CHAPTER 1—INTRODUCTION

Since 1960-61, a paper on Commonwealth payments to the States has been published annually among the Budget documents. Commencing with the 1974-75 issue this paper was expanded to encompass Commonwealth Government payments to local government authorities and, commencing with the 1978-79 issue, also included Commonwealth Government payments to the Northern Territory of Australia (which became a self-governing Territory on 1 July 1978 with expenditure responsibilities and has revenue raising powers broadly approximating those of a State).

This paper concentrates on providing information on forms of assistance on which Commonwealth expenditure has been incurred in 1979-80 and/or is proposed in 1980-81. The tables cover payments over five years where applicable, that is, the period 1976-77 to 1980-81. Information on earlier years may be found in earlier issues of this paper. The 1975-76 issue of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities' includes a consistent series of aggregate figures back to 1956-57.

Relationship with Statements Attached to the Budget Speech and Terminology In the statements attached to the Budget Speech Commonwealth Government outlays are classified, inter alia, in terms of economic type—that is, as to whether they take the form of expenditure on goods and services, cash benefits to persons, payments to other levels of government or transfers to other sectors in the economy. The following table classifies estimated total budget outlays for 1980–81 by economic type and shows the proportion to total of each category.

This paper provides details of those budget outlays classified as transfer payments and net advances to or for the States, the Northern Territory and local government authorities—that is, Commonwealth assistance to other spheres of government in Australia. Payments in this category comprise payments to the States and the Northern Territory, payments made direct to local government authorities and the State Governments' Loan Council borrowing program. These payments are estimated at \$12 821 million in 1980-81, which is 35.6 per cent of estimated total Commonwealth budget outlays.

In the statements attached to the Budget Speech, outlays are also classified according to function—that is, outlays having like purposes or objectives are brought together under one functional heading. Table 2 below classifies on a functional basis the transfer payments and net advances to or for other levels of government which are covered in this paper.

One of the main distinctions used in this paper is between funds provided to the States, the Northern Territory and local government for general purposes (that is, 'untied' funds) and those provided for specific purposes (that is, 'tied' funds). All general purpose funds are classified under the 'Not Allocated to Function' heading. Certain forms of specific purpose payments are also classified under that heading, but most of these payments are classified under functional headings. Specific purpose payments are, with a few exceptions, grouped in the following Chapters on this functional basis.

Reference should be made here to the treatment in this and other budget papers of the State Governments' Loan Council borrowing program, which is financed by the issue of Commonwealth Government securities and to which the Commonwealth Government itself subscribes from its own revenue sources, as necessary, to fill the program approved by the Loan Council. The national accounting item 'grants and net advances to the States, the Northern Territory and local government authorities' used in the Statements attached to the Budget Speech and in certain other papers includes this program. In this paper, the term 'payments to the States' does not include this program; however, totals of payments to the States and their Loan Council borrowing program are also given and, subject to the point referred to in the next paragraph, these totals are comparable with the totals of grants and net advances to the States included in other budget papers. The treatment of the States' Loan Council program in this paper is explained in more detail in Chapter III.

As the term implies, the national accounting aggregate 'grants and net advances to the States, the Northern Territory and local government authorities' includes Commonwealth Government advances (loans) to the States, the Northern Territory and local government authorities on a net basis—that is, after subtracting repayments by the States, the Northern Territory and local government authorities of advances they have received from the Commonwealth Government in earlier years. The national accounting aggregate also includes the States' Loan Council program net of sinking fund contributions. The figures for individual items and many of the aggregates referred to in the text or shown in the tables in this paper are on a gross basis—that is, before deducting repayments of Commonwealth Government loans or sinking fund contributions on State Loan Council borrowings. Where amounts are on a net basis this is specifically indicated. The grand totals in the summary tables in this Chapter and, for example, Tables 83 and 84 in Appendix 1 are on a net basis and are therefore consistent with the national accounting aggregate 'grants and net advances to the States, the Northern Territory and local government authorities' appearing in other budget papers.

Outline of Commonwealth Payments to the States, the Northern Territory and Local Government Authorities and Format of this Paper

Payments of various descriptions have been made to the States continuously since Federation. Prior to World War II, these payments were mainly of a marginal character and were confined, for the most part, to special grants to assist the financially weaker States and to certain specific purpose grants such as assistance for roads and for debt charges.

Since World War II there has been a marked increase in the amount and scope of assistance to the States. This has reflected, among other things, increases in the range and variety of governmental activities that have accompanied economic and social developments in this period of rapid growth of the Australian economy; greater participation by the national Government in matters that were previously the sole responsibility of the States; and the effects of the introduction and continuation of uniform income tax.

An account of the historical development of payments to the States is contained in the 1975-76 issue of 'Payments to or for the States, the Northern Territory and Local Government Authorities'—particularly the Appendices to that paper.

The arrangements under which the Commonwealth makes payments to the States for general recurrent purposes (referred to hereinafter as 'general revenue funds') are described in Chapter II. These funds comprise the largest element in Commonwealth payments to the States and are provided as general subventions to the States' budgets. There are no conditions attached as to how they may be used.

Since 1976-77, the bulk of revenue assistance to the States has been provided through tax sharing arrangements under which State Governments are entitled to a *specified* share of Commonwealth net personal income tax collections. General revenue funds also encompass the special grants paid to certain States on the recommendation of the Commonwealth Grants Commission.

Chapter III provides information on the general purpose capital funds available to the States and their authorities (including under the so-called infrastructure program) under the Loan Council arrangements. These comprise borrowings made on behalf of the State Governments (to which the Commonwealth Government has contributed from its own resources in most years), interest-free grants made to the States, and borrowings by State authorities. Further statistical material on these funds is presented in Appendix II.

Specific purpose payments to the States, which finance a wide variety of expenditures for both recurrent and capital purposes, are described in Chapter IV. Some further statistical details related to these payments are given in Appendix III.

Chapter V provides details of Commonwealth assistance to the Northern Territory and borrowings by Northern Territory authorities.

Chapter VI describes Commonwealth assistance to local government authorities, both direct and by way of payments through the States. In particular, attention is drawn to the very significant amounts now being provided by the Commonwealth for local government authorities in the States under the tax sharing arrangements. These funds now comprise 2.0 per cent of Commonwealth net personal income tax collections in the previous year, and are allocated among the States to be made available to their local authorities. In this paper, these funds are usually treated as specific purpose payments to the States as they are specifically earmarked for 'on-passing' by the States to local government authorities. In the hands of the recipient local government authorities, however, such funds are properly regarded as 'untied general purpose assistance' funds and are so treated in the discussion and tables in Chapter VI.

Appendix I provides figures, in detail and in aggregate, of payments to the States and the State Governments' Loan Council programs in 1979–80 and 1980–81 (estimated). It also sets out aggregate figures of these funds and of payments made direct to local government authorities for the period 1976–77 to 1980–81 (estimated). Appendix IV provides information on Commonwealth advances to the States and debt charges paid by the States thereon, and Appendix V gives figures, in detail and in aggregate, of payments to the six States combined and to each individual State for the years 1976–77 to 1980–81 (estimated).

Recent Trends in Commonwealth Assistance to the States, the Northern Territory and Local Government Authorities

In examining year to year movements—either in total assistance, percentage increases or in components thereof—account needs to be taken of certain changes in the way funds have become available to other levels of government. The following factors are relevant in this connection:

- (i) the Health Insurance Fund payments to the States for hospital running costs which began in 1975-76 subsumed various forms of payments for public hospitals which had not been classified as payments to the States in previous years;
- (ii) payments totalling \$215.6 million were made to the States in June 1976 (under arrangements for the financing of public hospital operating costs) in respect of expenditures arising in 1976-77;
- (iii) payments to the States in 1976–77 under the personal income tax sharing arrangements were based on estimated taxation collections; final taxation figures were determined by the Commissioner of Taxation on 31 July 1977 and the 1977–78 States' entitlements were reduced by the amount overpaid in respect of 1976–77; and
- (iv) the transfer of additional functions to the Government of the Northern Territory (notably education and health) in the period since the beginning of 1978-79.

The percentage increases in the final column of Table 3 show the annual percentage increases after adjusting for the factors listed above.

The figures in the foregoing table include the State Governments' Loan Council program but do not include the borrowing programs of State semi-government and local authorities. This reflects the fact that the States' Loan Council program is underwritten by the Commonwealth and thus represents an effective charge on the Commonwealth's budget while the authorities' program is not underwritten by the Commonwealth and does not affect the Commonwealth's budget. It is of interest, however, to show how the magnitudes given in the previous tables are affected if the authorities' programs are included. The following table is designed for that purpose.

CHAPTER II—GENERAL REVENUE FUNDS TO THE STATES

General revenue grants have, in one form or another, been paid by the Commonwealth to the States since Federation. Their purpose is to assist the States, by way of subventions to their budgets, in the financing of their recurrent expenditures. They are not subject to any conditions as to the purposes for which they may be spent; that is, they are completely 'untied'.

A detailed history of successive arrangements governing this form of assistance is to be found in Chapter II and Appendix II of the 1975–76 issue of this paper. This Chapter provides a very brief summary of the arrangements, which applied up to and including 1975–76, followed by a more detailed description of the personal income tax sharing arrangements between the Commonwealth and State Governments which commenced in 1976–77.

SUMMARY OF PREVIOUS ARRANGEMENTS

Payments of general revenue assistance to the States in the early years of Federation were governed by provisions in the Constitution relating to the allocation to the States of a portion of customs and excise revenue and of 'surplus revenue'. These were replaced after about 10 years by per capita payments which were in turn replaced, under the Financial Agreement of 1927, by contributions by the Commonwealth to interest and sinking fund on State debt. Although the assistance in respect of State debt charges has the effect of providing general relief to the States' budgets, the assistance is classified in this paper as a form of specific purpose payment.

Since 1910-11 the payments referred to above were supplemented by special grants to Western Australia and then later to Tasmania and South Australia; from 1934-35 these grants were paid on the recommendation of the Commonwealth Grants Commission.

In 1942, when uniform income tax arrangements were adopted, the Commonwealth became the sole Government imposing taxes on income. To compensate the States for revenue forgone as a result of their ceasing to impose such taxes, the Commonwealth began paying what were known as 'tax reimbursement grants' to the States. These grants continued until 1958–59, after which they were replaced by 'financial assistance grants'. These grants were replaced as from 1976–77 by payments under the personal income tax sharing arrangements.

In very abbreviated terms, the arrangements which applied over the period 1942-43 to 1975-76 may be summarised as follows:

- When the tax reimbursement grants commenced, both the total grants, and their distribution between States, were related mainly to the amounts of income tax previously being collected by the States.
- From 1948-49, however, a formula applied under which a total grant for each year was determined by increasing the amount payable in the preceding year by reference to increases in the population of the six States and to the increase in average wages.

- Over the period 1948-49 to 1956-57 a proportion of the grants was distributed between the States by reference to the previous income tax collections of the States and a proportion by reference to the respective populations of the States as adjusted for density and numbers of children between 5 and 15 years of age (they being factors considered to affect the relative needs of the States). The proportion allocated in the latter manner was gradually increased over the period, and in 1957-58 and 1958-59 the distribution amongst the States was wholly on that basis.
- In every year from 1949-50 to 1958-59 supplementary grants, in addition to those yielded by the formulae, were paid.
- The legislation authorising payment of the tax reimbursement grants made those grants conditional on the States refraining from levying income tax, and permitted reductions to be made in the grants payable to any State which did levy such a tax; this element of the legislation was unsuccessfully challenged before the High Court in 1955-56.
- Over the whole of the period of the tax reimbursement grants the three least populous States continued to receive additional grants annually on the recommendation of the Commonwealth Grants Commission.
- The financial assistance grants arrangements were instituted in 1959 and reviewed and amended (in each case so as to increase the grants payable to the States) in 1965, 1970 and 1975.
- The main change compared with the previous arrangements was that the grants each year increased not only in proportion to increases in State populations and in average wages but by a further, the so-called 'betterment', factor; until and including 1964-65 this factor was calculated as 10 per cent of the average wages increase in the year concerned; it was then fixed at 1.2 per cent, independent of the average wages increase, for the years 1965-66 to 1970-71, at 1.8 per cent for the years 1971-72 to 1975-76 and was to have been increased to 3.0 per cent in 1976-77.
- The grants arrangements have been adjusted from time to time apart from the periodic reviews referred to above; for example, adjustments were made to compensate the States for loss of receipts duty following a High Court decision in 1970-71, to reduce the grants when payroll tax was transferred from the Commonwealth to the States in 1971, when the Commonwealth assumed full responsibility for financing tertiary education from January 1974, and on account of transfers of railways from South Australia and Tasmania to the Commonwealth in 1975.
- Additions were made to the financial assistance grants following withdrawals from the Commonwealth Grants Commission system by South Australia, Western Australia and Tasmania.
- Special revenue assistance, either for particular States or all States, was paid in each of the years 1966-67 to 1974-75 to supplement the financial assistance grants; on some occasions, this was built in to the formula grants.
- In terms of the distribution of the grants between States, the effect of the formula—under which each State's annual grant was increased from the previous year in proportion to its population increase in the year and by

the average wages and betterment factors which were common to all States—was, abstracting from other factors, to maintain the relationships between the grants to the States in per capita terms. However, these relationships were also affected by various adjustments made in the arrangements from time to time, including those referred to above.

- The grants arrangements, as revised following the June 1975 Premiers' Conference and incorporating an increase in the betterment factor to 3.0 per cent in 1976-77 and thereafter, were to have applied over the five years 1975-76 to 1979-80 inclusive, with a review before the end of that period.
- The legislation authorising the financial assistance grants—namely, successive States Grants Acts—did not specifically state that the grants were conditional on the States not levying taxes on income; however, it was made clear by the Commonwealth at the time of each review that the grants were so conditional.
- The State Governments consistently expressed the view, over the whole of the period covered by the foregoing summary, that the arrangements were unsatisfactory from their point of view. In 1970 the six States unanimously proposed that they be given direct access to income tax broadly along the lines of the scheme then operating in Canada. In 1975 they proposed—again unanimously—that the general revenue grants arrangements should be based, in effect, on the principle that they should compensate the States for their lack of access to income tax and that, to put that principle into effect, the average wages element in the formula should be replaced by a new 'progression' factor equal to 1.5 times the increase in average wages each year.

PERSONAL INCOME TAX SHARING WITH THE STATES

Commencing in 1976-77, personal income tax sharing arrangements between the Commonwealth and the States replaced the financial assistance grants. The tax sharing arrangements with the States represent a central element in the Government's Federalism policy.

The way in which a share of Commonwealth personal income tax revenue is provided as assistance for local government is explained in Chapter VI.

The income tax sharing arrangements with the States have two stages.

Under Stage 1, which commenced in 1976-77, the States receive a specified proportion of Commonwealth net personal income tax collections. Relevant legislation—the States (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act 1976—received the Royal Assent in November 1976.

Under Stage 2, the Stage 1 arrangements would continue but, in addition, each State would have the right, at its discretion, to increase or reduce the personal income tax levied on residents of the State. Any additional income taxes so levied would be collected by the Commonwealth on behalf of the State or States concerned. Any rebate of tax in a State would be at the State's expense. Relevant

Commonwealth legislation—the *Income Tax* (Arrangements with the States) Act 1978—received the Royal Assent in June 1978. To date, no State has passed the necessary enabling State legislation.

Following is a list of points representing the understandings which were reached in 1976 between the Commonwealth and State Governments in connection with the scheme as it relates to State Governments (local government aspects are dealt with in Chapter VI).

Personal Income Tax Sharing Between the Commonwealth and State Governments: Points of Understanding

- (1) The scheme will be related to personal income tax—not company tax and not including withholding taxes on interest and dividends.
- (2) The scheme will be introduced in two Stages; referred to below as Stage 1 and Stage 2.

Stage 1

- (3) Stage 1 will apply as from the beginning of 1976-77.
- (4) The States' entitlements under Stage 1 will represent a specified percentage of Commonwealth imposed personal income tax. (State legislation will thus not be required in regard to Stage 1.)
- (5) The 'base' to which the percentage will be applied each year will be net personal income tax collected in the year.
- (6) The percentage figure for 1976-77, and for subsequent years, subject to any decisions made given relevant points recorded below, will be 33.6.
- (7) Personal income tax collections in the Territories will be included in the base figure but with this subject to review in the light of the developments in public finances in the Territories.
- (8) The yield or costs of special surcharges or rebates applied, in appropriate circumstances, by the Commonwealth will not be included in the base figure from which the States' entitlements will be calculated.
- (9) In regard to the possible effects on the States' Stage 1 entitlements of changes by the Commonwealth in its personal income tax legislation, the Commonwealth Government has given a firm assurance to the States that:
 - (a) it will ensure that the States are fully informed of relevant tax changes made by the Commonwealth and of their estimated effects on the States' entitlements;
 - (b) it will participate in a review of the arrangements when there are changes in Commonwealth tax legislation which have effects on the States' entitlements of such significance as to warrant such a review;
 - (c) when post-budget changes in Commonwealth personal income tax legislation with substantial effects on the States' entitlements are made, the Commonwealth will consider, in consultation with the States, appropriate adjustments in the arrangements to offset the effects on the States' entitlements in that particular financial year having regard

- to other relevant factors impinging on the States' budgetary positions; any necessary consultations with the States on this matter will be arranged at the earliest practicable stage; and
- (d) longer-term trends in regard to such matters as changes in the relative importance of personal income tax vis-a-vis other taxes will be kept under notice between the Commonwealth and State Governments.
- (10) However, it is agreed that it would not be practicable to devise in advance an automatic formula for defining how changes in Commonwealth tax laws should be reflected in the Stage 1 arrangements.
- (11) There will be a 'guarantee' arrangement to ensure that the States' Stage 1 entitlements in any year are not less, in absolute terms, than in the previous year. This arrangement will be supplemented in the first four years of the new scheme (that is, in the years 1976-77 to 1979-80) by a further undertaking that the entitlements will not be less in a year than the amount which would have been yielded in that year by the financial assistance grants formula as laid down in the States Grants Act 1973.
- (12) A total entitlement for all States will first be determined, to be then divided between the States.
- (13) The initial per capita relativities between the States in their Stage 1 entitlements will be the relativities in the financial assistance grants in 1975-76.
- (14) Subject to (16) and (17) below, and to any absorption of specific purpose payments, these relativities will be carried forward into subsequent years in such a way as to maintain the proportionate relationships between the per capita entitlements of the States.
- (15) The four less populous States will continue to be free to apply for grants on the recommendation of the Commonwealth Grants Commission in addition to their basic entitlements as yielded under the arrangements summarised above.
- (16) The matter of the relationship between the special grant which Queensland is at present receiving on the recommendation of the Commonwealth Grants Commission and the tax sharing arrangements is regarded as essentially one between the Commonwealth and Queensland Governments and will be considered by those Governments as necessary.
- (17) There will be a periodic review of relativities between all States, advice in relation to this review being sought from an independent review body; the first review will be made before the end of 1980-81 (the same timing as applies to the review of the tax sharing arrangements as a whole—see (35) below).
- (18) Arrangements will be made for the States to be regularly informed, as early as practicable and in confidence as necessary, of relevant estimates in relation to their entitlements.
- (19) In relation to the processes referred to in (9) and (18) as they may be affected by matters which are confidential as a result of their association with the Commonwealth's budget consideration and formulation, the Commonwealth will provide to the States the maximum possible relevant information as is consistent with the security and integrity of its own budget.

- (20) The States will be paid their Stage 1 entitlements on a monthly pro-rata basis, with adjustments during the financial year as necessary as estimates of personal income tax collections in the year are varied (this being similar to the arrangements under which the financial assistance grants are paid).
- (21) There will be full and precise documentation to record the understandings between Governments in relation to Stage 1 but this will not take the form of a formal Agreement.

Stage 2

- (22) Under Stage 2 each State will be able to legislate to impose a surcharge on personal income tax in the State (but not company taxation or withholding tax on dividends and interest) additional to that imposed by the Commonwealth, or to give (at cost to the State) a rebate on personal income tax payable under Commonwealth law and to authorise the Commonwealth to collect the surcharge or grant the rebate as its agent.
- (23) Any State surcharges or rebates will be expressed in percentage terms.
- (24) Assessment provisions, and the basic income tax rate structure, will continue to be uniform throughout Australia, these being matters for the Commonwealth to determine.
- (25) The Commonwealth will at all times remain the sole collecting and administrative agency in the income tax field.
- (26) The level of any State surcharges or rebates will be a matter for consideration by each State; relevant decisions will be taken within an appropriate framework of consultation with the Commonwealth and, as considered appropriate by the surcharging or rebating State, with other States, but ultimately the level of surcharge or rebate will be a decision for each individual State. In exercising these powers the States will accept responsibility to work in parallel with and not in negation of the overall economic management policies of the Commonwealth.
- (27) Equalisation arrangements will be made so that less populous States will be enabled to obtain the same relative advantage from a surcharge as the States with a broader tax base.
- (28) The Grants Commission will be responsible for assessing amounts payable under the arrangements referred to under (27).
- (29) The basis for assessment of equalisation assistance to the less populous States in regard to the yield of State surcharges levied under Stage 2 (see points (27) and (28) above) will be that supplementary assistance will be provided to a less populous State levying a surcharge to bring the per capita yield from the surcharge up to the average per capita amount which would be yielded if New South Wales and Victoria levied a surcharge on the same basis. The assessment will be independent of any examination of the overal financial position of the State concerned vis-a-vis other States.

- (30) Detailed proposals to implement Stage 2 will be formulated by an officers' working party. The firm target is to have an appropriate framework established, relevant matters agreed and any necessary legislation or other material prepared in time for Stage 2 to commence from the beginning of 1977-78.
- (31) At an appropriate time the Commonwealth will consider what implications Stage 2 might have in relation to the Territories.
- (32) Interest on future issues of Commonwealth securities will be subject to State income tax surcharges under Stage 2 of the tax sharing scheme; this change will not apply retrospectively to interest on securities already issued.

Implications for Tax Forms and Assessment Notices

- (33) In relation to tax forms, changes will be minimal apart from necessary changes to take account of surcharges or rebates.
- (34) Assessment notices will be changed only to accommodate State surcharges or rebates (any Commonwealth surcharge or rebate would, of course, also be shown), with information on the disposition of Commonwealth tax to States (and local government) provided to taxpayers separately but in conjunction with assessment notices.

Review of Total Tax Sharing Arrangements

(35) There will be a review of the tax sharing arrangements as a whole periodically, with the first review being made at some time before the end of 1980-81 with any revisions applying as from the beginning of the next financial year after the review; arrangements will be made for the Commonwealth and State Governments to agree, well in advance of the review, on the procedures which are to be followed in connection with it.

Many of these points of understanding have since been incorporated into the States (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act 1976 or the Income Tax (Arrangements with the States) Act 1978. Others have been developed further in discussions at the Premiers' Conferences in 1977, 1978, 1979 and 1980 (see below).

Although the majority of matters relating to the Stage 1 arrangements had been settled at the 1976 Premiers' Conferences, some outstanding issues, together with matters relating to Stage 2, were considered at Premiers' Conferences in April, July and October 1977, June 1978, June and December 1979 and June 1980, mostly on the basis of joint reports by Commonwealth and State officers. The position reached on these issues is set out below.

(1) The States and the Commonwealth agreed in April 1977 on the scheme unanimously recommended by the Commonwealth and State officers under which, to meet possible cash flow problems faced by a State to the extent that a deficit in its budget was due to the State's Stage 1 entitlement in respect of a year falling short of the Commonwealth Budget estimate of its entitlement,

- and within Loan Council arrangements, a State would have access to Treasury Bills against which it would, except in extreme cases, be expected to lodge counterpart deposits with the Reserve Bank.
- (2) Consideration was given at the April and July 1977 Premiers' Conferences to the arrangements for the provision of information by the Commonwealth to the States, and for consultation, as necessary, between the Commonwealth and the States, in relation to Commonwealth budget decisions as they might affect the States' entitlements. At the July 1977 Conference the Prime Minister stated that the Commonwealth would provide information to the States as follows:—
 - a preliminary estimate of each State's Stage 1 entitlement for the year ahead on the basis of then current Commonwealth tax legislation;
 - an estimate of the yield/cost of a 1% surcharge/rebate in each State on the basis of then current Commonwealth tax legislation;
 - an estimate of each State's entitlement under the former financial assistance grants arrangements (the guaranteed entitlement);
 - relevant wage assumptions underlying these estimates; and
 - certain other information to the extent this is practicable and consistent with budget security.
- (3) Following the 1976 Census, the Australian Statistician revised the State population estimates. This resulted in changes in the estimated entitlements of the individual States for 1976–77, although the total entitlement of the States as a whole was not affected by the revision. Officers were directed by the April 1979 Premiers' Conference to examine and report on the implications of the revision of population figures. While no change was made to the tax sharing arrangements in this regard, the general question of whether estimates of State populations could be made more accurate was considered at the October 1977 and June 1978 Premiers' Conferences on the basis of officers' reports. The Australian Statistician's efforts to overcome certain estimation problems were noted and it was agreed that no further action could usefully be taken at that stage.
- (4) Point of Understanding (17) records that there would be a periodic review of relativities and that advice in relation to this review would be sought from an independent review body. There were three aspects to be considered: the guidelines for the review body, the nature of the review body, and the timing of the review.

At the April 1977 Premiers' Conference, the States and the Commonwealth agreed that the guidelines for the review body should be expressed in relatively broad terms to give it flexibility in carrying out its work, and agreed that the guidelines should be along the following lines:

(i) The basic purpose is to review the percentage relationship between the States' respective per capita entitlements under Stage 1 of the personal income tax sharing arrangements between the Commonwealth and State Governments and to make any recommendations for changes in those relationships considered appropriate.

- (ii) The review should be on the basis of the principle that each State should be able to provide State Government services of a recurrent kind of the same standard as other States without imposing higher rates of taxes or charges; differences in revenue raising capacities and in the relative costs of providing comparable government services should be taken into account.
- (iii) The review is to include an examination of the existing relativities, of the factors which have influenced them and of any relevant changes which have occurred in the period since those relativities were established.

It was also agreed at the April 1977 Premiers' Conference that the States and the Commonwealth would each have a right to argue before the review body any matters which a State or the Commonwealth regarded as relevant to the review, that the first review should be commenced as soon as possible and that the review body's report would be considered at a Premiers' Conference before any decision was taken on it.

Agreement was not reached at the April 1977 Premiers' Conference on the constitution of the review body but the Commonwealth undertook to give the matter further consideration. After this further consideration, the Commonwealth reiterated its view that the Commonwealth Grants Commission was the appropriate body to conduct the review. The States (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Amendment Bill 1977, nominating the Grants Commission as the review body and prescribing the guidelines which it was to follow, was introduced into the Parliament on 26 May 1977 and was passed by the House of Representatives. However, in the light of views expressed by several Premiers, the Bill was not proceeded with in the Autumn session of the Parliament and the matter was discussed at the Premiers' Conference on 1 July 1977.

At that Conference, the Prime Minister agreed that Commonwealth and State officers would consult further on the guidelines and would also give consideration to suggested amendments proposed by some of the Premiers. On the question of the review body the Prime Minister put forward a compromise proposal—in effect, a special Division of the Commonwealth Grants Commission supplemented by three associate members nominated by the States. It was then agreed that the body to review the relativities should be composed of the Chairman of the Grants Commission, two members of the Commission, plus three associate members, one of whom would be nominated by New South Wales and Victoria and two by the four other States.

The Premiers' Conference on 21 October 1977 agreed on the wording of revised guidelines which were in line with the broad agreement reached at the April 1977 Premiers' Conference. The Conference also agreed that:

- (i) the intention was for reviews to be held no more often than every three to five years;
- (ii) Commonwealth legislation for the purpose should give flexibility to enable a review to be held whenever there were special circumstances which warranted this—for example, if a review were sought by (say) three States; and

(iii) the guidelines were not intended to place any limitation on the review body in considering the matters that led to the existing relativities.

Amendments were made in June 1978 to the States (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act 1976 and to the Commonwealth Grants Commission Act 1976 to provide, inter alia, for periodic reviews by a special Division of the Commonwealth Grants Commission of the per capita relativities between the States in their tax sharing entitlements.

(5) The July 1977 Premiers' Conference noted that there had been fluctuations in the estimates of the total tax sharing entitlements during 1976-77. These fluctuations had occurred largely because of changes in estimates of tax collections but the uncertainty arising from these sources would have been avoided had the States not chosen to have their tax sharing entitlements calculated as a percentage of the current year's personal income tax collections, which were not finally known until 31 July in the following financial year.

Against the background of the uncertainty inevitably associated with the use of current year tax collections as the base, the Prime Minister suggested that the States might reconsider the earlier Commonwealth proposal that the preceding year's collections be used as the base (local government tax sharing entitlements were already based on collections in the preceding year—see Chapter VI for details). He offered to fix the States' tax sharing entitlements in respect of 1977–78 at \$4336.1 million if the States were to decide to adopt that proposal. (This would be subject to adjustments on account of over-payments in 1976–77 of State entitlements for that year—see page 21 of the 1978–79 issue of this paper.) The Prime Minister pointed out that this would reduce uncertainty and administrative difficulties.

The Premiers agreed that Commonwealth and State officers should examine and report on arrangements for changing the total tax sharing entitlements from 33.6 per cent of the current year's collections to an appropriate percentage of the preceding year's collections.

On the basis of the officers' report, the October 1977 Premiers' Conference agreed to adopt the preceding year's net personal income tax collections as the base, using 39.87 per cent for the purpose. The amending legislation—the States (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Amendment Act 1978—provides, inter alia, for States' entitlements for 1977–78 to be \$4336.1 million (subject to the guarantee arrangements) and the entitlements in each subsequent year to be 39.87 per cent of the preceding year's collections (again, subject to the guarantee arrangements).

- (6) In addition, the June 1978 Premiers' Conference referred the following matters to officers for examination and report:
 - (i) the States' request that there be an extension beyond 30 June 1980 of the present guarantee that until then each State will be entitled to receive each financial year under Stage 1 of the tax sharing arrangements at least what it would have received under the old financial assistance grants formula;

- (ii) a review in accordance with point 9 (b) of the points of understanding;
- (iii) procedures regarding consultation between the Commonwealth and States in relation to post-budget changes in the income tax structure (point of understanding 9 (c) refers);
- (iv) an examination of a New South Wales draft document relating to the points of understanding in relation to the extent to which it is an accurate, full and up-to-date record of the understandings reached between the Commonwealth and States; and
- (v) the factual position in relation to the effect of changes to population estimates on the level of Queensland's guaranteed minimum entitlement under the old financial assistance grants formula. (Queensland raised this matter at the October 1977 Premiers' Conference claiming that consistent under-estimation of its population has meant that its financial assistance grants were lower than they should have been and that, therefore, its guaranteed minimum entitlement is too low).

Officers' reports on these five matters were before the June 1979 Premiers' Conference. Regarding the officers' report on the related items (i) and (ii) above, the Prime Minister advised the States that the Commonwealth could not agree to either an extension of the existing guarantee beyond 30 June 1980 or an upwards adjustment to the States' share of tax collections. It was agreed, however, that Commonwealth and State officers would examine, taking into account the financial capacity of the Commonwealth, possible alternatives to the existing guarantee with a view to presenting a report to a Premiers' Conference to be held later in 1979. That Conference was also to resume consideration of the officers' reports on items (iii) and (iv) above. In respect of the bilateral matter of Queensland's guarantee (item (v) above), the Commonwealth and Queensland agreed to discuss this outside the Premiers' Conference. In the event, no adjustment was made to Queensland's guaranteed minimum entitlement.

(7) A further Premiers' Conference in December 1979 had before it officers' reports on possible alternatives to the existing guarantee arrangements and on the matters relating to consultation between the Commonwealth and the States and the documentation of the understandings reached between the Commonwealth and the States referred to at items (iii) and (iv) of paragraph (6). Having in mind the review of the tax sharing arrangements to be made by the end of 1980-81 and the review of State relativities under the arrangements currently being undertaken by the Commonwealth Grants Commission, the Prime Minister put forward guarantee arrangements to apply in 1980-81. Under the Prime Minister's proposal, which was adopted by the Conference, the States' tax sharing entitlements in 1980-81, on a State by State basis, will be 39.87 per cent of net personal income tax collected in 1979-80, distributed according to the tax sharing relativities prescribed in the States (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act 1976, with the guarantee that each State will receive no less in real terms than the amount it received in 1979-80 as measured by the Consumer Price Index for the four quarters to March 1981, compared with the four quarters to March 1980, in the capital city of the State. This guarantee arrangement is embodied in the States (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Amendment Act 1980 which received the Royal Assent in May 1980. The Act also extends the definition of withholding tax in the States (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act 1976 to include the withholding tax on certain revenues derived from the use of land for mining purposes, which came into effect on 1 July 1979. The effect of this amendment is that, like collections of withholding tax on dividends and interest, collections of mining withholding tax are excluded from the taxation collections in which the States share. The matters relating to consultation between the Commonwealth and the States and documentation of the understandings reached between the Commonwealth and the States were not considered by the December 1979 Premiers' Conference.

(8) The States (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act 1976 and Point (35) of the understandings between the Commonwealth and the States provide that the tax sharing arrangements as a whole shall be reviewed before the end of 1980–81. In this connection, it was decided at the June 1980 Premiers' Conference that the matter would be considered by a Premiers' Conference to be held early in 1981.

Stage 2 of the Tax Sharing Arrangements

The April 1977 Conference had before it the report of the working party of officers of the Commonwealth and State Treasuries and taxation and legal officers, established following the April 1976 Conference, to advise on the introduction of Stage 2 of the tax sharing arrangements. The report canvassed some fundamental aspects of possible arrangements, including several which raised important and complex legal and policy questions.

The Conference was in broad agreement as to the objectives to be pursued in developing detailed arrangements for Stage 2:

- (i) there should be complete uniformity as between the States in all respects other than rates of any surcharges or rebates;
- (ii) the arrangements should be free of any significant Constitutional or other legal doubt;
- (iii) the scheme should be as simple and inexpensive to administer as practicable consistent with legal requirements and the other broad objectives being followed;
- (iv) the arrangements should impose the least inconvenience practicable on taxpayers and employers; and
- (v) the arrangements should be such as to avoid creating avenues for tax avoidance or evasion.

For the benefit of States choosing to enter into Stage 2 arrangements, and in order to avoid technical problems, the Commonwealth suggested that it and all States co-operate to prepare complementary or 'interlocking' legislation. This proposal was not accepted by all States.

At the April 1977 Conference, the Commonwealth emphasised that it wanted to introduce enabling legislation as soon as possible, thus providing each State

with the option of proceeding to raise or lower income tax within its own borders if it so chose. The States could, within a framework of enabling legislation, make their own decisions, in their own time and in accordance with their own priorities, whether or not to utilise the provisions of Stage 2. It was agreed that Commonwealth officers and officers of the Victorian and Western Australian Governments should have discussions regarding the Commonwealth legislation which was to be drafted.

The Income Tax (Arrangements with the States) Bill 1977 was introduced into the Commonwealth Parliament late in the Autumn 1977 sittings. This Bill was designed to enable the States at their own discretion to increase their shares of personal income tax by increasing the tax paid by their residents or to provide tax rebates to their residents at the States' own cost. In order to allow time for proper consideration and informed debate, the Bill was not proceeded with immediately. At the July 1977 Premiers' Conference, the Prime Minister invited comments from the States on the Bill.

The 1977 Bill lapsed with the dissolution of the Commonwealth Parliament on 10 November 1977.

Subsequently, after careful consideration, the Commonwealth Government agreed to some changes being made to the provisions of the 1977 Bill to meet points raised by the Premiers before re-introducing the Bill into the Parliament. The revised Bill, basically the same as the 1977 Bill but incorporating these changes, and a number of minor technical and machinery improvements, was passed by the Parliament late in the 1978 Autumn sittings and became the *Income Tax (Arrangements with the States) Act* 1978.

The drafting of possible enabling legislation which might be adopted by individual States is a State matter, but one on which the Commonwealth has indicated a willingness to consult and co-operate.

States' Tax Sharing Entitlements in 1979-80 and 1980-81

Under the States (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act 1976, the States are entitled to receive in respect of each year subsequent to 1977–78 39.87 per cent of net personal income tax collections in the preceding year. This is subject to the guarantee that the States' Stage 1 entitlements in any year will not be less, in absolute terms, than in the previous year. In the years 1976–77 to 1979–80 a further guarantee applied that the States' entitlements would not be less in a year than the amount which would have been yielded in that year by the financial assistance grants formula laid down in the States Grants Act 1973. For 1980–81 the States are guaranteed that their entitlements will not be less in real terms than in 1979–80 (see page 19 above).

The entitlements are calculated on the basis of net personal income tax collections, excluding the effects of any special tax levies or rebates so declared for purposes of the Act. At present, there are no such special tax levies or rebates. The health insurance levy, which operated from 1 October 1976 to 31 October 1978, was in the nature of a special tax levy applied by the Commonwealth and has been excluded from the tax collections figures from which the States' entitlements are calculated.

The relative shares of the States are determined on a weighted population basis, the weights (which are based on the per capita relativities in the States' financial assistance grants in 1975-76) being prescribed in the Act, the populations being determined by the Australian Statistician.

Particulars of the calculations underlying the States' tax sharing entitlements for the years 1976-77 to 1978-79 are given in earlier issues of this paper.

The States were entitled to receive in respect of 1979-80 and subject to the guarantee arrangements, 39.87 per cent of \$12 670.8 million, the amount of net personal income tax collections (excluding the effects of the health insurance levy) in 1978-79 determined by the Commissioner of Taxation in accordance with the Act. As required by the legislation, the Australian Statistician made determinations of amounts that would have been payable under the financial assistance grants formula (that is, the States' guaranteed minimum entitlements) and of State populations at 31 December 1979. After allowing for the operation of the guarantee in the case of all States, the States' total entitlement for 1979-80 was \$5 415.9 million.

The following table shows the calculations underlying the States' tax sharing entitlements in 1979-80:

The amount of net personal income tax collections (excluding the effects of the health insurance levy) in 1979-80 determined by the Commissioner of Taxation in accordance with the Act is \$15 039.3 million giving, on application of the percentage of 39.87 per cent, a total States' tax share in 1980-81 of \$5996.2 million.

Assuming an increase of 10.5 per cent in the Consumer Price Index for the four quarters to March 1981 compared with the four quarters to March 1980 in the capital city of each State, States' minimum entitlements for 1980-81 under the guarantee arrangements would be \$5984.5 million.

On this basis, the estimated guaranteed entitlements of three States—Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania—would be above their individual tax shares, resulting in an estimate of the States' entitlements in 1980–81 of \$6020.2 million.

The following table shows the calculations underlying the State by State estimates of tax sharing entitlements in 1980-81. It is to be emphasised that these figures are estimates dependent on projections relating to population and the Consumer Price Index and hence must necessarily be subject to a substantial margin of uncertainty.

THE SPECIAL GRANTS

Special grants have been paid to the States on the recommendation of the Commonwealth Grants Commission since 1934-35. The Commission was established in 1933 and currently functions under the Commonwealth Grants Commission Act 1973.

Under the legislation as it now stands, the Commission is required to inquire into and report upon:—

- any application made by a State or the Northern Territory for financial assistance for the purpose of making it possible for the State (or the Northern Territory), by reasonable effort, to function at a standard not appreciably below the standards of other States (or the States).
- any other matters related to Commonwealth financial assistance to the States which may be referred to it by the Government.
- any matters relating to the financing of works and services provided in respect of the Australian Capital Territory which may be referred to it by the Government.

For particulars of the Commission's role in relation to periodic reviews of the per capita relativities between the States in their tax sharing entitlements and in relation to applications for financial assistance by the Northern Territory see pages 16 to 18 and Chapter V of this paper respectively. The role of the Commission in the matter of Commonwealth assistance for local government is dealt with in Chapter VI of this paper.

The Commission's inquiries and reports in relation to special grants to States are made under the first of these provisions; the wording is based on the principle of financial need as set out by the Commission in its Third Report (1936).

The tax sharing arrangements permit each of the four less populous States to apply for special grants under the Grants Commission arrangements. Queensland has been the only applicant State in recent years. (Tasmania, which had withdrawn from claimancy in 1974–75, applied on 30 June 1978 for a special grant in respect of 1977–78 but subsequently withdrew its application.) Arrangements under which the various States withdrew from claimancy for special grants are set out in the 1975–76 issue of this paper.

Since 1949 each recommendation by the Commission for payment of a special grant has consisted of two parts. One part is based on an estimate of the claimant State's financial need in the current financial year, and is treated as an advance payment subject to adjustment two years later when the Commission has compared in detail the financial positions in that year of the claimant and standard States. The other part represents the final adjustment to the advance payment made two years earlier and is known as the completion payment.

In arriving at its recommendations, the Commission makes a detailed comparison between the financial position of a claimant State and those of the 'standard' States. Prior to 1959-60 the Commission used a standard derived from the experience of New South Wales, Victoria and Queensland. From 1959-60 the standard States have been New South Wales and Victoria.

In 1979-80 Queensland received special grants totalling \$12.4 million, consisting of an advance grant for 1979-80 of \$11.0 million and a completion grant in respect of 1977-78 of \$1.4 million. The grants were recommended by the Commission in its Forty-sixth Report presented to Parliament in the Budget Session in 1979, and were authorised by the Queensland Grant (Special Assistance) Act 1979.

The Commission has recommended for payment to Queensland in 1980–81 a completion grant in respect of 1978–79 of \$6.7 million. No recommendation has been made by the Commission with respect to an advance grant for 1980–81. This is because although Queensland has made application for a special grant for 1980–81 it has indicated to the Commission that it is not seeking an advance grant. Queensland's decision not to seek an advance grant is based on possible implications for the methodology adopted for assessing special grants arising from the fact that the Commission is conducting a review of the tax sharing relativities of all States, and that this review is due for completion before the assessment of any special grant for Queensland for 1980–81. The Commonwealth Government has accepted the Commission's recommendation and it is expected that legislation to authorise payment of the grant will be introduced in the Budget sittings of Parliament following tabling of the Commission's Forty-seventh Report.

The table below shows the *final* amount of special grants paid to Queensland in respect of each of the years 1976-77 to 1978-79 inclusive—that is, the advance grant paid in the year concerned plus the completion grant normally paid two years later. The table also shows the advance payment for 1979-80. Table 8 shows the grants in terms of amounts actually paid each year.

OTHER GENERAL REVENUE ASSISTANCE

Prior to 1975–76, the Commonwealth Government from time to time provided general revenue assistance to the States additional to that payable under the tax reimbursement and financial assistance grants arrangements or by way of special grants recommended by the Grants Commission. Details of the amounts so provided are to be found in the 1975–76 issue (pages 22 and 23, Tables 116 and 117) and earlier issues of this paper.

Advisory Council for Inter-Government Relations

One other element of the Government's Federalism policy which has potential implications for Commonwealth/State financial relations is the establishment of the Advisory Council for Inter-Government Relations.

The Council is an independent body established under Commonwealth legislation—the Advisory Council for Inter-Government Relations Act 1976—and in accordance with agreement reached at the April 1976 Premiers' Conference. The Council whose Secretariat is in Hobart comprises 22 members including representatives of the Commonwealth and State Parliaments (Queensland participating from 1 July 1979), local government and the community. In addition, the Legislative Assembly of the Northern Territory and the Australian Capital Territory House of Assembly have observer status on the Council. The Commonwealth and the States together each meet 45 per cent of the Council's costs, the remaining 10 per cent being contributed by local government. Subjects for investigation and advice by the Council are referred to it by Premiers' Conferences; subjects so referred may include matters raised at the initiative either of local government or the Council itself.

The April 1977 Premiers' Conference approved the following items for examination and report:—

- An examination of the relationships which should exist between Federal, State and local governments (referred to as the 'Relationships' reference).
- A study of the costs and benefits of an interchange of personnel between the three spheres of government, and recommendations for selected implementation of a staff exchange program (referred to as the 'Interchange' reference).

In January 1978 the Prime Minister as chairman of the Premiers' Conference suggested the Council might concentrate initially on the relationships which should exist between local government and the Commonwealth and State Governments (referred to as the 'Local Government' sub-reference).

Annual reports for the years ending 31 August 1977, 1978 and 1979 have been published. The Council has made two reports on the 'Interchange' reference in June 1978 and August 1979, and a progress report on the 'Relationships' reference in June 1979.

The first 'Interchange' report dealt with short term staff interchanges and a final report with long term staff interchanges.

The 'Relationships' reference will necessitate a major review by the Council, over a considerable period of time, of all aspects of the Australian federal system. The Council is at present conducting studies of inter-governmental relations aspects of the provision of roads, the care of the aged, and the Loan Council.

Under the 'Local Government' sub-reference the Council is undertaking a major inquiry into Australian local government. Following public meetings held in all States in 1979, the Council is issuing a series of discussion papers on intergovernmental issues affecting local government. These include supplementary revenue sources of local government, Loan Council arrangements for local government borrowing, and inter-governmental grant procedures.

CHAPTER III—GENERAL PURPOSE CAPITAL FUNDS

This Chapter provides information on the general purpose capital funds available to the States and their authorities under the Loan Council arrangements. These comprise borrowings made on behalf of the State Governments (to which the Commonwealth has contributed from its own resources in most recent years), interest-free grants made by the Commonwealth to the States and borrowings by State authorities. Relevant statistical material for the period from 1976–77 is presented in Appendix II; statistical information for earlier years is available in Appendix III of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities 1975–76'.

The Loan Council, which is constituted under the Financial Agreement, to co-ordinate the borrowings of the Commonwealth and the States, consists of representatives of the Commonwealth and each State Government. Under the terms of the Financial Agreement borrowings by the Commonwealth and on behalf of State Governments (except defence borrowings by the Commonwealth and borrowings for temporary purposes) are limited in total in each year to the amounts of the annual borrowing programs for the Commonwealth and State Governments determined each year by the Loan Council. The terms and conditions of loans to finance these programs require the approval of the Loan Council. Subject to the decisions of the Loan Council, borrowings for and on behalf of the State Governments and conversions, renewals, redemptions and consolidations of the public debt of the States are, with limited exceptions, arranged by the Commonwealth. The Loan Council also determines annual borrowing programs for the 'larger' semi-government and local authorities of each State, and approves the terms and conditions of borrowings by these authorities under the approved borrowing programs.

TREATMENT OF LOAN COUNCIL PROGRAMS IN THIS AND OTHER BUDGET PAPERS The capital grants (beginning in 1970–71) paid by the Commonwealth to the States in relation to their government loan programs represent Commonwealth payments to the States and are so categorised for purposes of this and other budget papers.

The State Governments' Loan Council borrowing programs are not included in the totals of payments to the States shown in this paper. However, as mentioned in Chapter 1, the national accounting item 'grants and net advances to the States, the Northern Territory and Local Government Authorities' used in the statements attached to the Budget Speech and other papers does include these programs. The equivalent aggregate is described in this paper as the total of Commonwealth payments to the States and the Northern Territory, the State Governments' Loan Council borrowing program and payments to local authorities.

STATE GOVERNMENTS' LOAN COUNCIL PROGRAM

The Loan Council program for State Governments represents a major source of funds available to the States for capital works. Loan Council determines an aggregate program for the States as a whole and allocates the amount between the States. Each State may apply the proceeds of its share of the program as it wishes.

The Commonwealth undertakes to complete the financing of the State Governments' borrowing program by subscribing from its own resources any shortfall in actual loan raising. In addition, a proportion of the total program for State Governments has, since 1970–71, been provided as an interest-free non-repayable capital grant by the Commonwealth. Since 1975–76 that proportion has been one-third of the State Governments' program. This arrangement will continue in 1980–81. Background material on the grants, together with a summary of changes in the proportion of the total program provided as grants, is to be found on page 27 of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities 1975–76'. On pages 24 and 25 of that paper there is an account of the way in which Commonwealth assistance to the States for housing has in the past been related to the Loan Council arrangements.

For 1979-80 the Loan Council approved a State Governments' program of \$1 245 million of which two-thirds, or \$830 million, comprised borrowings and one-third, or \$415 million, was provided as capital grants to the States.

The Loan Council at its June 1980 meeting approved a State Governments' program of \$1307.25 million for 1980–81, representing an increase of 5 per cent over the 1979–80 program. Two-thirds of this, or \$871.5 million, will comprise borrowings and one-third, or \$435.75 million, will be provided as interest-free capital grants to the States.

The following table shows the distribution between the States of the programs for 1979-80 and 1980-81:—

Financing of States' Borrowing Programs and the Capital Grants
As previously mentioned, all borrowings on behalf of the State Governments are, with limited exceptions, arranged by the Commonwealth.

When the proceeds of public borrowings available for this purpose are insufficient to finance the States' program the Commonwealth makes up the

shortfall by subscribing from its own resources the appropriate amount to a special loan, proceeds of which are allocated to the States. The amounts made available in this way represent State debt. Special loans are raised on terms and conditions similar to those attaching to Treasury Bonds on offer for public subscription in Australia, or, if no such securities are on offer at the time, the securities most recently on offer. The effect of this arrangement is that as necessary—and this has been the case in the majority of years since 1951–52—the Commonwealth contributes amounts from its own resources to help finance the Loan Council program of the State Governments.

The borrowing authority approved for the Commonwealth by the Loan Council each year includes an amount equal to the capital grant provided to the States under the State Governments' program. The legislation authorising payment of the capital grant authorises the Treasurer to borrow the amount concerned, or to meet it wholly or in part from Consolidated Revenue Fund.

A summary of the financing of the States' Loan Council programs since 1975-76 is given in Table 95 in Appendix II; Table 96 shows further details of the financing of the programs since 1975-76.

Following previous practice, the Commonwealth has undertaken to support the total State Governments' program of \$1307.25 million agreed for 1980–81, conditional on the States' agreement to the level of borrowing programs proposed by it for the States and for the States' and Commonwealth's larger authorities, and to certain arrangements designed to promote the raising of loans to finance the State Government's program. In summary, the Commonwealth:—

- (a) agrees to make up any shortfall of public borrowing by subscribing from its own resources;
- (b) agrees to provide one-third of the total approved State Governments' program in the form of capital grants;
- (c) by leaving to the States, to the extent necessary to complete their government borrowing program, the whole of the proceeds derived from public loan raisings by the Commonwealth in Australia (other than the net proceeds of Interest Equalisation Deposits, Treasury Notes and other borrowings for temporary purposes; and amounts applied to redemption of public securities (including Special Bonds and Australian Savings Bonds) that cannot be financed out of the National Debt Sinking Fund);
- (d) by arranging, to the maximum possible extent, for the redemption of maturing but unconverted State debt that cannot be met from State sinking funds; and
- (e) by making monthly advances to the States for the first eight months of the financial year against the borrowing component of the program at an annual rate not exceeding \$871.5 million, the position then to be reviewed and a tentative determination made, not later than February 1981, of the amount of any special loan assistance the Commonwealth may provide from its own resources. (The amount of the capital grant component of the program is paid to the States by equal monthly instalments.)

BORROWINGS BY STATE AUTHORITIES

Under the 'Gentlemen's Agreement', originating in 1936, the Loan Council approves an aggregate annual borrowing program for larger semi-government and local authorities. In 1980–81, as in 1979–80, larger authorities are defined as those borrowing more than \$1.2 million in the financial year, the Loan Council having decided at its June 1979 meeting to increase the limit from \$1 million which had applied since 1977–78. The limit applying in 1976–77 was \$0.8 million. For information on the limits applying in years prior to that see page 29 of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities 1975–76'. Since 1962–63 no overall control has been set by the Loan Council on borrowings by smaller authorities, that is, authorities borrowing individually within the financial year up to the amounts mentioned above.

The program approved for borrowings by the larger authorities of the States is distributed between the States by the Loan Council. Each State determines the distribution between its individual larger authorities of its share of the basic borrowing program approved for such authorities. From time to time, the Loan Council also approves special temporary additions to the programs of particular States to meet specific circumstances, including under the special infrastructure financing guidelines (see below). The terms and conditions of loans raised by authorities under Loan Council approved borrowing programs are subject to Loan Council approval.

Borrowings by State 'smaller' authorities are also subject to the terms and conditions approved by the Loan Council under the 'Gentlemen's Agreement' and it is the responsibility of each government to ensure that its authorities conform to these terms and conditions.

For 1979-80, the Loan Council approved a borrowing program for the States' larger authorities of \$1 301.6 million (excluding additions for infrastructure financing—see below), which was subsequently adjusted to \$1 290.6 million following a revision to a requirement for special temporary assistance by Queensland. This program was made up of a basic program of \$1 225 million and special temporary additions of:

- \$20 million for New South Wales under arrangements made at the July 1977 Loan Council meeting, the same amount to be available for that State in each of the five years from 1977-78 to 1981-82;
- \$23 million for Queensland, consisting of \$4 million for the Gladstone power station and \$19 million for the Queensland Sugar Board against three-year programs of \$25 million and \$50 million respectively under arrangements made in 1977-78 (although in the event only \$8 million was borrowed against the \$19 million for the Queensland Sugar Board); and
- \$33.6 million for Western Australia consisting of \$1 million for the Kwinana power station (representing the final approval against a program of \$24 million over three years under arrangements made at the July 1977 Loan Council meeting), \$15 million for further electric power development at Muja (representing the second approval against a program of \$40 million over three years) and \$17.6 million for rehabilitation and upgrading of the railway between Kwinana and Koolyanobbing (representing the second approval against a program of \$65 million over six years).

At its June 1980 meeting, the Loan Council approved a borrowing program for larger State authorities of \$1 297.3 million (excluding additions for infrastructure financing—see below). This comprises a basic program of \$1225 million (the same as in 1979–80) and special temporary additions of:

- \$20 million for New South Wales under arrangements made at the July 1977 Loan Council meeting;
- \$42.3 million for Western Australia, consisting of \$16 million for further electric power development at Muja and \$26.3 million for rehabilitation and upgrading of the railway between Kwinana and Koolyanobbing under arrangements made at the June 1978 Loan Council Meeting; and
- \$10 million for Tasmania.

Details of the States' larger authorities' programs for 1979-80 and 1980-81 (excluding additions for infrastructure financing—see below) are set out in the following table:—

The States' smaller authorities' borrowings have increased substantially in recent years. In 1979–80 these borrowings amounted to \$462.7 million and are estimated by the States to total \$515.2 million in 1980–81, an increase of 11.3 per cent.

The borrowings of both larger and smaller authorities in each State in 1979-80 and previous years, the shares of the program for larger authorities in each State in 1980-81, and estimated borrowings by smaller authorities in 1980-81, are shown in Table 90 in Appendix II. (That table includes additions for infrastructure financing—see below.) Table 94 in that Appendix shows the amounts that have been borrowed by local government authorities from within the total borrowings of both larger and smaller authorities. Further reference to the borrowing arrangements for local government authorities is made in Chapter VI.

⁽b) The distribution of the basic program between the States in 1980-81 is the same as the distribution of the 1979-80 basic program.

⁽c) At its June 1979 meeting the Loan Council approved special temporary additions amounting to \$23 million for Queensland in 1979-80. In the event only \$12 million was required because some \$11 million of the requirement for the Queensland Sugar Board was met from the Board's current revenues.

Special Additions for Infrastructure Financing

At its June 1978 meeting, the Loan Council adopted new guidelines for consideration by it of proposals for special additions to annual larger authorities' borrowing programs—the so-called 'semi-government programs'—for financing infrastructure. The guidelines apply to Commonwealth and State authorities. The new arrangements represent, in effect, an extension of the Gentlemen's Agreement which governs borrowings by these authorities. They do not relate to borrowings by Governments, which are of course subject to the Financial Agreement.

The Loan Council accepted the principle of a separate category of borrowings comprising special additions to semi-government programs, including forward approvals thereof, subject to such additions being confined to exceptional cases which:

- could not be reasonably accommodated within resources normally available to the Government and the authority, under 'normal' Loan Council programs;
- are for the provision of services of kinds normally provided by Government or public utility enterprises;
- have special significance for development; and
- require outlay within a relatively short time span.

Under the guidelines, each proposal for a special addition is subject to careful examination by the Loan Council, including as to the viability of the proposed project, its special significance to the economic development of Australia, its importance and urgency, the extent to which the project will be funded from resources otherwise available to the authority concerned, and the need for the special addition. Approval by the Loan Council of a special addition under the infrastructure financing guidelines requires the agreement of a simple majority including the Commonwealth.

To facilitate assessment of individual proposals which are competing for substantial quantities of scarce resources, Loan Council has decided to adopt the procedure of referring all proposals to a working party of Commonwealth and State Treasury officers for evaluation and report prior to their consideration by Loan Council.

The guidelines also provide that, where the Loan Council has approved a special addition to a government's semi-government program, the government and authority concerned shall use their best endeavours to obtain the funds within Australia. However, in exceptional cases if, because of inability of the domestic market to provide the funds on satisfactory terms or because of advantages to be derived from project financing involving a mix of local and overseas funds, the government concerned considers it desirable to arrange an overseas borrowing by the authority, it may seek the approval of the Loan Council to the arranging of such a borrowing.

Loan Council approval may also be sought for an overseas borrowing under a normal semi-government borrowing program where the government concerned can demonstrate that that program cannot be raised in Australia on satisfactory terms because of domestic market conditions.

In considering any proposal for an overseas borrowing, either under a special addition or a normal semi-government borrowing program, the Chairman, in view of the Commonwealth's overall economic management responsibilities, may take into account the implications of the proposed borrowing for the Commonwealth's fiscal policy, monetary policy and external policy objectives, and its own overseas borrowing activities.

In November 1978, the Loan Council considered a detailed report by State and Commonwealth officers on infrastructure financing proposals submitted by the States, and approved in principle a forward program of special additional borrowing authority, totalling about \$1.8 billion in June 1978 prices, in relation to twelve projects and spanning eight years commencing in 1978–79. The projects approved in principle and the indicative amounts in June 1978 prices, comprised:

- \$299 million for New South Wales for coal loaders at Balmain and Port Kembla (\$89 million) and the Eraring electricity project (\$210 million);
- \$399 million for Victoria for the Loy Yang electricity project (\$343 million) and a World Trade Centre (\$56 million);
- \$205 million for Queensland for a coal loader at Hay Point (\$75 million) and a number of power station projects (\$130 million);
- \$186 million for South Australia for a petrochemical project at Redcliff;
- \$568 million for Western Australia for a natural gas pipeline between Dampier and Perth (\$416 million), the integration of power supplies in the Pilbara region (\$111 million), and the Worsley aluminium project (\$41 million); and
- \$110 million for Tasmania for hydro-electric power development (\$75 million) and a number of water supply projects (\$35 million).

In December 1979 the Loan Council considered a report by State and Commonwealth officers on a further group of infrastructure financing proposals submitted by the States and the Commonwealth. Approval was given with respect to nine new proposals involving a forward program of special additional borrowing authority totalling \$800 million over the years to 1986–87. The new projects approved and the indicative amounts in June 1979 prices comprised:

- \$256 million for New South Wales for the Bayswater electricity project (\$142 million) and electrification of the Gosford/Newcastle railway (\$114 million);
- \$270 million for Queensland for the electrification of the Brisbane railway (\$68 million) and acceleration of construction of the Tarong Power Station (\$202 million);
- \$145 million for South Australia for the Northern Power Station;
- \$74 million for Western Australia for infrastructure associated with the North West Shelf gas project (\$45 million), and conversion of the Kwinana Power Station from oil to predominantly coal (\$29 million);
- \$25 million to Tasmania for the Hydro-Electric Commission fuel oil conservation program; and
- \$30 million to the Commonwealth for Telecom's acceleration of the conversion of the telecommunications rural sector network to automatic exchanges.

Subsequent to the December 1979 meeting of Loan Council, a further proposal was approved:

- \$12 million for Victoria for the Wurdee Boluc pipeline to facilitate an increase in the water supply of Geelong and Bellarine Peninsulas.

For 1978-79 Loan Council approved initial borrowings totalling \$158 million for the first group of infrastructure projects. In the event, actual borrowings in that year amounted to \$149 million, including \$143 million raised overseas.

For 1979–80 special borrowing additions totalling \$479 million were approved for the two groups of infrastructure project approvals. In the event, actual borrowings amounted to \$429 million, including \$322 million raised overseas.

At its June 1980 meeting, Loan Council considered a report by State and Commonwealth officers on a third group of infrastructure financing proposals submitted by the States and the Commonwealth. Approval was given to include in the program eight new proposals involving indicated borrowings of \$1552 million over the years to 1989–90. The new proposals approved and the indicative amounts in June 1980 prices, comprised:

- \$375 million for New South Wales for continuation of the Bayswater Stage I electricity project;
- \$871 million for Victoria for revisions to the Loy Yang A electricity project (\$200 million), a further electricity generation capacity to be known as Loy Yang B (\$493 million), a transmission line to carry power to Portland (\$123 million) and grain terminal facilities (\$56 million);
- \$243 million for Western Australia for additional electricity generation capacity to be known as Muja D (\$236 million) and facilities at Jervoise Bay to aid in construction at the North West Shelf gas field (\$7 million); and
- \$62 million for the Commonwealth on behalf of the Australian National Railways Commission for standardisation of the railway between Adelaide and Crystal Brook in South Australia.

Subsequent to its June 1980 meeting, Loan Council approved inclusion of a further project, electrification of the Waterfall/Port Kembla railway, in the infrastructure program. The New South Wales Government has indicated that the State Rail Authority will wish to borrow \$182 million (June 1980 prices) for this project. Together with the requirement for the eight new proposals approved in June 1980 and the revised estimates for the previously approved proposals, the Waterfall/Port Kembla proposal brought the total indicative forward program of special additional borrowing authority for infrastructure to about \$4.9 billion in June 1980 prices for 29 projects. Additionally, major proposals for New South Wales and Queensland for large scale expansion of electric power generating capacity are under consideration. A number of railway electrification proposals have been identified, including Sydney/Melbourne and three projects in Queensland—Norwich Park/Hay Point, Blackwater (Mines)/Gladstone and Collins/Abbot Point, which are candidates for inclusion in the infrastructure program.

For 1980-81 Loan Council has approved total borrowings of \$694 million for the 29 projects now covered by the program. A condition attaching to approvals

at the June meeting was that the working party of Commonwealth and State Treasury officers examine all approved projects and report to Loan Council on the possibilities for rescheduling and modification of proposed borrowings.

Details of special infrastructure financing additions to the larger Commonwealth and State authorities' programs for 1978-79, 1979-80 and 1980-81 are set out in the following table:

CHAPTER IV—SPECIFIC PURPOSE PAYMENTS TO THE STATES

The Commonwealth has provided financial assistance for certain specific types of expenditure by the States for many years. The present Government, in line with its Federalism policy, has been lessening the emphasis on specific purpose programs following the considerable expansion in this type of assistance in the first half of the 1970s.

This Chapter outlines specific purpose payments recently made, presently being made or proposed to be made, to the States. Table 85 in Appendix 1 of this paper shows aggregate specific purpose payments to each State since 1976–77 classified as to whether they were for recurrent or capital purposes, and Table 2 in Chapter 1 classifies these and other payments by function.

The various payments in this Chapter are grouped under the functional headings used in the Statements attached to the Budget Speech—the only exceptions being that the payments included in the 'Not Allocated to Function' category (namely, assistance related to State debts, assistance for local government and natural disaster relief) are shown under specific headings in appropriate places in the Chapter, and that payments for Aboriginal Advancement are outlined together; in the functional statements these are distributed over a number of functions.)

Details further to those provided in this Chapter on specific purpose payments made to the States for 'on-passing' to local government authorities are given in Chapter VI.

ASSISTANCE RELATED TO STATE DEBTS

Payments Under the Financial Agreement

Contributions to Interest on State Debts

Under the Financial Agreement of 1927, the Commonwealth makes payments to the States described as a contribution towards interest payable on State debts. They are treated here as specific purpose grants, although they have some of the characteristics of grants for general purposes. In fact, these payments superseded the general revenue grants of \$2.50 per head of the population of each State made in the period 1910–11 to 1926–27 under the Surplus Revenue Act 1910. (See Appendix II of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities 1975–76'.)

Each year the total payment is \$15.17 million, the amount that was payable in 1926–27 under that Act. The contribution is apportioned between the States in the same way as the 1926–27 per capita grant and is to continue for 58 years from 1 July 1927 (that is, until 1985). It is distributed among the States as shown in the following table:

Sinking Fund Contributions

The Financial Agreement established arrangements for the payment of sinking fund contributions, by both the Commonwealth and State Governments, in respect of State debt or debt incurred on behalf of the States. These arrangements, with relatively minor amendments, applied from 1927–28 to 1974–75 and are summarised on page 36 of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities 1974–75'.

Amendments to the Financial Agreement which were ratified by the Parliaments of the Commonwealth and the States over the course of 1975–76 (the relevant Commonwealth legislation being the *Financial Agreement Act* 1976), and which had retrospective effect to 30 June 1975, provide for different sinking fund arrangements in respect of State debt which may be briefly summarised as follows:

- (i) Specified contributions were made by the States (\$121.5 million) and by the Commonwealth (\$30.2 million) in 1975-76.
- (ii) For the next nine years (ten in the case of New South Wales) the contributions will equal the amounts referred to in (i) adjusted by a percentage of the difference between each State's net debt at 30 June 1975 and the net debt at 30 June immediately preceding the year of contribution; the percentage is 1.20 for State contributions and 0.28 for Commonwealth contributions.
- (iii) As from and including 1985-86 (1986-87 in the case of New South Wales) the contributions by each State will equal 0.85 per cent of its net debt at the preceding 30 June and the Commonwealth's contribution will be 0.28 per cent.

The Financial Agreement amendments of 1975–76 also gave effect to the transfer of \$1000 million of State debt to the Commonwealth from 30 June 1975. (See page 34 of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities 1975–76'.)

Further details of sinking fund arrangements may be found in the annual reports of the National Debt Commission.

The following table shows the Commonwealth's contributions to the sinking fund on States' debts from 1976–77, including estimated contributions to be made in 1980–81:

DEFENCE

Housing for Servicemen

Under successive Commonwealth-State Housing Agreements provision was made from 1956-57 to 1970-71 for certain of the funds advanced annually to the States for housing to be devoted to the erection of dwellings for serving members of the Defence Force. (For further details *see* page 35 of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities 1975-76'.)

Present arrangements were agreed between the Commonwealth and States in 1972 and embodied in the Commonwealth-State Housing Agreement (Servicemen) 1972, since amended to extend them to June 1981. Funds for housing for servicemen in the States are provided under the arrangements by way of advances repayable over 53 years and attract an interest rate equivalent to the long-term bond rate when the advances are made. Future arrangements are under review and funds in 1980–81 are intended for upgrading of older dwellings to contemporary standards.

The following table shows the amount provided to the States since 1976–77 and estimates for 1980–81:

Assistance to State Emergency Services

The Natural Disasters Organisation, which was formally established in 1974, is responsible for co-ordinating physical assistance provided by the Commonwealth (including that provided by the armed services) with the efforts made by State emergency services and local and voluntary organisations to cope with major natural disasters.

The Organisation also has the function of supervising the provision of assistance to State Emergency Services, for the purpose of strengthening those services. Following is a summary of assistance which is being provided by the Commonwealth:

- (i) grants are made to the States to meet the cost of salaries of an agreed number of State Emergency Services' personnel at Division or District headquarters (this assistance was first provided in 1974-75);
- (ii) grants are made to subsidise disaster protection—specifically, levee banks, drains and firebreaks—and to provide depots for emergency service units at the local level:

- (iii) under a practice of some years' standing, capital equipment is provided to the State organisations. Equipment valued at \$1.17 million was provided in 1979-80 and the estimated value of equipment to be provided in 1980-81 is \$1.3 million:
- (iv) the Commonwealth meets the costs of State Government personnitravelling to attend courses at the Australian Counter Disaster College at Mount Macedon; and
- (v) other forms of assistance are provided from time to time.

Of these forms of assistance, those summarised as (i) and (ii) above are classified as payments to or for the States for purposes of this and other budget papers; they are both regarded as being recurrent payments for purposes of this paper. The following table shows payments made for these purposes since 1976–77 and estimated payments in 1980–81:

Special Assistance to Exmouth Shire

In 1975 the Western Australian Government sought assistance towards the operational costs of the Exmouth Shire, which provides support to the United States Communications Station at North West Cape. Payments totalling \$1.14 million were made to Western Australia, including \$0.35 million in 1979–80, the final year in which assistance was provided.

EDUCATION

Grants to the States for education began with assistance for the recurrent expenditures of universities in 1951–52. The area of assistance was progressively extended, and the magnitude of Commonwealth assistance in particular areas has also been increased, the most notable example being the assumption by the Commonwealth of full financial responsibility for tertiary education in 1973–74 (previously

expenditure in this area had been shared between the Commonwealth and State Governments). Other examples are the substantially increased assistance for schools as from 1973–74 and for technical and further education as from 1974–75, and, more recently, the Commonwealth's undertaking to provide \$150 million over the period of 1980 to 1984 for school-to-work transition activities. As a result of these various developments, payments to the States for education have grown rapidly—for example, from \$259.4 million in 1972–73 to \$2084.4 million in 1979–80, and an estimated \$2306.6 million in 1980–81.

In recent years the arrangements for payments to the States in the four broad areas of education—universities, colleges of advanced education, technical and further education, and schools—have undergone a number of changes.

For universities and colleges of advanced education, fixed triennial funding arrangements for recurrent grants (other than equipment grants) were introduced in 1979. Capital and equipment grants continue to be determined annually. Technical and further education funds are also determined annually, while rolling program arrangements have been maintained for payments to the States for schools.

Cost supplementation arrangements for 1981 will continue to be confined to the wages and salaries component of recurrent programs, including the fees reimbursement component in the technical and further education assistance.

The figures for 1980–81 given in Tables 16 through 19 below in respect of the four areas are generally on the basis of estimated June 1980 cost levels, with a separate bulk allowance for estimated cost supplementation of the States' components of the tertiary and schools programs, for which an amount of \$103 million has been allowed in the Budget. This is a preliminary estimate and it is not possible to give a reliable sectoral break-down in the tables. As an indication, however, approximately \$73 million would relate to the tertiary education sector and \$30 million to the schools program. For purposes of this paper, the tertiary component is assumed to comprise \$68 million relating to recurrent grants and \$5 million relating to capital grants and the schools component break-down is assumed to be \$26 million and \$4 million respectively; this has been allocated between States in proportion to recurrent and capital grants for education respectively.

Tertiary Education

The Tertiary Education Commission Act 1977 established the Tertiary Education Commission to promote balanced and co-ordinated development of tertiary education throughout Australia. The Commission replaced three former Commissions—the Universities Commission, the Commission on Advanced Education and the Technical and Further Education Commission—which had previously performed these functions. Relevant programs of assistance to the States are administered by the Commission and currently are authorised under the States Grants (Tertiary Education Assistance) Act 1978.

In May 1980, the Government announced base levels of expenditure for 1981 (ie, before adjustment for cost increases during the year). For universities and colleges of advanced education, recurrent funds are to be maintained at approximately the same real level in 1981 as in 1980, in line with the Government's

triennial funding commitment. Capital funds are to be reduced by 17.6 per cent in real terms in 1981, consistent with enrolment trends. For the technical and further education sector, there is to be an overall increase of 1.1 per cent in real terms in assistance in 1981.

The percentages referred to above in this section relate to the total programs which are the subject of recommendations by the Commission. In the case of universities and colleges of advanced education, these programs relate to institutions in the Australian Capital Territory as well as the States but, in the case of technical and further education, they exclude the Australian Capital Territory.

Universities

Assistance to the States for the recurrent expenditures of universities dates from 1951-52; in 1957-58 assistance was first given for expenditure on capital programs. In 1973-74 the Commonwealth assumed full financial responsibility in this area.

The program of financial assistance to the States for universities in 1981 amounts to \$722.2 million at estimated June 1980 prices. The allocation for 1980–81 is \$713.8 million, again at estimated June 1980 prices.

Colleges of Advanced Education

Assistance to the States for colleges of advanced education began in 1964-65 when the Commonwealth agreed to provide capital grants. From the start of the 1967-69 triennium, assistance was extended to include recurrent grants. Grants

to the States have been made since 1967-68 for teachers colleges and since 1968-69 for pre-school teachers colleges. In 1973-74 these grants were absorbed into an overall program of grants for colleges of advanced education.

The program of financial assistance to the States for colleges of advanced education in 1981 amounts to \$507 million, at estimated June 1980 prices. The allocation for 1980–81 is \$508.7 million, again at estimated June 1980 prices.

Technical and Further Education

Assistance to the States for technical and further education, first provided in 1964–65, has been directed towards enhancing the quality and extending the availability of technical and further education, and compensating the States for not levying fees.

Grants are made on the understanding that the States do not reduce the levels of activity financed from their own resources.

The program of financial assistance to the States in 1981 amounts to \$159.5 million at estimated June 1980 prices, including a \$17.9 million further instalment on a Government undertaking in 1978 to provide an additional \$50 million (in real terms) for capital works. The allocation for 1980–81 is \$161.1 million, at estimated June 1980 prices. In addition to expenditures under this program, technical and further education will also benefit substantially from expenditures under the school-to-work transition program (see below).

Schools

The Commonwealth has been providing assistance for schools in the States since 1964–65 when it provided grants for science laboratories and equipment. The range of assistance was progressively extended and by 1975–76 the Commonwealth was providing grants for both government and non-government schools in a number of categories: general recurrent grants, general building grants and grants for science laboratories and equipment, primary and secondary school libraries, schools for handicapped children, disadvantaged schools, migrant children, teacher development, innovatory projects and information programs.

The Schools Commission, established by the Schools Commission Act 1973, administers these programs of assistance.

Three-year rolling program arrangements have applied to assistance for schools in the States since 1977. Under these arrangements an amount of \$741.1 million (at estimated June 1980 prices) will be provided as the base program of assistance in 1981.

School-to-Work Transition

The Commonwealth decided in 1979 to provide up to the equivalent of \$150 million in constant 1979 prices in the five years from the beginning of 1980 for a range of education, training and counselling activities in schools and technical and further education institutions. These activities are directed particularly to young people who have left or are likely to leave school early, and are intended to equip them better to move into the work force.

Funds are being made available very largely through the States, and in 1980, the initial year, the Commonwealth is meeting the full cost of \$23.4 million of the programs agreed with the States. In 1981 up to \$26.7 million will be made available to the States, on condition that they contribute matching amounts totalling \$9.9 million. From 1982 onwards, that allocation for the States will be on a \$1 for \$1 matching basis.

Child Migrant and Refugee Education

Grants are provided by the Commonwealth to the States for child migranic education in schools. Until 1976, they were made available under the *Immigration* (Education) Act 1971. Since then almost all of the program of assistance has been subsumed within the general recurrent grants programs administered by the Schools Commission (see above). Grants under the *Immigration* (Education) Act are now only provided for the purpose of initial special instruction of refugee children who arrive during the course of a school year, and for the purchase of language teaching materials and equipment. The increased expenditure shown below for 1980-81 is to cater for the large increase in refugee arrivals during 1979-80 and the further increase in intake agreed to for 1980-81.

For the period 1973-74 to 1976-77, assistance was also provided to the States under the Act for the construction of portable supplementary classrooms to accommodate the increased number of students needing special language instruction in government and non-government schools. Since 1978-79 funds have been provided on an emergency basis to assist government and non-government school systems to provide accommodation, where it is not already available, for newly arrived refugee children. These funds are for expenditure on activities such as the transport, erection and repair costs of portable classrooms provided by the school authorities.

The Commonwealth also reimburses the States for the cost of certain adult migrant education services. These reimbursements are regarded as payments for services rendered and are not, therefore, classified as payments to the States. In addition, Commonwealth funds provided since 1978-79 for portable classrooms for adults are not classified as payments to the States.

Pre-Schools

Commonwealth grants to the States for pre-schools commenced in 1973–74 with the provision of funds for both capital and recurrent purposes. In 1977–78 assistance to the States for the recurrent costs of pre-school services was provided in the form of a block grant subject to certain broad requirements concerning priority of access. From 1978–79, the block grants have represented the total Commonwealth contribution to the States towards capital and recurrent costs of pre-schools.

The block grants are made under the Children's Services Program administered by the Office of Child Care. For 1980–81 the Government has decided to provide \$69.22 million for the Children's Services Program of which \$32.75 million is for block grants to the States for pre-schools.

Educational Research

Grants to the States for the purposes of educational research are made under the Education Research Act 1970. For this purpose, the Education Research and Development Committee advises the Minister for Education on priorities in educational research, and makes recommendations on allocations of financial support for educational research projects proposed to it or commissioned by it. The Committee is also required to advise the Minister on any other means for the improvement of educational research, its development and the application of results in Australia.

\$1.17 million has been approved for 1980-81 and, of this, it is estimated that \$0.77 million will be made available to the States on the recommendations of the Committee.

Under the Act payments are also being made to the States for research and evaluation commissioned by the Minister for Education. These payments are in addition to the activities of the Education Research and Development Committee.

HEALTH

The Commonwealth has been providing assistance to the States for health services and facilities since 1949–50, when it began providing grants for the control of tuberculosis. Grants of relatively minor amounts have also been made for blood transfusion services since 1953–54, for the disposal of ships' garbage since 1966–67 and for nursing homes and certain health education services since 1970–71.

During the past decade, however, the level and extent of Commonwealth assistance to the States for health have increased dramatically, with a number of new continuing programs being initiated. The most significant of these is the scheme for sharing net operating costs of recognised hospitals in the States.

Payments to the States for health purposes have consequently risen rapidly—from \$21 million in 1972–73 to \$1218.2 million in 1979–80. The estimated payments in 1980–81 are \$1377.6 million.

Health Insurance Program

Section 30 of the *Health Insurance Act* 1973 authorised the Commonwealth to enter into agreements with State Governments 'for the provision of hospital services' by the States. The agreements made had effect from various dates during 1975–76. Under these arrangements, the States provided free standard ward public hospital treatment without means test and free public hospital outpatient services. There were agreed arrangements in respect of charges in wards other than standard wards.

In very much abbreviated terms, the agreements provided that the Commonwealth meet 50 per cent of the net recurrent costs of hospitals referred to as 'recognised' hospitals in the agreements.

Payments under the agreement were suspended in May 1976, following legal advice that the agreements were invalid. Up to that date, the Commonwealth had already made payments totalling \$575.2 million.

As an interim measure, until new cost-sharing arrangements were negotiated with the States as part of the new health insurance arrangements that were to apply from 1 October 1976, the States Grants (Hospital Operating Costs) Act 1976 authorised the payment of up to \$315 million to the States to meet 50 per cent of net operating costs of hospitals incurred before 1 October 1976. Of this amount, \$294.5 million was paid to the States in 1975–76 to meet the estimated payments that would have been made to the States from 25 May to 30 September 1976 had the former agreements not been declared invalid. It was estimated that \$215.6 million of that amount would have been paid in ordinary circumstances in 1976–77.

New cost-sharing arrangements under the *Health Insurance Act* 1973 were negotiated with the States and became effective on 1 October 1976. Apart from revisions to relevant charges and to conditions in respect of free hospital treatment (both of which have been revised still further since then), the main change from the previous arrangement was that the Commonwealth now meets 50 per cent of budgets approved by the Commonwealth and State Health Ministers. From 1 November 1978, eligible persons without hospital insurance are entitled to free hospital provided treatment and services. Agreements with four of the States (New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland and Western Australia) expired on 30 June 1980, but have been extended on an annual basis pending finalisation of the Commission of Inquiry into the Efficiency and Administration of Hospitals. Agreements with the two remaining States (South Australia and Tasmania) expire on 30 June 1985.

Launceston General Hospital

Under an agreement with the Tasmanian Government, the Commonwealth is continuing to meet 50 per cent of the approved costs of Stage 1 of the redevelopment of the Launceston General Hospital. Payments to Tasmania for this purpose from 1976–77 to 1979–80 have totalled \$14.5 million. The estimated amount to be provided in 1980–81 is \$3.7 million.

Community Health Facilities and Services

The Government is continuing to provide grants in 1980-81 to the States and other eligible organisations under the Community Health Program which commenced in 1973.

The Commonwealth now meets 50 per cent of recurrent and capital costs of approved projects, except in respect of recurrent costs of women's refuges where funds allocated through the States are provided at the rate of up to 75 per cent. In addition, the Commonwealth meets the full cost of those community health projects that have an Australia-wide application.

Since 1979-80, further funds have been provided to the States through the Community Health Program for the employment of ethnic health workers and interpreters and translators. The costs of employing such persons were fully funded by the Commonwealth in 1979-80, and are to be shared between the Commonwealth and the States on a \$3 for \$1 basis in 1980-81.

School Dental Scheme

The Commonwealth has been co-operating with the States since 1973 in an Australia-wide School Dental Service for all primary school children.

The State Governments are responsible for administering the scheme. Until 1975–76, the Commonwealth met the full capital and operating costs of training facilities for dental therapists, as well as the full capital costs and 75 per cent

of operating costs of school dental clinics. These arrangements have since been revised on a couple of occasions and from 1978–79 the Commonwealth has met 50 per cent of the operating costs of training facilities and clinics and 50 per cent of the capital costs of new facilities.

Health Education Campaigns

The Commonwealth is continuing to sponsor, in conjunction with the States, the National Drug Education Program. Funds have been provided to support State and national projects of drug education since 1970–71. It is estimated that \$1.6 million, an increase of 44.2 per cent, will be made available to the States for this purpose in 1980–81. Grants paid to the States since 1976–77 and estimates for 1980–81 are shown in the following table:

Blood Transfusion Service

Grants have been made to the States since 1953-54 for the purpose of assisting Blood Transfusion Services conducted by the Australian Red Cross Society.

From 1973-74 the annual operating costs of the Services in the States were met 35 per cent by the Commonwealth, 60 per cent by the States, and 5 per cent by the Society. It was agreed in 1975-76 that approved capital expenditure for the Services be shared between the Commonwealth and the States on a S1 for S1 basis.

The basis of the Commonwealth's contribution to operating costs changed from the beginning of 1976-77 so that the Society's contribution, within each State Division, is the lower of 5 per cent of operating costs or 10 per cent of the previous year's income from donations. Any reduction in the Society's previous share is taken up by the Commonwealth. Approved capital costs in the States continue to be shared equally by the Commonwealth and the States.

Health Planning Agencies

The Government will continue to provide grants in 1980-81 for the support of State health planning agencies. Payment of grants for this purpose commenced in 1973-74. In years prior to 1978-79, these grants were provided to the States on a \$2 for \$1 basis. Since then, the Commonwealth has met 50 per cent of the approved costs of the agencies.

Control of Encephalitis

Following the outbreak of Australian Encephalitis (formerly known as Murray Valley Encephalitis) early in 1974, the Commonwealth has provided funds to New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia to assist in a mosquito eradication campaign along the Murray Valley Basin.

To assist in the continued control of Australian Encephalitis, funds have been provided since 1978–79 not only for mosquito abatement programs but also for co-ordination, research and teaching purposes. The campaign was also extended in 1978–79 to include Western Australia and the Northern Territory.

Grants paid to the States under these arrangements and estimated grants in 1980-81 are set out in the following table:

Disposal of Ships' Garbage

Under arrangements offered to the States in 1965-66 (1967-68 in the case of Western Australia), financial assistance has been made available to each State for the provision of facilities for the disposal of overseas ships' garbage with a view to improving measures against the entry of exotic diseases into Australia. The Commonwealth has been meeting the full capital cost of incinerators and ancillary structures and half the cost of access roads, excluding land costs at selected ports. Grants paid to the States from 1976-77 and estimates in 1980-81 are shown in the following table:

High Security Quarantine Units

To meet the threat of new types of human quarantinable diseases, the Commonwealth is meeting the cost of establishing a national high security quarantine unit at the Fairfield Infectious Diseases Hospital, Victoria. The cost of constructing

the unit, estimated to be approximately \$2.1 million, is being met in full by the Commonwealth. Payments to 30 June 1980 amounted to \$1.14 million, including a payment of \$0.85 million in 1979-80, and it is estimated that \$0.97 million will be provided in 1980-81.

SOCIAL SECURITY AND WELFARE

Welfare Services for the Aged

Under two Acts effective from June 1969—the States Grants (Home Care) Act 1969 and the States Grants (Paramedical Services) Act 1969—the Commonwealth is making grants to the States for certain services provided wholly or mainly to aged persons—specifically for home care services, senior citizens' centres and paramedical services.

Home Care Services

Under the States Grants (Home Care) Act 1969 the Commonwealth shares with participating States, on a \$1 for \$1 basis, the cost of approved house-keeping or other domestic assistance provided wholly or mainly for aged persons in their homes. Grants provided from 1976–77 and estimates for 1980–81 are shown in the following table:

Senior Citizens' Centres

Under the States Grants (Home Care) Act 1969, the Commonwealth shares with participating States, on a \$2 for \$1 basis, up to a maximum of two-thirds of the approved capital cost of senior citizens' centres. The Commonwealth also shares on a \$1 for \$1 basis, the salaries of welfare officers employed in conjunction with such centres. Grants provided for these purposes since 1976–77 and estimates for 1980–81 are shown in the following table:

Paramedical Services

The Commonwealth shares on a \$1 for \$1 basis with participating States the cost of approved paramedical services, such as chiropody, occupational therapy, physiotherapy and speech therapy, provided wholly or mainly for aged persons in their homes. Although all States have indicated their willingness to participate, to date only Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania have provided paramedical services in circumstances which qualify for assistance under the arrangement. Grants up to specified amounts are made in the first instance through the States Grants (Paramedical Services) Act 1969. However, where a State has an approved requirement for funds in excess of the limits prescribed by that Act, provision may be made for a supplementary grant through an Appropriation Act.

Assistance for Deserted Wives

Under the States Grants (Deserted Wives) Act 1968, the Commonwealth has been sharing on a \$1 for \$1 basis with the States up to prescribed limits the cost of helping certain mothers of families without a breadwinner where the mothers are ineligible for a Class A widow's pension or, as from 1973–74, a supporting parent's benefit.

Assistance is provided during the first six months after the date of the evert which gives rise to eligibilty (e.g. the birth of a child or separation). The main groups of mothers assisted under the Act are separated wives, wives of prisoners, and unmarried mothers. After the first six months these groups of mothers may qualify for either a Class A widow's pension or a supporting parent's benefit.

The grant to a State is equal to half the cost of the approved assistance paid by the State to each eligible person but is not to exceed half the amount that would be payable to such a person were she eligible for a Class A widow's pension or a supporting parent's benefit.

Victoria and South Australia have now withdrawn from these arrangements as from 1 January 1980 and 1 July 1980 respectively; Western Australia has indicated that it will withdraw from 26 August 1980. As announced in the Budget Speech, the Government has decided to extend the supporting parent's benefit from 1 November 1980 to cover the first six months of sole parenthood. This pension will replace, from that date, assistance to States under the States Grants (Deserted Wives) Act, which will be repealed accordingly.

Children's Services

Services for children provided in the States began attracting Commonwealth financial support in 1972–73 under the *Child Care Act* 1972. Under that Act, payments were made direct to non-profit organisations and local government bodies—that is, not by way of payments to the States. Payments to the States commenced in 1973–74 under a broader scheme of assistance introduced in that year and have continued since then, as have the direct forms of payment.

The program of assistance is administered by the Office of Child Care which was established under the Minister for Social Security to advise on programs providing for capital and recurrent assistance for pre-school and child care projects including home care, vacation and after school care projects and various other community initiated projects. Funds for pre-schools are included under the Education function discussed earlier in this Chapter.

The Government has decided that up to \$36.1 million will be provided in 1980-81 for children's services other than pre-schools. It is tentatively estimated that, of that total, approximately \$8.2 million will take the form of payments to the States.

Employment Grants for Maryborough Region

Following the decision to cease granting export licences for minerals from sand mining on Fraser Island, the Commonwealth agreed to provide \$10 million to Queensland for allocation by that State to create employment opportunities in the Maryborough region. The Commonwealth recently agreed to extend this assistance by an additional \$450 000 in 1979–80. Payments therefore totalled \$10.45 million, comprising \$1 million in 1976–77, \$3 million in each of 1977–78 and 1978–79 and \$3.45 million in 1979–80.

Rehabilitation Centre—Hobart

The Commonwealth and Tasmanian Governments agreed in 1974 to share the costs of establishing and operating a joint rehabilitation centre for handicapped persons in Hobart. The arrangement provides for the Commonwealth to meet up to half the capital cost of building and equipping the centre and to contribute 70 per cent of the annual running costs. Total payments for capital purposes to 30 June 1980 amounted to \$3.3 million including a payment of \$850 000 in 1979–80. The Commonwealth contribution is expected to be \$1.61 million in 1980–81, comprising \$700 000 for capital purposes and the first recurrent payments of \$910 000.

Translating and Interpreting Service

Arising out of its consideration of the Galbally Report on Post-Arrival Services for Migrants, the Government has offered to the States funds for a program of assistance towards the provision of translating and interpreting services in areas of primarily State responsibility. The program is for services other than those provided under the Community Health Program (see Community Health Facilities and Services above).

The Commonwealth meets the full costs of these services in the first year of the program and thereafter shares agreed costs equally with the States. To date New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia have accepted the offer and received funds totalling \$221 000 in 1979-80. In 1980-81 a total of \$235 000 is to be provided to these States, comprising \$105 000, \$70 000 and \$60 000 respectively.

Unattached Refugee Children

From 1980-81, it is proposed that payments previously made directly to unattached refugee children, accepted on arrival as wards of the Commonwealth under the *Immigration* (Guardianship of Children) Act 1946, will be made through State government authorities. An amount of \$463 000 has been provided for this purpose in 1980-81; the estimated State-by-State distribution is given in Appendix V.

ABORIGINAL ADVANCEMENT

Since 1968-69 the Commonwealth has provided assistance to the States for Aboriginal advancement, particularly in the fields of housing, education and health. Details of payments are included in the statements attached to the Budge: Speech and in Table 2 in this paper under the functional headings appropriate to the specific kinds of assistance involved. In other relevant tables in this paper, however, all payments specifically designated for this purpose are grouped together.

The Commonwealth also provides assistance for Aboriginal advancement in the States by way of direct assistance to Aboriginal organisations and other bodies.

Housing

Welfare Housing Advances

Under successive arrangements between the Commonwealth and the States, financial assistance has been made available to the States in one form or another since 1945–46 for the provision of housing, including assistance with home ownership, for families of low or moderate means.

For many years, housing funds were closely aligned with State Governments' Loan Council borrowing programs and for two years, 1971–72 and 1972–73, they were integrated within these programs (although additional specific revenue grants of \$2.75 million per year in respect of each of those two years were provided in lieu of former interest subsidies, and continue to be payable for 30 years). Since 1973–74, financial assistance for welfare housing has been provided fully by way of specific purpose payments, appropriate 'offsets' having been made to State Governments' Loan Council borrowing programs. A detailed account of successive arrangements, together with statistics covering the period to 1975–76, is to be found on pages 66 through 68, 200, 201 and 224 of the 1975–76 issue of this paper.

Under the *Housing Assistance Act* 1978 three-year Housing Agreements were executed with the States to cover the period from 1978–79 to 1980–81. In accordance with the Agreements the total amount of advances each year is determined in the annual Budget context after consideration of State requirements. Advances are repayable over 53 years as under earlier Agreements and concessional fixed rates of interest apply—4.5 per cent per annum for funds directed to home purchase assistance and 5 per cent per annum for rental housing.

The 1978 Agreements lay particular importance on the effective use of funds and resources to assist those most in need. The States also now have greater flexibility in determining the uses to which housing funds can be put and the extent of assistance to individuals. At least 40 per cent of advances in 1980–81 are to be applied to home purchase assistance. Restrictions under previous arrangements on the sale of State Housing Authority dwellings have been removed. The States determine their own sales policies provided that all sales are for cash at market value or replacement cost; purchasers of State Housing Authority dwellings are eligible for loans from the home purchase assistance program.

In 1980-81, total advances to the States are estimated at \$166.5 million, compared to \$160 million in 1979-80. As in 1979-80, the advances will be provided on a \$1 for \$1 matching basis. State expenditures on welfare housing under the Agreements and surpluses arising from the operation of the rental housing and home purchase assistance programs under the Agreements are eligible for matching. Annual payments are shown in the table at the end of this section.

Grants for Rental Housing

Pensioner Housing

Since 1969-70, the Commonwealth has provided grants to the States to assist with the provision of self-contained accommodation at reasonable rentals for certain categories of single aged and service pensioners who have little or no means of support apart from their pensions.

Since 1978-79 these grants have been provided under the *Housing Assistance* Act 1978, with wider eligibility criteria and under conditions giving the States greater freedom in the way the funds can be applied than in earlier years. Eligible persons include those in receipt of an age, invalid or widow's pension, a supporting parent's benefit, a special benefit, a sheltered employment allowance, a training allowance in certain circumstances and some classes of service pension. Married as well as single pensioners are being assisted.

Grants totalling \$31 million are provided in 1980-81, compared to \$30 million in 1979-80. Annual payments are shown in the table at the end of this section.

Rental Housing for Other Persons in Need

As well as grants for pensioner housing, the *Housing Assistance Act* 1978 provides for assistance for any other class of persons declared by the Minister for Housing and Construction to be in need of rental assistance. In 1980–81, grants totalling \$21 million are provided for Aboriginals in need of rental housing assistance (compared to \$20 million in 1979–80) and \$52 million for other persons eligible for rental housing assistance under the Housing Agreements with the States (compared to \$50 million in 1979–80).

URBAN AND REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT NEC AND THE ENVIRONMENT

Payments to the States included under this functional heading relate to a number of programs, including growth centres and decentralisation, and assistance for development of Aboriginal communities. Payments in 1979–80 were \$42.9 million and are expected to total approximately \$45.4 million in 1980–81. (These figures are *net* of repayments.)

Payments in 1980-81 for most of the urban and regional development programs and for certain programs falling within other functional headings were made mainly under the authority of the *Urban and Regional Development* (Financial Assistance) Act 1974.

Growth Centres and Decentralisation

In 1979–80 S4.2 million and \$0.8 million were provided to New South Wales and Victoria respectively for the Albury-Wodonga growth centre for land development and headworks, housing and commercial development construction, studies and investigations and running costs of the Albury-Wodonga Development Corporation.

In 1980–81 further assistance of \$5 million will be provided towards expenditure on Albury-Wodonga. While the precise allocation of this amount between New South Wales and Victoria is not possible at this stage, preliminary consideration of the proposed program of expenditure for 1980–81 suggests that the bulk of the funds might go to New South Wales. For the purposes of this document the whole of the \$5 million has been allocated to that State.

The 1980–81 Budget also allows for \$23.8 million for capitalised interest on advances to the States for Albury-Wodonga in 1980–81 and earlier years, and on earlier advances for the Bathurst-Orange and Macarthur growth centres. This amount represents estimated interest payments which are deferred and added to the amount of principal outstanding and on which interest thus accrues. (In 1979–80 capitalised interest, including in respect of the Monarto growth centre, amounted to \$22.1 million.) Allowance is also made in the Budget for a repayment in 1980–81 of \$5.1 million by South Australia in settlement of loans provided to the State in earlier years for the former Monarto growth centre.

In addition to the above, the Commonwealth provides funds for general decentralisation purposes under the Commonwealth's Regional Development Program to State, local government and community bodies, and firms engaged in manufacturing and tertiary industry, in selected non-metropolitan centres. However these funds are not classified as payments to the States or local government authorities.

Payments to the States for growth centres and related projects since 1976–77 and estimated payments in 1980–81 for Albury-Wodonga, including capitalised interest, are given in Appendix V.

Urban Flood Mitigation

Since 1975-76 \$5.5 million, including \$62 000 in 1979-80, has been provided to Queensland under the *Urban and Regional Development (Financial Assistance)*

Act 1974 to assist with flood mitigation works on various creeks in the Brisbane metropolitan area. A further amount of \$126 000 is to be provided in 1980-81 for this purpose.

Funds for urban flood mitigation in 1979-80 were also provided under the National Water Resources (Financial Assistance) Act 1978 with \$0.7 million being provided towards the cost of flood mitigation works on Kedron Brook in the Brisbane metropolitan area. Further assistance may be provided for urban flood mitigation works in 1980-81 under this legislation from funds which have yet to be allocated to particular projects under the National Water Resources Program (See page 74).

Assistance for Land Acquisition and Development in Urban Areas

In 1973-74 a program of assistance by way of grants and loans was undertaken with the object of making land available for residential and associated uses and to facilitate the planning and development of new urban areas.

With the discharge of remaining commitments in 1977–78, this program came to an end. However, interest is being capitalised on advances in a similar manner to its treatment for growth centres and related projects (see above). The 1980–81 Budget includes \$17.5 million for capitalised interest on the loans provided to the States in 1977–78 and earlier years. Repayments on the first of these loans are due to begin in 1983–84.

Payments for land acquisition, development and related works in urban areas since 1976-77 (including capitalised interest) and capitalised interest in 1980-81 are given in Appendix V.

Woolloomooloo Redevelopment

An agreement was concluded in 1974–75 with New South Wales under which up to \$17 million is being provided by way of grant for acquisition of 3.2 hectares of property, and planning and site development in the Woolloomooloo Basin in Sydney. Payments to the State have totalled \$11 million since 1975–76, including \$0.7 million in 1979–80. An amount of \$5.2 million has been included in the Budget for estimated payments to the State in 1980–81.

The Commonwealth also agreed to transfer, at no cost to the State, 2.6 hectares of Commonwealth property in the Woolloomooloo Basin which was valued in excess of \$11 million. Most of this land has now been transferred.

The agreement also provides for the State to make payments to the Commonwealth in respect of each unit of public housing produced on the property acquired by, or transferred to, the State and payment of the receipts from any part of the property that is not retained for public housing. A total of \$1.9 million has been received from the State under these provisions since 1976–77 including \$0.7 million in 1979–80. Similar payments by the State in 1980–81 are estimated to be \$0.9 million.

The amounts shown in Appendix V are net amounts after deductions of these receipts.

Captains Flat-Pollution Abatement Works

Under the Captains Flat (Abatement of Pollution) Agreement Act 1975 the Commonwealth is providing financial assistance to New South Wales for approved programs of works to abate the pollution of the Molonglo River from the mine waste dumps at Captains Flat. Financial assistance of up to \$2.5 million is being provided for expenditure on capital works and up to \$100 000 will be provided on a \$1 for \$1 matching basis for expenditure on maintenance of the works. The financial assistance for capital works is 80 per cent by way of grant and 20 per cent by way of loan, and for maintenance wholly by way of grant.

Payments to the State since 1975–76 have amounted to \$2 million for capital works and \$68 000 for maintenance. There have been no further payments in respect of expenditure on capital works in 1978–79. \$20 000 has been included in the Budget for estimated payments in respect of expenditure in 1980–81 on maintenance.

Legana Industrial Estate—Tasmania

The Commonwealth will make available to Tasmania in 1980-81 up to \$0.2 million by way of loan on a matching basis towards the development of an industrial estate at Legana, in the Launceston area.

CULTURE AND RECREATION

The Commonwealth Government first provided grants to the States for cultural and recreational purposes in 1973-74. An estimated \$5.5 million will be made available for these purposes in 1980-81.

National Fitness Program

Financial assistance to the States for national fitness activities commenced in 1975–76. Under arrangements agreed with the States in 1977–78, funds for these purposes are now allocated to the 'Life Be In It' campaign. Of a total of \$0.7 million provided for the campaign in 1980–81, \$207 000 is allocated for payment to the States. A similar amount was paid in 1979–80.

Capital Assistance for Leisure and Cultural Activities

A program of capital assistance grants on a cost-sharing basis with State, local government and voluntary bodies for the development of community sporting and recreation complexes was commenced in 1973–74 and expanded in 1974–75 to cover a wider range of community leisure facilities including arts/cultural facilities. The program was discontinued in December 1975 and payments since that date have been for outstanding commitments. A final payment of \$509 600 was made in 1979–80. Payments made to each State since 1976–77 are given in Appendix V.

Nature Conservation

Amounts of \$56 000 and \$125 000 were paid to the States in 1979-80 under the States Grants (Nature Conservation) Act 1974 and the Environment (Financial Assistance) Act 1977 respectively for land acquisition and programs related to the management of parks and reserves for the purposes of nature conservation.

\$20 000 has been provided in 1980-81 for payment to Tasmania for a number of land acquisitions under the *States Grants* (*Nature Conservation*) Act. There are also outstanding commitments for the acquisition of specific identified areas of land in New South Wales and Victoria that have been approved for acquisition in terms of the Act but for which cash disbursements are dependent on further negotiation. Upon completion of the negotiations, funds will be provided in terms of the existing agreements.

National Estate

Since 1974 grants have been provided for the restoration, preservation and improvement of landscapes and buildings of special significance. The Australian Heritage Commission, established in 1975 under the Australian Heritage Commission Act 1975, provides advice to the Commonwealth on the programs of assistance in respect of these matters. All grants to the States are made in accordance with Agreements concluded under the Urban and Regional Development (Financial Assistance) Act 1974.

Port Arthur Conservation Program

Beginning in 1979–80, the Commonwealth is providing assistance on a \$2 for \$1 basis to Tasmania for a seven-year program to restore and develop the Port Arthur region. In 1979–80 the Commonwealth paid the State \$0.4 million for this purpose, and will make available \$0.8 million in 1980–81.

Facilities for 1982 Commonwealth Games

\$10 million by way of grant is being provided to Queensland for the construction of sporting facilities and athletes' and officials' accommodation for the 1982 Commonwealth Games in Brisbane. The third of four annual payments of \$2.5 million is to be made in 1980–81.

ECONOMIC SERVICES—TRANSPORT

The Commonwealth has been making payments to the States for transport purposes continuously since 1923–24, when it began providing grants for roads. The estimated total payments, *net* of repayments, are \$682.8 million for this function in 1980–81 and, of this, \$616.9 million is for roads and bridges (\$10 million being towards construction of the Second Hobart Bridge) and \$45.6 million for urban public transport.

Roads

Commonwealth assistance for expenditure on roads has taken two main forms—general assistance and assistance for specific road projects. Payments of the latter kind (such as those for beef roads and the sealing of the Eyre highway) were subsumed in the general program of roads assistance as from 1974–75. (See page 81 and the relevant section of Appendix IV of the 1975–76 issue of this paper for an historical description of the Commonwealth's assistance for roads).

For the triennium 1977–78 to 1979–80 assistance to the States for road construction and maintenance, totalling \$1529 million, was provided under the *States Grants (Roads) Act* 1977 amended appropriately. Grants provided in 1978–79 and 1979–80 were designed to provide the equivalent in real terms to the 1977–78 grant. The legislation also set down annual quotas for expenditure by each State from its own resources.

Over the five years 1980-81 to 1984-85, the Commonwealth is to provide \$3650 million to the States and the Northern Territory as grants for road construction and maintenance. Of this amount, \$606.9 million will be provided to the States in 1980-81. This represents an increase of 11.2 per cent over the amount provided in 1979-80 and is expected at least to maintain the 1979-81 level of Commonwealth financial assistance in real terms. The State expenditure quotas are also to be increased similarly. Interim legislation has been passed in respect of grants in 1980-81.

In addition, beginning in 1980-81, the number of road categories for which assistance is to be made available has been reduced from eight to four to simplify administration of the program. The new categories are: national and developmental roads, rural arterial roads, urban arterial roads and local roads.

Second Hobart Bridge

Following agreement in 1975 between the Commonwealth and Tasmanian Governments, a Joint Committee on the Second Hobart Bridge was established. The first stage of the Committee's work was to carry out the technical investigations and design associated with the provision of a second bridge across the Derwent River at Hobart. These studies, completed in 1978–79, were funded by the Commonwealth at a total cost of \$1.2 million.

The Commonwealth subsequently agreed to fund the full cost of providing the bridge and necessary approach roads. The bridge is expected to be completed in 1984 at an estimated total cost of \$35 million. An amount of \$1 million was provided in 1979–80, and \$10 million is expected to be made available in 1980–81.

Railway Mainline Upgrading Projects

Over the period to 1982-83, the Government is providing assistance to those States which operate their own rail systems for expenditure on projects designed to upgrade the national mainline railway network. Up to \$70 million will be made available for this purpose by way of interest bearing repayable grants under the National Railway Network (Financial Assistance) Act 1979.

South Australia and Tasmania are not eligible for assistance under this program as their mainline railways have been transferred to the Commonwealth and are controlled by the Australian National Railways Commission.

An allocation of \$19.7 million has been made in 1980–81 for the program. Agreements have been concluded with Queensland and Victoria specifying the terms and conditions which will apply and the actual projects to be assisted in those States. Provision of assistance to New South Wales and Western Australia is subject to the finalisation of agreements with those States. Preliminary consideration suggests that in 1980–81, the third year of this program, possible allocations might be of the order of \$4.7 million, \$5.7 million, \$8.3 million and \$1 million to New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland and Western Australia respectively. While final decisions have yet to be made about the State-by-State distribution, these figures have been adopted for the purposes of this document. Payments made to relevant States since 1979–80 are given in Appendix V.

Adelaide-Crystal Brook Railway

An amount of \$863 000 has been provided in 1980-81 for South Australia at a refund of payments of interest and repayments of principal made under earlier arrangements concerning construction of the Adelaide to Crystal Brook railway. Responsibility for the construction of this railway is to be transferred from the State to the Australian National Railways Commission. The Loan Council has approved a borrowing program by the Commission for this project under the infrastructure guidelines.

Urban Public Transport

Since 1973-74 the Commonwealth has had a program whereby it meets two-thirds of the costs of approved urban public transport projects in the States.

The States Grants (Urban Public Transport) Act 1978 provided for grants totalling up to \$300 million to the States under this program over the five years 1978–79 to 1982–83. The Act initially made available for payment to the States a total of \$60 million a year, of which \$40 million was to be allocated to the States in fixed basic amounts with the remaining \$20 million available for allocation annually on the basis of needs and priorities assessed in the light of proposals submitted by the States. However, the Government limited payments in 1978–79 and 1979–80 to the basic amounts. The States Grants (Urban Public Transport) Amendment Act 1979 varied the basic amounts to \$45 million in 1980-81 and \$50 million in each of 1981–82 and 1982–83 by, in effect, absorbing into those amounts the 1978–79 needs component and part of the needs component for 1979–80. In 1980–81, the Government has again decided to limit the current year's payments to the basic amount as in previous years.

In 1979-80, \$42.1 million was provided including \$2.5 million to finalise outstanding commitments under previous arrangements. The amount for 1980-81. \$45.6 million, includes \$0.6 million in respect of commitments entered into in 1979-80 but not paid in that year.

Transport Planning and Research

For a number of years, funds have been made available for planning and research projects related to roads. Assistance was first provided for urban public transport planning and research in 1974–75.

Under the Transport Planning and Research (Financial Assistance) Act 1977, the Commonwealth met two-thirds of expenditure in 1977–78 on approved programs of projects and is meeting one-half of such expenditure by the States in subsequent years. The program now includes all land transport modes and their relationship with other modes. For 1980–81 a total program of \$12.5 million is expected to be approved with the Commonwealth's share amounting to \$6.25 million.

ECONOMIC SERVICES—WATER SUPPLY AND ELECTRICITY

Urban Water Supply

Payments amounting to \$35.4 million have been provided to South Australia since 1974–75 under the *Urban and Regional Development (Financial Assistance)*Act 1974 to assist with the construction of water treatment plants in the Adelaide metropolitan area. Of this amount, \$2.6 million was paid in 1979–80. In 1979–80 the Commonwealth also provided to Western Australia \$690,000 to assist in the development of a supplementary water supply for Port Hedland to relieve pressure on existing water supply sources, and \$500,000 to assist in the provision of additional water supplies for the West Pilbara region. Further funds in 1980–81 for such purposes may be provided from funds which have yet to be allocated to particular projects under the National Water Resources Program (see page 74).

Julius Dam

A grant of \$250 000 was provided to Queensland in 1979-80 under the National Water Resources program for on-passing to the Mount Isa City Council as the final instalment of Commonwealth assistance towards the Council's share of the debt burden associated with the now-completed Julius Dam. Similar grants of \$325 000 and \$500 000 were made in 1977-78 and 1978-79 respectively.

ECONOMIC SERVICES—INDUSTRY ASSISTANCE AND DEVELOPMENT

Softwood Forestry

From 1966-67 until 1976-77 the Commonwealth provided assistance to the States by way of interest-bearing loans for a program of increased planting it softwood forests.

Under the Softwood Forestry Agreements Act 1978 the Commonwealth agreed to provide assistance for a further five-year period commencing 1 July 1977 to cover the cost of maintenance of existing forestry planting financed by earlier Commonwealth assistance. The assistance, which is by way of loans, is repayable over twenty years with repayment commencing fifteen years after the date of each advance.

Payments made in 1979-80 totalled \$5.1 million. It is estimated that \$4.9 million will be provided in 1980-81.

Assistance to the Forestry Industry in Tasmania

The Commonwealth has agreed to provide financial assistance to Tasmania amounting to \$680 000 over the five years 1978–79 to 1982–83 toward the cost of establishing some small plantations and certain silviculture projects involving native trees. This assistance is being supplemented by a further \$400 000 over the four years 1979–80 to 1982–83 for the establishment of eucalypt plantations of marginal farmland and a program of purchase of such farmland.

The assistance, by way of loans on a \$1 for \$1 matching basis, is to be repayable over 40 years commencing 20 years after each advance is made. During the 20 years in which repayments are deferred, interest is to be capitalised.

Payments to 1979-80 have amounted to \$272 000, and \$336 000 is expected to be provided in 1980-81.

Rural Adjustment

In accordance with an agreement reached between the Commonwealth and the States in 1976, assistance is being made available under the States Grants (Rush Adjustment) Act 1976, partly as grants and partly as loans, for the purposes of Rural Adjustment Scheme embracing debt reconstruction, farm build-up, farm improvement, carry-on finance, rehabilitation and household support. The scheme

replaced the Rural Reconstruction Scheme, the Dairy Adjustment Program and the program of Carry-on Assistance to the Beef Industry, all of which were terminated on 31 December 1976.

The scheme is monitored constantly by the Commonwealth and the States and amended as required to maintain its relevance in the light of changing adjustment needs in the rural sector. Wine-grape producers became eligible in 1978–79 for carry-on finance assistance; assistance for beef and dairy producers was discontinued as from 1979–80.

Assistance under the Scheme in 1979-80 amounted to \$15.1 million and it is estimated that a further \$17.1 million will be provided in 1980-81.

Supplementary Assistance for Apple and Pear Growing Industries

In early 1974 the Commonwealth joined with Queensland, Western Australia and Tasmania, on a \$1 for \$1 matching basis, to supplement for the 1974 season the assistance available to the apple growing industry under the Commonwealth funded Apple and Pear Stabilisation Scheme. The supplementary arrangements were subsequently extended to cover the seasons 1975 to 1978. All States except New South Wales have participated in the arrangements at one time or another.

For the 1979 and 1980 seasons, the Commonwealth has offered to continue the supplementary assistance arrangements and to extend them to the pear

growing industry. Payments to the States amounted to \$689 000 in 1979-80 and it is estimated that \$950 000 will be made available in 1980-81. Arrangement to apply for the seasons 1981 to 1984 are currently subject to review.

International Sugar Agreement

The International Sugar Agreement Act 1978 approved Australia's ratification of an Agreement which seeks to stabilise international trade in raw sugar through the management of special reserve stocks and the imposition of export quotas.

The International Monetary Fund has agreed to provide drawings from its Buffer Stock Financing Facility to export members of the Agreement to assist in financing the acquisition costs of their stockholding obligations, and a foreign currency drawing equivalent to \$27.8 million was made by the Commonwealth in November 1979 and on-lent to the sugar industry through the Queensland Government. The local industry's special stock holdings were released for sale in February 1980 following a sharp increase in world sugar market prices, and the Commonwealth was required to repay the International Monetary Fund drawing in May 1980. The \$A equivalent of the foreign currency drawing at that date was \$27.4 million and this amount, together with accrued interest, will be recovered from the State in 1980–81.

Eradication of Bovine Brucellosis and Tuberculosis

Since 1970 the Commonwealth has joined with the States in an intensified national campaign for the eradication of bovine brucellosis and tuberculosis. The Commonwealth has agreed to provide \$18.9 million during 1980–81 as payments to the States for this purpose.

In 1973 the Commonwealth joined with the mainland States in a scheme to compensate partially owners of livestock slaughtered following positive reaction to bovine tuberculosis tests, and, from July 1976, joined with these States in a bovine brucellosis slaughter compensation scheme. An estimated \$3.6 million is to be paid to the States for this purpose in 1980–81.

Control and Eradication of Exotic Animal Diseases

Under long-standing agreements between the Commonwealth and the States in respect of outbreaks of a number of exotic animal diseases, \$11 273 was paid to Queensland in 1979-80 in respect of an outbreak of bluetongue disease. A payment of \$67 000 to Tasmania is expected in 1980-81 in respect of a recent outbreak of vesicular disease in pigs in that State.

Control and Eradication of Plant Pests

The Commonwealth agreed in 1978 to provide \$450 000 to South Australia to assist that State in defraying some costs of its blue and spotted lucerne aphid control programs. A final payment of \$143 000 was made in 1979-80.

New South Wales was paid \$65 500 in 1979-80 under an agreement to match contributions by all States for the eradication of an outbreak of warehouse beetle in that State.

Extension Services Grants

From 1948–49 annual grants have been made to the States to promote improved practices in the dairy industry and from 1952–53 further grants have been provided for development in the States of agricultural advisory services generally. In addition to the payments to the States, a small amount is expended directly by the Commonwealth on projects of national importance.

Agricultural Research Grants

Commonwealth Special Research Grants have been made to the States since 1960-61 to finance special investigation projects of a new, limited nature, usually on a \$1 for \$1 matching basis with the States and/or industry. Grants amounted to \$94 000 in 1979-80 and are estimated at \$82 000 in 1980-81. For 1980-81 it is expected that \$200 000 will also be made available for projects sponsored by the Australian Agricultural Council under a separate program. \$127 000 was provided in this manner in 1979-80.

Assistance to the Mount Lyell Mining and Railway Company Limited
Repayments were made in 1979–80 of all outstanding assistance provided to Tasmania towards meeting previous cash deficits of the copper mining operations of the Mount Lyell Mining and Railway Company Limited at Queenstown.

Assistance to the Chrysotile Corporation of Australia

The New South Wales Grant (Chrysotile Corporation) Act 1978 provides for the Commonwealth to provide funds to New South Wales towards meeting the cash deficit of the Chrysotile Corporation's asbestos mine at Barraba for the period 1 October 1978 to 31 December 1979, on a \$1 for \$1 basis with the State, up to a maximum of \$1.4 million. An advance of \$1.2 million was made in 1979–80 in respect of that period, and the balance of \$0.2 million is to be paid in 1980–81. A further \$1 million is expected to be paid in 1980–81 under a separate arrangement.

Launceston Precision Tool Annexe

\$0.34 million was offered to the Tasmanian Government in 1979–80 to facilitate the re-establishment of the Launceston Precision Tool Annexe and the full amount is expected to be paid in 1980–81. The assistance is repayable over 10 years.

Water Resources Management and Development

The Commonwealth has for many years provided financial assistance to the States for water related purposes. Depending on these purposes, this assistance has communder a number of functional headings. While the following tables group all of

the relevant assistance together, several projects are dealt with elsewhere in this paper and in the Statements attached to the Budget Speech under their appropriate functional headings.

In November 1977, the Commonwealth established a National Water Resources Program to provide funds for water related purposes over the five years 1978–79 to 1982–83. (Assistance to the Northern Territory for these purposes will also be provided under this program from 1980–81.) The Commonwealth has indicated its intention to contribute \$200 million over the duration of the program.

The program encompasses the provision of funds to the States by way of grants and/or loans for programs, projects or activities of national significance or in special circumstances, for:

- urban and rural water supplies and water re-use;
- flood mitigation and flood plain management;
- problems representing a threat to long-term use of existing water resources;
- water resources assessment and control; and
- regional planning and management investigations.

Details of assistance provided to the States in 1979-80, amounting in total to \$20.9 million including \$4.8 million dealt with under other functional headings, are given in the table below. For details of assistance in previous years, see Appendix V and earlier issues of this paper.

It is estimated that, of \$29.4 million to be provided under the National Water Resources Program in 1980-81, an amount of \$26.1 million will be provided to the States (and \$1.9 million to the Northern Territory). Of this amount an estimated \$387 000 is to be made available for investigations and construction of rice storage facilities associated with the Ord Irrigation Scheme and \$126 000 for urban flood mitigation works on the Brisbane creeks; the remaining \$25.6 million has not yet been allocated. The balance of \$1.3 million under the Program in 1980-81, not classified as payments to the States and the Northern Territory, is to be allocated to meet the Commonwealth's contribution to the River Murray Commission (\$763 000), reimbursement to the Bureau of Meteorology for water resources assessment work undertaken on behalf of the States (\$90 000), the Australian Water Resources Council's research program (\$475 000), and the Burdekin Ecology Study (\$20 000).

Burdekin Dam Project

It was announced in June 1980 that the Commonwealth Government has agreed in principle to assist the Queensland Government in the construction of the Burdekin Dam. When complete the project will provide irrigation for an additional 45 125 hectares adjacent to the existing Burdekin Irrigation Area for sugar. rice and horticultural production. Commonwealth and State officers are currently preparing a report to the two Governments on possible financing arrangements for the project.

ECONOMIC SERVICES—LABOUR AND EMPLOYMENT

Coal Mining Industry—Long Service Leave

In those States where coal miners have been awarded long service leave by industrial tribunals, the State Governments reimburse employers the cost of this leave. The Commonwealth, in turn, reimburses the States for the amounts paid and the administrative costs incurred by them in giving effect to these arrangements.

The funds required for these purposes are obtained from an excise imposed on coal production under the *Coal Excise Act* 1949. The excise is currently 15 cents per tonne of which an amount equivalent to 10 cents per tonne is appropriated to a Trust Fund under the *States Grants (Coal Mining Industry Long Service Leave) Act* 1949. Payments are made to the States from the Trust Fund. The balance of the excise is applied to coal research.

Apprenticeship Training

Since 1971–72 the Commonwealth and the States have collaborated in several schemes to improve and extend apprenticeship training. In 1979–80 the Commonwealth provided \$1.1 million to meet costs incurred by the States in employing apprentices surplus to requirements. \$120 000 has been made available in 1980–81 by way of a final payment. The reduction is due mainly to the phasing out of this program and its replacement by other manpower and training schemes. A notional distribution of payments to the States for 1980–81 is included in the following table, but no commitment to the provision of these amounts is implied.

Education Program for Unemployed Youth

Under the Education Program for Unemployed Youth the Commonwealth provides funds to the States to conduct courses to improve the skills and motivation of the young unemployed, particularly those with low or inadequate educational qualifications. Similar programs are also being supported under the School-to-Work Transition Program which is referred to earlier in this paper under Education.

In 1979-80 \$3.5 million was paid to the States under the program and the Government has decided to provide \$3.8 million in 1980-81. In addition, almost \$4.2 million will be provided as living allowances to trainees under this scheme in 1980-81. This amount forms part of the allocation for allowances under the National Employment and Training Scheme and is not classified as a payment to the States.

GENERAL PUBLIC SERVICES

Law, Order and Public Safety

Promotion of Road Safety Practices

In each year from 1947–48, grants have been made to the States to assist in the financing of public education programs for the promotion of road safety practices. Since 1970–71 the annual grants to the States have totalled \$150 000 and the distribution between States has also remained constant. The amounts are given in Appendix V.

Research Grants

Since 1965-66 the Commonwealth has made grants to the States for research projects on the recommendation of the Australian Research Grants Committee. An outline of developments over the period 1965 to 1975 was given in Appendix IV of the 1975-76 issue of this paper.

An amount of \$12.3 million was provided in 1979–80. Payments in 1980–81 and future years will be made directly to the individual researchers through the research institutions and will not, therefore, be classified as payments to or for the States. Payments made to each State from 1976–77 to 1979–80 are given in Appendix V.

ASSISTANCE FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Commencing in 1976–77 local government authorities have participated in the income tax sharing arrangements introduced in 1976. Details of these arrangements as well as other schemes of assistance, insofar as they affect local government authorities, are given in Chapter VI.

ASSISTANCE FOR NATURAL DISASTER RELIEF

Commonwealth assistance for natural disaster relief is provided under the natural disaster relief arrangements. These long standing arrangements provide for Commonwealth financial assistance to help the States (and the Northern Territory) meet the sometimes large and unpredictable costs of providing natural disaster assistance within their areas. The arrangements recognise the States' primary responsibility for the administration, provision and funding of relief measures, while providing for Commonwealth assistance with the costs of certain standard measures on a reasonable cost sharing basis.

Under the arrangements the Commonwealth meets, on a \$1 for \$1 basis, State expenditures on standard measures for the immediate relief of personal hardship and distress, except where such expenditure is of a very minor nature. Such expenditures may cover provision of emergency food, clothing and accommodation and essential repairs to houses to make them habitable and secure.

The Commonwealth also assists in meeting, on a \$3 Commonwealth to \$1 State basis, State expenditures on other relief and restoration measures in the case of 'major' disasters where it is considered beyond the capacity of the State concerned to meet these expenditures from its own resources. Under the arrangements a State is responsible for meeting in full expenditures in a year up to its prescribed base amount. The existing base contributions, set in 1978–79, are:

Major disasters are defined as those necessitating expenditures on standard relief and restoration measures in excess of one-tenth of a State's base annual expenditure.

The standard measures which attract Commonwealth assistance under the arrangements, are as follows:

- (a) grants for relief of personal hardship and distress (cyclones, floods, storms and bushfires);
- (b) grants for restoration of public assets and emergency protection and repair works by State, local and semi-government authorities (disasters as in (a));
- (c) concessional loans to small businesses (cyclones and floods);
- (d) concessional loans to churches, sporting associations and other voluntary non-profit organisations (disasters as in (c));

- (e) concessional loans to primary producers for carry-on, restocking and restoration purposes (cyclones, floods, storms, bushfires and droughts);
- (f) freight subsidies for primary producers (disasters as in (e));
- (g) subsidies for carriage of water to central dispersal points for primary producers (drought); and
- (h) assistance to State, local and semi-government authorities for the disposal of helpless and unsaleable stock (floods, bushfires and droughts).

As a result of the inclusion of the measures listed above in the arrangements, the States are able to assume that relief expenditure incurred in respect of these measures will be eligible for Commonwealth assistance following specified major disasters. If a State wishes to change the terms of previously applied standard measures (e.g. the size of concessional loans), it is required to seek Commonwealth approval. It also remains open to a State to request Commonwealth agreement to a non-standard measure which it may wish to implement for a particular disaster.

Table 99 in Appendix III shows payments that have been made to each State since 1976–77 in respect of various types of disaster (drought, flood, storm, cyclone and bushfires). Reflecting the differing incidence of disasters, the amounts vary considerably from one State to another and from one year to another. Assistance to the States for natural disaster relief in 1979–80 was mainly in respect of drought and cyclones in both Western Australia and Queensland.

The following table shows payments to the States from 1976–77, including estimated payments in 1980–81. Table 100 gives a more detailed breakdown of payments from 1975–76 to 1979–80. Details of payments for natural disaster relief and restoration purposes in previous years are included in Table 158 of the 1975–76 issue of this document.

CHAPTER V—PAYMENTS TO THE NORTHERN TERRITORY

On 1 July 1978 the Northern Territory of Australia became a self-governing Territory under the Northern Territory (Self-Government) Act 1978. Under this and associated legislation (and regulations thereunder) the Territory has expenditure responsibilities and revenue raising powers broadly approximating those of a State (though, of course, the Territory is not a State under the Constitution).

FUNCTIONS TRANSFERRED

The Legislative Assembly of the Northern Territory has power, with the assent of the Administrator or Governor-General, to make laws 'for the peace, order and good government of the Territory' and the Ministers of the Territory have executive authority in respect of the following main matters:

Remuneration, allowances and other entitlements in respect of services of Members of the Legislative Assembly, Members of the Executive Council and Ministers of the Territory

Territory insurance

Territory banking

Taxation, including stamp duty

Provision of rural, industrial and home finance credit and assistance

The Public Service of the Territory

Maintenance of law and order and the administration of justice (including legal aid and correctional services)

Police

Private law

Administration of estates and trusts

Civil liberties

Inquiries and administrative reviews (including matters relating to a Territory ombudsman)

Markets and marketing

Corporate affairs

Marketable securities

Consumer affairs

Sales and leases of goods, supply of services, and security interests in or over goods

Prices and rent control

Industry (including forestry, fisheries, pastoral, agricultural, building and manufacturing)

Regulation of businesses and professions

Tourism

Printing and publishing

Labour relations (including training and apprenticeship, workers' compensation and compulsory insurance or indemnity therefor)

Industrial safety

Mining and minerals (excluding uranium but including gases and hydrocarbon fuels)

Land, public and private (including internal waters)

Land use, planning and development

Surface transport regulation (including traffic control, carriers, roads and bridges, vehicle registration and compulsory third party insurance, driver licensing and road safety)

Ports and harbours

Environment protection and conservation (including parks, reserves and gardens, and preservation of historical objects and areas)

OUTLINE OF FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS

The financial arrangements between the Commonwealth and the Northern Territory are set out in a Memorandum of Understanding agreed between the Commonwealth and Northern Territory Governments. This section summarises the main features of the arrangements which have applied from 1 July 1979, when State-type arrangements were introduced. Particulars of transitional financial arrangements for 1977–78 and 1978–79 are contained in the 1978–79 and 1979–80 issues of this paper.

Funds Available to the Northern Territory on a State-type Basis-1979-80 and 1980-81

As from 1 July 1979 the Northern Territory receives a tax sharing entitlement, a local government tax sharing entitlement, and specific purpose payments, under arrangements similar to those that apply in the case of the States. In addition, the Territory receives from the Commonwealth general purpose capital assistance comprising one-third grant and two-thirds loan on the same terms and conditions as apply to the State Governments Loan Council programs.

The Northern Territory Government and its authorities are empowered to borrow subject to Loan Council arrangements and procedures. Individual borrowings may be guaranteed by the Commonwealth.

The general approach which has been followed in settling the financial arrangements is described in the Memorandum of Understanding in the following words:

'General Approach

16. The first step will be to settle an overall amount for revenue assistance (ie assistance for recurrent expenditures) for the Northern Territory in year 1 (the first year of operation of the State-type financial model), an overall amount for capital assistance for year 1 and an appropriate borrowing program under the umbrella of the Commonwealth's semi-government borrowing program for year 1 within the Loan Council arrangements.

17. The second step will be to dissect the overall amounts of revenue and capital assistance for year 1 into various categories of payments and to specify

the terms and conditions which will apply to the payments.

18. The overall amounts referred to in paragraph 16 above will be settled having regard to the levels of the relevant provisions in the years preceding year 1, and the special needs of the Territory. It should be noted, however, that the overall amount for revenue assistance could, in effect, be determined by any special grant paid after inquiry and recommendation by the Commonwealth Grants Commission, and in the case of the semi-government borrowing program, the figure ultimately will be determined by the Loan Council.

19. The Commonwealth has given an assurance that Commonwealth assistance to the Northern Territory will be sufficient to maintain standards of service at an overall equivalent to that presently provided pending the examination by the Grants Commission, of the Territory's current revenue and expenditures, this on the understanding that the Territory will make a reasonable revenue

raising effort.

20. The terms and conditions attaching to the various payments referred to in paragraph 17 above will in appropriate cases include a formula for determining the levels of assistance in the years beyond year 1. In other cases the level of assistance in those years will be determined by the Commonwealth in the context of its priorities and its own budgetary constraints and in the light of the needs of the Territory. These are similar to the arrangements which apply between the Commonwealth and the States.'

Special Grant and Additional Assistance Grant

The Northern Territory has been given access to the Commonwealth Grants Commission on the same basis as a claimant State, that is, it is eligible to apply for a special grant on the recommendation of the Grants Commission.

Under the agreed arrangements between the Commonwealth and Northern Territory Governments, however, an additional assistance grant of \$20 million is payable in each of the first three years of operation of the State-type financial arrangements; this will be phased out over the following three years to 1984–85. The additional assistance grant is intended to ensure that over the transition period total Commonwealth funds to the Territory are at a level commensurate with historical levels; special grants are based on comparison with the States.

An additional assistance grant will not be payable in a year in which a special grant is recommended for payment if such special grant exceeds the additional grant otherwise payable. The intention is that in these initial years the Territory should receive *either* a special grant or an additional grant, whichever is greater.

Assistance for Expenditure on Aboriginals

Overall responsibility for policy planning and co-ordination in respect of Aboriginal affairs remains with the Commonwealth. However, a considerable part of expenditure in the Territory on various transferred functions is directed towards Aboriginals. Allowance for continued relatively high per capita expenditure on the Aboriginal people of the Northern Territory will be made by means of the normal general purpose and specific purpose Commonwealth assistance provided to the Northern Territory. The Northern Territory Government has agreed to give full consideration to the needs of the Aboriginal people in setting its expenditure priorities.

Mineral Revenues

Special arrangements have been entered into in relation to mineral revenues, the principal features being as follows. Ownership of minerals other than uranium is vested in the Crown in the right of the Northern Territory which will have the right to collect royalties. The Commonwealth will continue to make payments into the Aboriginal Trust Account in accordance with the Aboriginal Land Rights (Northern Territory) Act 1976 and on this basis a once-for-all adjustment was made to the Northern Territory tax sharing entitlement for 1979–80. The Commonwealth will retain ownership of uranium but will make an additional grant to the Northern Territory of an amount in lieu of uranium royalties at a rate of $1\frac{1}{4}$ per cent of the value of production less certain allowable deductions.

Transfer of Assets

Assets transferred to the Northern Territory under the provisions of section 69 of the Northern Territory (Self-Government) Act 1978 did not attract a capital liability payable to the Commonwealth except in the case of the assets associated with the following items, in respect of which there is a capital liability as indicated.

- (a) Staff Housing
 - Each dwelling transferred to the Northern Territory attracts a capital liability of \$19 000 repayable over 53 years from the date of transfer at an interest rate of 5 per cent per annum.
- (b) Northern Territory Housing Commission

 The capital liability of the Northern Territory Housing Commission as at 30 June 1978 and the terms and conditions applying to the advances comprising that liability have been assumed by the Northern Territory.

(c) Electricity Supply

Assets have been transferred at a valuation of \$55.983 million, repayable over 20 years at 9.7 per cent which was the long-term private semi-governmental interest rate current at the transfer on 1 July 1978.

(d) Water Supply and Sewerage
Assets have been transferred at a valuation of \$16 million repayable at an annual redemption of 0.85 per cent plus interest at 5 per cent per annum.

PAYMENTS TO THE NORTHERN TERRITORY AND BORROWINGS BY NORTHERN TERRITORY AUTHORITIES IN 1979–80 AND 1980–81

From 1 July 1979, in accordance with the Memorandum of Understanding, funds have been provided under various categories of general and specific purpose assistance, under arrangements which are based on those with the States. These detailed categories of assistance for 1979–80 and 1980–81 do not correspond with the transitional arrangements that applied in 1977–78 and 1978–79 and consequently year to year comparisons of the figures can only be made at a very broad level of aggregation and have limited value. (Details of arrangements relating to these earlier years are contained in the 1978–79 and 1979–80 issues of this paper.)

The table immediately following shows payments to the Northern Territory, borrowing programs by or on behalf of Northern Territory authorities, and interest paid by the Northern Territory to the Commonwealth for 1979–80 and estimates for 1980–81. The succeeding table gives details of the main categories on a per capita basis.

General Purpose Payments

General purpose payments to the Northern Territory comprise general purpose revenue payments (tax sharing entitlement, additional assistance grant and grant in lieu of uranium royalties) and general purpose capital payments (provided on terms and conditions analogous to those applying to the State Government Loan Council programs). The general purpose payments for 1979–80 were determined in accordance with the Memorandum of Understanding on the basis of residuals after the allocation of specific purpose payments from within a global figure for financial assistance.

The Memorandum of Understanding provides formulae for determining the tax sharing entitlements and the general purpose capital payments in years subsequent to 1979-80.

In accordance with the relevant formula, the tax sharing entitlement for 1980-81 is calculated by changing the 1979-80 entitlement in proportion to net personal income tax collections in Australia (lagged by one year) and the population of the Northern Territory. On this basis, and taking into account

(b) the estimated cost of known functions to be transferred and arrangements to apply in 1980-81,

the estimate of the Northern Territory's tax sharing entitlement in 1980-81 is \$269.1 million, compared to an entitlement of \$208.9 million in 1979-80.

The Northern Territory Government will receive additional general revenue assistance as a grant in lieu of uranium royalties at a rate of 1½ per cent of the value of production less certain allowable deductions. This grant was agreed to on the basis that its payment would be conditional on the Northern Territory ensuring that the terms of stamp duties and similar charges applying to mining agreements or to financial transactions in respect of such agreements are in line with those that apply in the States. The first payment (estimated to be \$0.9 million) is to be made in 1980–81.

The level of the general purpose capital payment for 1980–81 is calculated by changing the 1979–80 payment (adjusted to take account of the full-year effect of functions transferred to the Northern Territory in 1979–80) by 5 per cent, corresponding to the increase in State Government Loan Council programs (excluding any special additions). On this basis, the general purpose capital payment for 1980–81 is \$114.9 million. The payment in 1979–80 was \$107.4 million.

As in the case of the analogous payments to the States, one-third of the general purpose capital payments to the Northern Territory is paid as a capital grant. The remaining two-thirds is provided at the same rates of interest as the States pay on their corresponding borrowing programs and the Territory is liable to make payments to the Commonwealth analogous to the Sinking Fund liabilities of the States under the Financial Agreement. (As noted below, debt charges assistance is provided to the Territory to enable it to meet these charges.)

For 1979–80 the Commonwealth Grants Commission recommended an advance special grant of \$10 million for the Territory. Since the recommended special grant was less than \$20 million, the Territory received an additional assistance grant of \$20 million in 1979–80 under arrangements set out in the Memorandum of Understanding and summarised above. In accordance with the Grants Commission's usual procedure, a completion grant in respect of 1979–80 will be recommended in 1981–82 on the basis of detailed examination of the Territory's audited accounts for 1979–80. The Territory has not applied for a special grant for 1980–81 and therefore will receive the additional assistance grant of \$20 million in that year.

Specific Purpose Payments

In accordance with the Memorandum of Understanding, the Northern Territory is eligible for specific purpose assistance in respect of all relevant forms of assistance provided to the States under section 96 of the Constitution under terms and conditions similar to those applying to the States (see Chapter IV). The Northern Territory may also receive other forms of specific purpose assistance on terms and conditions agreed with the Commonwealth. Assistance estimated to be provided in 1980–81 and payments in 1979–80 are shown in Table 58.

Further details are set out below for cases where there are special features.

Northern Territory Electricity Commission—Subsidy

Under the Memorandum of Understanding between the Commonwealth and the Northern Territory, the Commonwealth is to provide a subsidy for the operations of the Commission up to 1981–82 based on the difference between estimated operating costs and the revenue the Commission would receive if it had applied average North Queensland tariffs. The payment in respect of that year is subject to subsequent variation by either the addition to the subsidy estimate of half the amount by which the operating loss based on this revenue assumption in that year exceeds the estimated loss or the reduction of the subsidy estimate by half the amount by which that operating loss in a year falls short of the estimated loss. The 1980–81 estimate of \$48 million represents an increase of \$18 million on the 1979–80 estimate, due mainly to increased oil costs. The Commonwealth and Northern Territory Governments have agreed to a re-examination of the subsidy arrangements during 1980–81.

Debt Charges

The Territory receives from the Commonwealth funds analogous to the State Government Loan Council programs and is required to meet debt charges on a portion of these funds under terms and conditions analogous to those that apply to the States' program. It has been agreed that in the early years of self-government the Commonwealth will make specific purpose payments to the Northern Territory equal to those debt charges. The estimated payment in 1980–81 is \$10.6 million compared with \$1.6 million in 1979–80. The rise in the Territory's interest payment reflects the fact that at the time of self-government the Territory had virtually no debt and therefore no debt charges to meet. The figures are also influenced by the timing of interest payments over the two years involved.

Aboriginal Sacred Sites Protection Authority

Included in the 1980–81 estimates is an amount of \$223 000 for payment to the Aboriginal Sacred Sites Protection Authority in the Northern Territory, compared with \$64 000 in 1979–80. This body processes applications by Aboriginals for the registration of sacred sites and has a responsibility to undertake the protection of such sites in accordance with the provisions of the Aboriginal Sacred Sites Ordinance 1978 of the Northern Territory.

Jabiru Township—Contribution to Social Infrastructure

The Commonwealth has undertaken to reimburse the Northern Territory Government for additional capital or other expenditure, arising from the proposed uranium developments, to the extent that such expenditure is incurred by the Northern Territory Government in accordance with prior specific arrangements agreed between the two Governments. In 1980–81 expenditure of \$10 million is estimated as being payable by the Commonwealth for approved State-type social infrastructure at Jabiru Township under this arrangement.

CHAPTER VI—PAYMENTS TO OR FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES

Local government authorities in Australia (except in the Northern Territory) are established under Acts of the State Parliaments for the purpose of providing certain public services within defined geographical boundaries. The functions of these authorities differ significantly between States and, indeed, within States.

Prior to 1973 no Commonwealth assistance was provided specifically for local government in the States. Successive Commonwealth Governments had taken the view that as local authorities were constituted and functioned under State laws, it was the responsibility of the State Governments to assess and provide for the needs of local government in the light of local government's overall responsibilities and the revenue raising resources available to it. The Commonwealth, for its part, provided general purpose funds to the States to assist in the financing of all the States' expenditure responsibilities, including in the local government area.

(There were, however, over this period, and there continue to be a number of Commonwealth programs under which local authorities are among the bodies eligible for assistance either directly or through the States. Details of payments under these programs are provided later in this Chapter.)

The major developments concerning Commonwealth assistance for local government in recent years are summarized below.

While the borrowing arrangements of local government authorities do not involve Commonwealth payments to or for such authorities, this Chapter includes material on such funds because of their relevance in the general context of intergovernment financial relations.

Then follows an outline of various Commonwealth programs involving payments to or for local government authorities. Payments to or for local government authorities in the Northern Territory are described in a separate section in this Chapter.

The Chapter ends with a summary of the various forms of payments in the years 1976-77 to 1980-81.

Particulars of programs in respect of which expenditures were not made in 1979-80 nor are expected to be made in 1980-81 but which involved expenditures in earlier years may be found in previous issues of this paper.

GENERAL PURPOSE ASSISTANCE PROVIDED ON ADVICE OF THE GRANTS COMMISSION

In 1973 the Commonwealth Parliament passed the Grants Commission Act 1973 repealing the Commonwealth Grants Commission Act 1933. The 1973 Act, inter alia, laid down procedures for regional organisations of local government to apply for financial assistance from the Commonwealth and for such applications to be the subject of inquiry and report by the Grants Commission. It also provided that the grants to the States for local authorities should be provided in such a way as to promote financial equality between local authorities and regional groupings of such authorities.

After consideration of written and oral submissions and evidence from interested parties, the Commission recommended grants for local government totalling \$56 345 000 in 1974–75 and \$79 908 000 in 1975–76, and further recommended that the grants be paid without conditions attached as to their use by local government authorities. The Commonwealth accepted the Commission's recommendations in both years. The payments were made in the first instance to State Governments for transmission to individual local government authorities in the amounts specified.

These arrangements were replaced in 1976 by the tax sharing arrangements described below, and the Grants Commission ceased to be responsible for recommending amounts to be paid to specific local authorities or regional groups (Commonwealth Grants Commission Act 1976).

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE UNDER THE TAX SHARING ARRANGEMENTS

As noted in Chapter II, the sharing of personal income tax between the Commonwealth, the States and local government represents a central element in the Government's Federalism policy.

The arrangements agreed in 1976 between the Commonwealth and the States for the sharing of personal income tax collections with local government, and subsequently incorporated in the Local Government (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act 1976, are broadly as follows:

- each year local government in the States will be entitled to a fixed percentage of net personal income tax collections in the previous year;
- the amount so derived will be divided amongst the States in specified proportions which are subject to recommendation by the Commonwealth Grants Commission:
- each State will allocate a minimum of 30 per cent of the assistance among its local authorities on a basis which takes into account the respective populations of those local authorities, but which may also take into account the respective sizes and the respective population densities, and any other matters agreed upon between the Commonwealth and the State concerned.
- the remaining assistance will be allocated among the local authorities, having regard to their respective financial needs, on the recommendation of State Grants Commissions.

In 1979-80 the Local Government (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act 1973 was amended on two occasions. The effect of these amendments was to increase the share of net personal income tax collections allocated to local government in the States from 1.52 per cent to 1.75 per cent in 1979-80, and to 2 per cent 1980-81. The increases fulfil the Prime Minister's undertaking given in November 1977 to raise the entitlement to 2 per cent over the following three years.

The Act provides for the assistance to be distributed amongst the States as follows:

Borrowing Arrangements for Local Government Authorities

As explained in Chapter III, the borrowings of Commonwealth and State Government authorities, including those of local government authorities, come within the purview of the Loan Council. Under the Gentlemen's Agreement, the Loan Council determines maximum interest rates and other terms and conditions of loans raised by authorities and approves annual total borrowing programs for the 'larger' authorities (since 1979–80 those authorities borrowing more than \$1.2 million in a year) of the Commonwealth and of each State. These borrowings are arranged by the individual authorities, with guarantees and other assistance being provided in some cases by the Government concerned. 'Smaller' authorities are not subject to any aggregate borrowing program restraint, but are subject to the Loan Council's decisions on the permissible terms and conditions for their borrowings.

Borrowings by Local Government Authorities 1979-80 and 1980-81

The table following shows aggregate borrowings by all 'larger' and 'smaller' authorities in 1979-80 and the amounts borrowed within these aggregates by local government authorities, together with corresponding estimates for 1980-81.

(Figures for earlier years are given in Appendix II.) It will be seen that a considerable proportion of, but not all, borrowings in the 'smaller' authorities category are made by local government authorities. It will be seen also that the amounts of borrowings by local government authorities vary markedly between the States (after taking account of differences in population). This reflects a number of factors including, importantly, variations between the States in the functions allocated to local government. As an example, the particularly high figures for Queensland reflect in part the large borrowings by the Brisbane City Council, which carries out a number of functions (e.g. sewerage) which in other States are undertaken by semi-government authorities.

Under the financial arrangements applying between the Commonwealth and the Northern Territory from 1 July 1978, Northern Territory semi-government and local authorities are subject to the Loan Council arrangements applying to Commonwealth authorities; individual borrowings may be guaranteed by the Commonwealth in appropriate circumstances—see Chapter V.

COMMONWEALTH PAYMENTS MADE DIRECT TO LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES

There are no Commonwealth programs of direct payments to local government authorities designed for the specific purpose of providing financial assistance to these authorities.

There are, however, a number of programs under which local government authorities are among bodies that are eligible for, and have received, Commonwealth assistance paid direct to them. The programs concerned are summarized below. Wide variations between the States in the amounts paid under particular programs reflect, amongst other things, differences in the extent to which the activities concerned are carried out by local government authorities rather than by private organisations or by State Government departments or agencies.

Nursing Homes

In 1974–75 the Commonwealth Government introduced a scheme under which religious, charitable and other non-profit organisations conducting nursing homes may receive assistance from the Commonwealth Government in meeting deficits incurred in running the homes.

Local government authorities operating nursing homes on a non-profit basis are eligible to participate in this scheme, and authorities in three States—New South Wales, South Australia and Western Australia—are presently participating in the scheme. It is estimated that an amount of \$1.2 million will be provided to meet the operating deficits of these nursing homes in 1980–81. Details of payments are set out in the following table:

Home Nursing

Under the *Home Nursing Subsidy Act* 1956 organisations (other than profit-making bodies and bodies conducted or controlled by a State Government) conducting home nursing services are eligible for annual subsidies depending on the number of nurses employed on home nursing duties. The amount of Commonwealth Government assistance cannot exceed the amount received by the organisation from a State Government and/or a local government authority.

Local government authorities in New South Wales and Tasmania have received assistance under this scheme. The only local government authorities to participate since 1976–77, however, have been in New South Wales. The amounts of grants

that have been paid to such authorities since 1976-77 and estimates for 1980-33 are as follows: 1976-77, \$193 000; 1977-78, \$223 000; 1978-79, \$290 000; 1979-80, \$394 000; 1980-81, \$450 000 (estimate).

Aged or Disabled Persons Homes

Under the Aged or Disabled Persons Homes Act 1954, local government authorities along with religious, charitable and certain other organisations, are eligible to receive assistance for the capital and operating costs associated with the provision of certain kinds of accommodation for the aged.

The rate of subsidy is \$2 for \$1 up to a maximum subsidy of \$12 100 for a single unit and \$14 035 for a double unit plus a maximum of \$1920 a unit for land. The subsidies are reviewed periodically.

In 1969 the Act was amended to provide for the payment of personal care subsidies in respect of persons aged eighty years and over resident in hostel accommodation and receiving personal care services provided by an approved organisation. In 1973 the subsidy was extended to hostel residents aged less than eighty years who require, and are receiving, approved personal care. The subsidy is presently \$15 a week.

The greater part of the capital grants under this Act is paid to organisations other than local government authorities. In 1979–80 local government authorities received \$1.7 million out of total capital grants of \$26.7 million. For 1980–81 it is estimated that local government authorities will receive \$3.0 million out of total estimated payments under the Act of \$29.9 million.

Aged Persons Hostels

Under the Aged Persons Hostels Act 1972, local government authorities along with religious, charitable and other organisations are eligible to receive assistance for the capital costs associated with the provision of hostel accommodation for the aged.

Subject to certain conditions, the Commonwealth Government meets the capital cost to eligible organisations of providing hostel accommodation up to a current maximum of \$18 150 per person. The subsidies are reviewed periodically. The Government also pays an additional grant of up to \$2400 per person for the purchase of land; a further \$250 per person is available for furnishings.

Local government authorities first received assistance under the Act in 1975-76. The following table shows grants paid to local government authorities since 1976-77 and estimated payments for 1980-81.

Delivered Meals Subsidy

Under the *Delivered Meals Subsidy Act* 1979, eligible organisations can receive assistance for the provision of what are known as 'meals on wheels' services. Since 1974 assistance has been at the rate of 30 cents for meals with an approved vitamin C supplement and 25 cents for meals without such a supplement. These rates are to be increased, with effect from 1 July 1980, to 45 cents and 40 cents, respectively.

The table below shows grants that have been paid to local government authorities under this scheme since 1976–77 and estimated grants in 1980–81. In 1979–80 total payments under the Act were \$2.5 million, of which \$0.9 million was paid to local government authorities. For 1980–81 it is estimated that local government authorities will receive \$1.4 million out of total estimated payments under the Act of \$3.9 million.

Handicapped Persons Assistance

Under the Handicapped Persons Assistance Act 1974, local government authorities and voluntary non-profit bodies are eligible to receive assistance for the accommodation, employment and training of disabled people. Capital grants are provided on a \$4 for \$1 basis; assistance with rent is also on a \$4 for \$1 basis and assistance for staffing is generally on \$1 for \$1 basis.

In addition, a training fee of \$500 is paid to eligible sheltered workshops for each former employee who, after completing more than six months sheltered employment, graduates to, and retains, normal employment for 12 months or more.

The following table shows grants paid since 1976-77. It is not expected that any payments to local government authorities will be made in 1980-81.

Children's Services

Under the Children's Services Program, grants are made direct to local government authorities and community organisations towards the cost of the establishment and operation of a range of care and associated services for children, including educational services for young children.

In 1979-80 grants paid direct to local government authorities under the Children's Services Program totalled \$7.2 million and payments in 1980-81 are estimated to be \$7.8 million.

The following table shows grants made direct to local government authorities in the States in the years 1976-77 to 1979-80 and estimated payments for 1980-81.

In addition to the amounts shown in the table, \$298 000 was paid to local government authorities in the Northern Territory in 1979-80 (comprising \$191 000 for capital purposes and \$107 000 for recurrent expenses). It is estimated that in 1980-81, these payments will total \$167 000 (comprising \$11 000 for capital purposes and \$156 000 for recurrent expenses).

Community Youth Support Scheme

The Commonwealth introduced the Community Youth Support Scheme in November 1976 to assist young unemployed persons. The scheme provides financial assistance to community groups, including local government authorities, for supportive programs and services to unemployed youth, the aim of the scheme being to develop and maintain their skills and job orientation.

Overall expenditure on the scheme in 1979-80 was \$11.6 million and is estimated to be \$11.6 million in 1980-81.

Grants amounting to \$0.8 million were made direct to local government authorities in 1979-80. A notional distribution of estimated payments to local government authorities in 1980-81 is included in the following table:

Homeless Persons Assistance

Under the Homeless Persons Assistance Act 1974, capital grants are made to voluntary agencies, and local government authorities, for approved projects to

upgrade and replace existing inadequate accommodation and to build new facilities for homeless men and women. Assistance is also provided towards the cost of accommodation and meals and to meet up to half the salaries of welfare officers performing approved services for homeless persons.

Under this legislation assistance was received by one local authority in Victoria up to 1978-79. Since 1978-79 one local authority, in Western Australia, has been receiving assistance under the Act. Total payments for both recurrent and capital purposes since 1976-77 and estimated payments for 1980-81 are as follows:

Arts

Local government authorities are eligible to receive assistance for community arts activities under a program administered by the Community Arts Board of the Australia Council which was established in 1977–78 to assist local government, service and welfare organisations to include the arts in their programs, to raise the standards of their arts activities, and to expand them to cater for new sectors of the community. Grants made by the Australia Council for the period 1976–77 to 1979–80 to local government authorities are shown in the following table. As these grants depend on the consideration of applications made during the course of the year, the grants that might be paid to local authorities in 1980–81 cannot be estimated at this stage.

Aerodrome Local Ownership Plan

Assistance is provided to local government authorities and to other bodies under the Aerodrome Local Ownership Plan to establish, develop and maintain local aerodromes on their own initiative and to take over aerodromes owned by the Commonwealth. Funds are provided on a \$1 for \$1 basis by the Commonwealth

for both developmental and maintenance works proposals which meet the relevant criteria. Where an authority takes over a Government-owned aerodrome, the Commonwealth meets 100 per cent of the cost of any approved 'pre-transfer' works necessary to bring the aerodrome up to an acceptable standard. The following table shows the payments made to local authorities in each State under the Aerodrome Local Ownership Plan since 1976–77 and estimated payments in 1980–81:

PAYMENTS TO THE STATES FOR ON-PASSING TO LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES

As explained above, the funds provided by the Commonwealth as general purpose assistance for local government take the form of payments to State Governments for on-passing to individual local authorities. There are also other programs of payments to the States under which portions of the funds provided are passed on to local government authorities. However, it should be noted that the degree of influence exerted by the Commonwealth over the particular amounts paid to local authorities varies considerably among the different programs as does the availability of information relating to those amounts. In some cases the amounts passed on to local government authorities are wholly at the discretion of the State Governments.

Each of the programs concerned is summarized, in general terms, in Chapter IV. The purpose of this section is to outline the way in which local government is involved and to provide available details of the amounts passed on by the States at their own discretion, or at the request of the Commonwealth, to local government authorities. As with the programs of direct payments, differences between the States in the amounts of payments in this category made to local government

authorities reflect, in part, differences in the extent to which the functions concerned are undertaken by local government authorities rather than by State Government departments or agencies or private bodies.

It is emphasised that the payments referred to in this Section are included in the totals of payments to the States shown in this paper.

Because of the lag, in some cases, between payment of the funds concerned to the States and their allocation by the States, the amounts of funds paid to the States for local government authorities under a particular program in any year may not necessarily equal the amounts paid to authorities in that year.

Special Assistance to Exmouth Shire

As mentioned in Chapter IV, the Western Australian Government sought financial assistance towards the operational cost of Exmouth Shire which was established with the main purpose of servicing the United States Naval Communications Station at North West Cape. Amounts totalling \$320 500 were paid to the Western Australian Government on a \$1 for \$1 basis for on-passing to the Shire in 1975–76 and 1976–77 from the Department of Defence appropriations. This grant was additional to that provided to the Shire as a result of Commonwealth Grants Commission recommendations.

As an alternative to the continuing special financial assistance to the Shire. the Commonwealth agreed to assume responsibility for specified loans amounting to \$715 125 and to repay the principal with interest over a three-year period on the basis that the Western Australian Government accepts that this action will represent a full discharge of Australian Defence interests in the operations of the Shire. Payments totalling \$466 876 were made in 1977–78 and 1978–79, and a final payment of \$351 624 was made in 1979–80.

Community Health Facilities

Assistance for community health facilities is provided by the Commonwealth to the States and other eligible organisations under the Community Health Program. A brief description of the program is set out in Chapter IV of this paper. Local government authorities have some form of involvement in a small number of projects within the Community Health Program. However, the degree of involvement in the administration or funding of particular projects varies widely.

The following table shows assistance to local authorities from Commonwealth grants since 1976–77, with estimates for 1980–81.

Home Care Services and Senior Citizens Centres

Grants for these purposes are provided under the States Grants (Home Care) Act 1969. Local government authorities are amongst the bodies eligible for assistance. Of total grants of \$14.7 million paid to the States under this Act in 1979–80, \$8.3 million or about 56 per cent was for local government authorities. Assistance under the Act is not available to State Government departments or agencies.

Since 1976–77 local government authorities in one State only, Victoria, have been receiving assistance for the provision of *home care services*. Amounts provided to Victoria for on-passing to local authorities are as follows: 1976–77, \$2 018 000; 1977–78, \$2 520 000; 1978–79, \$3 450 000; 1979–80, \$4 226 000; and 1980–81, \$4 310 000 (estimate).

Children's Services

Commonwealth Government assistance for services for children is outlined in Chapter IV and earlier in this Chapter in the section on 'Commonwealth Payments Made Direct to Local Government Authorities'. Briefly, the position is that, in addition to direct grants to local government and private bodies, grants are made to the States. Some of the grants to the States are for on-passing to local government authorities for children's services.

The following table shows payments made in the years 1976–77 to 1979–89 and estimated payments in 1980–81:

Urban Flood Mitigation

Amounts of \$1 574 271, \$992 041, \$818 000 and \$761 676 provided to Queensland in 1976–77, 1977–78, 1978–79 and 1979–80 respectively to assist with the construction of certain flood mitigation works on various creeks in the Brisbane metropolitan area were passed on to the Brisbane City Council.

An amount of \$100 000 was paid to Victoria in 1975-76 and 1976-77 for flood mitigation works at Seymour.

An amount of \$126 000 is expected to be provided in 1980-81 as the Commonwealth's contribution to the now-completed flood mitigation works on the Breakfast and Enoggera Creeks in Brisbane. Additional funds for urban flood mitigation could be provided in 1980-81 when the as yet unallocated amount of \$25.6 million under the National Water Resources Program is allocated.

Urban Water Supply

Grants of \$325 000 and \$500 000 in 1977–78 and 1978–79 respectively were made to Queensland for on-passing to the Mount Isa City Council as assistance towards the Council's share of the debt burden associated with the now-completed Julius Dam. A final grant of \$250 000 was provided for this purpose in 1979–80.

Capital Assistance for Leisure Facilities

Payments to the States under this program (see Chapter IV) have included payments passed on to local government authorities in respect of community leisure facilities sponsored by these authorities. Of the total grants of \$509 000 paid to the States in 1979–80, \$108 000 was passed on to local government authorities.

Payments to local government authorities have now been finalised. The following table provides details of payments since 1976–77:

National Estate

National Estate projects supported from funds provided to the States under the Urban and Regional Development (Financial Assistance) Act 1974 have included many projects undertaken by local government authorities. Assistance provided to the States from the 1979–80 National Estate program for projects undertaken by local government authorities was \$402 000 out of a total expenditure under this program of \$1.8 million. It is estimated that \$1.98 million will be made available to the States in 1980–81 for this program, and provision will be made from within this amount for projects undertaken by local government authorities in 1980–81. No details of the amounts local government authorities will receive from the States in 1980–81 are available at this stage. The following table shows amounts passed on by individual States to local government authorities in the years 1976–77 to 1979–80:

Roads

The Commonwealth provides grants to the States for expenditure on the construction and maintenance of roads, including roads which are the responsibility of local government authorities. Although the relevant Commonwealth legislation does not determine any particular amount which the States must provide to local government, in each State amounts determined by the State are passed on to the local government authorities for expenditure on roads which are the responsibility of those authorities.

The following table shows assistance to local authorities from Commonwealth grants from 1976-77 to 1979-80; estimates for 1980-81 are not available at this stage.

Urban Public Transport

Amounts passed on to local government authorities out of payments to the Queensland Government under this program were \$523 586 in 1976-77 and \$2 066 343 in 1977-78. These amounts were passed on to the Brisbane City Council for the acquisition of buses. A further \$63 213 was made available in 1979-80 for unpaid commitments incurred on the bus acquisition project.

PAYMENTS TO LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES IN THE NORTHERN TERRITORY

Before the Northern Territory became self-governing on 1 July 1978, two local government authorities had been established under the Northern Territory Local Government Ordinance—the Corporation of the City of Darwin in 1957 and the Corporation of the Municipality of Alice Springs in 1971. The relationship between the Commonwealth Government and these authorities changed on 1 January 1977 when executive responsibility for the Corporations was transferred to the Northern Territory Legislative Assembly. While the assistance given to these two authorities was of a quite different character from other forms of assistance referred to earlier in this Chapter, it can be regarded as the equivalent of assistance received by other local government authorities from State Governments.

Initial establishment grants had been provided to both Corporations and continuing operational subsidies were provided to the Corporations to meet the difference between income from ratepayers and the cost of providing municipal services at what were regarded as reasonable standards. These subsidies were subject to quinquennial review.

Capital assistance was also provided to the two Corporations in the form of matched and unmatched grants for capital works generally.

Additional financial assistance was given to the Corporation of the City of Darwin in 1974–75 to meet the cost of the emergency services provided by the Corporation following Cyclone Tracy. The two Corporations also received assistance under various specific programs from time to time.

The Northern Territory itself has established two further local government authorities, the Corporation of the Municipality of Katherine and the Corporation of the Municipality of Tennant Creek.

In 1978-79, the first year of self-government in the Northern Territory, the bulk of Commonwealth assistance to the Territory was provided as a global allocation. Included in this was an allowance for local authorities, but there was no requirement that the Northern Territory Government pass on specified amounts to local authorities.

Under the Memorandum of Understanding between the Commonwealth and the Northern Territory, the Northern Territory is entitled, as from 1979–80 to a share of net personal income tax collections for on-passing to its local government authorities.

The entitlement for the intial year, that is 1979–80, was the equivalent in per capita terms for population under local government of the analogous payment to the States in 1979–80. Assistance for subsequent years is determined by increasing the preceding year's entitlement in proportion to net personal income tax collections lagged by one year and adjusted for any changes in the percentage of personal income tax payable to local authorities in the States. The entitlement for 1979–80 amounted to \$1 061 733; that for 1980–81 is \$1 440 224.

Some local government authorities in the Northern Territory also receive assistance direct from the Commonwealth under the Children's Services Program described earlier in this chapter. The amount was \$298,000 in 1979–80, and is estimated to be \$167,000 in 1980–81.

The following amounts of Commonwealth assistance were passed on by the Northern Territory Government to its local authorities in 1979–80—Children's Services \$2400, and Roads \$519 000.

Payments made in the period 1976–77 to 1980–81 are shown in the summary table following.

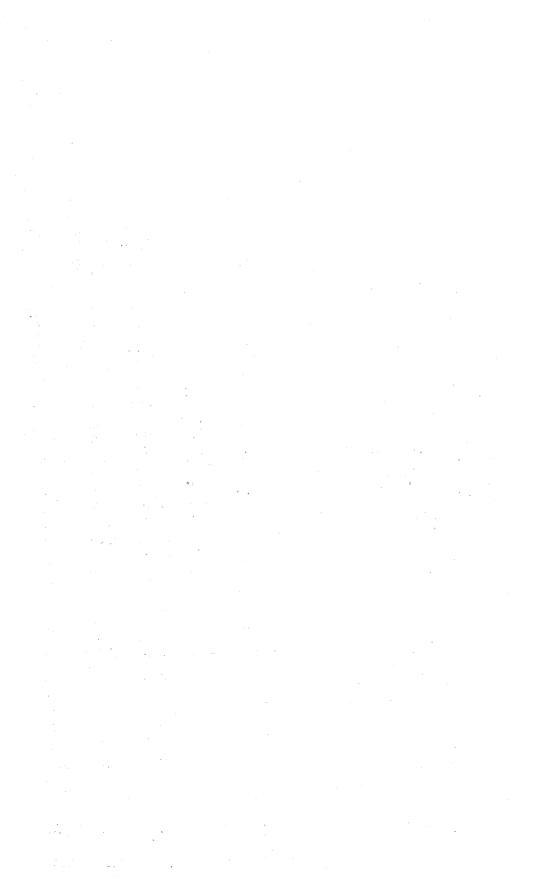
