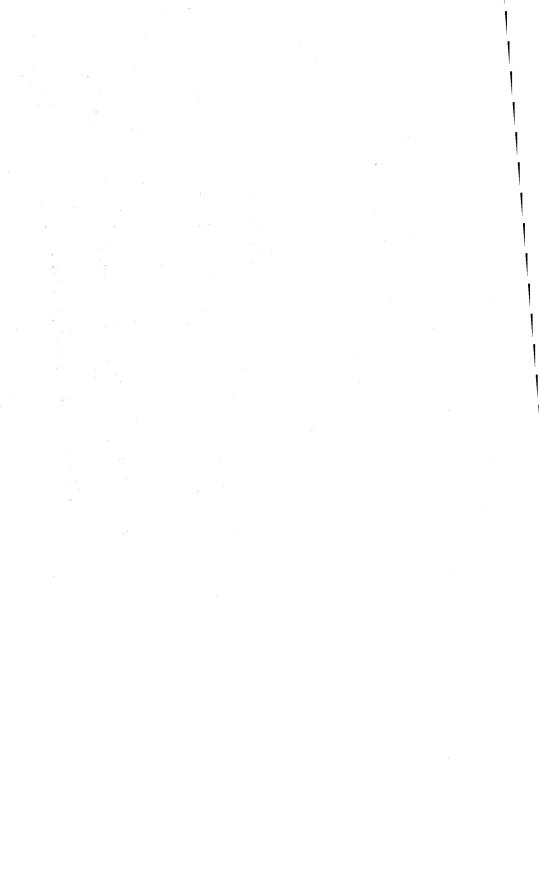
