CHAPTER I—INTRODUCTION

The Commonwealth has made payments to the States since Federation. Prior to World War II, however, these payments had a relatively small impact on the overall finances of the States. They were confined for the most part to special grants designed to assist the financially weaker States and to certain specific purpose grants including assistance for roads and for debt charges.

During and after World War II, there was a marked increase in the amount and scope of assistance to the States. This reflected not only the introduction and continuation of uniform income tax, but also an increase in the range and variety of the activities of both Commonwealth and State governments and greater participation by the national government in matters which were previously considered to be the sole responsibility of the States.

Each year since 1960-61, a Paper on Commonwealth payments to the States has been included among the Budget documents. From 1974-75, the Paper has also encompassed Commonwealth payments to local government authorities and, from 1978-79, it has also included payments to the Northern Territory of Australia (which became a self-governing Territory on 1 July 1978 with expenditure responsibilities and revenue raising powers broadly approximating those of a State).

This Paper focuses on direct payments to the States from the Commonwealth Budget, including State Governments' Loan Council borrowing programs which are undertaken by the Commonwealth on behalf of the States. In addition, although State authorities undertake their own borrowings, information is also included on these borrowings because of the role which has been played by the Commonwealth in Loan Council in the determination of various arrangements governing them.

The years 1983-84 and 1984-85 receive the most comprehensive treatment in this Paper, although the five years 1980-81 to 1984-85 are covered in the tables wherever applicable. Information on earlier years may be found in earlier issues of the Paper. In particular, the 1975-76 issue of 'Payments to or for the States and Local Government Authorities' included a consistent series of aggregate figures back to 1956-57. The 1981-82 issue contained an historical appendix (Appendix II) showing general revenue payments since 1950-51 and special grants since 1910-11.

Structure of the Paper

Following some general remarks on the structure of the Paper and the terminology to be used in it, this chapter provides a brief overview of trends in the magnitude and structure of Commonwealth payments to the State and local government sector and the sector's outlays, receipts and borrowings. Subsequent chapters deal with the various Commonwealth payments and Loan Council borrowings in more detail.

The arrangements under which the Commonwealth makes payments to the States for general recurrent purposes (referred to hereinafter as 'general revenue funds') are described in Chapter II. These funds comprise the largest element in Commonwealth payments to the States and are provided as general subventions which the States are free to use for any purpose.

Chapter III provides information on the general purpose capital funds available to the States and their authorities under the Loan Council arrangements. The chapter this year concentrates in particular on the substantial changes made in the Loan Council arrangements applying to authority borrowings at the 1983 and 1984 Loan Council meetings. Further statistical material on the general purpose capital funds available to the States and their authorities is presented in Appendix II.

Specific purpose payments to the States (that is, funds 'tied' to a particular category of State outlays), which finance a wide variety of State expenditures for both recurrent and capital purposes, are described in Chapter IV. Some further statistical details related to these payments are presented in Appendix III.

Chapter V draws together the details of Commonwealth assistance to the Northern Territory and borrowings by Northern Territory authorities. This year, for the first time, payments to the Northern Territory are included in the detailed tables of Commonwealth payments presented in the Appendices to this Paper.

Chapter VI describes Commonwealth assistance to local government authorities, both direct and by way of payments through the States and the Northern Territory. The major item of assistance is the provision to local government authorities of 2.0 per cent of Commonwealth net personal income tax collections in the previous year. These funds are paid to the States and the Northern Territory on the condition that they be passed on to local government authorities and therefore, in this Paper, they are usually treated as specific purpose payments. In the hands of the recipient local government authorities, however, such funds are properly regarded as 'untied general purpose assistance funds' and are so treated in the discussion and tables in Chapter VI.

Appendix I provides figures, in detail and in aggregate, of total payments to the States and the Northern Territory in 1982-83, 1983-84 and 1984-85 (estimated). It also sets out aggregate amounts of these payments and of payments made direct to local government authorities for the period 1980-81 to 1984-85 (estimated). Appendix IV, which has been added to the Paper this year, provides information on Commonwealth payments to the States and the Northern Territory made in the form of grants while Appendix V sets out information on advances to the States and the Northern Territory and debt charges paid by the States thereon. Appendix VI gives figures, in detail and in aggregate, on payments to the six States combined and to each individual State and the Northern Territory for the years 1980-81 to 1984-85 (estimated).

Relationship with Statements in Budget Paper No. 1 and Terminology

When examining the impact on the Commonwealth Budget of payments to the States, Northern Territory and local government authorities, the relevant aggregates are those relating to payments on a *net* basis—that is, after repayments of Commonwealth Government loans or sinking fund contributions by the States in respect of borrowings by the Commonwealth on their account. This is the approach adopted in other Budget Papers and also embodied in the national accounting aggregate 'grants and net advances to the States, the Northern Territory and local government authorities'.

Where repayments occur, however, they tend to lag behind the initial advances and, in many cases, are made in respect of programs which have already terminated. Moreover, repayments are frequently met from general purpose funds available to the States and their *direct* influence on the magnitude of the programs to which they nominally relate is not always clear. For ease and clarity of presentation and to provide a complete picture of the resources being directed to particular programs, the approach adopted in this Paper in presenting the detail of programs is to record payments on a *gross* basis. Tables showing repayments, however, are included in Appendix V to enable net figures to be derived where appropriate. To facilitate comparison with other Budget Papers,

some tables, in particular the summary tables in this chapter and in Appendix I, include totals on a net basis.

In the Statements in Budget Paper No. 1, Commonwealth budget outlays are classified according to *function*—that is, outlays having like purposes or objectives are brought together under the one functional heading. Total payments and net advances by the Commonwealth to or for other levels of government which are covered in this Paper are shown in Table 1, classified on a functional basis.

Table 1 also begins to illustrate the relationship between the functional classification of funds provided to the States, the Northern Territory and local government and the distinction made throughout this Paper between funds provided for *general* purposes ('untied' funds) and those provided for *specific* purposes ('tied' funds). All general purpose funds are classified under the 'Not Allocated to Function' heading (ex-

cluding general purpose capital funds nominated by the States as being for the purpose of public housing, under arrangements which have applied since 1982-83). Some limited forms of specific purpose payments are also classified under the 'Not Allocated to Function' heading. In the following chapters, however, most specific purpose payments are grouped under functional headings.

The Structure of Commonwealth Payments to the States, Northern Territory and Local Government Authorities

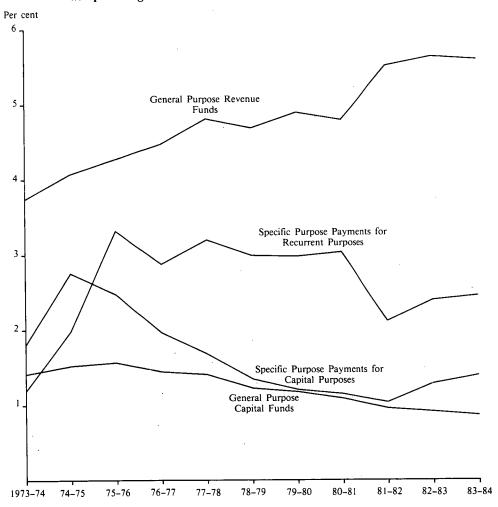
Commonwealth payments to the States, Northern Territory and local government authorities can be classified as being provided for either general or specific purposes. Each of those categories of payment can be further subdivided according to whether the payments are being made for recurrent or capital purposes.

Chart 1 illustrates the magnitude of these four categories of Commonwealth payments relative to GDP, and broad trends in them for the years 1973-74 to 1983-84. The main points include:

- the fairly consistent increase in general purpose revenue funds relative to GDP over most of the period;
- the variability in specific purpose payments for recurrent purposes over the last decade, reflecting the differing emphasis placed on the provision of funds for specific purposes by different Governments over that period;
- the turnaround in specific purpose payments for capital purposes beginning in 1982-83, following a steady decline since 1974-75, reflecting the introduction and/or expansion of a number of major programs including in particular the Australian Bicentennial Road Development program;
- the steady decline, in relative terms, in general purpose capital funds (see also Table 3 which shows more than offsetting growth in other forms of borrowings by the State and local government sector); and
- the sharp offsetting movements in 1981-82 in the general and specific purpose recurrent payments, which reflect changed arrangements for health funding (see Chapter II for details).

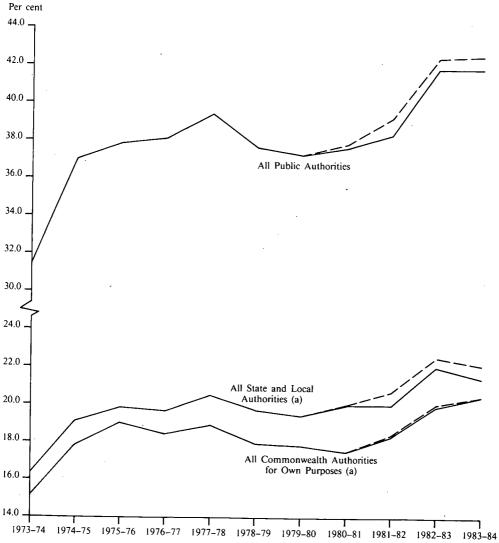
Notwithstanding the rapid growth in nominal GDP in 1983-84, the growth in Commonwealth payments to the State and local government sector was sufficient to sustain the relative levels of all categories of payments at broadly similar levels to those applying in 1982-83.

Relationship Between State and Local Government Sector and Commonwealth Sector The public sector can be envisaged as comprising two main parts—a Commonwealth sector, and a State and local government sector, with the State and local government sector encompassing the States, the Northern Territory and their semi-government and local authorities. To assess the demand of each sector for real and financial resources, an estimate can be derived of total outlays for each sector 'for its own purposes', which reflects its final expenditure on goods and services plus transfer payments and net advances to the private sector. Such estimates are shown in Chart 2 below.

Budget Paper No. 1 Statement No. 6 contains details of various components and aggregates of the public sector but does not specifically show outlays of each sector for its own purposes. Estimates of such outlays can be derived from figures for total outlays by netting out all transfer payments between the sectors. For this purpose, it is necessary to allocate interest payments in respect of State debt incurred under Loan Council arrangements either as a State or a Commonwealth outlay. Although under Loan Council arrangements the Commonwealth Government actually pays the interest to holders of the Commonwealth securities issued on behalf of the States, the approach adopted assumes, in effect, that it is merely acting as an agent for the States when doing so. These interest payments are thus treated as a State Government outlay and are, therefore, deducted from total Commonwealth outlays. Other interest payments to the Commonwealth by State and local authorities, however, are deducted from the outlays of the State and local government sector as they do not represent a net transfer to the private sector. The total of outlays by each sector for its own purposes is, of course, equal to total outlays by the public sector as a whole.

Chart 2 shows the outlays of the State and local government and Commonwealth sectors for their own purposes as well as total public sector outlays, as a percentage of GDP, for the years 1973-74 to 1983-84. State and local government sector outlays have represented a slightly higher proportion of GDP than Commonwealth outlays throughout the period. The solid lines in Chart 2 understate the level of effective public sector outlays because they are based on figures published by the Australian Bureau of Statistics that do not pick up the considerable use which Commonwealth and, more particularly, State authorities have made of sale and leaseback arrangements in recent years as a means of funding fixed capital expenditures. As the capital expenditure (and borrowings) associated with these transactions are recorded in the private sector (and deducted from the public sector) by the Statistician, the published estimates do not reflect fully the extent to which the public sector has, in effect, increased its capital expenditures (and financed that increase by new borrowings). The dotted lines in Chart 2 show the estimated effect of sale and leaseback arrangements. In very broad terms, the trend in each sector's outlays for its own purposes as a proportion of GDP has been similar—a sharp increase in 1974-75 followed by a relatively flat picture until 1981-82, with a further substantial increase, when sale and leaseback arrangements are taken into account, over the last two years as a whole.

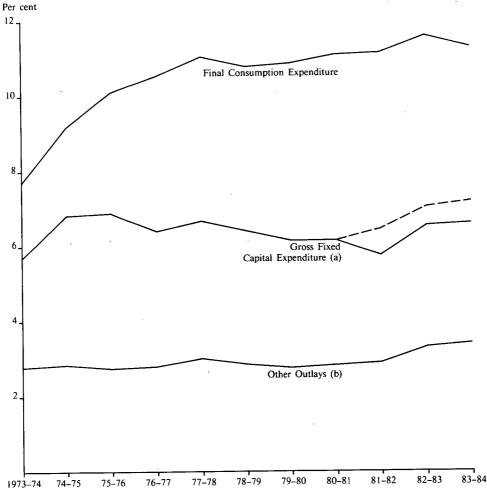
The sharp lift in public sector outlays as a proportion of GDP in 1982-83 partly reflected cyclical and other special factors (eg outlays in respect of drought and other natural disasters) as well as policy decisions at both levels of Government. Even with the rapid growth in nominal GDP in 1983-84, the Commonwealth's own account outlays continued to increase as a percentage of GDP largely due to continued strong growth in transfer payments.

Table 2 permits a comparison of changes in Commonwealth budget outlays for its own purposes with assistance provided to the State and local government sector during the period 1980-81 to 1984-85 (estimated). As has been the case in recent years, the estimated increase in Commonwealth assistance in 1984-85 is below the estimated increase in Commonwealth outlays for its own purposes.

Chart 3 shows final consumption expenditures, gross fixed capital expenditures, and other outlays of the State and local government sector in relation to GDP. Final consumption expenditures grew very strongly relative to GDP from 1972-73 to 1977-78

more slowly thereafter. The disparate movements in 1982-83 and 1983-84 largely reflect cyclical factors, although various special factors including drought and natural disaster payments in 1982-83 and the introduction of Medicare (which has resulted in the transfer of certain health expenditures from the private to the public sector) have also affected the outcome.

(a) Dotted line includes estimated expenditure associated with sale and leaseback arrangements. Derived from estimates provided by the Australian Statistician and Treasury estimates.

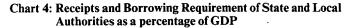

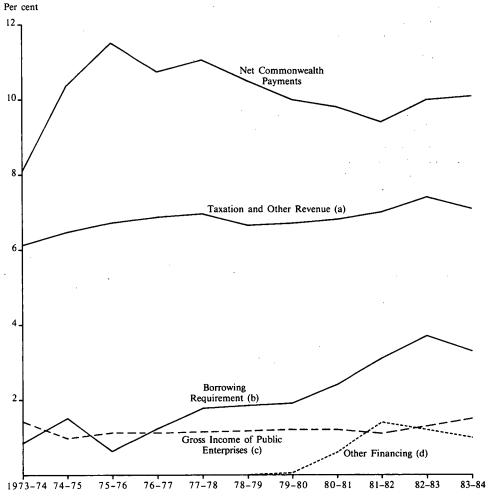
Gross fixed capital expenditure relative to GDP increased strongly in 1974-75 and again in the past two years, offsetting a decline in the intervening period. As noted above, the official statistics do not take account of the impact of the use of sale and leaseback arrangements on public sector fixed capital expenditures. As shown by the dotted line in Chart 3, the use of sale and leaseback arrangements has enabled capital

expenditure of the State and local government sector to grow at a faster and more even rate than the official statistics suggest. The new Loan Council arrangements relating to borrowings by semi-government authorities described in Chapter III of this Paper, along with changes in the taxation treatment of certain sale and leaseback arrangements employed by tax-exempt public authorities, are likely to reduce the significance of this type of financing in the future.

State and Local Government Sector Finances

It is of some interest to examine how the State and local government sector has continued to maintain, and in recent years to add to, its high level of outlays relative to GDP following the sharp increase during the first half of the 1970's. The major categories of funds used by the State and local government sector relative to GDP are shown in Chart 4.

While net Commonwealth payments to the States are a significantly higher proportion of GDP than a decade ago those payments have generally grown less rapidly than GDP for most of the period since 1975-76 so that, since then, Commonwealth assistance has formed a declining proportion of State and local government sector outlays.

Taxation and other revenues of the State and local government sector grew relatively slowly during the period. The gross income of State and local government sector public enterprises, relative to GDP, has also remained steady and is well below the ratio in the early 1970's.

Of course, in considering the influence of the Commonwealth on State and local government sector finances, it is necessary to take account of borrowings by State authorities as well as of direct payments from the Commonwealth Budget (see Chapter III for a detailed discussion of Loan Council arrangements). As noted in this Paper last year, the State and local government sector has, in fact, maintained its level of outlays relative to GDP, in spite of the generally downward trend in Commonwealth assistance relative to GDP since the mid-seventies, principally by sharply increasing its 'borrowing'. In recent years, much of that increase occurred outside the area of borrowing programs approved by Loan Council and has included sharply increased 'other' financing by way of short-term borrowings, trade credits and deferred payment arrangements, sale and leaseback of existing assets, the running down of cash balances and the like. Borrowings by electricity authorities also increased sharply in 1982-83, following the removal of Loan Council control over the volume of such borrowings in June 1982. As a result Loan Council approved borrowing programs constituted just over a quarter of total borrowings by State authorities in 1983-84 compared with about 95 per cent in 1979-80. It was against this background that Loan Council at its meeting on 21 June 1984 accepted a proposal by the Commonwealth that Loan Council should in 1984-85 adopt a 'Global Approach' which considers all forms of authority borrowings. This 'Global Approach' is discussed further in Chapter III.

Table 3 shows details of total Commonwealth payments to the States, by major purpose, and State authorities' borrowings for each of the last five years. It should be noted that year to year comparisons of the major categories of Commonwealth payments can be affected by changes in the nature of the funding arrangements, such as in the case of health funding arrangements referred to above, and also by the volatility associated with some payments, such as natural disaster relief assistance, which will not necessarily reflect underlying trends in payments. Table 91 in Appendix 1 shows percentage changes in the major categories of payments after various adjustments have been made to the original figures.

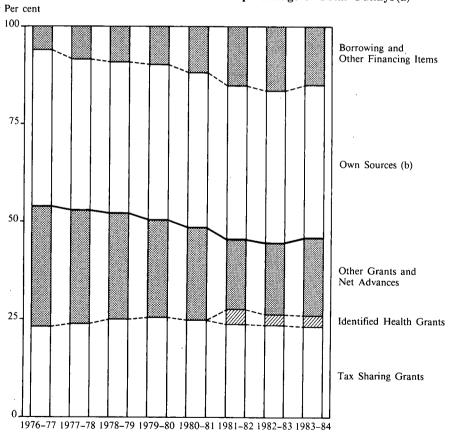

Chart 5 summarises the overall contribution made by Commonwealth payments to the State and local government sector to the financing of the activities of that sector. The chart shows the percentage contributions which each of the various sources of funds available to the sector made to the funding of the total outlays of the sector over the period from the introduction of the tax sharing grants in 1976-77 until 1983-84. The decline over that period in the proportion of funds obtained from Commonwealth sources reflects some reduction in Commonwealth payments as a proportion of GDP. That this did not prevent an expansion in the State and local government sector was due to the significant increase in borrowings (and other financing) by State authorities. Over the entire period, the main on-going forms of general revenue assistance provided by the Commonwealth, the tax sharing and identified health grants, amounted to about one quarter of the funds employed by the sector in each year. These payments are thus by no means the sole determinant of the capacity of the sector to finance its activities, although their importance to the smaller States and the Northern Territory is much greater than for the sector as a whole.

CHAPTER II—GENERAL REVENUE ASSISTANCE

General revenue grants have been paid by the Commonwealth to the States in one form or another since Federation. The purpose of these grants is to assist the States, by way of subventions to their budgets, in the financing of their recurrent outlays. The Commonwealth does not impose conditions as to the purposes for which those grants are spent, although it may make provision of the funds subject to certain other conditions being met. While these grants represent the major component of Commonwealth assistance to the State and local government sector they are, as indicated in Chapter 1, only one of a number of sources of funds available to the State and local government sector.

A detailed history of successive arrangements governing general revenue assistance was provided in Chapter II of the 1981-82 and 1982-83 issues of this Paper and in Appendix II of the 1981-82 issue. This Chapter outlines the current arrangements for payments of general revenue grants to the States. Further background information on these arrangements is available in the 1982-83 and 1983-84 issues of this Paper. Details of the arrangements relating to the Northern Territory are provided in Chapter V.

CURRENT ARRANGEMENTS FOR PAYMENT OF GENERAL REVENUE GRANTS

The main forms of general revenue grants currently provided to the States are the tax sharing grants and the identified health grants. Special grants may also be paid to individual States and the Northern Territory under the Commonwealth Grants Commission Act 1973. Special temporary revenue assistance grants were also paid to the States in 1983-84. Each of these forms of assistance is considered in turn in the remainder of this chapter.

Tax sharing grants were first introduced in 1976-77, based initially on a sharing of net *personal* income tax collections. At the Premiers' Conference held on 4 May 1981, however, it was agreed to move, after a transitional year in 1981-82, to the calculation of tax sharing grants on the basis of *total* tax collections. Those arrangements have provided the basic framework for the calculation of tax sharing grants since 1981-82, although the relativities used to determine the *distribution* of the grants among the States have been adjusted following consideration of the Commonwealth Grants Commission's Report on State Tax Sharing and Health Grants 1982 at the Premiers' Conference held on 24-25 June 1982.

The relativities based on the Commission's assessments were modified so that, in accordance with Clause 7.1 of the relevant hospital cost-sharing agreements, the hospital cost-sharing grants being paid to South Australia and Tasmania would not result in their share of tax sharing grants being reduced on account of the Commission's assessment of relative health needs.

It was agreed at the Conference that the new relativities would be phased in over the three years ending 1984-85 at the rate of 33½ per cent each year (for full details see the 1983-84 issue of this Paper). Each State's tax sharing grant was made subject to a real terms guarantee (ensuring a two per cent real growth in its grant in 1982-83 and a one per cent real growth in each of the following two years) while the new relativities were being phased in. As explained below, this guarantee is funded initially from a supplementary pool established within the total tax sharing funds available, with the Commonwealth making up any shortfall required to meet the full cost of the guarantee.

Identified health grants have been paid to the States and the Northern Territory since 1 July 1981. They replaced (and consolidated) grants payable under previous hospital cost-sharing agreements with the States (except for South Australia and Tasmania whose hospital cost-sharing agreements were to apply to the end of 1984-85) and the Northern Territory, and payments for community health and school dental programs for all States and the Northern Territory. (The identified health grants, which are for general purposes but are identified as a Commonwealth contribution towards the cost of health programs, were seen by the previous Government as an interim step towards full absorption of health grants into tax sharing grants.)

The States (Tax Sharing and Health Grants) Act 1981, as amended, provides the legislative authority for the payment of the tax sharing and identified health grants. Details of the evolution and the application of the legislation are provided in the 1982-83 and 1983-84 issues of this Paper, while the current provisions are set out later in this chapter. The provisions of the Act governing the distribution of grants will expire on 30 June 1985 but the Act provides for a review prior to that time.

STATES' TAX SHARING GRANTS IN 1983-84 AND 1984-85

Under the States (Tax Sharing and Health Grants) Act 1981, as amended, States receive tax sharing grants in 1983-84 and 1984-85 amounting to 20.72 per cent of total net Commonwealth tax collections in the previous year, plus any additional amounts that might be required to meet the one per cent real terms guarantee.

The grants are calculated by reference to a tax base consisting of total net Commonwealth taxation collections in the previous year (except for certain minor exceptions such as State-type tax collections in the Australian Capital Territory), as determined by relevant taxing authorities under the Act, and excluding any special surcharges or rebates nominated by the Treasurer for the purposes of the Act. Revenue from the levy on motor spirit and diesel fuel (currently standing at two cents per litre), announced in the 1982–83 Budget, has been nominated as a special surcharge and was excluded from the tax base used for determining tax sharing payments to the States in 1983–84 and 1984–85. Collections from the Medicare levy, introduced on 1 February 1984 have also been excluded from the tax base used for determining tax sharing payments in 1984–85. In both cases the major part of the proceeds of the levy are paid to the States—in the one case to fund the Australian Bicentennial Road Development program and, in the other, the Medicare program—and it would not be appropriate for them to receive, in addition, a share of those same funds under the tax sharing arrangements.

In accordance with the States (Tax Sharing and Health Grants) Act 1981, States' tax sharing grants are calculated by reference to two pools of funds. The 'basic' tax sharing pool, equal to 20.323 per cent of the tax base, is distributed among the States in accordance with the per capita relativities prescribed in the Act for the financial year concerned and States' populations as at 31 December of that year. A 'supplementary' tax sharing pool, equal to 0.397 per cent of the tax base, is provided primarily to fund any guarantee payments required. To the extent that funds from this pool are not required to meet guarantee payments, they are distributed among the non-guarantee States on the basis of the prescribed relativities. The full procedure for the calculation of each State's tax sharing grant from these two pools was explained in detail in the 1982-83 issue of this Paper.

In 1983-84 total net Commonwealth tax collections, as defined under the *States* (*Tax Sharing and Health Grants*) Act 1981, amounted to \$43 377.2 million, an increase of 7.5 per cent over 1982-83. Accordingly, the basic tax sharing pool for 1984-85 will be \$8 815.5 million and the supplementary pool will be \$172.2 million.

In 1983-84 all States except Queensland received a guarantee payment and they are expected to do so in 1984-85. As was the case in 1983-84 the supplementary pool in 1984-85 is not expected to be sufficient to fund the additional payments required by the one per cent real terms guarantee, estimated at about \$238 million in 1984-85. In accordance with provisions in the Act, the Commonwealth made up the shortfall in 1983-84 at a cost of \$178.5 million and will be required to do so again in 1984-85 at an estimated cost of \$66 million. Based on these estimates, the States in 1984-85 will receive 20.87 per cent of the total net Commonwealth tax collections in 1983-84 (21.16 per cent in the previous year), which compares with the 20.72 per cent represented by the combined tax pools.

Calculation of the Tax Sharing Grants

The distribution of the basic tax sharing pool in 1982-83, 1983-84 and 1984-85 among the States is calculated on the basis of the populations of each State as at 31 December in each year, weighted by the per capita relativities prescribed in the States (Tax Sharing and Health Grants) Act 1981, following the Premiers' Conference held on 24-25 June 1982. These per capita relativities are shown in Table 4.

Table 6 shows the further calculations required to determine States' total tax sharing grants in 1984–85. Because the amounts required for guarantee payments to the States will exhaust the funds available from the supplementary pool this year, the calculation of each State's 1984–85 grant is considerably simplified.

In brief, the relevant steps are:

- the final tax sharing grant paid to each State in 1983-84 (Row (1)) is escalated by a factor (Row (2)), reflecting the estimated increase in the Consumer Price Index for each State capital averaged for the year ended the March quarter of 1985 and the real growth factor (1 per cent in 1984-85), to yield the estimated guaranteed minimum tax sharing payment for each State in 1984-85 (Row (3));
- each State's share of the basic tax sharing pool of \$8815.5 million for 1984-85 (Row (4)), as calculated in Table 5, is compared to the guaranteed minimum share to determine the guaranteed additional amounts which need to be added to its share of the basic tax sharing pool (Row (5)); and

• as the total of the guaranteed additional amounts is greater than the amount available from the supplementary pool, each State's tax sharing grant is equal to the greater of the amounts shown in Rows (3) and (4).

Impact of Tax Sharing Arrangements on Relativities

As explained earlier, it was agreed at the Premiers' Conference held on 24-25 June 1982 that new relativities for the distribution of tax sharing grants among the States would be phased in over the three years 1982-83, 1983-84 and 1984-85.

The real terms guarantee provisions of the arrangements also agreed at that Premiers' Conference have had the effect of slowing or reversing progress towards the distribution of per capita grants based on the relativities in the Grants Commission's 1982 report (as modified) and which, except for the guarantee, would have applied in 1984-85, the final year of the phasing-in period. In 1982-83, the three less populous States received payments under the guarantee arrangements. All States except Queensland received a guarantee payment in 1983-84 and that situation is also expected to apply in 1984-85. Thus, the three most populous States will receive smaller shares of the grants in 1984-85 than implied by the relativities proposed at the June 1982 Premiers' Conference while the shares of the three smaller States will be larger. The effect of these guarantee payments on actual per capita relativities as compared to those which would otherwise have applied is demonstrated in Table 7.

IDENTIFIED HEALTH GRANTS 1984-85

The basis of calculating the total identified health grants payable to the States and the Northern Territory and the distribution of those grants among the States was described in the 1983-84 issue of this Paper.

The basic features of those arrangements were:

• The total identified health grant payable to the States (other than South Australia and Tasmania) and the Northern Territory is calculated by increasing the total grant for the previous year in the same proportion as the increase in total Commonwealth tax collections in that previous year.

• The amount of the identified health grant payable to each State (other than South Australia and Tasmania) and the Northern Territory is determined on the same basis as the total grant, that is, by increasing the grant payable in the previous year by the increase in the total Commonwealth tax collections in that year. The resultant distribution of the identified health grants among the States and the Northern Territory is not intended to reflect relative health needs. As already noted, it was decided at the June 1982 Premiers' Conference that relative health needs should continue to be reflected in the distribution of tax sharing grants. Under this approach, subject to the modifications explained earlier, the States' shares of tax sharing grants reflect, inter alia, the Grants Commission's assessments of relative health needs adjusted to take account of States' shares of the identified health grants.

These arrangements will continue in 1984-85 but the basis of calculating the grants has been varied in two significant respects to take account of agreements reached at the Premiers' Conference held on 30 June-1 July 1983 concerning the hospital funding aspects of Medicare (see Chapter IV).

First, the hospital cost-sharing agreements with South Australia and Tasmania were terminated on 1 February 1984 and the specific purpose payments involved were absorbed into the identified health grants payable during the remainder of 1983-84. Under the States (Tax Sharing and Health Grants) Amendment Act (No. 2) 1983, South Australia and Tasmania received in 1983-84 an addition to their existing identified health grants (previously payable only in respect of the community health and school dental programs) equal to the 'agreed amounts' (agreed between the Commonwealth and the two States as representing the amounts that would have been payable to each State had its hospital cost-sharing agreement continued for the whole of the financial year in the absence of the Medicare arrangements) less the amounts that each had already been paid in respect of the period 1 July 1983 to 31 January 1984 under its hospital cost-sharing agreements.

As a consequence of these changes, the base for the calculation of identified health grants to South Australia and Tasmania in 1984-85 is equal to the sum of the amounts that each received under the legislation in respect of the school dental and community health schemes in 1983-84 *plus* the 'agreed amounts' described above.

Second, in accordance with the States (Tax Sharing and Health Grants) Amendment Act 1984, the amounts of the identified health grants payable to certain States in 1984-85 are to be reduced by amounts representing adjustments in respect of Commonwealth-operated pathology laboratories which were not taken over by the States involved. (At the June 1981 Premiers' Conference an amount representing the cost of operating these laboratories was added to general revenue assistance on the understanding that the States would take over their operation. As only Western Australia took over the operation of the laboratories, the identified health grants to the other States have now been reduced accordingly.)

Table 8 shows the basis of the calculations of the estimated identified health grants for the States and the Northern Territory for 1984-85.

SPECIAL GRANTS

Special grants have been paid to the States on the recommendations of the Commonwealth Grants Commission since 1934-35. The Commission was established in 1933 and currently functions under the *Commonwealth Grants Commission Act 1973*.

Under current legislation, the Commission is required, *inter alia*, to inquire into and report upon any application made by a State or the Northern Territory for financial assistance for the purpose of making it possible for the State (or the Northern Territory), by reasonable effort, to function at a standard not appreciably below the standards of other States (or the Northern Territory).

Under the arrangements agreed at the Premiers' Conference held on 24-25 June 1982 for the phasing-in of new tax sharing relativities over a three-year period commencing from 1982-83, there are to be no special grants paid to any State in relation to the years 1982-83 to 1984-85.

SPECIAL BUDGETARY ASSISTANCE GRANTS

At the Premiers' Conference held on 30 June-1 July 1983, the Commonwealth agreed to provide the States with a special temporary revenue assistance grant of \$155.5 million in recognition of claims that they were facing unusually severe budgetary difficulties in 1983-84. It was agreed that the special budgetary assistance grant would be distributed in accordance with the then estimated 1983-84 distribution of tax sharing grants. The individual States' amounts were: New South Wales \$47.1 million, Victoria \$34.8 million, Queensland \$31.0 million, Western Australia \$18.2 million, South Australia \$17.2 million and Tasmania \$7.2 million. All States agreed that this special assistance would not be included in the base for determining tax sharing grants in 1984-85 or beyond.

The Commonwealth has agreed to make two grants of special budgetary assistance to Victoria in 1984-85.

First, following the decision by the High Court of Australia in August 1983 to invalidate a pipeline licence fee imposed by the Victorian Government, the State was required to repay the revenues it had already collected plus interest. In recognition of the adverse impact on the State's budget, the Commonwealth agreed to pay Victoria an amount equivalent to the company tax it expects to receive as a result of the pipeline tax repayments. This is estimated to amount to \$35 million, \$28 million of which was paid in 1983-84 and \$7 million in 1984-85.

Second, in the context of decisions taken on the taxation arrangements to apply to the petroleum sector in 1984-85 and subsequent years (see Statement No. 4 in Budget Paper No. 1), the Commonwealth agreed to make a special budgetary assistance grant of \$24 million to Victoria in 1984-85.

SUMMARY OF GENERAL REVENUE GRANTS TO THE STATES

Table 9 shows payments of general revenue grants to the States from 1980-81 and estimates for 1984-85.

GENERAL REVENUE PAYMENTS AFTER 1984-85

The provisions of the present legislation for the distribution of tax sharing and identified health grants are due to expire on 30 June 1985. During the course of 1984-85, as provided for in the States (Tax Sharing and Health Grants) Act 1981, and agreed at the June 1984 Premiers' Conference, there will be a review of the overall level of general revenue assistance to be provided to the States after 1984-85, the arrangements

governing the distribution of that assistance and the distribution of tax powers between the Commonwealth and the States to be associated with the new arrangements. This review will take into account the results of an inquiry by the Commonwealth Grants Commission into the distribution of tax sharing grants to apply after 1984-85. The Special Minister of State sent formal terms of reference for the inquiry to the Commission on 10 February 1984 and a supplementary reference (relating to the impact of the Medicare Compensation Grants introduced in February 1984 on Queensland's relativity) was forwarded on 30 March 1984. The Commission has been asked to report by 31 March 1985. The Commonwealth and the States have agreed to consider these various matters at a preliminary meeting in May 1985.

CHAPTER III—GENERAL PURPOSE CAPITAL FUNDS

This chapter provides information on the general purpose capital funds available to the States and their authorities under Loan Council arrangements. These funds comprise borrowings made on behalf of the State Governments under the State Governments' Loan Council programs (including the interest-free grant component of those programs), and borrowings by State and local government authorities on their own account. Relevant statistical material for the period from 1980-81 is presented in Appendix II: statistical information for preceding years is available in earlier issues of this Paper (An historical series covering the period 1963-64 to 1975-76 is included in Appendix III of the 1975-76 issue of this Paper).

The Loan Council, which is constituted under the Financial Agreement of 1927, was established to co-ordinate the borrowings of the Commonwealth and the States and consists of representatives of the Commonwealth and each State Government. Under the terms of the Financial Agreement, borrowings by the Commonwealth for its own purposes and on behalf of State Governments (except defence borrowings by the Commonwealth and borrowings for temporary purposes) are limited in total in each financial year to the amounts of the annual borrowing programs for the Commonwealth and State Governments determined by the Loan Council. Subject to the decisions of the Loan Council, borrowings for and on behalf of the State Governments and conversions, renewals, redemptions and consolidations of the public debt of the States are, with limited exceptions, arranged by the Commonwealth.

Since 1970-71, part of the annual borrowing programs approved by the Loan Council for State government purposes (the State Governments' Loan Council Programs) has been provided by the Commonwealth to the States as interest-free non-repayable grants. Both the loan and grant portions of the programs represent Commonwealth payments to the States and are so categorised for purposes of this and other Budget Papers (as discussed below and in Statement No. 6 in Budget Paper No. 1, that means that the State and local government sector borrowing requirement is measured net of the loan portion of the programs).

Under the Gentlemen's Agreement originating in 1936, the Loan Council has approved annual borrowing programs for 'larger' semi-government and local authorities (defined as authorities borrowing in excess of a specified annual amount). In recent years major changes have been made to the arrangements governing approval of authority borrowings both in respect of the volume and the terms and conditions of such borrowings. At its meeting on 24-25 June 1982, Loan Council agreed that, for a trial period of three years, the amount and terms and conditions of domestic borrowings by electricity authorities of the Commonwealth and the States would be determined by individual members outside the Gentlemen's Agreement. Full details of this decision and the conditions that were attached to it at the time can be found in the 1982-83 issue of this Paper. At its meeting on 30 June-1 July 1983, Loan Council delegated to individual members responsibility for determining the terms and conditions of domestic borrowings by all semi-government authorities. Full details of this decision and the background to it were set out in the 1983-84 issue of this Paper. Most recently, at its meeting on 21 June 1984 the Loan Council agreed to further substantial changes in arrangements in respect of State (and Commonwealth) authority borrowings, particularly the 'global' total of those borrowings.

Following the usual description in the next section of the State Governments' Loan Council programs and the financing thereof, this chapter provides background to, and details of these, and other elements in the evolution of Loan Council arrangements in recent years, with particular emphasis on the Global Approach adopted on a trial basis in 1984-85.

STATE GOVERNMENTS' LOAN COUNCIL PROGRAMS

The State Governments' Loan Council programs represent a significant source of funds available to the States for capital works. The Loan Council determines an aggregate program for the States as a whole and allocates the amount among the States. How each State applies the proceeds of its share of the program is a matter for determination by it.

Since 1975-76 the proportion of the State Governments' programs provided as capital grants has been one-third except that, in 1982-83, the approved program also included a supplementary \$65 million grant for public housing. This supplementary grant has not been repeated, but the Commonwealth has substantially increased the level of funding for public housing under the Commonwealth State Housing Agreement (see Chapter IV for details). Background material on the capital grants, together with a summary of changes in the proportion of the total program provided as grants, is set out on page 27 of the 1975-76 issue of this Paper. On pages 24 and 25 of that issue there is also an account of the way in which Commonwealth assistance to the States for housing had, prior to that, been related to the Loan Council arrangements.

In respect of 1984-85, Loan Council agreed to a State Governments' new money program of \$1564.5 million, an increase of \$95 million (or 6.5 per cent) over the Government program for 1983-84 of \$1469 million. The State Governments' program for 1984-85 comprises two-thirds borrowing program (\$1043 million) and one-third (\$521.5 million) to be provided to the States as an interest-free general purpose capital grant.

As in 1982-83 and 1983-84, the States have been given the option in 1984-85 of nominating part of their Government borrowing programs for public housing, subject to meeting their matching requirements under the Commonwealth State Housing Agreement. State nominations under this arrangement totalled \$145.9 million in 1982-83 and \$227.1 million in 1983-84. Such amounts as may be nominated in 1984-85 are again to be provided to the States on the concessional loan terms and conditions provided for in the Commonwealth State Housing Agreement. A further \$530 million is to be provided for public housing under the Commonwealth State Housing Agreement (see Chapter IV).

The following table shows the distribution among the States of the Government Loan Council new money programs for 1983-84 and 1984-85.

Financing of State Governments' Loan Council Programs

As previously mentioned, all borrowings on behalf of the State Governments are, with limited exceptions, arranged by the Commonwealth.

In the past, when the proceeds of public borrowings available for this purpose have been insufficient to finance that part of the States' Loan Council programs to be borrowed on account of the States (ie the total programs less the capital grants), the Commonwealth has made up the shortfall by subscribing from its own resources to a special loan, proceeds of which have been allocated to the States. Any amounts made available in this way represented State debt. Special loans have been raised on terms and conditions similar to those attaching to Treasury Bonds sold to the public. The effect of this arrangement has been that, as necessary—and this has been the case in the majority of years since 1951-52—the Commonwealth has contributed amounts from its own resources to help finance the Loan Council borrowing programs of the State Governments. The Commonwealth has not been required to provide such assistance in either of the last two years.

The borrowing authority approved for the Commonwealth by the Loan Council includes amounts equal to the capital grants provided to the States under the State Governments' programs, together with any amounts nominated from within the loan portion for public housing. It has been the practice that the legislation enacted to authorise payments of the capital grant and of the nominated funds for public housing gives the Treasurer authority either to borrow the amount concerned, or to meet it wholly or in part from the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

A summary of the financing of the States' Loan Council programs since 1979-80 is given in Table 93 in Appendix II; Table 102 shows further details of the financing of the programs since 1979-80.

In line with previous practice, in 1984-85 the Commonwealth has undertaken to support the total approved State Governments' new money program of \$1564.5 million, conditional on the States' agreement to the level of borrowing programs proposed by it for the Commonwealth and the States, to new money borrowings from all sources by Commonwealth, State and local authorities and government-owned companies being restricted to agreed 'global' limits, and to arrangements designed to facilitate the raising of loans to finance the State Governments' program including, inter

alia, overseas loans by the Commonwealth. In summary, the Commonwealth has agreed:

- to make up any shortfall of public borrowing available towards the approved State Governments' programs by subscribing from its own resources;
- to provide \$521.5 million of the State Governments' total program of \$1564.5 million as an interest-free general purpose capital grant;
- to leave to the States, to the extent necessary to complete their Government borrowing programs, all proceeds of public loan raisings by the Commonwealth in Australia (other than the net proceeds of Income Equalization Deposits, Treasury Notes and other borrowings for temporary purposes, and amounts applied to redemption of public securities—including Special Bonds and Australian Savings Bonds—that cannot be financed out of the National Debt Sinking Fund);
- to arrange, to the maximum possible extent, for the redemption of maturing but unconverted State debt that cannot be met from State Sinking Funds; and
- to make pro rata weekly advances against the State Governments' borrowing program and the general purpose capital grant. (Advances were previously made monthly.)

DEVELOPMENTS IN LOAN COUNCIL ARRANGEMENTS APPLYING TO STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITY BORROWINGS

As noted, the Loan Council agreed at its meeting on 21 June 1984 to substantial changes to the arrangements applying to authority borrowings under the *Gentlemen's Agreement*. As an aid to understanding the significance of those changes this Section examines developments in borrowings by the State and local government sector over the last decade or so.

Trends in authority borrowings

Statement No. 6 of Budget Paper No. 1 provides information on the Public Sector Borrowing Requirement (PSBR) and its main components. As shown there, borrowings by the State and local government sector comprised more than 40 per cent of the PSBR in 1983-84. As also shown there, and in Chapter 1 of this paper, borrowings by the State and local government sector have increased substantially as a proportion of GDP in recent years.

The borrowing requirement of the State and local government sector stems from three main sources—the State Budget sector, 'larger' State authorities and 'smaller' (mainly local) authorities. Public financial enterprises (e.g. government banks and insurance companies) would not generally be included in estimates of the PSBR and the State and local government sector borrowing requirement as such institutions are engaged primarily in financial intermediation and their borrowings do not, of themselves, give rise to a direct call by the public sector on the nation's financial resources.

Table 11 shows estimates of total State and local government sector deficits over the last decade (adjusted for sale and leaseback arrangements), together with estimates of Commonwealth net advances to the State Governments, estimates of the 'conven-

tional' borrowing programs of State authorities and other State and local government financing transactions. Under the terms of the *Financial Agreement*, all borrowings by State Governments are, with limited exceptions, arranged by the Commonwealth on behalf of the States and passed on to the States by way of advances from the Commonwealth budget. As explained in Statement No. 6 in Budget Paper No. 1 and noted earlier in this chapter, these advances are not treated as part of the borrowing requirement of the State and local government sector in the Budget Papers.

Table 11 shows the expansion in recent years in the State and local government sector borrowing requirement. It shows that borrowings undertaken by the sector now account for a significantly higher proportion of the sector's deficit than a decade ago. It also highlights the extent to which, in recent years, the proportion of State and local authority borrowings subject to Loan Council approval has declined substantially as authorities resorted extensively to financing techniques not subjected to Loan Council approval—the so-called 'off-program' borrowings. In 1979-80, Loan Council approved programs accounted for 95 per cent of the total State and local authority borrowings, but that proportion had fallen to about 25 per cent by 1983-84.

The main factors accounting for this development were the decision, at the meeting of Loan Council on 24-25 June 1982 to exempt, for a trial period of three years, the major electricity authorities from the need to obtain approval for their domestic borrowings, and the growth in 'off-program' borrowings from 1981-82. In part, this expansion in 'off-program' financings involved greater utilisation of forms of borrowing that were subject to specific Loan Council guidelines but outside the 'larger' authorities approved program—trade credits and domestic deferred payments arrangements. However, there was also a rapid growth in other financing techniques such as leveraged and financial leases, sale and leaseback arrangements, security deposits and other repayable front-end capital contributions. Leveraged and financial leasing by tax-exempt public authorities almost invariably offered significant tax advantages to the taxable lending parties involved which, *inter alia*, acted to lower the cost of the loans to the public authorities at the expense of the Commonwealth revenue. The Commonwealth has announced measures to remove the taxation advantages associated with tax-exempt public authorities.

Against the background of the above developments in State and local government sector borrowing, the Commonwealth proposed at the Loan Council meeting on 21 June 1984 that a system of 'global' limits on Commonwealth and State authority borrowings be adopted. Under the arrangements applying prior to that meeting, the Loan Council had very little influence over the totality of authorities' borrowings. One consequence of that was that neither the States nor the Commonwealth had adequate information about the likely demands of the State and local government sector on the capital market and real resources. This posed particular difficulties for the Commonwealth in fulfilling its responsibilities for overall economic management.

The Global Approach, which has been adopted on a trial basis for 1984-85, broadens the scope of Loan Council oversight of authority borrowings, while at the same time, further increasing authorities' flexibility to borrow in ways best suited to their requirements, including enhanced access to overseas markets. Details of the new arrangements are discussed in the next section of this Chapter.

The global approach to authority borrowings

Under the new arrangements adopted by Loan Council on a trial basis in 1984-85, borrowings in *all* forms by Commonwealth and State semi-government and local authorities and Government-owned companies are to be confined to voluntarily agreed limits.

Under the *Gentlemen's Agreement* as it applied in 1983-84, the main elements of the arrangements applying to authority borrowings were as follows:

- the total and the terms and conditions of *domestic* borrowings by electricity authorities were determined by individual Loan Council members;
- the volume of 'conventional' borrowings by 'larger' non-electricity authorities were determined annually by the Loan Council ('non-conventional' forms of financing were not subjected to Loan Council approval);
- borrowings by 'smaller' authorities were subject to an annual limit of \$1.8 million per authority;
- overseas borrowings by authorities (including by electricity authorities) were limited to \$800 million (excluding trade credits complying with separate guidelines under the *Gentlemen's Agreement*) and were not permitted in overseas public markets;
- the terms and conditions of all *domestic* borrowings by authorities were determined by individual Loan Council members, those on *overseas* borrowings by the Loan Council;
- borrowings overseas by authorities for temporary purposes were not permitted;
 and
- statutory marketing authorities were permitted to borrow overseas, separate from the approved loan programs, by way of loans from or through a bank or banks for the purposes of financing stocks held or to be shipped abroad for sale to foreign buyers.

Under the Global Approach, the States and the Commonwealth agreed that new money 'global' borrowings by State and Commonwealth authorities and government-owned companies (including 'conventional' borrowings, domestic deferred payments, overseas trade credits, financial leases, sale and leaseback arrangements, security deposits and other repayable front-end capital contributions and other means of financing capital programs) would be limited, on a voluntary basis, to \$6772.4 million in 1984-85, or about the same in money terms as in 1983-84. The distribution of that total by States is shown in Table 12. As in earlier years when Loan Council approved 'larger' authorities' programs, each State is free to determine the distribution of the total among its individual authorities. The agreed 'global' limits exclude borrowings by government-owned financial institutions (except where on-lent to non-exempt authorities) and borrowings by statutory marketing authorities (except borrowings for the purpose of financing capital expenditure).

The amount for 1984-85 represents new money proposals net of the State Government program. The authority/governmental composition is not yet determined. Includes projected borrowings of \$18.9 million by government-owned companies.

Against that background, Loan Council also agreed, on a trial basis in 1984-85, that:

- the present controls on borrowings by 'larger' non-electricity authorities would be removed;
- the borrowing limit on individual 'smaller' authorities would also be removed;
- the ceiling on total overseas conventional borrowings by State authorities would be increased to \$1200 million (with the distribution thereof remaining a matter for the States themselves);
- State authorities would be permitted access to the domestic \$US and Eurodollar public markets, the Swiss Franc public market and (subject to a review by the Commonwealth of the extent of the proposed deregulation of the Japanese capital markets when it occurs) the domestic Yen and Euro-Yen public markets, with the Commonwealth retaining priority and subject to appropriate queuing and approval arrangements;
- in respect of conventional borrowings undertaken overseas within the \$1200 million ceiling:
 - prior Loan Council approval will continue to be required for approaches to be made to approved public markets, but such approval shall be delegated to individual members in respect of borrowings in non-public markets provided that the intention to undertake any particular borrowing has previously been communicated to Loan Council; and

- Loan Council approval of terms and conditions of individual borrowings will continue to be required in respect of private placements in the Sterling, Deutschemark and Dutch Guilder markets (essentially with a view to differentiating these borrowings from public issues by the Commonwealth in these relatively smaller markets), but in all other permitted markets, the approval will be delegated to the individual members who will keep Loan Council fully informed of the terms achieved;
- overseas trade credits (including buyer credits in permitted public markets)
 would continue to be outside the overseas borrowing ceiling (but within the
 overall global limits);
- subject to an overall limit of \$200 million for the States as a whole, borrowing for temporary purposes by authorities would be permitted overseas (with the distribution thereof to be determined by the States themselves). Such borrowings would fall outside the ceiling on overseas borrowings; and
- statutory marketing authorities would be permitted to borrow overseas (in addition to the purposes already permitted) for advance payments to meet up to 50 per cent of seasonal crop financing requirements and up to 50 per cent of borrowings to finance buffer stocks held in Australia, including borrowings in short term overseas security markets (such borrowings to continue to be outside the ceiling on overseas borrowings and, as noted, outside the global limits).

The States and the Commonwealth have agreed to provide Loan Council with regular and timely information on total borrowings by their authorities. One of the objectives of the new arrangements is to make clear publicly the full extent of total public sector borrowings. To formalise the adoption of the Global Approach in 1984-85, the relevant sections of the *Gentlemen's Agreement* have been suspended for that year. A review of the new arrangements is to be undertaken before the June 1985 Loan Council meeting.

The Global Approach encompasses borrowing by Commonwealth and Northern Territory authorities as well as State authorities. Details on borrowings by Commonwealth authorities are provided in Statement 6 of Budget Paper No. 1 and total borrowings by Northern Territory authorities are shown in Chapter V of this Paper. Table 96 in Appendix II shows total borrowings by Commonwealth and Northern Territory authorities.

Terms and Conditions of Borrowings

Full details of recent changes in Loan Council arrangements for approval of the terms and conditions of authorities' domestic borrowings were set out at pages 29 to 33 of the 1983-84 issue of this Paper.

From its inception, Loan Council was closely involved in the determination of the terms and conditions of borrowings undertaken by the several levels of Government in Australia. However, towards the end of the seventies, the Loan Council began to re-examine and amend the controls on terms and conditions in order to devolve more responsibility to individual Loan Council members to determine terms and conditions. So far as authority borrowings were concerned, this devolution occurred within parameters set directly by the Loan Council, including in relation to maximum coupon rates and yields, maximum underwriting and brokerage fees and to the timing of loans.

At its meetings on 2 April and 28-29 June 1979, the Loan Council approved proposed new arrangements for selling Commonwealth securities, including the introduction of a system of (generally weekly) competitive tenders for selling Treasury Notes, and a tap method of selling Treasury Bonds. With the change to the tap system for selling Treasury Bonds, maximum coupon interest rates for semi-government issues which had hitherto been set directly by Loan Council, were henceforth set at margins above the yield to maturity on the tap stocks of relevant maturity. The margins were determined by Loan Council and were, from time to time, to be reviewed by that body.

At its meeting on 26-27 June 1980, Loan Council adopted further new arrangements which, in the main, again moved in the direction of a more market-oriented approach to semi-government borrowing, including the introduction of a graduated scale of maximum placement fees (replacing previous flat rate fees for both underwriting and brokerage) and a shortening of timetables for public issues (to discourage the practice of issues being pre-sold by underwriters). However, the same meeting of Loan Council decided to impose additional restraints on the larger, better-rated authorities in favour of smaller authorities—in particular by restricting the proportion of their programs which could be raised in the first half of the financial year (the two-thirds rule) and restricting their approaches to the public market to two-monthly intervals.

Over the course of 1981-82 inadequacies became apparent in the operation of the tap system of selling Treasury Bonds and in the setting of maximum semi-government interest rates under that system. In June 1982, the Commonwealth obtained Loan Council agreement to:

- the sale of Treasury Bonds by periodic competitive tenders;
- a full delegation to the Treasurer, as Chairman, to decide the maturities, coupons and quantities of stock to be offered at, and the timing of, each tender;
- a full delegation to the Treasurer to determine the terms and conditions of Australian Savings Bonds; and
- maximum interest rates for semi-government borrowings henceforth to be set by reference to bond tender yields in the week following each tender and by reference to secondary market bond yields in other weeks.

As noted earlier in this chapter, Loan Council also decided in June 1982 to remove all control over the amount and terms of issue of domestic borrowings by electricity authorities. This placed those authorities in an advantageous position in the market vis-a-vis comparable authorities such as Telecom and some larger State non-electricity authorities which had remained subject to control over the terms and timing of their borrowings. Over the ensuing year, electricity authorities explored and introduced loan flotation techniques which had not previously been available to semi-government authorities, the success of which, together with the advent of Central Borrowing Authorities able to borrow on behalf of all authorities, contributed to the States' willingness to accept, at the Loan Council meeting on 30 June-1 July 1983, removal of Loan Council control over the terms and conditions of all authority borrowings.

As outlined in the 1983-84 issue of this Paper, the decision taken at that Loan Council meeting that the interest rates, timing and terms and conditions of authorities' domestic borrowings would in future be determined by the representative member of Loan Council completed a process of Loan Council deregulation of terms and

conditions on semi-government authorities' domestic borrowings—leaving Loan Council oversight of the terms of borrowings limited to overseas borrowings by the Commonwealth and by Commonwealth and State authorities, and Treasury Bills (used essentially as intra-governmental financing devices). As noted above, Loan Council decided at its meeting on 21 June 1984 that, as part of the new global arrangements applying on a trial basis in 1984-85, Loan Council approval of the terms and conditions of authorities' overseas borrowings would no longer be required, except in respect of private placements in the Sterling, Deutschemark and Dutch Guilder markets. It was also decided, again on a trial basis in 1984-85, that Loan Council approval would no longer be required for the terms and conditions of overseas borrowings by the Commonwealth Government.

Special Additions for Infrastructure Financing

At its meeting on 22-23 June 1978, the Loan Council adopted guidelines against which it would consider proposals for special additions to 'larger' authorities' borrowing programs for financing infrastructure. Borrowings under the infrastructure program were required to meet a number of specific criteria and could in certain circumstances be funded by overseas borrowings. Details of these guidelines and arrangements are set out fully in the 1981-82 issue of this Paper.

Between the program's inception in 1978-79 and 1983-84, actual borrowings under the infrastructure financing guidelines amounted to \$2323.6 million. Of this total, \$1396.1 million, or 60.1 per cent comprised overseas borrowings. No new projects were admitted to the infrastructure program subsequent to 1980-81.

The decision of the Loan Council meeting on 24-25 June 1982 to free electricity authority borrowings from Loan Council control had the effect of placing outside Loan Council control some 14 of the then 29 approved projects under the infrastructure financing guidelines. That decision, together with the completion of projects and the non-admission of new projects since 1980-81 saw borrowings under the guidelines decline substantially from the level reached in 1981-82 when such borrowings represented one-third of all approved borrowings by 'larger' semi-government authorities. Actual borrowings under the infrastructure guidelines in 1982-83 were \$185.6 million and in 1983-84 \$79.5 million. Under the Global Approach to authority borrowings adopted by Loan Council on a trial basis in 1984-85, the infrastructure program, together with the 'larger' non-electricity authorities' program, has been subsumed in the 'global' total.

Details of special infrastructure financing additions to the 'larger' Commonwealth and State authorities' programs since 1978-79, including approvals for non-electricity projects for 1983-84, are set out in Table 101 of Appendix II. Overseas borrowings relating to approved infrastructure projects are included in the table below.

Overseas Borrowings

Overseas borrowings by State authorities had their genesis in the infrastructure guidelines adopted at the Loan Council meeting on 22-23 June 1978.

Those guidelines provided that where the Loan Council had approved a special addition to a government's semi-government program for the purposes of infrastructure financing, the State Government and authority concerned should use their best endeavours to obtain the funds within Australia. However, in exceptional

cases, if because of inability of the domestic market to provide the funds on satisfactory terms or because of advantages to be derived from project financing involving a mix of local and overseas funds, the Government concerned considered it desirable to arrange an overseas borrowing by the authority, it could seek the approval of the Loan Council to the arranging of such a borrowing.

The guidelines also provided for Loan Council approval for an overseas borrowing under a 'normal' semi-government borrowing program where the Government concerned could demonstrate that the program could not be raised in Australia on satisfactory terms.

The guidelines prescribed a two stage approval process—namely, Loan Council approval was required for an authority to approach overseas markets, and the terms and conditions of any borrowing subsequently negotiated also required approval.

Under those arrangements, overseas borrowings required the approval of the Commonwealth. In considering any proposal for an overseas borrowing, either under an infrastructure financing addition or a 'normal' semi-government borrowing program, the Chairman of the Loan Council could, in view of the Commonwealth's overall management responsibilities, take into account the implications of the proposed borrowing for the Commonwealth's fiscal policy, monetary policy and external policy objectives and its own overseas borrowing activities.

Hence, proposals for overseas raisings were only considered on a case-by-case basis subject to the two stage approval process mentioned above. The States, however, argued that the arrangements did not permit them to develop their plans for overseas borrowings sufficiently in advance or to approach overseas markets in the most efficient manner. From June 1980 therefore, the Loan Council moved progressively to a system based on a maximum aggregate amount ('indicative ceiling') which could be borrowed overseas by State authorities during each year or half year. Commonwealth proposals in respect of the appropriate level of 'indicative ceilings' continued to take account of its fiscal, monetary and external policy objectives, but from 1980-81 individual borrowing proposals within the indicative ceiling were no longer subject to the test of funds not being available in Australia on satisfactory terms.

Prior to 1982-83, the Loan Council received only one proposal for an overseas borrowing against the 'normal' program, and that was not approved. In practice, therefore, overseas borrowings prior to that time were made up wholly by borrowings by authorities with approved infrastructure programs. Since July 1983, the States have been free to allocate overseas borrowings proceeds between their 'larger' authorities according to their own priorities and overseas borrowings by such authorities are now merely a sub-component of the overall global total.

At its meeting on 21 June 1984 the Loan Council agreed that State authorities would be permitted to borrow up to \$1200 million overseas in the course of 1984-85, with the distribution of that amount to be mutually agreed by the States. The arrangements agreed in respect of determination of the terms and conditions of overseas borrowings by State authorities were described above. Table 13 below shows overseas borrowings by State authorities since 1978-79.

CHAPTER IV—SPECIFIC PURPOSE PAYMENTS TO THE STATES

The Commonwealth provides financial assistance for a wide range of specific types of expenditure by the States. This chapter outlines specific purpose payments recently made, presently being made or proposed to be made, to the States. Table 87 in Appendix I of this Paper shows aggregate specific purpose payments to each State since 1980-81 classified as to whether they were for recurrent or capital purposes and Table 1 in Chapter I classifies these and other payments by function.

The various payments in this chapter are grouped under the functional headings used in the statements in Budget Paper No. 1—the only exceptions being that payments included in the 'Not Allocated to Function' category (namely, assistance related to State debts, assistance for local government, natural disaster relief and assistance for South West Tasmania) are shown under specific headings in appropriate places in the chapter and that various payments for Aboriginal advancement, support for steel regions and payments under water programs are grouped together (in the functional statements these are distributed over a number of functions).

ASSISTANCE RELATED TO STATE DEBTS

Payments Under the Financial Agreement

Contributions to Interest on State Debts

Under the Financial Agreement of 1927, the Commonwealth makes payments to the States described as a contribution towards interest payable on State debts. They are treated here as specific purpose grants, although they have some of the characteristics of grants for general purposes. In fact, these payments superseded the general revenue grants of \$2.50 per head of the population of each State made in the period 1910-11 to 1926-27 under the Surplus Revenue Act 1910. (See Appendix II of the 1975-76 issue of this Paper.)

Each year the total amount payable is \$15.17 million, the amount that was payable in 1926-27 under the Act. The contribution is apportioned between the States in the same way as the 1926-27 per capita grant and is to continue for 58 years from 1 July 1927 (that is, until 30 June 1985). It is distributed among the States as shown in the following table:

Sinking Fund Contributions

The Financial Agreement established arrangements for the payment of sinking fund contributions, by both the Commonwealth and State Governments, in respect of State debt or debt incurred on behalf of the States. These arrangements, with relatively minor amendments, applied from 1927-28 to 1974-75 and are summarised on page 36 of the 1974-75 issue of this Paper.

Amendments to the Financial Agreement which were ratified by the Parliaments of the Commonwealth and the States over the course of 1975-76 (the relevant Commonwealth legislation being the *Financial Agreement Act 1976*), and which had retrospective effect to 30 June 1975, provide for different sinking fund arrangements in respect of State debt which may be briefly summarised as follows:

- specified contributions were made by the States (\$121.5 million) and by the Commonwealth (\$30.2 million) in 1975-76;
- for the next nine years (ten in the case of New South Wales) the contributions will equal the amounts contributed in 1975-76 adjusted by a percentage of the difference between each State's net debt at 30 June 1975 and the net debt at 30 June immediately preceding the year of contribution; the percentage is 1.20 for State contributions and 0.28 for Commonwealth contributions; and
- as from and including 1985-86 (1986-87 in the case of New South Wales) the contributions by each State will equal 0.85 per cent of its net debt at the preceding 30 June and the Commonwealth's contribution will be 0.28 per cent.

The Financial Agreement amendments of 1975-76 also gave effect to the transfer of \$1 000 million of State debt to the Commonwealth from 30 June 1975. (See page 34 of the 1975-76 issue of this Paper.)

Further details of sinking fund arrangements may be found in the annual reports of the National Debt Commission.

The following table shows the Commonwealth's contributions to the sinking fund in respect of States' debts from 1980-81, including estimated contributions to be made in 1984-85:

DEFENCE

Housing for Servicemen

Under successive Commonwealth State Housing Agreements, provision was made from 1956-57 to 1970-71 for certain of the funds advanced annually to the States for housing to be devoted to the erection of dwellings for serving members of the Defence Force. (For further details see page 35 of the 1975-76 issue of this Paper.)

Present arrangements were first agreed between the Commonwealth and the States in 1972 and renewed in 1978. The Commonwealth State Housing Agreement (Servicemen) is being renewed without substantial alteration.

Loans for housing for servicemen in the States are provided under the same terms and conditions as loans under the Commonwealth State Housing Agreement (see below).

The following table shows the amounts provided to the States since 1980-81 and estimates for 1984-85:

Assistance to State Emergency Services

The Natural Disasters Organisation, which was formally established in 1974, is responsible for co-ordinating physical assistance provided by the Commonwealth (including that provided by the Defence Force) with the efforts made by State emergency services and local and voluntary organisations, to cope with major natural disasters and for civil defence.

The Organisation also has the function of supervising the provision of special forms of assistance to State emergency services, for the purpose of strengthening those services. The following forms of assistance are provided by the Commonwealth:

- grants are made to the States to meet the cost of salaries of an agreed number of State Emergency Services' personnel at Division or District headquarters (this assistance was first provided in 1974-75);
- grants are made on a dollar for dollar basis for the clearing of firebreaks and providing depots for emergency service units at the local level;
- capital equipment is provided to the State organisations. Equipment valued at \$1.3 million was provided in 1983-84 and it is estimated that \$1.1 million will be provided in 1984-85;
- the Commonwealth meets the costs of State Government personnel travelling to attend courses at the Australian Counter Disaster College at Mount Macedon; and
- other forms of assistance are provided from time to time.

The first two of these forms of assistance are classified as recurrent payments to the States for purposes of this and other Budget Papers. The following table shows payments made for these purposes since 1980-81 and estimated payments in 1984-85:

EDUCATION

Grants to the States for education began with assistance for the recurrent expenditures of universities in 1951-52 and the area of assistance has been progressively extended. The magnitude of Commonwealth assistance in particular areas has also been increased, the most notable example being the assumption by the Commonwealth of full financial responsibility for universities and colleges of advanced education in 1973-74 with corresponding offsets in general purpose assistance to the States. Other examples are the substantially increased assistance for schools from 1973-74, for technical and further education from 1974-75, and the provision of funds for school-to-work transition activities from 1979-80, now subsumed within the Participation and Equity Program. As a result of these developments, payments to the States for education have grown rapidly—for example, from \$259.4 million in 1972-73 to \$3343 million in 1983-84, and an estimated \$3691 million in 1984-85.

The programs of the Commonwealth Tertiary Education Commission and the Commonwealth Schools Commission have a calendar year rather than a financial year basis. Existing arrangements for triennial funding of higher education (universities and colleges of advanced education) recurrent programs are to be extended by the Commonwealth, with triennial funding arrangements for all elements of higher education programs for 1985-87 including capital and equipment as well as recurrent grants. For technical and further education, triennial funding arrangements will be implemented by the Commonwealth for the first time for 1985-87, subject to commitments by the States. Payments to the States for schools have been determined in line with a new concept of a 'Community Standard' of desirable resource levels with a target date of 1992 to achieve that Standard. From 1984 the Commonwealth reinstated the policy of announcing funding decisions on tertiary education and schools programs

in constant prices and supplementing grants retrospectively for cost increases—fully for salary and wage increases, and to the commencement of the program year for other elements. In accordance with these arrangements, separate bulk allowances of \$53.8 million and \$69.8 million have been included in the Budget for estimated cost supplementation of the States' components of the tertiary education and schools programs respectively in 1984-85.

Tertiary Education

The Commonwealth Tertiary Education Commission Act 1977 established the Commonwealth Tertiary Education Commission to promote balanced and co-ordinated development of tertiary education throughout Australia. The Commission replaced three former Commissions—the Universities Commission, the Commission on Advanced Education and the Technical and Further Education Commission—which had previously performed these functions in their respective areas. Relevant programs of assistance to the States towards these areas are administered by the Commission and currently are authorised under the States Grants (Tertiary Education Assistance) Act 1981 (as amended); further legislation will be enacted to appropriate grants for the 1985-87 triennium.

On 5 July 1984, the Minister for Education and Youth Affairs announced levels of expenditure for the 1985 tertiary education programs. In the case of universities and colleges of advanced education, these programs relate to institutions in the Australian Capital Territory as well as the States, but in the case of technical and further education, they exclude the Australian Capital Territory with the exception of grants to be recommended by the Commission under the Participation and Equity Program. Final decisions on funding of tertiary education programs in 1986 and 1987 will be made following a further report by the Commission.

Universities

Assistance to the States for the recurrent expenditure of universities dates from 1951-52. Assistance was first given for expenditure on capital programs in 1957-58. In 1973-74 the Commonwealth assumed full financial responsibility in this area.

The announced overall program of financial assistance for universities and colleges of advanced education in 1985 amounts to \$1992 million in estimated December 1983 prices. Pending a report by the Commission, due in September 1984, recommending the distribution of 1985 grants, the 1984-85 estimates include assumptions about the distribution of higher education funds between these two sectors and among States.

Colleges of Advanced Education

Assistance to the States for colleges of advanced education began in 1964-65 when the Commonwealth agreed to provide capital grants. From the start of the 1967-69 triennium, assistance was extended to include recurrent grants. Grants to the States were made from 1967-68 for teachers' colleges, and from 1968-69 for pre-school teachers' colleges. In 1973-74 these grants were absorbed into an overall program of grants for colleges of advanced education.

As mentioned above, the 1985 program for colleges of advanced education will be determined following the Commonwealth's consideration of a report by the Commonwealth Tertiary Education Commission.

Technical and Further Education

Assistance to the States for technical and further education, first provided in 1964-65, has been directed towards enhancing the quality and extending the availability of technical and further education, and compensating the States for not levying fees.

The States will be expected at least to maintain fully their own total efforts in this area.

The announced program of financial assistance in 1985 amounts to \$299 million in estimated December 1983 prices. Pending the Commission's report in September 1984, the 1984-85 estimates include assumptions about the distribution of technical and further education funds among States.

The following table shows grants to the States for technical and further education since 1980-81 and estimated grants for 1984-85; the amounts exclude grants for the Participation and Equity Program which are included in Table 23:

Schools

The Commonwealth has been providing assistance for schools in the States since 1964-65 when it provided grants for science laboratories and equipment. By 1975-76 the Commonwealth was providing grants for both government and non-government schools in a number of categories including general recurrent grants, building and library grants, programs for handicapped children, disadvantaged schools, migrants and multicultural programs, and teacher development. Notwithstanding this increasing Commonwealth involvement, the bulk of public sector funding for schools, and in particular government schools, continues to be the responsibility of the States.

The Commonwealth Schools Commission, established by the Commonwealth Schools Commission Act 1973, administers the programs of assistance to the States. The Commission's program for 1985, announced by the Minister for Education and Youth Affairs on 14 August 1984, will be \$1389 million (estimated December 1983 prices). However this amount is based on August 1983 enrolments in respect of the non-government school general recurrent grants program, and on the basis of past enrolment growth, the figure could increase by up to \$35 million. The program for 1985 compares with a program for 1984 of \$1352 million (based on the same prices and non-government school enrolment levels). Retrospective cost supplementation procedures (which commenced in 1984) will continue in 1985. The 1985 program amounts mentioned below are all in estimated December 1983 prices.

For government schools in 1985, general recurrent grants for the first time will be based on per capita subsidies for primary and secondary school students and tied to a new concept of a Community Standard of desirable resource levels. The first step towards this Standard will be taken in 1985 at a cost of \$18.2 million. Funding in later

years is to be provided on the basis of satisfactory resource agreements being negotiated with the States. The intention is to attain the Standard over the period to 1992. Government schools will also benefit from expenditure of \$5.3 million in 1985 on the new Basic Learning in Primary Schools Program developed to ensure that all children will reach an acceptable level of academic skills. In addition to these initiatives the Participation and Equity (see below) and Computer Education programs will continue into their second year at the same real levels.

For non-government schools in 1985 the new concept of a Community Standard will be applied, as for government schools. The existing four tiered per capita scheme for 1984 will be enlarged to a 12 category scheme accompanied by a revised income test. These new arrangements, along with betterments in line with the Community Standard concept, are estimated to cost \$10.6 million in 1985, and will be introduced in such a way that schools will not receive less in money terms than in 1984. However, it will be incumbent on non-government schools and systems to maintain their own funding efforts in real terms. This and other matters will be part of resource agreements between the Commonwealth and non-government schools and authorities. In addition non-government schools will also benefit from the Basic Learning in Primary Schools Program by \$1.4 million in 1985 as well as from the continuation of the Participation and Equity and Computer Education programs.

Joint Programs, that is programs in which both school sectors may participate, will continue at the same real level in 1985 as in 1984.

School-to-Work Transition

Under the previous School-to-Work Transition Program and the associated Education Program for Unemployed Youth, the Commonwealth made funds available to the States for activities in schools and technical and further education institutions directed particularly to young people who had left or were likely to leave school early. These activities were planned to better equip young people to make the transition to working life. From January 1984 the programs were subsumed within the Participation and Equity Program (see below).

The following table shows grants to the States for school-to-work transition activities since 1980-81; the amounts shown for 1983-84 represent the payments in the concluding six-month period July-December 1983.

Participation and Equity

The Participation and Equity Program, which commenced in January 1984, has the objectives of both increasing participation in education and of introducing greater equity in overall educational provision for young people. Funds for appropriate activities in schools and technical and further education institutions are administered by the relevant Commonwealth education commission and will be made available to States under the States Grants (Education Assistance—Participation and Equity) Act 1983 (as amended).

Pre-Schools

Commonwealth grants to the States for pre-schools commenced in 1973-74 with the provision of funds for both capital and recurrent purposes. Since 1977-78 for the recurrent component and 1978-79 for the capital component, the assistance has been provided in the form of block grants subject to certain broad requirements concerning priority of access.

Education Research

Grants to the States for the purposes of education research have been made under the *Education Research Act 1970*.

Payments are now made to the States for certain research and evaluation activities approved by the Minister for Education and Youth Affairs. These amounted to \$75 000 in 1983-84 and are expected to be \$120 000 in 1984-85.

Grants to the States for education research since 1980-81 and estimates for 1984-85 are shown in the tables in Appendix VI.

Video Facilities

The Commonwealth will continue for the three years 1985-87 the program under which it is providing the States with grants to make available educational video facilities on loan to children in isolated areas.

It is estimated that a total of \$842 000 will be provided to the States in 1984-85, comprising an estimated \$223 000 to New South Wales, \$12 000 to Victoria, \$409 000 to Queensland, \$99 000 to Western Australia, \$93 000 to South Australia and \$6 000 to Tasmania.

HEALTH

The Commonwealth has been providing assistance to the States for health services and facilities since 1949-50. The level of assistance rose rapidly during the 1970s with the introduction of arrangements for the sharing of net operating costs of recognised hospitals, and the beginning of the community health program and the schools dental scheme.

Under financial arrangements that commenced on 1 July 1981, New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, Western Australia and the Northern Territory receive, under the States (Tax Sharing and Health Grants) Act 1981, general purpose financial assistance identified for health purposes in lieu of specific purpose assistance previously provided by the Commonwealth for public hospital operating costs, the community health program and the school dental scheme. Assistance to South Australia and Tasmania continued to be provided under hospital cost-sharing agreements. Under these arrangements, South Australia and Tasmania received general purpose assistance payments in respect of the community health program and school dental scheme only. However, as part of the arrangements for the introduction of Medicare, from

1 February 1984 specific purpose payments to South Australia and Tasmania for health purposes under the hospital cost-sharing agreements were replaced by general purpose identified health grants. For further details of these arrangements, see Chapter II and also the 1983-84 issue of this Paper.

Medicare Compensation

As part of its Medicare program, the Commonwealth makes payments to the States and the Northern Territory designed to ensure that no government is financially disadvantaged by the introduction of Medicare into its public hospital system.

The provision of these Medicare compensation grants is subject to a number of conditions being met. Most importantly, they are provided on the basis that:

- the States and the Northern Territory will provide public hospital inpatient treatment in shared wards, and outpatient treatment, without charge to persons defined as eligible by the *Health Insurance Act 1973* unless the patient elects to be treated as a private patient; and
- charges for persons electing to be treated as private patients are set at \$80 per day for the twelve-month period commencing on 1 February 1984, and thereafter to be adjusted at six-monthly intervals.

Medicare grants to each State and the Northern Territory are designed to compensate them for:

- revenue losses associated with both the abolition of accommodation charges for public patients in public hospitals and of charges for public hospital inpatient and outpatient care and the reduction in accommodation fees for private patients in public hospitals; and
- costs arising from the increased requirement to provide medical services to public patients arising from the change in the numbers of patients with public rather than private status.

These arrangements are to continue to 30 June 1987, although they will be subject to review before the end of 1984-85. The compensation payments are to be in addition to, and independent of, the identified health grant and tax sharing arrangements.

In recognition of the special circumstances of that State, Queensland will receive under the Medicare arrangements, an additional special public hospital payment of \$35 million in 1984-85.

The Medicare grants also include an additional component designed to restore the Commonwealth's real terms contribution to community health funding to the 1975-76 level. An amount of \$18 million is included for this purpose in 1984-85.

Total payments to the States and Northern Territory under these arrangements in 1983-84 were \$274.8 million, with an estimated \$855.8 million to be provided in 1984-85. The following table shows payments to the States for Medicare in 1983-84 and 1984-85:

Hospital Cost-Sharing

As outlined in the previous section, hospital cost-sharing payments to South Australia and Tasmania ceased from 1 February 1984, being replaced by identified health grants equal in value to the amounts these States would have received in respect of the period 1 February 1984 to 30 June 1984 in the absence of the Medicare arrangements.

Launceston General Hospital

Under an agreement with the Tasmanian Government, the Commonwealth is meeting 50 per cent of the approved costs of Stage 1 of the redevelopment of the Launceston General Hospital. Payments to Tasmania for this purpose from 1976-77 to 1983-84 have totalled \$21.9 million. An amount of \$250 000 will be made available in 1984-85 as a final payment in respect of the Commonwealth contribution to the Stage 1 redevelopment.

In addition, the Commonwealth is to fund 50 per cent of the approved cost of construction of a centralised laundry facility at the hospital at an indicative total cost of \$4.6 million. An amount of \$50 000 is to be provided in 1984-85 as an initial contribution for the commencement of construction of the laundry.

Drug Education

The Commonwealth is continuing to sponsor, in conjunction with the States, the National Drug Education Program. Funds have been provided to support State and national projects of drug education since 1970-71. It is estimated that \$1.8 million will be made available to the States for this purpose in 1984-85. Grants paid to the States since 1980-81 and estimates for 1984-85 are shown in the following table:

Blood Transfusion Service

Grants have been made to the States since 1953-54 for the purpose of assisting blood transfusion services conducted by the Australian Red Cross Society.

The annual operating costs of the services in the States are met by the States (60 per cent), the Society (the lower of 5 per cent of operating costs or 10 per cent of the previous year's income from donations) and the Commonwealth (the balance). Approved capital costs in the States are shared equally by the Commonwealth and the States.

Diseases Control

The Commonwealth has provided since 1974 assistance to the States on a dollar for dollar basis to control Australian Encephalitis. In 1983-84 the program was expanded into the National Diseases Control Program to control other mosquito-borne diseases such as dengue fever and Ross River virus infection.

Disposal of Ships' Garbage

The Commonwealth reimburses those States that have agreed to provide on its behalf seaport waste disposal facilities. Funds are made available for the provision and installation of new and replacement waste disposal facilities, including ancillary equipment and approved specialised transport and collection equipment, and necessary buildings, fences and access roads.

Grants paid to the States from 1980-81 and estimates for 1984-85 are shown in the tables in Appendix VI.

High Security Human Quarantine Unit

In 1982-83 the Commonwealth completed the establishment of a national high security human quarantine unit at the Fairfield Infectious Diseases Hospital, Victoria. The cost of constructing the unit (\$3.1 million), was met in full by the Commonwealth. In 1984-85, \$110 000 is being provided for repairs to the unit.

SOCIAL SECURITY AND WELFARE

Welfare Services for the Aged

Home Care Services

Under the States Grants (Home Care) Act 1969, the Commonwealth shares with the States, on a dollar for dollar basis, the cost of approved house-keeping or other domestic assistance provided wholly or mainly for aged persons in their homes. Grants provided since 1980-81 and estimates for 1984-85 are shown in the following table:

Senior Citizens' Centres

Under the States Grants (Home Care) Act 1969, the Commonwealth shares with participating States, on a \$2 for \$1 basis, up to a maximum of two-thirds of the approved capital cost of senior citizens' centres. The Commonwealth also shares, on a dollar for dollar basis, the salaries of welfare officers employed in connection with such centres.

Paramedical Services

The Commonwealth shares on a dollar for dollar basis with participating States the cost of approved paramedical services, such as chiropody, occupational therapy, physiotherapy and speech therapy, provided wholly or mainly for aged persons in their homes. Grants up to specified amounts are made in the first instance through the States Grants (Paramedical Services) Act 1969. However, where a State has an approved requirement for funds in excess of the limits prescribed by that Act, provision may be made for a supplementary grant through an Appropriation Act.

Although all States have indicated their willingness to participate, to date paramedical services have been approved for funding purposes under the provisions of the Act, in respect of only Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania. Annual figures of grants paid to these States for paramedical services since 1980-81 and estimates for 1984-85 are shown in the following table:

Crisis Accommodation

Grants to the States totalling \$12.5 million are being provided in 1984-85 within the Commonwealth State Housing Agreement under a new Crisis Accommodation Program which is to be complementary to the new Supported Accommodation Assistance Program discussed below.

These grants replace the Crisis Accommodation for Families in Distress Program, capital payments under the Homeless Persons' Assistance Program and payments for capital purposes made in 1983-84 under the Women's Emergency Services Program. Total payments to the States for capital purposes under these programs were \$3.7 million in 1983-84.

Supported Accommodation Assistance

Subject to agreement with the States, the Government intends to introduce from 1 January 1985 a new Supported Accommodation Assistance Program. The program will incorporate the existing Women's Emergency Services Program, Homeless Persons' Assistance Program, Youth Services Scheme and elements of the Children's Services Program. An additional \$14.3 million will be available for these purposes from 1 January 1985.

Women's Emergency Services

The Commonwealth provided \$3.8 million to the States in 1983-84 for the National Women's Emergency Services Program for additional assistance for women's refuges to allow for the phasing-in of award wages for women's refuge workers, expansion of existing services, and new services. This program will cease from 1 January 1985 and will be subsumed within the new Supported Accommodation Assistance Program. Payments to the States in 1984-85 are estimated at \$1.9 million.

Children's Services

Services for children provided in the States began attracting Commonwealth financial support in 1972-73 under the *Child Care Act 1972*. Under that Act, payments were made directly to non-profit organisations and local government bodies—that is, not by way of payments to the States. Payments to the States commenced in 1973-74 under a broader scheme of assistance introduced in that year and have continued since then, as have the direct forms of payment.

The program of assistance is administered by the Office of Child Care which was established under the Minister for Social Security to advise on programs providing capital and recurrent assistance for pre-school and child care projects, including home care, vacation and after school care projects and various other community initiated projects. Funds for pre-schools are included under the 'Education' function discussed earlier in this Chapter.

The Government has decided that \$124.6 million will be provided in 1984-85 for children's services other than pre-schools. It is estimated that, of that total, approximately \$23.1 million will take the form of payments to the States.

Family Support Services

Since 1978-79, the Commonwealth has provided funds to the States for the Family Support Services Scheme under the Children's Services Program. The Government has decided to provide a further separate allocation of \$2.9 million to the States in 1984-85 to enable the scheme to continue until 30 September 1985.

Rehabilitation Centres

The Commonwealth and Tasmanian Governments agreed in 1974 to share the costs of establishing and operating a joint rehabilitation centre for handicapped persons in Hobart. The arrangement provides for the Commonwealth to meet up to half the capital cost of building and equipping the centre and to contribute 70 per cent of the annual running costs. A final capital payment of \$18 000 was made in 1983-84.

Recurrent payments to Tasmania for this purpose in 1984-85 are estimated to be \$1.5 million. The Commonwealth will also provide \$344 000 in 1984-85 to assist the New South Wales Government's rehabilitation centre in Newcastle.

Mortgage and Rent Relief

Under this program, which began in 1982-83, the Commonwealth makes available funds, on a dollar for dollar matching basis with the States and Territories, for short-term assistance to low-income home buyers experiencing extreme difficulty in meeting their mortgage repayments and to low-income private renters experiencing similar difficulty in meeting rent payments or in gaining access to private rental accommodation. This program has been incorporated as a sub-program of the Commonwealth State Housing Agreement in 1984-85. Of a total program of \$22.0 million for the States and Territories in 1984-85, \$21.5 million is for payment to the States. The States received \$17.9 million overall in 1983-84.

Translating and Interpreting Service

Since 1979-80, the Commonwealth has offered the States and Northern Territory assistance towards the provision of additional State-operated translating and interpreting services in areas of prime State responsibility. Following a review of post-arrival services for migrants by the Australian Institute of Multicultural Affairs in 1982, the Commonwealth decided to extend support for these services for a further three years. In 1983-84, New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland and South Australia received a total of \$550 000 for this purpose. Payments to the States since 1980-81 and estimated payments in 1984-85 are given in Appendix VI.

ABORIGINAL ADVANCEMENT

Since 1968-69 the Commonwealth has provided special assistance to the States for Aboriginal advancement purposes through programs administered by the Department of Aboriginal Affairs. This assistance embraces the fields of health (including environmental health), education, training, employment, social support, community management and services, and culture and recreation. It is provided by way of supplementation of expenditure incurred by the States.

It is estimated that some \$38.0 million will be provided to the States in 1984-85 (\$36.5 million in 1983-84) for Aboriginal advancement purposes, comprising:

- \$16.4 million for payment to State Health Departments and authorities to stimulate, support and co-ordinate health programs;
- \$9.7 million for payment to State Education Departments and authorities for the implementation and support of special Aboriginal education programs, including the employment of Aboriginal teacher aides;
- \$3.4 million for employment and training programs designed to provide employment for Aborigines and vocational training programs;
- \$2.1 million for social and welfare services:
- \$6.4 million to assist in the provision and maintenance of essential services and basic community amenities such as water, sewerage, and power generation and reticulation services at Aboriginal communities; and
- \$40 000 for cultural and recreational programs.

Special housing assistance for Aborigines previously funded through the Department of Aboriginal Affairs has, since 1981-82, been provided under the public housing arrangements discussed below.

The following table shows payments made to the States since 1980-81 and estimated payments in 1984-85. Details of these payments by function are in Table 104 in Appendix III.

HOUSING

Public Housing

Under successive arrangements between the Commonwealth and the States since 1945-46, financial assistance has been made available to the States for the provision of housing, including assistance with home ownership, for families with low or moderate incomes.

For many years, housing funds have been closely aligned with the State Governments' Loan Council programs. For two years, 1971-72 and 1972-73, they were integrated within these programs (although additional specific recurrent grants of \$2.75 million per year in respect of each of those two years were provided in lieu of former interest subsidies, and continue to be payable for 30 years). From 1973-74, when appropriate 'offsets' were made to State Governments' Loan Council programs, financial assistance for public housing has been provided by way of specific purpose payments. These payments have been made subject to the provisions of successive Commonwealth State Housing Agreements which have included requirements for the States to match, on a dollar for dollar basis, certain Commonwealth assistance.

Since 1982-83, these payments have been supplemented by arrangements under which each State is able to nominate an additional amount from its Loan Council program for the purpose of public housing, providing that it is able to first meet the matching requirements of the Commonwealth State Housing Agreement (CSHA) for expenditure on public housing from its own resources (see below). These nominated funds are made available on the same concessional loan terms and conditions that have applied under the CSHA to advances for public housing. Under the arrangements in 1983-84, the States nominated a total of \$227.1 million from their Loan Council

programs for public housing. Most States have not yet formally advised the amounts they intend to nominate in 1984-85, but it is estimated that States will nominate about \$275 million.

Except for the recurrent grants referred to above and the nominated funds for public housing, payments to the States in 1984-85 are to be made under a new ten year Commonwealth State Housing Agreement which will be executed with the States and the Northern Territory later this year. As under previous Agreements, the 1984 Agreement places particular importance on the provision of assistance to those most in need. The States have flexibility in determining the uses to which housing funds can be put and the extent of assistance to individuals. The 1984 Agreement will provide for:

- guaranteed minimum Commonwealth funding of at least \$1500 million for the first three years of the Agreement;
- broadened eligibility criteria to ensure that single people, particularly young single people can qualify for assistance;
- rents for public housing tenants based on the cost of providing the accommodation, with rent rebates for those unable to afford this amount;
- rental purchase schemes to facilitate home ownership for those who cannot save a deposit;
- low start loans for home purchase assistance with repayments based on income; and
- separately identified funds for assistance to specific groups and for specific purposes.

In 1984-85 the Commonwealth will provide a total of \$623.3 million as grants to the States and the Northern Territory for public housing, including funds for the Mortgage and Rent Relief Program, the Crisis Accommodation Program and the Local and Community Housing Program.

These programs, with a total allocation of \$40.9 million to the States (\$409 000 to the Northern Territory) in 1984-85, have not been included in previous CSHAs. Excluding these amounts, funding to the States and the Northern Territory will be \$582 million in 1984-85 compared with the \$500 million provided in 1983-84. Total grants to the States in 1984-85 will be \$592.5 million and grants to the Northern Territory will be \$30.8 million.

Pensioner Housing

Since 1969-70, the Commonwealth has provided grants to the States to assist with the provision of self-contained accommodation at reasonable rentals for certain categories of pensioners who have little or no means of support apart from their pensions. Since 1978-79 these grants have been provided under the Commonwealth State Housing Agreement. Eligible persons include those in receipt of an age or invalid pension, a widow's pension, a supporting parent's benefit, a special benefit, a sheltered employment allowance, a rehabilitation allowance in certain circumstances, and some classes of service pension. Grants totalling \$34.5 million have been allocated to the States for this purpose in 1984-85—an increase of \$3.0 million over funding in 1983-84. Funding for the Northern Territory in 1984-85 is \$500 000. These grants do not have to be matched by the States.

Aboriginal Housing

Grants to the States totalling \$42.4 million in 1984-85 are provided under the Commonwealth State Housing Agreement for Aborigines in need of rental housing assistance, the same amount as allocated in 1983-84. Grants to the Northern Territory in 1984-85 for Aboriginal housing total \$9.6 million. These amounts include the transfer to the public housing program of grants to the States for Aboriginal housing provided before 1981-82 through the Department of Aboriginal Affairs. These grants do not have to be matched by the States.

Local and Community Housing

In 1984-85, \$7.0 million will be provided as grants to the States and Northern Territory for a new Local and Community Housing Program, of which \$6.9 million represents payments to the States.

The grants will be provided to enable the States and the Northern Territory to assist local government, community and welfare organisations to purchase, construct, lease or upgrade dwellings for low cost rental housing. These dwellings may also be wholly or jointly owned by State Housing Authorities but managed by the local government, community or welfare organisation. These grants do not have to be matched by the States.

Other Housing Assistance—Grants

In 1984-85, \$495 million is to be provided to the States and the Northern Territory under the Commonwealth State Housing Agreement as grant assistance for public housing not tied to specific housing programs. Of this amount, \$474.7 million will be provided to the States. Under the 1981 Agreement, these grants and other housing assistance in the form of loans were provided on a dollar for dollar matching basis. However, in 1984-85 the States are required to match only \$431.6 million of these grants. (The Northern Territory matching requirement in 1984-85 is \$18.4 million.) The States are free to allocate the grants between home purchase assistance programs and rental housing programs as they wish. This assistance to the States compares to similar grants of \$258.7 million in 1983-84.

Other Housing Assistance—Loans

In 1984-85, as a special concession, all assistance to the States and the Northern Territory under the Commonwealth State Housing Agreement will be provided in the form of grants. In 1983-84, loans to the States under the CSHA were \$138.7 million, the same as in 1982-83. Loans are repayable over 53 years and attract a concessional fixed rate of interest of 4.5 per cent. Under the 1981 Agreement, loans and other housing assistance in the form of grants were provided on a dollar for dollar matching basis.

URBAN AND REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT NEC AND THE ENVIRONMENT

Payments to the States included under this functional heading relate to a number of programs, including assistance for development of Aboriginal communities. Payments in 1983-84 were \$56.7 million and are expected to total approximately \$26.3 million in 1984-85 (these figures are net of repayments).

Payments in 1984-85 for most of the urban and regional development programs and for certain programs falling under other functional headings are being made mainly under the authority of the *Urban and Regional Development (Financial Assistance)* Act 1974.

Growth Centres

No loan assistance will be provided for growth centres in 1984-85.

The 1984-85 Budget provides for \$34.8 million for capitalised interest on advances to the States for Albury-Wodonga in 1982-83 and earlier years, and on earlier advances for the Bathurst-Orange and Macarthur growth centres.

The capitalised interest provisions in the estimates represent, in effect, notional advances to the States which are offset by equivalent notional receipts from the States. The notional advances indicate the extent of the concession actually afforded the States by the deferment of interest payments. In 1983-84 capitalised interest amounted to \$37.4 million.

Repayments of \$86 000 in respect of loans previously provided to New South Wales and Victoria for municipal works at Albury-Wodonga are scheduled for 1984-85. In addition, repayments of \$458 000 in respect of loans previously provided to Victoria for Albury-Wodonga, and \$580 000 in respect of loans previously provided to New South Wales for the Albury-Wodonga, Bathurst-Orange and Macarthur growth centres, are scheduled to commence in 1984-85.

Payments to the States for growth centres and related projects since 1980-81, including capitalised interest, are given in Appendix VI.

Urban Flood Mitigation

Since 1978-79, \$19.6 million has been provided for urban floodplain management under the National Water Resources Program including \$5.6 million in 1983-84. Details of this assistance are provided in Table 47. Further assistance for urban floodplain management in 1984-85 will be allocated from funds provided for the Federal Water Resources Assistance Program.

Land Acquisition and Development in Urban Areas

In 1973-74 a program of assistance by way of grants and loans was undertaken with the object of making land available for residential and associated uses at fair prices and to facilitate the planning and development of new urban areas. The last payments under this program were in 1977-78.

South Australia and Victoria have subsequently reached agreement with the Commonwealth to make lump sum payments over a number of years in settlement of the loans provided in earlier years for assistance to the South Australian Land Commission and the Victorian Urban Land Council/Urban Land Authority respectively. In addition, New South Wales has reached agreement with the Commonwealth to settle in

full that State's debt in respect of loans previously provided to the New South Wales Land Commission, by a single payment in 1984-85. Payments totalling \$9.5 million (including the final payment from South Australia) were received in 1983-84. Repayments in 1984-85 are estimated at \$21.1 million, representing the final payment from Victoria (\$4.0 million), the lump sum settlement for New South Wales (\$17.0 million), and repayments (\$173 000) relating to the 1974-75 loan agreements with Western Australia in respect of its Land Commission.

Capitalised interest on loans provided to New South Wales and Western Australia in 1977-78 and earlier years is estimated at \$4.0 million in 1984-85. Capitalised interest since 1980-81 and estimated capitalised interest for 1984-85 are given in Appendix VI.

Woolloomooloo Redevelopment

An agreement was concluded in 1974-75 with New South Wales under which up to \$17 million is being provided by way of grants for acquisition of 3.2 hectares of property, and for planning and site development in the Woolloomooloo Basin in Sydney. Payments to the State have amounted to \$16.8 million since 1975-76, including \$512 000 in 1983-84, and it is expected that \$210 000, the balance of funds available under the agreement, will be paid in 1984-85.

The Commonwealth also agreed to transfer, at no cost to the State, 2.6 hectares of Commonwealth property in the Woolloomooloo Basin which was valued in excess of \$11 million.

The agreement also provides for the State to make payments to the Commonwealth in respect of each unit of public housing produced on the property acquired by or transferred to the State, and payment of the receipts from any part of the property that is not retained for public housing. A total of \$3.2 million has been received from the State under these provisions since 1976-77, including \$306 000 in 1983-84. Similar payments by the State in 1984-85 are estimated to be \$355 000.

The amounts shown in Appendix VI are net amounts after deductions of these receipts.

Captains Flat Pollution Abatement Works

New South Wales is to be provided with \$294 000 in 1984-85 under the Captains Flat (Abatement of Pollution) Agreement Act 1975 to rectify some deficiencies in the original works program for the abatement of mine waste pollution of the Molonglo River.

Sewerage Works-Western Australia

The Commonwealth agreed to provide a grant of \$20.0 million to Western Australia as a special payment towards the cost of construction of a sewerage pipeline in the Cockburn Sound area from Woodman Point to the sea off Cape Peron. Of this amount, \$7.9 million, representing the final payment for the pipeline, was provided in 1983-84.

CULTURE AND RECREATION

The Commonwealth first provided grants to the States for cultural and recreational purposes in 1973-74. An estimated \$31.1 million will be made available for these purposes in 1984-85.

Nature Conservation

Under the States Grants (Nature Conservation) Act 1974, agreements were concluded between the Commonwealth and the States for the acquisition of specific areas of land for nature conservation. Under the terms of the agreements, an estimated \$12 000 remains to be disbursed to Victoria when financial settlement arrangements have been completed. Under the Environmental (Financial Assistance) Act 1977 an amount of \$200 000 was provided to Queensland in 1983-84 for the acquisition of land for nature conservation. No further payments under this Act are envisaged for 1984-85.

Payments made to the States for nature conservation purposes since 1980-81 and estimates for 1984-85 are given in Appendix VI.

National Estate

Since 1974 grants have been provided for the restoration, preservation and improvement of landscapes and buildings of special significance. The Australian Heritage Commission, established in 1975 under the Australian Heritage Commission Act 1975, provides advice to the Commonwealth on the programs of assistance in respect of these matters. All grants to the States are made in accordance with agreements concluded under the Urban and Regional Development (Financial Assistance) Act 1974.

Port Arthur Conservation

Beginning in 1979-80 the Commonwealth has been providing grants on a \$2 for \$1 basis to Tasmania for a seven-year program to restore and develop the Port Arthur region. Payments up to and including 1983-84 have been \$4.9 million, and \$600 000 is to be made available in 1984-85.

International Standard Sporting Facilities

In 1981-82 the Commonwealth introduced a three-year program to develop international standard sporting facilities in the States and Territories. In 1983-84, \$8.0 million was provided to the States and the Northern Territory and an estimate of \$5.8 million has been included in the Budget for 1984-85 to cover outstanding amounts under that program. In addition, a new expanded three-year program of assistance has been initiated by the Commonwealth which will involve the States, Territories, local government and sporting bodies. Commonwealth contributions to approved projects are being made on the basis of claims by the States and Territories.

International Youth Year

In preparation for the International Youth Year (1985) the Commonwealth is providing funds for International Youth Year activities. In addition to funds provided for national promotion and co-ordination, \$217 000 is being provided to the States in 1984-85 to increase their participation in these activities.

Details of estimated payments to the States in 1984-85 are shown in the tables in Appendix VI.

Australian Bicentenary

The Commonwealth has agreed to provide the States with \$48 million (in July 1982 prices) for the Commonwealth-State Bicentennial Commemorative Program with an initial payment of \$10 million to be provided in 1984-85. The estimated amounts to be paid to each State are given in the tables in Appendix VI.

Defence of the America's Cup

The Commonwealth has decided to provide up to \$30 million for projects associated with the defence of the America's Cup at Fremantle in 1987. In 1984-85, \$6.0 million has been provided of which up to \$4.0 million may take the form of payments to Western Australia.

Sesquicentenary Celebrations—Victoria and South Australia

The Commonwealth is providing grants of \$5.0 million and \$2.0 million towards preparations for sesquicentenary celebrations in Victoria and South Australia respectively. In 1984-85, \$1.9 million is being provided to Victoria and \$525 000 to South Australia.

ECONOMIC SERVICES—TRANSPORT

Payments to the States included under this functional heading are in respect of assistance for roads and bridges, aerodrome local ownership, improving the transportation system in Victoria, railway mainline upgrading projects, and replacement of the Bass Strait passenger vessel.

Aerodrome Local Ownership Plan

The Aerodrome Local Ownership Plan was established to facilitate the transfer to local ownership of Commonwealth-owned aerodromes servicing local needs, with the objectives of encouraging the rational development of Australian aerodromes and their more

efficient administration. Under the Plan, the Commonwealth provides grants towards the cost of upgrading aerodromes at the time of transfer to local ownership and towards the development and maintenance of locally owned aerodromes. Most aerodromes transferred under the Plan are owned by local authorities, but some are owned by State semi-government authorities operating in local areas.

Payments for those aerodromes which are operated by State semi-government authorities are classified as payments to the States. Details of payments made direct to local authorities can be found in Chapter VI. Details of payments to the States since 1981-82 and estimates for 1984-85 are given in Appendix VI.

Roads

The Commonwealth has been providing assistance to the States for expenditure on roads since 1923-24. Details of this assistance in past years may be obtained from earlier issues of this Paper and, in particular, from the 1975-76 issue which provides details of Commonwealth assistance from 1923-24.

The main forms of Commonwealth assistance to the States and the Northern Territory for roads are grants made under the Roads Grants Acts and the Australian Bicentennial Roads Development program. Total assistance in 1983-84 was \$1195.2 million, a 40.5 per cent increase over payments in 1982-83. Estimated payments in 1984-85 are to increase by a further 3.3 per cent to \$1234.7 million.

Grants under the Roads Grants Acts

In 1984-85, the Commonwealth is to provide \$797.2 million to the States and \$26.2 million to the Northern Territory under the *Roads Grants Act 1981* as part of the commitment announced by the Commonwealth in June 1980 to provide \$3650 million as roads assistance over the period 1980-81 to 1984-85.

Australian Bicentennial Road Development

In addition to assistance provided under the *Roads Grants Act 1981*, the Commonwealth introduced in 1982-83 the Australian Bicentennial Road Development program with the overall aim of developing the Australian road system to a high standard by 1988, the Bicentenary Year.

This program is financed by a surcharge on excise on motor spirit and distillate paid into the Australian Bicentennial Road Development Trust Fund. The level of the surcharge applying from 1 July 1983 until the termination of the program on 31 December 1988 is two cents per litre; an initial surcharge of one cent per litre was applied from 18 August 1982 to 30 June 1983. Expenditure under this program is estimated at \$417.0 million in 1984-85 compared with \$417.2 million in 1983-84. It is estimated that the program will involve overall expenditure of about \$2500 million over the period to 1988-89.

Burbong Bridge—Canberra/Batemans Bay Road

The old Burbong Bridge, located near the border of the Australian Capital Territory, is being replaced by a new bridge being built nearby in New South Wales by the appropriate authorities in that State. Planning and construction is estimated to cost \$3.3 million. The Commonwealth provided \$1.0 million for this purpose in 1983-84 and will provide \$1.4 million in 1984-85.

Second Hobart Bridge

The Commonwealth has agreed to fund the full cost of planning and constructing the Second Hobart Bridge and necessary approach roads. The bridge was opened in early 1984 at an estimated total cost of \$50.7 million. An amount of \$4.9 million was provided in 1983-84, and an estimated \$4.0 million is to be made available in 1984-85 to complete the project.

Railway Mainline Upgrading Projects

For many years the Commonwealth has provided financial assistance to those States which operate their own rail systems for expenditure on specific major rail standardisation and other railway projects.

Payments under this program ceased in 1982-83. The tables in Appendix VI show payments made to the States in the period 1980-81 to 1982-83, and capitalised interest thereafter.

Railway Projects

Under the Railway Agreement (Western Australia) Act 1961 financial assistance is being provided to Western Australia for the construction of a standard gauge railway from Kwinana to Koolyanobbing, with an extension to Kalgoorlie, and for the purchase of rolling stock for the railway.

The Act provides no time limit but imposes a project cost ceiling of \$106.3 million; \$102.9 million was advanced by the Commonwealth between 1962-63 and 1977-78. It is estimated that \$70 000 will be provided during 1984-85 under the Act.

Replacement of Bass Strait Passenger Vessel

The Commonwealth is providing up to \$26 million in assistance to Tasmania for the purchase and modification of a replacement vessel for the *Empress of Australia* on the Bass Strait service, and towards the associated costs of upgrading terminal facilities. An amount of \$958 000 was provided in 1983-84 as a deposit for the selected replacement vessel, leaving approximately \$25 million available for payment to Tasmania in 1984-85.

Transport Improvement—Victoria

The Commonwealth will provide a special assistance grant of \$19.0 million to Victoria for 1984-85 only, for the improvement of public transport facilities.

ECONOMIC SERVICES—WATER SUPPLY AND ELECTRICITY

Urban Water Supply

Since 1978-79, the Commonwealth has provided \$41.2 million under the National Water Resources Program in respect of urban water supply facilities including \$15.5 million in 1983-84. In 1983-84 the Commonwealth contributed towards the costs of

construction of water treatment plants in the Adelaide metropolitan area (\$5.4 million), construction of a water filtration plant on the Morgan-Whyalla Pipeline (\$2.3 million), construction of the Harding River Dam to provide additional water supplies for the West Pilbara region (\$4.8 million), and construction of the Tanjil Dam in Victoria to provide water supply for power generation and urban and industrial development (\$2.0 million). Further funds in 1984-85 for such purposes will be allocated from funds provided for the Federal Water Resources Assistance Program.

Water Quality Improvement—South Australia

The Commonwealth will provide a special assistance grant of \$7.0 million to South Australia in 1984-85 for projects to improve water quality.

ECONOMIC SERVICES—INDUSTRY ASSISTANCE AND DEVELOPMENT

Rural Adjustment

Under an agreement reached between the Commonwealth and the States in 1976, assistance is provided under the *States Grants (Rural Adjustment) Act 1976*, for the purposes of a Rural Adjustment Scheme embracing debt reconstruction, farm build-up, farm improvement, carry-on finance, rehabilitation and household support.

Assistance for debt reconstruction, farm build-up, farm improvement, and rehabilitation is provided 85 per cent by loan and 15 per cent by grant. The Commonwealth contributes a further amount towards administrative expenses. For the household support component, the Commonwealth finances all assistance and contributes to administrative expenses. The States and the Commonwealth share equally both the financing of loans and all principal and interest repayments for carry-on finance.

Assistance under the scheme in 1983-84 amounted to \$43.2 million of which \$10.5 million was for carry-on assistance to the sugar industry in Queensland and New South Wales for 1983-84 only. An estimated \$24.8 million will be provided in 1984-85.

Following consideration of the Industries Assistance Commission's report on the Rural Adjustment Scheme, the Commonwealth is negotiating with the States on a range of amendments to take effect from 1 July 1985.

Supplementary Assistance for Apple and Pear Growing Industries

In early 1974 the Commonwealth agreed to provide assistance on a dollar for dollar matching basis with Queensland, Western Australia and Tasmania, to supplement assistance available under the Apple and Pear Stabilization Scheme. These arrangements have continued and, with the exception of New South Wales, all States have participated at various times.

In 1981 new arrangements were introduced. The Stabilization Scheme was terminated in respect of pears and is being phased out over four years for apples. At the same time, the Commonwealth agreed to underwrite apple and pear export returns during the 1981-85 export seasons at 95 per cent of the weighted average return during the four immediately preceding years. The Commonwealth also agreed to continue the provision of supplementary assistance on a similar basis with the States but with it being more flexible with a view to facilitating structural adjustment within the apple and pear industry.

The following table shows payments that have been made to the States for this purpose since 1980-81 and estimated payments in 1984-85:

Adjustment Assistance for the Canning Fruit Growing Industry

The Commonwealth agreed to a program of assistance in 1983-84 for the removal of canning peach and pear trees surplus to long-term market requirements. Funds were to be provided in the first instance to participating States for on-lending to growers. Only Victoria participated in the program in 1983-84 and it was advanced \$279 000. In 1984-85 only South Australia is expected to participate and will receive assistance estimated at \$600 000.

A non-recurring advance of \$4.1 million was made to the New South Wales Government in 1983-84 for payment to the Letona Co-operative Ltd as an interest free loan, repayable within a period of 15 years. The payment was directed towards restructuring the debt of the Co-operative and restoring viability to its cannery operations.

Plant Genetic Resources

The Commonwealth is providing grants of \$357 000 in 1984-85 to New South Wales (\$177 000), Western Australia (\$109 000) and South Australia (\$71 000) for the purpose of upgrading storage facilities relating to State plant genetic resource programs.

International Sugar Agreement

Under its obligations as a member of the 1977 International Sugar Agreement, Australia has set aside 380 908 tonnes of special reserve stocks of raw sugar. To help defray the costs of these special stocks, Australia obtained drawings of \$36.7 million from the Buffer Stock Financing Facility of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) in 1982-83. Upon receipt, these funds were on-lent to Queensland on the same terms and conditions under which they were received.

In late 1983, the IMF invoked its right to recall the loan in view of Australia's improved balance of payments position. The Commonwealth repaid the drawing by 30 November 1983. Due to exchange rate movements, the amount repaid to the IMF, and subsequently recovered from Queensland, was \$37.2 million.

In addition, an interest free loan of \$3.9 million was received in 1983-84 from the Stock Financing Fund of the International Sugar Organisation for on-lending to Queensland. This fund is financed through a levy on traded sugar. In 1984-85 Australia is eligible for further loans of around \$3.2 million from the Stock Financing Fund.

Eradication of Bovine Brucellosis and Tuberculosis

Since 1970 the Commonwealth has joined with the States in an intensified national campaign for the eradication of bovine brucellosis and tuberculosis. In 1984-85, \$21.3 million will be paid to the States for operational expenditure on the campaign from the National Cattle Disease Eradication Trust Account. These funds are recovered from industry through levies on the slaughter and export of livestock.

In 1973 the Commonwealth joined with the mainland States in a scheme to compensate owners of livestock slaughtered following positive reaction to bovine tuberculois tests, and from July 1976, joined with these States in a bovine brucellosis slaughter compensation scheme. Since 1983-84, the Commonwealth has met 75 per cent of net slaughter compensation. An estimated \$7.1 million is to be paid to the States for compensation in 1984-85.

The Commonwealth has also agreed to provide an additional \$1.6 million in 1984-85, on a dollar for dollar matching basis with the States, for expenditure on a range of new assistance measures.

Exotic Diseases Eradication

The Commonwealth is to provide \$120 000 in 1984-85 for feral animal control as part of the new exotic diseases preparedness program. Amounts estimated to be paid to the States are in the tables in Appendix VI.

Agricultural Research

Commonwealth Special Research Grants have been made to the States since 1960-61 to finance special investigation projects of a new, limited nature, usually on a dollar for dollar matching basis with the States and/or industry. Grants to the States are estimated to be \$185 000 in 1984-85, with \$121 000 being provided in 1983-84. In 1984-85, \$220 000 will also be made available for projects sponsored by the Australian Agricultural Council under a separate program. In 1983-84, \$178 000 was provided for this purpose.

AMDEL Pilot Plant Relocation

In 1984-85 the Commonwealth will provide \$166 000 to the South Australian Government as a contribution to the cost of the relocation of the pilot plant operated by the Australian Mineral Development Laboratories.

Soil Conservation

The Commonwealth is to provide \$3.3 million in 1984-85 to the States and the Northern Territory for the National Soil Conservation Program. The program, which commenced in 1983-84, provides financial assistance to the States and the Northern Territory for the purposes of soil conservation and related research and extension activities. An amount of \$600 000 was paid to the States and the Northern Territory in 1983-84 with a further amount of \$400 000 expended by the Commonwealth on a national publicity campaign.

Barrier Reef Island Tourist Resorts—Diesel Fuel Costs

The Commonwealth will provide an estimated \$500 000 in 1984-85 to Queensland to subsidise certain diesel fuel costs to Great Barrier Reef island tourist resorts.

The subsidy was introduced in the 1983-84 Budget as an assistance measure to offset the higher costs involved in generating electricity using diesel fuel on islands not connected to the mainland electrical grid. Payments in 1983-84 totalled \$315 000.

Water Resources Management and Development

The Commonwealth has for many years provided financial assistance to the States for water-related purposes. This assistance has come under a number of functional headings. While the following table groups all of the relevant assistance together, several projects are also discussed elsewhere in this Paper and in Budget Paper No. 1, under their appropriate functional headings.

In November 1977, the Commonwealth established a National Water Resources Program (NWRP) to provide funds for water-related purposes. Assistance to the Northern Territory for these purposes has also been provided under this program since 1980-81. Over the life of the program, \$191.0 million has been provided, of which \$177.9 million was provided to the States and the Northern Territory for development of water resources.

The NWRP has now been superseded by the Federal Water Resources Assistance Program (FWRAP), which brings together all previous Commonwealth programs of assistance for water resource development. Although details are still to be finalised, the following activities will be eligible for assistance under FWRAP:

- water resource development or management activities/projects for agricultural, urban or industrial purposes;
- floodplain management:
- water resources assessment programs;
- salinity reduction and drainage;
- State-wide or broad regional water plans; and
- public education on water-related matters.

The 1983-84 assistance of \$43.6 million was provided under the National Water Resources Program. Of this amount \$40.7 million was provided to the States and \$1.4 million to the Northern Territory. The balance, not classified as payments to the States and the Northern Territory, was mostly allocated to meet the Commonwealth's contribution to the River Murray Commission (\$1.1 million) and the Australian Water Resources Council's research program (\$250 000).

In addition to assistance under NWRP in 1983-84, the Commonwealth provided \$13.0 million to Queensland for the construction of the Burdekin Dam and \$229 000 to the Hunter District Water Board for water quality improvement under the initiative to provide assistance to steel regions. (In 1984-85, assistance for these projects will be funded under FWRAP.)

Details of assistance provided to the States under the National Water Resources Program in 1983-84, including \$21.1 million dealt with under other functional headings, are given in the table below. For details of assistance in previous years, see Table 106 in Appendix III, Appendix VI, and earlier issues of this Paper.

\$64.3 million is being provided under FWRAP in 1984-85. Of this amount, an estimated \$62.0 million will be provided to the States and the Northern Territory, comprising \$19.0 million for the Burdekin Dam, \$4.0 million for the Bundaberg Irrigation Project, \$2.2 million for water quality improvement in New South Wales as part of the Assistance to Steel Regions initiative and \$36.8 million yet to be allocated to particular projects. The balance of \$2.3 million, not classified as a payment to the States and the Northern Territory, is to be allocated mainly to meet the Commonwealth's contribution to the River Murray Commission (\$1.3 million) and the Australian Water Resources Council's research program (\$500 000) and an allocation to the Bureau of Meteorology and the Bureau of Mineral Resources for the evaluation of water resources assessment data.

ECONOMIC SERVICES—LABOUR AND EMPLOYMENT

Coal Mining Industry—Long Service Leave

In those States where coal miners have been awarded long service leave by industrial tribunals, the State Governments reimburse employers the cost of this leave. The Commonwealth, in turn, reimburses the States for the amounts paid and the administrative costs incurred by them in giving effect to these arrangements.

The funds required for these purposes are obtained from an excise imposed on coal production under the Coal Excise Act 1949. The excise is currently 25 cents per tonne of which an amount equivalent to 20 cents per tonne is appropriated to a trust fund under the States Grants (Coal Mining Industry Long Service Leave) Act 1949. Payments are made to the States from the trust fund. The balance of the excise is applied to coal research.

Wages Pause—Special Employment Programs

Following a special Premiers' Conference held on 7 December 1982, the Commonwealth implemented a wages pause in areas of its own employment and undertook to fund employment generating programs from the savings to its own budget that resulted from the pause. For this purpose, \$300 million was appropriated in the Special Employment-related Programs Act 1982, equal to the savings then estimated to accrue to the Commonwealth in 1983. This amount was allocated to two components of the Wage Pause Program.

The first, the public housing component, was for \$100 million. These funds, which were allocated between the States and Territories on a population basis, were to be applied mainly to the construction of new rental accommodation in order to maximise the employment generating effect of the program. An amount of \$46.5 million, representing the final allocation under the program, was paid in 1983-84. Of this amount, \$44.5 million comprised payments to the States.

The rest of the Wage Pause Program (\$200 million) was allocated to the general employment component. Again, funds were provided to the States and the Territories on a population basis with the intention of generating worthwhile employment opportunities in areas other than public housing. States were required to use half their allocation under this component to assist the young unemployed, and half to assist older workers and others disadvantaged in the labour market, including the disabled, migrants with language difficulties, and Aborigines. Equal employment opportunities

were to be afforded unemployed females. A total of \$101.1 million, representing the balance of funds available under the program, was provided for these purposes in 1983-84. Of this amount, \$97.6 million represented payments to the States.

Details of assistance provided to the States under the Wages Pause Program are given in Appendix VI.

Community Employment Program

An amount of \$400 million has been provided in 1984-85 for direct job creation following the establishment by the Commonwealth of the Community Employment Program under the Community Employment Act 1983. Of this amount, \$351.2 million will be payments to the States.

The Community Employment Program provides short term employment for three to twelve months, particularly for disadvantaged groups in the labour market such as women, migrants, the long-term unemployed and disabled persons. Funds are provided for expenditure on labour intensive projects of social and economic benefit to the community, including the construction of local roads and country town water supply facilities. Although emphasis is placed on providing jobs in areas experiencing relatively high unemployment rates, funds are allocated to the States principally on a population basis. Arrangements have been made to ensure joint Commonwealth and State involvement in the consideration, approval and supervision of projects.

Payments to the States in 1983-84, and estimated payments in 1984-85 are shown in the following table:

Infrastructure Support for the Steel Regions

The Commonwealth is providing grants of assistance for a range of infrastructure development projects in the Illawarra, Hunter and Whyalla regions designed to promote employment opportunities in these regions to assist in offsetting the decline in recent years in employment in the steel industry. In 1983-84, \$9.8 million was paid to New South Wales for expenditure for this purpose. In 1984-85, \$22.4 million will be provided, with \$1.3 million being paid to South Australia for projects in the Whyalla region and the balance being paid to New South Wales.

OTHER ECONOMIC SERVICES

Centre for Regional Economic Analysis—Tasmania

Provision of \$40 000 has been made in 1984-85 for a dollar for dollar matching grant to Tasmania for the Centre for Regional Economic Analysis at the University of Tasmania. The main purpose of the Centre is to provide the Tasmanian Government and industry with quantitative information on the State's economy, including the impact of Commonwealth policies and programs.

GENERAL PUBLIC SERVICES

Law, Order and Public Safety

Legal Aid

In 1984-85, \$1.1 million will be provided as part of an on-going program of assistance for community legal aid centres. The grants will provide supplementary funds to services in the States. It should be noted that the 1984-85 distribution of these grants among the States is notional only, and no commitment to the provision of the amount shown for each State is implied.

Reimbursement of Costs of Operations of the Joint Law Courts Library in New South Wales

New South Wales is to be provided with a grant of \$302 000 in 1984-85 to meet the Commonwealth's share of the salary and operating costs of the Joint Law Courts Library in Sydney. An amount of \$235 000 was provided in 1983-84 for this purpose.

Promotion of Road Safety Practices

In each year from 1947-48, grants have been made to the States to assist in the financing of public education programs for the promotion of road safety practices. Since 1970-71, the annual grant to the States has been \$150 000 and the distribution of this amount between States has remained constant. The amounts paid to each State are given in Appendix VI.

ASSISTANCE FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Since 1976-77, payments have been made to the States to be passed on to local government authorities under the *Local Government (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act 1976*. Details of these arrangements, as well as other payments to or for local government authorities, are given in Chapter VI.

DROUGHT RELIEF FODDER SUBSIDY

The Drought Relief Fodder Subsidy Scheme, established by the *Drought Assistance* (*Primary Producers*) Act 1982, provided for the Commonwealth to make arrangements with the States for the payment of a subsidy to drought-declared primary producers towards the cost of purchasing fodder for sheep and cattle.

Following an easing of wide-spread drought conditions, the scheme ceased on 30 June 1983, with all fodder purchased after that date being ineligible for the subsidy. Under the arrangements with the States, however, primary producers were allowed a further six months to submit claims. In 1983-84, \$18.3 million was paid to the States bringing the total amount paid over the two years of the scheme to \$122 million.

NATURAL DISASTER RELIEF

Commonwealth assistance under the long-standing natural disaster relief arrangements is designed to help the States and the Northern Territory meet the unpredictable and sometimes large costs of providing natural disaster relief. The arrangements recognise the States' and the Northern Territory's primary responsibility for the administration, provision and funding of relief measures.

The Commonwealth's role is confined to providing financial support when expenditure on approved relief measures in a financial year exceeds a State's or the Northern Territory's assessed financial capacity. The arrangements cover natural disasters related to weather conditions—cyclones, floods, storms, bushfires and droughts.

Under the arrangements, the Commonwealth has provided assistance on a \$3 for \$1 basis towards expenditure on approved relief and restoration measures in cases of 'major' disasters where such expenditures exceeded a State's or the Northern Territory's assessed financial capacity as represented by an annual base amount of expenditure. A major disaster has been, for this purpose, defined as a disaster in respect of which a State's or the Northern Territory's expenditure on approved measures exceeds one-tenth of its annual base amount.

The base amounts applying in 1983-84 had not been varied since 1978-79. With effect from 1 July 1984, the Government has decided that these amounts should be restored to (and maintained at) the levels applying in 1978-79 as a proportion of State and Northern Territory budget sector receipts. This is to be achieved by setting the base amounts for a particular year at a percentage (0.24 per cent) of budget sector receipts two years earlier—the latest firm figures available from the Australian Bureau of Statistics for this purpose. The previous base amounts and the base amounts for 1984-85 (applying the above formula) are set out in the following table:

The Commonwealth has indicated that it would be prepared to consider the provision of additional assistance to the States and the Northern Territory, in 1984-85 only, if it can be shown that the application of the new base amounts has caused undue financial hardship.

The existing cost-sharing and other arrangements will be retained in 1984-85. The approved measures which attract Commonwealth assistance under the arrangements are:

- grants for relief of personal hardship and distress, and grants for restoration of public assets and emergency protection, and repair works by State, local and semi-government authorities (cyclones, floods, storms and bushfires);
- concessional loans to small businesses, churches, sporting associations and other voluntary non-profit organisations (cyclones and floods);
- concessional loans to primary producers for carry-on, restocking and restoration purposes and freight subsidies for primary producers (cyclones, floods, storms, bushfires and droughts);
- subsidies to primary producers for carriage of water to central dispersal points (drought); and
- assistance to State, local and semi-government authorities for the disposal of helpless and unsaleable stock (floods, bushfires and droughts).

The Commonwealth also meets half of the cost of assistance provided by the States on approved measures for the immediate relief of personal hardship and distress where such expenditures do not qualify for \$3 for \$1 assistance under the conditions outlined above. Approved measures for the relief of personal hardship and distress comprise the provision of emergency food, clothing and accommodation, essential repairs to houses to make them habitable and secure and the repair and replacement of essential items of furniture and personal effects. These measures are restricted to people left in needy circumstances as a result of a disaster. In practice, the cost of assistance provided for the

immediate relief of personal hardship and distress is minor compared with assistance provided under the \$3 for \$1 cost-sharing.

It is open to a State to request Commonwealth agreement to change the terms of previously approved measures (e.g. the size of concessional loans) or, implement a new measure for a particular disaster under the arrangements.

Further changes to the arrangements are to apply from 1 July 1985. The base amounts of expenditure to be met by the States and the Northern Territory before Commonwealth assistance becomes available will continue to be set at 0.24 per cent of State and Northern Territory budget sector receipts two years earlier. Costs above the base amount will be shared on a dollar for dollar basis up to 75 per cent above the base amount and \$3 Commonwealth: \$1 States and Northern Territory thereafter. Other changes which will come into effect from that date are:

- the distinction between major and minor disasters will be removed (i.e. minor disasters will become eligible for assistance under the arrangements);
- restoration of assets of State and Northern Territory trading undertakings (with the exception of railways) will not be eligible for assistance; and
- the responsibility for determining, within agreed guidelines, specific measures to be eligible for assistance will be transferred to the States and Northern Territory.

Payments by the Commonwealth to the States and the Northern Territory in 1983-84 for natural disaster relief and restoration totalled \$138.8 million. This reflected the continuing effects of the severe drought in the mainland States, the bushfires in Victoria and South Australia in February 1983, and the damage caused by extensive flooding particularly in New South Wales and Queensland between April and June 1983 and January-February 1984.

The budget provision in 1984-85 of \$37 million is based upon past expenditures. It is essentially a notional figure—actual outlays in 1984-85 will depend on the eventual incidence and severity of natural disasters. The reduction in the provision reflects the severity of disasters impacting on 1983-84 expenditures and the effect of the new base amounts.

The following table shows payments to the States since 1980-81, including estimated payments in 1984-85. Reflecting the differing incidence of disasters, the amounts vary considerably from one State to another and from one year to another.

Tables 107 and 108 in Appendix III provide a more detailed breakdown of Commonwealth natural disaster relief payments to the States and the Northern Territory. Details of payments for natural disaster relief in past years may be obtained from earlier issues of this Paper and, in particular, from Tables 158 and 159 of the 1975-76 issue of this Paper.

ASSISTANCE RELATED TO SOUTH WEST TASMANIA

Work on the Gordon River Power Development Stage Two in South West Tasmania ceased following a decision by the High Court on 1 July 1983. The Commonwealth had given a number of undertakings to Tasmania in relation to the provision of financial assistance to offset the employment and other effects of termination of the project. Agreement has now been reached that the following assistance will be provided in full settlement of those undertakings:

• \$45.3 million for employment creation projects under the Interim Financial Agreement between the Commonwealth and the State, of which \$16.9 million was paid in 1983-84 plus direct expenditure by the Commonwealth on the upgrading of Hobart Airport at an estimated total cost of \$5.6 million, of which \$2.4 million was spent in 1983-84;

- \$200 million (January 1984 prices) in equal annual instalments over 10 years as a subsidy to reduce the cost of providing 112MW of electricity to the cost of electricity that would have been produced by the Gordon River Power Development Stage Two; the Commonwealth has also undertaken to provide a subsidy to similarly reduce the cost of providing a further 68MW of electricity, if and when the need for the electricity is demonstrated; and
- an ex-gratia payment of \$25 million for expenditure incurred by the State on the Gordon River Power Development Stage Two in order to avoid the need for any increase in electricity prices as a result of that expenditure.

Arrangements for the joint management of the World Heritage Area in South West Tasmania are currently being discussed separately with the State. As an interim measure, the Commonwealth provided \$530 000 in 1983-84 for employment of rangers and the provision of ancillary equipment, and, pending finalisation of longer term arrangements, has agreed to provide \$26 000 a month to Tasmania for the employment of rangers in the area.

Total financial assistance provided by the Commonwealth to Tasmania under these arrangements in 1983-84 amounted to \$62.9 million, including \$170 000 for assistance to contractors. In addition, the strengthening of the Hobart Airport runway was undertaken as part of the assistance arrangements, at an estimated cost of \$2.6 million.

Assistance to Tasmania in 1984-85 for employment generation, for assistance to contractors, and for a further instalment of the electricity subsidy is estimated at \$51.0 million. In addition, an estimated \$3.0 million is to be expended by the Commonwealth on the upgrading of Hobart Airport to limited international operations standard.

CHAPTER V—PAYMENTS TO THE NORTHERN TERRITORY

On 1 July 1978 the Northern Territory of Australia became a self-governing Territory under the Northern Territory (Self-Government) Act 1978. Under this and associated legislation (and regulations thereunder) the Territory has expenditure responsibilities and revenue raising powers broadly approximating those of a State (although, of course, the Territory is not a State under the Constitution).

FUNCTIONS TRANSFERRED

The Legislative Assembly of the Northern Territory has power, with the assent of the Administrator or Governor-General, to make laws 'for the peace, order and good government of the Territory' and the Ministers of the Territory have executive authority in respect of the matters listed on pages 81 and 82 of the 1980–81 issue of this Paper.

PAYMENTS TO THE NORTHERN TERRITORY AND BORROWINGS BY NORTHERN TERRITORY AUTHORITIES FROM 1980-81 TO 1984-85

The basic framework for financial arrangements between the Commonwealth and the Northern Territory is set out in the Memorandum of Understanding in Respect of Financial Arrangements Between the Commonwealth and a Self-governing Northern Territory which was agreed between the two Governments in 1978.

Since 1 July 1979 the Northern Territory has received annually a tax sharing grant, a local government tax sharing grant and specific purpose payments, under arrangements similar to those with the States. In addition, the Territory receives from the Commonwealth, general purpose capital assistance comprising one-third grant and two-thirds loan on the same terms and conditions as apply to the State Governments' Loan Council programs.

The Northern Territory authorities are also empowered to borrow, subject to arrangements analogous to the Loan Council arrangements and procedures for State semi-government authorities. As explained in Chapter III of this Paper, Loan Council agreed at its meeting on 21 June 1984 to the introduction of a system of 'global' borrowing limits for semi-government and local authorities and government-owned companies on a one-year trial basis. The 'global' program (which relates to both 'conventional' loan raisings and other 'non-conventional' financing techniques) agreed to for Northern Territory authorities in 1984-85 is \$50 million, an increase of 36 per cent over borrowings undertaken in 1983-84. Individual borrowings which are raised against the Territory's global limit may be guaranteed by the Commonwealth.

Table 54 summarises payments to the Northern Territory, borrowing programs by or on behalf of Northern Territory authorities, and interest paid by the Northern Territory to the Commonwealth from 1980-81 to 1984-85 (estimated). Further details are given in Table 137 in Appendix VI. Table 55 gives details of the main categories on a per capita basis.

General Purpose Payments

General purpose payments to the Northern Territory consist of general revenue assistance (comprising a tax sharing grant, identified health grant, special assistance grant or additional assistance grant whichever is the greater, a grant in lieu of uranium royalties and a payment to the Northern Territory for recreation leave and furlough entitlements in respect of former Commonwealth employees) and general purpose capital assistance.

Tax Sharing Grant

The current basis for determining the Northern Territory's tax sharing grant is the relevant formula in the Memorandum of Understanding varied, in line with the arrangements now applying to the States, by using total tax collections—as defined in the States (Tax Sharing and Health Grants) Act 1981—rather than net personal income tax collections to determine the rate of increase in the grant. That is, the grant is calculated by changing the previous year's grant in proportion to the change in total Commonwealth tax collections (lagged by one year) and in the population of the Northern Territory. On this basis, the Northern Territory's 1984-85 tax sharing grant is estimated at \$475.0 million, compared with a grant of \$424.7 million in 1983-84.

These arrangements differ from those applying to the States in some important respects. The formula for the total tax sharing grant for the States does not directly take account of population growth, but each State's grant is subject to a real terms guarantee that does not apply in the case of the Northern Territory. While it has been agreed that no special grants are to be paid to any State in relation to the years 1982-83 to 1984-85, the Northern Territory has the right to apply for a special grant on the recommendation of the Commonwealth Grants Commission and enjoys special arrangements in respect of an additional assistance grant during the first six years of full self-government. These aspects of the arrangements are discussed below.

Identified Health Grant

As discussed in Chapter II, identified health grants have been payable to the Northern Territory (and the States) since 1 July 1981. They replaced previous specific purpose grants payable to the Northern Territory for the sharing of hospital costs, for community health and school dental programs. The health grants are provided as a general purpose payment, but are identified as the Commonwealth's contribution towards the cost of health programs in the Northern Territory. These arrangements, which were seen by the previous Government as an interim step towards full absorption of health grants into tax sharing grants, are to be reviewed before 30 June 1985.

The derivation and distribution of the total identified health grant payable in 1984-85 is explained in detail in Chapter II. A grant of \$27.2 million is estimated to be payable to the Northern Territory in 1984-85.

Special Grant and Additional Assistance Grant

The Northern Territory is eligible to apply for a special grant on the recommendation of the Commonwealth Grants Commission.

Under the provisions of the Memorandum of Understanding setting out the financial arrangements between the Commonwealth and Northern Territory Governments, an additional assistance grant may be payable in each of the first six years of operation of the State-type financial arrangements. The level of the additional assistance grant as

specified in the arrangements was \$20.0 million for each of the first three years (1979-80 to 1981-82), decreasing in steps of \$5.0 million in each of the following three years before terminating in 1985-86.

An additional assistance grant is not payable in a year in which a special grant is recommended for payment if the total value of the special grant recommended in that year exceeds the additional assistance grant otherwise payable in that year. Under the Memorandum of Understanding the Territory receives either a special grant or an additional assistance grant, whichever is greater.

From 1979-80 to 1982-83, the Northern Territory received the additional assistance grant. In 1983-84 the Northern Territory received a special grant of \$16.9 million in respect of 1981-82. Since this amount was greater than the \$10.0 million additional assistance grant which otherwise would have been paid, the Northern Territory received the special grant in 1983-84.

The Northern Territory's application for a special grant in respect of the year 1982-83 is still under consideration by the Commonwealth Grants Commission, which normally recommends a completion or final grant for payment two years after the close of that year. Final assessment of the special grant for 1982-83 has been held over by the Commission until completion of its report on the distribution of tax sharing grants (see Chapter II). The estimated payment of \$5.0 million for 1984-85 shown in Table 137 represents the additional assistance grant which will be payable unless the special grant recommended in respect of 1982-83 is a greater amount.

The Northern Territory has also applied for special grants in respect of 1983-84 and 1984-85, although it has not sought advance grants for those years.

Grant in Lieu of Uranium Royalties

Under the Atomic Energy Act 1953, ownership of uranium and other prescribed substances in the Northern Territory is vested in the Crown in right of the Commonwealth. The Memorandum of Understanding provides, inter alia, for the Commonwealth to pay a grant to the Northern Territory each year equal in amount to and in lieu of uranium royalties at the rate of 1.25 per cent in respect of the mining of uranium in the Northern Territory. It is estimated that \$4.0 million will be payable in 1984-85 compared with \$4.4 million in 1983-84.

Payments in Respect of Recreation Leave and Furlough Entitlements

The Commonwealth makes payments to the Territory in lieu of the accrued recreation leave and furlough entitlements of officers who transferred from the Commonwealth Public Service to the Northern Territory Public Service. Payments are made on an emerging cost basis and the estimate of \$500 000 for 1984-85 relates to entitlements of officers who retired or resigned in 1982-83.

General Revenue Assistance After 1984-85

The arrangements applying to general revenue assistance to the Northern Territory after 1984-85 will be considered in the context of the review to be undertaken of general revenue payments to the States (see Chapter II). As a basis for considering the future arrangements to apply to the Northern Territory, the terms of reference for the inquiry by the Commonwealth Grants Commission into the distribution of the tax sharing grants to apply after 1984-85 include a request that the Commission calculate tax sharing relativities showing the effect of including the Northern Territory in a tax

sharing pool encompassing the States and the Northern Territory with the Northern Territory treated on the same basis as the States.

General Purpose Capital Assistance

The Memorandum of Understanding provides for general purpose capital assistance to the Northern Territory to be increased from year to year in line with the increase in the State Governments' Loan Council programs (excluding any special additions). On this basis the capital assistance payment for the Northern Territory will increase from \$129.1 million in 1983-84 to \$137.5 million in 1984-85, an increase of 6.5 per cent.

As in the case of the analogous payments to the States, one-third of the general purpose capital assistance to the Northern Territory is paid as a capital grant. The remaining two-thirds is provided at the same rates of interest as the States pay on their corresponding borrowing programs and the Territory is liable to make payments to the Commonwealth analogous to the Sinking Fund liabilities of the States under the Financial Agreement. (As noted below, debt charges assistance is provided to the Territory to reimburse it for these payments.)

The Northern Territory (like the States) is able, subject to it first satisfying the matching requirements under the Commonwealth State Housing Agreement, to nominate amounts from its borrowing program for the purpose of public housing. Any such nominated amounts will be advanced on the loan terms and conditions of the Commonwealth State Housing Agreement. The Territory did not nominate any additional funds for this purpose in 1983-84 (there being no incentive to nominate for concessional funds while the Commonwealth assumes responsibility for the Northern Territory's debt charges).

Specific Purpose Payments

In accordance with the Memorandum of Understanding, the Northern Territory is eligible for specific purpose assistance in respect of all relevant forms of assistance provided to the States under section 96 of the Constitution under terms and conditions similar to those applying to the States (see Chapter IV).

The Northern Territory may also receive other forms of specific purpose assistance on terms and conditions agreed with the Commonwealth. Estimated assistance in 1984-85 and payments in the four preceding years are shown in Table 54.

Further details are set out below for payments where there are special features.

Electricity Supply in the Northern Territory

The Commonwealth is providing financial assistance towards the operational costs of electricity supply in the Northern Territory under arrangements applying for the five year period ending in 1986-87. The arrangements provide for a formula-based Commonwealth grant which takes into account fuel and general price increases and load growth. The 1984-85 estimate of \$69.3 million represents an increase of \$6.2 million on the 1983-84 provision.

The Commonwealth is to provide grant assistance of \$124 million (in 1980-81 prices) towards the construction cost of a power station near Darwin, to replace the existing oil-fired plant. These funds are to be provided over the construction period for the power station. In 1984-85 assistance under this program is estimated at \$14.6 million.

Debt Charges

The Territory receives from the Commonwealth funds analogous to the State Governments' Loan Council programs and is required to meet debt charges on a portion of these funds under terms and conditions analogous to those that apply to the States' program. It has been agreed that in the early years of self-government the Commonwealth will make specific purpose payments to the Northern Territory equal to those debt charges. The estimated payment in 1984-85 is \$65.3 million compared with \$48.8 million in 1983-84 and \$31.1 million in 1982-83. The steep rise in the Territory's interest payments in recent years reflects the fact that at the time of self-government the Territory had virtually no debt and therefore no debt charges to meet.

Aboriginal Advancement

In 1984-85 the Commonwealth is to provide \$2.1 million in assistance to the Northern Territory for Aboriginal Advancement programs, administered through the Department of Aboriginal Affairs. Included in the total is an amount of \$1.7 million for the provision of water and sewerage systems under the Commonwealth's five year \$50 million Public Health Improvement Program. The balance is to provide assistance to the Northern Territory Department of Education in the employment and training of Aborigines as assistant teachers at outstations in the Territory.

Environmental Restoration

In 1984-85 the Commonwealth is to provide \$7.7 million to the Northern Territory in relation to the rehabilitation of former uranium mining sites. Included in the total is an amount of \$7.6 million in respect of the former Rum Jungle mine. The balance relates to site investigations at the former Rockhole and Moline mines.

Assistance to Upgrade the Stuart Highway

In addition to assistance provided to the Northern Territory under the Roads Grants Act 1981, and the Australian Bicentennial Road Development program, the Commonwealth is providing \$2.7 million in 1984-85 to accelerate the upgrading of the Stuart Highway.

CHAPTER VI—PAYMENTS TO OR FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES

Local government authorities in Australia (except those in the Northern Territory) have been established under Acts of the State Parliaments for the purpose of providing certain public services within defined geographical boundaries. The functions of these authorities differ significantly between States and, indeed, within States.

Prior to 1973 no Commonwealth assistance was provided specifically for local government in the States. Successive Commonwealth Governments had taken the view that, as local authorities were constituted and functioned under State laws, it was the responsibility of the State Governments to assess and provide for the needs of local government in the light of local government's overall responsibilities and the revenue raising resources available to it. The Commonwealth, for its part, provided general purpose funds to the States to assist in the financing of all the States' expenditure responsibilities, including those in the local government area.

Since 1974-75, the Commonwealth has made payments of general purpose assistance through the States for local government authorities. It also makes some direct payments of specific purpose assistance. Details of both types of payments are provided in this Chapter. In addition, local government authorities, like Commonwealth and other State and Northern Territory authorities, are able to borrow under the Loan Council arrangements, and this Chapter outlines the arrangements as they affect local authorities.

Local government authorities also receive significant assistance from State Governments. Part of this assistance consists of funds provided by the Commonwealth to the States as specific purpose payments and passed on to local authorities to carry out particular programs. The amounts passed on to local authorities under these arrangements are generally at the discretion of the States. Information on these payments to local government authorities obtained both from Commonwealth sources and from the States and the Northern Territory is included in this Chapter.

GENERAL PURPOSE ASSISTANCE

In 1974-75 and 1975-76 general purpose grants were made for local government authorities on a basis recommended by the Commonwealth Grants Commission. In 1976, at the same time as the States' tax sharing grants were introduced, new arrangements were agreed between the Commonwealth and the States for the sharing of personal income tax collections with local government. These arrangements, which were subsequently incorporated in the Local Government (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act 1976, are broadly as follows:

- each year local government in the States is entitled to a fixed percentage of net personal income tax collections in the previous year;
- the amount so derived is divided among the States in specified proportions, which are subject to review by the Commonwealth Grants Commission;
- each State allocates a minimum of 30 per cent of the assistance among its local authorities on a basis which takes into account the respective populations of those local authorities, but which may also take into account the respective sizes and the respective population densities, and any other matters agreed upon between the Commonwealth and the State concerned;

- the remaining assistance is allocated among the local authorities, having regard to their respective financial needs, on the recommendation of State Grants Commissions; and
- when a State's share of the grant has been allocated among its local government authorities, and the Commonwealth informed of that allocation, the amount of its share is paid to the State to be passed on immediately to the local authorities.

The initial percentage share allocated to local government under the *Local Government (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act 1976*, was 1.52 per cent. The share was increased to 1.75 per cent in 1979-80 and to 2 per cent from 1980-81.

The Act provides for the assistance to be distributed among the States as follows:

As part of a review of the Act carried out in consultation with the States, the Commonwealth decided in the context of the Premiers' Conference held on 24-25 June 1982 that the percentage distribution set out in the table should continue to apply.

The Government has decided that the amount of general purpose assistance for local government in 1984-85 will be no less in real terms than in 1983-84. In practice, this will mean that the increase in the grant in 1984-85 will be no less than the increase in the average level of the Consumer Price Index between 1983-84 and 1984-85.

The following table shows the amount of assistance paid to each State in the years 1980-81 to 1983-84 and the amount to be paid in 1984-85 to the States to be passed on as general purpose assistance to local government authorities. The increase in assistance of 5.9 per cent in 1984-85 exceeds the projected increase in the Consumer Price Index for 1984-85.

On 10 May 1984, the Minister for Territories and Local Government announced the establishment of a Committee of Inquiry into Local Government Finance. Under

its terms of reference, the Committee is to review the local government tax sharing arrangements and report on any changes required to improve the operation of the *Local Government (Personal Income Tax Sharing) Act 1976*, with reference to:

- the respective roles of the Commonwealth and the States in regard to local government;
- the purpose and functions of local government revenue sharing; and
- the level and form of funding for local government available from Commonwealth, State and local government sources and the principles which should determine the level and allocation of the local government revenue sharing funds between and within States.

The review is expected to take about a year and the Commonwealth has undertaken to consult with the States before determining any changes to the local government tax sharing arrangements.

BORROWING ARRANGEMENTS FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES

It is emphasised that borrowings referred to in this Section are included in the totals of borrowings by the States' authorities shown elsewhere in this paper.

Local government authorities undertook about 7.6 per cent of total public authority borrowings in Australia in 1983-84.

The amounts of borrowings by local government authorities vary markedly between the States (after taking account of differences in population). This reflects a number of factors, including variations between the States in the functions allocated to local government. The comparatively high figures for Queensland local authorities, for example, reflect in part borrowings by the Brisbane City Council which carries out a number of functions (eg. sewerage) which are undertaken by semi-government authorities in other States.

As outlined in Chapter III, the Loan Council, at its meeting on 21 June 1984, adopted a Global Approach to the determination of borrowing programs for Commonwealth and State semi-government and local authorities and government-owned companies on a trial basis in 1984-85. Under this approach, each member of Loan Council has agreed on a voluntary basis to global limits on new money borrowings from all sources for their authorities and government-owned companies. The arrangements encompass both semi-government and local authorities' borrowings.

These arrangements represent a significant departure from those applying in 1983-84 and earlier years. Then, under the terms of the Gentlemen's Agreement, the Loan Council approved separate arrangements for borrowings by 'larger' and 'smaller' Commonwealth and State authorities. Local authorities borrowed as both larger and smaller authorities; however, in recent years more than half of the total borrowings by local authorities have been undertaken under the arrangements for smaller authorities. Loan Council approved annual programs for conventional borrowing by 'larger' authorities (in 1982-83 and 1983-84, for 'larger' non-electricity authorities) while permitting 'smaller' authorities to individually undertake conventional borrowings up to an agreed annual limit without requiring a Loan Council program (although under arrangements adopted at the Loan Council meeting on 24-25 June 1982, where smaller

authority borrowings were undertaken by a Central Borrowing Authority, an annual borrowing limit was agreed between the Commonwealth and the State concerned). Under agreements reached at the Loan Council meeting held on 30 June-1 July 1983, the annual limit applying to smaller authorities was increased from \$1.5 million (applying in 1982-83) to \$1.8 million and each member of Loan Council assumed responsibility for determining the timing, terms and conditions of issue and form of borrowing undertaken on the domestic market by public authorities, including local authorities.

Under the new Global Approach no formal distinction is made between larger and smaller authorities. Each member of Loan Council will be responsible for allocating the global borrowing limit between its various authorities and for determining the terms and conditions of domestic loan raisings. Within the amounts allocated to each authority, each will be able to borrow in the form which best suits its needs.

BORROWINGS BY LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES 1983-84 AND 1984-85

The following table shows global borrowings by Commonwealth and State authorities in 1983-84 and the amounts borrowed within these aggregates by local government authorities. The table also shows estimated borrowings by local authorities within the agreed global borrowings limits for 1984-85.

COMMONWEALTH PAYMENTS MADE DIRECT TO LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES

There are no Commonwealth programs of direct payments to local government authorities designed for the specific purpose of providing financial assistance to these authorities.

There are, however, a number of programs under which local government authorities are among bodies that are eligible for, and have received, Commonwealth assistance paid direct to them. The programs concerned are summarised below. (Further details of a number of these programs are provided in Statement No. 3 in Budget Paper No. 1.) Wide variations between the States in the amounts paid to local authorities under particular programs reflect, among other things, differences in the extent to which the activities concerned are carried out by those authorities rather than by private organisations or by State Government departments or authorities.

Nursing Homes

In 1974-75 the Commonwealth Government introduced a scheme under which religious, charitable and other non-profit organisations conducting nursing homes may receive assistance from the Commonwealth Government in meeting approved deficits incurred in running the homes.

Local government authorities operating nursing homes on a non-profit basis are eligible to participate in this scheme and authorities in four States—New South Wales, Western Australia, South Australia and Tasmania—are receiving assistance under the scheme. It is estimated that an amount of \$4.0 million will be provided to meet the operating deficits of these nursing homes in 1984-85. Details of payments are set out in the following table:

Home Nursing

Under the *Home Nursing Subsidy Act 1956*, organisations (other than profit-making bodies and bodies conducted or controlled by a State Government) conducting home nursing services are eligible for annual subsidies depending on the number of nurses employed on home nursing duties. The amount of Commonwealth Government assistance cannot exceed the amount received by the organisation from a State Government and/or a local government authority.

Local government authorities in New South Wales and Tasmania have in the past received assistance under this scheme. The only local government authorities to participate since 1976-77, however, have been in New South Wales. The amounts of

grants that have been paid to those authorities since 1980-81 and estimates for 1984-85 are as follows: 1980-81, \$411 000; 1981-82, \$518 000; 1982-83, \$678 000; 1983-84, \$696 000; and 1984-85, \$802 000 (estimate).

Aged or Disabled Persons' Homes

Under the Aged or Disabled Persons Homes Act 1954, local government authorities along with religious, charitable and certain other organisations, are eligible to receive assistance for the capital and operating costs associated with the provision of certain kinds of accommodation for the aged.

Grants on a \$2 for \$1 basis up to certain maximum limits may be made to meet the cost of erection, extension or purchase of the accommodation. The maximum subsidies are reviewed periodically, and for approved projects commencing after 1 January 1983, the subsidy limits are \$15 020 for a single unit and \$17 425 for a double unit of accommodation, while a maximum of \$1920 a unit is provided for land.

In 1969 the Act was amended to provide for the payment of personal care subsidies in respect of persons aged eighty years and over resident in hostel accommodation. In 1973 the subsidy was extended to hostel residents aged less than eighty years who require, and receive, approved personal care. From 1 January 1984, the age criteria for the payment of the personal care subsidy were abolished and a new hostel care subsidy was introduced for all residents of eligible hostels assessed as needing hostel care. The personal care subsidy is paid only in respect of persons assessed as requiring or receiving daily assistance in the performance of daily living tasks and is payable in addition to the hostel care subsidy. The rate of personal care subsidy will be increased on 1 November 1984 from \$40 to \$44 per week and the rate of hostel care subsidy from \$10 to \$11 per week.

During 1983-84 the Act was amended to provide for payment of a 'respite care' bed subsidy of \$10 per week in respect of an approved respite care bed where that bed is occupied for 14 days or less during a 28-day period, or \$50 per week where the bed is occupied for at least 15 days during a 28-day period. From 1 November 1984 these rates will also increase to \$11 and \$55 respectively.

Capital grants under this Act are paid direct to charitable organisations and local government authorities. In 1983-84 local government authorities received \$6.1 million out of total capital grants of \$48.8 million. For 1984-85 it is estimated that local government authorities will receive \$6.3 million out of total estimated payments under the Act of \$56 million.

The following table shows the grants for both recurrent and capital purposes that have been paid to local government authorities in each State since 1980-81 together with estimates for 1984-85:

Aged or Disabled Persons' Hostels

Under the Aged or Disabled Persons Hostels Act 1972, local government authorities along with religious, charitable and other organisations receive assistance for the capital costs associated with the provision of hostel accommodation for the aged.

Subject to certain conditions, the Commonwealth Government meets the capital costs to eligible organisations of building hostel accommodation up to a maximum limit per person. This and other subsidies are reviewed periodically. The maximum building cost limit for projects commencing after 1 January 1983 is \$22 530 per person. The Government also pays an additional grant of up to \$2400 per person for the purchase of land; a further \$250 per person is available for furnishings.

Local government authorities first received assistance under the Act in 1975-76. The following table shows grants paid to local government authorities since 1980-81 and estimated payments in 1984-85:

Delivered Meals Subsidy

Under the *Delivered Meals Subsidy Act 1970*, eligible organisations can receive assistance for the provision of delivered meals ('meals on wheels') services. Assistance is at the level of 55 cents a meal for meals with an approved vitamin C supplement and 50 cents for meals without such a supplement.

From 1 January 1985, assistance will be provided in two components—a subsidy of 50 cents per meal for cost of production or purchase and 25 cents per meal for delivery.

The table below shows grants that have been paid to local government authorities under this scheme since 1980-81 and estimated grants in 1984-85. In 1983-84, total payments under the Act were \$5.6 million of which \$2.2 million was paid to local government authorities. For 1984-85 it is estimated that local government authorities will receive \$2.5 million out of total estimated payments under the Act of \$6.8 million.

Handicapped Persons' Assistance

Under the Handicapped Persons Assistance Act 1974, local government authorities and voluntary non-profit bodies are eligible to receive assistance for the accommodation, employment and training of disabled people. Capital grants are provided on a \$4 for \$1 basis; assistance with rent is also on a \$4 for \$1 basis and assistance for staffing is generally on a dollar for dollar basis, although higher rates of up to 100 per cent, may be paid in the first two years of operation of new services and a maximum remuneration subsidy of 80 per cent may be paid for selected 'key staff' employed in the third and subsequent years of the operation of approved prescribed services.

A training fee of \$500 is paid to eligible sheltered workshops for each former employee who, after completing more than six months sheltered employment, obtains, and retains, normal employment for 12 months or more.

The table below shows grants paid to local government authorities since 1982-83 and estimated payments in 1984-85. There were no payments in the previous two years.

Children's Services

Under the Children's Services Program, grants are made direct to local government authorities and community organisations towards the cost of the establishment and operation of a range of care and associated services for children, including educational services for young children.

Homeless Persons' Assistance

Under the *Homeless Persons Assistance Act 1974*, capital grants are made to voluntary agencies and local government authorities for approved projects to upgrade and replace existing inadequate accommodation and to build new facilities for homeless men and women. Assistance is also provided towards the cost of accommodation and meals and to meet the full salary of one approved social welfare worker position and up to half the salaries of other approved social welfare workers employed at each of the approved centres. Accommodation vouchers may be issued by approved homeless persons' centres and exchanged for accommodation in places approved by the Department of Social Security.

Subsidy for Migrant Aid

The initial two-year grant which commenced in May 1982 to enable the Fairfield City Council to employ a Social Worker to assist in the settlement of Indo-Chinese refugees in the area has been renewed for a further three years. The amounts paid were: \$7 940 in 1981-82, \$30 922 in 1982-83 and \$30 393 in 1983-84. The estimated grant in 1984-85 is \$33 000.

Arts

Local government authorities are eligible to receive assistance for community arts activities under a program administered by the Community Arts Board of the Australia Council, which was established in 1977-78 to assist local government, service and welfare organisations to include the arts in their programs, to raise the standards of their arts activities, and to expand them to cater for new sectors of the community. Grants made by the Australia Council during the period 1980-81 to 1983-84 to local

government authorities are shown in the following table. As these grants depend on the consideration of applications made during the course of the year, the grants that might be paid to local authorities in 1984-85 cannot be estimated at this stage.

Aerodrome Local Ownership Plan

The Aerodrome Local Ownership Plan was established to facilitate the transfer of Commonwealth-owned aerodromes servicing local needs to local ownership, with the objectives of encouraging the rational development of Australian aerodromes and their more efficient administration. Under the plan, the Commonwealth provides grants towards the cost of upgrading aerodromes at the time of transfer to local ownership and towards the development and maintenance of locally owned aerodromes. Most aerodromes transferred under the plan are owned by local government authorities, but some are owned by State semi-government authorities operating in local areas. The table below shows payments made to local authorities in each State under the Aerodrome Local Ownership Plan since 1980-81 and estimated payments in 1984-85. Payments to State semi-government authorities under the plan are included in Chapter IV of this Paper.

Local Government Improvement Program

The Local Government Improvement Program was a pilot program in 1983-84 which provided assistance to local government authorities in selected target areas aimed at supporting these bodies' capacities to tackle their long term problems of employment, provision of infrastructure services and community development. The grants provided totalled \$1 411 000, with local government authorities in New South Wales and Victoria receiving \$809 000 and \$602 000 respectively. From 1984-85 assistance provided under some elements of this program has been subsumed in the Local Government Development Program (see below).

Local Government Development Program

The purpose of this program, introduced in 1984-85, is to provide a range of support services to local government designed to strengthen its capacity to improve its efficiency and performance, strengthen local economies and infrastructure, and facilitate the provision of community services. A sum of \$4 655 000 has been allocated for this program in 1984-85.

PAYMENTS TO LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES IN THE NORTHERN TERRITORY

There are four local government authorities in the Northern Territory: the City of Darwin and the Municipalities of Alice Springs, Katherine and Tennant Creek.

Under the Memorandum of Understanding between the Commonwealth and the Northern Territory, the Northern Territory has received since 1979-80 a share of net personal income tax collections to be passed on to its local government authorities.

The grant for 1979-80, the initial year, was equivalent in per capita terms for the population under local government in the Northern Territory to the analogous payment to the States in 1979-80. Assistance for subsequent years has been determined by increasing the preceding year's grant in proportion to increases in net personal income tax collections (lagged by one year), and adjusted for any changes in the percentage of net personal income tax collections payable to local authorities in the States. The amounts of grants paid since 1980-81 are: 1980-81, \$1 440 224; 1981-82, \$1 680 013; 1982-83, \$2 032 527 and 1983-84, \$2 199 392. The grant for 1984-85 is \$2 329 629.

Like local government authorities in the States, some local government authorities in the Northern Territory also receive assistance direct from the Commonwealth under a number of Commonwealth specific purpose programs. The amounts of this assistance since 1980-81 are shown in Table 68 below.

FUNDS MADE AVAILABLE TO LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES FROM COMMONWEALTH PAYMENTS TO THE STATES

As explained earlier, tax sharing funds provided by the Commonwealth as general purpose assistance for local government take the form of payments to State Governments to be passed on to individual local authorities. There are also other programs of payments to the States under which portions of the funds made available

are passed on by them to their local government authorities. However, it should be noted that the degree of influence exerted by the Commonwealth over particular amounts paid to local authorities varies considerably among the different programs as does the availability of information relating to those amounts. Generally, the States have considerable discretion as to the amounts passed on to local government authorities.

Each of the programs concerned is summarised, in general terms, in Chapter IV of this Paper. The purpose of this section is to outline the way in which local government is involved and to provide details of the amounts passed on by the States at their own discretion, or at the request of the Commonwealth, to local government authorities. That information has been obtained in part from Commonwealth sources and has in part been provided by the States. For 1983-84 all of the information was obtained from the States. Because of the lag, in some cases, between the payment of funds to States and their subsequent allocation by them, the amounts of funds paid to the States for local government authorities under a particular program in any one year may not necessarily equal the amounts paid to those authorities in that year.

As with the programs of direct payments, differences between the States in the amounts of payments in this category made to local government authorities reflect, in part, differences in the extent to which the functions concerned are undertaken by local government authorities rather than by State Government departments or agencies or private bodies.

It is emphasised that the payments referred to in this section are included in the totals of payments to the States shown elsewhere in this Budget Paper.

Home Care Services and Senior Citizens' Centres

Grants for these purposes are provided under the States Grants (Home Care) Act 1969. Local government authorities are among the bodies eligible for assistance. Of total grants of \$31.4 million paid to States under this Act in 1983-84, an estimated \$11.8 million was passed on to local government authorities.

Amounts for the provision of *home care services* of \$4.3 million in 1980-81, \$4.1 million in 1981-82, \$5.9 million in 1982-83 and \$7.5 million in 1983-84 were passed on to local authorities in Victoria, and in 1983-84, \$16 000 was also passed on to local authorities in South Australia.

Children's Services

National Estate

Roads

The Commonwealth provides grants to the States for expenditure on the construction and maintenance of roads, including roads which are the responsibility of local government authorities. The relevant Commonwealth legislation does not determine any particular amount which the States must provide to local government. However, amounts, as determined by the State Governments, are passed on to the local government authorities for expenditure on roads which are the responsibility of those authorities.

As noted elsewhere in this Paper, funds for roads are provided by the Commonwealth to the States under the Roads Grants Act 1981, and the Australian Bicentennial

Road Development Program introduced in 1982-83. Some funds for roads are also being made available under the Community Employment Program.

South West Tasmania Special Assistance

Under arrangements for compensation payable to Tasmania as a result of the cessation of the Gordon-below-Franklin Dam, certain projects to provide alternative work for displaced employees are for the benefit of local government. In 1983-84 approximately \$80 000 was passed on by the State to local authorities for such projects.

FUNDS MADE AVAILABLE TO LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES FROM COMMONWEALTH PAYMENTS TO THE NORTHERN TERRITORY

The Northern Territory Government, like State Governments, passes on funds received under a number of Commonwealth programs to local government authorities in the Territory. The tables in these Appendices provide a comprehensive record of payments by the Commonwealth to and for the States and the Northern Territory for the period 1980-81 to 1983-84 and estimates of payments in 1984-85. These payments may be classified as being provided as:

- general purpose or specific purpose payments;
- payments for recurrent or capital purposes; and
- grants or advances.

Tables are provided which set out the payments on the basis of each method of classification.

Where appropriate, information is also included on payments made direct to local government authorities to show total Commonwealth payments to the State and local government sector.

Appendix I Summary Tables provides tables of total payments to the States and the Northern Territory on each basis of classification, and the rates of growth of various classes of payments. Tables are provided which set out payments on both a gross and net basis. It also includes details of payments to each State and the Northern Territory for the year 1982-83, 1983-84 and 1984-85 (estimated).

Appendix II Tables of General Purpose Capital Funds provides details of the funds available to the States through the State Governments' Loan Council programs and as capital grants, and the financing of the State Governments' Loan Council programs. It also records borrowings by State semi-government and local authorities subject to Loan Council arrangements.

Appendix III Tables of Specific Purpose Payments sets out details of some of the major programs of specific purpose payments to the States described in Chapter IV of this Paper.

Appendix IV Tables of Grants to the States and the Northern Territory, which appears for the first time this year, records for each State and the Northern Territory those payments made by the Commonwealth in the form of grants.

Appendix V Advances, Debt Charges, Net Advances, Net Payments and State Government Debt Outstanding deals with those payments made by the Commonwealth in the form of advances. It sets out the advances and debt charges on advances applicable to each State and thereby permits a detailed reconciliation between Commonwealth payments on a gross basis as set out in this Paper and Commonwealth payments on a net basis as recorded in the other Budget Papers. It also records the levels of debt outstanding in respect of the financing of State Governments' Loan Council borrowing programs.

Appendix VI Commonwealth Payments to or for the States and the Northern Territory and State Governments' Loan Council Borrowings 1980-81 to 1984-85 provides details for the States and the Northern Territory, the six States, and each State and the Northern Territory individually of Commonwealth payments and, in the case of the States, Loan Council borrowings.
